STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The number of trustees shall be not less than 3 and shall not exceed 15.

The Council of the University of Leeds and the Vice-Chancellor of Leeds Beckett University may each appoint and remove by notice in writing one trustee who shall not be required to retire by rotation.

The trustees may co-opt up to two members of staff from the Universities (but for the avoidance of doubt only one from each University) who are willing to be trustees and cause their co-option to cease. Such trustees shall not be required to retire by rotation.

In addition to the University-Staff-Trustees co-opted by the board, the trustees may co-opt up to two further trustees who are willing to act, and may cause their co-option to cease, but such a co-opted trustee holds office only until the next AGM.

WYEC shall appoint an individual to be trustee and a trustee so appointed will hold office of the chairman of the trustee's meeting and shall not be required to retire by rotation.

Except for persons appointed per the above no person shall be appointed or reappointed a trustee at any general meeting or to fill a vacancy unless they are duly and properly nominated by a member of the Charity and have consented to act (or continue to act) as a trustee.

The Charity may by ordinary resolution appoint a person who is willing to act to be trustee either to fill a vacancy or as an additional trustee and may also determine the rotation in which any additional trustees are to retire.

No person may be appointed as trustee unless they have attained the age of 18 years or in circumstances such that, had they already been a trustee, they would have been disqualified from acting under the provisions of Article 7.

Trustees' responsibilities

The business of the Charity shall be managed by the trustees who may exercise all the powers of the Charity.

The trustees shall expend the funds of the Charity in such a manner as they shall consider most beneficial for the achievement of the objects, invest in the name of the Charity such part of the funds as they may see fit, direct the sale or transposition of any such investment and expend the proceeds of any such sale in furtherance of the objects of the Charity.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Background

The Universities' Chaplaincy in Leeds Trust serves the staff and students across both the University of Leeds and Leeds Beckett University. This means supporting the spiritual welfare of approximately 60,000 students and 10,600 staff of all faiths and none. The team works within the oversight of our parent body, the West Yorkshire Ecumenical Council (WYEC), a group of church bodies who have covenanted to work together to provide a chaplaincy service at these universities. Chaplains are from nine different Christian denominations and include both volunteers and stipendiary clergy.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Achievements

The Co-ordinating chaplains continue to work closely with the Chaplaincy Service Manager.

The Student Outreach Worker has continued to be a valuable addition to the services provided by the Chaplaincy Team. Ellie Whitmore-Titterton completed her term of office in June 2014 and Jonathan Evans was appointed from July 2014 on a one year contract.

The Trustees continue to have an excellent working relationship with the senior managers of both Universities. We have also seen some changes with Ann Dudzinski being appointed as Company Secretary, taking over from Felicity Hildred, Catherine Lorigan has been appointed as Trustee for the University of Leeds, taking over-from Andrew Parkinson-and Jan Daley-has been appointed as Trustee for Leeds Beckett University, taking over from Sally Glen. Rachel Muers has also moved from being co-opted trustee, to Quaker Trustee.

The Universities continue to value the contribution of the Chaplaincy to the community life of the universities.

The significant activities of the day to day work continue. These include:

- 1. Crisis support continues to be much appreciated by both Universities in the support of students, staff and their families at times of trauma and death.
- 2. The Chaplaincy now has three chaplains undertaking wellbeing appointments at Leeds Beckett University. Our workshop activities also continue at Leeds Beckett University. A newly appointed Assistant Quaker Chaplain is expected to develop provision at Leeds Beckett including a weekly Meeting for Worship in the Quaker Style ("Breathe").
- 3. Pastoral support for staff and students continues through groups, worship activities and one-to-one pastoral care.
- The Chaplaincy continues to make a major contribution to the success of the International Students Club.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial review

The financial result for the year shows a surplus of £14,657. Reserves have increased to £65,948. Expenditure was £65,689, which is less than the usual expenditure of £80,000. The trust is therefore well placed to develop its Chaplaincy work. The Chaplaincy Service Manager continues to work on seeking additional income to balance future budgets, with room bookings being an area of growth over the year. Both Universities have also increased the amount of money to be paid under the SLAs for the next 3 years.

FUTURE AIMS

The future aims include:

- Increasing chaplaincy provision through staff appointments, effective use of volunteers and interns, and range of activities.
- 2. Developing ways to increase spiritual awareness and opportunity amongst the staff and student populations.
- 3. Exploring the inter-faith context and collaboration, in particular building on partnership with the Muslim Chaplain and events such as Holocaust Memorial Day.
- 4. Publicising the work of the Chaplaincy, widening an awareness in the two institutions on the services we can offer to their staff and students.
- 5. Securing additional funds to continue our work.
- 6. Building on the increased level of collaboration with the Wellbeing Team at Leeds Beckett University.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of The Universities' Chaplaincy in Leeds Trust

I report on the accounts for the year ended 31 August 2014 set out on pages five to twelve.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees (who are also the directors for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year (under Section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act)) and that an independent examination is required.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 August 2014

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Support costs have been allocated based on the time spent on charitable activities and governance costs.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings

- 20% on reducing balance

Computer equipment

- 33% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company contributes to the pension provision of certain members of staff. Contributions payable by the charitable company are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
