Constitution

Wiltshire Archaeological and Natural History Society is a company limited by guarantee, registration number 3885649, governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association and a charity, registration number 1080096 The members of the Society are subscribing members, in the event of the Society being wound up. the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10 per member

Directors and Trustees

The directors of the charitable company (the Society) are its Trustees for the purpose of charitable law and throughout the report are referred to collectively as "the Trustees" As set out in the Articles of Association twelve Trustees are elected by the membership, one third of whom retire each year and are eligible for reelection at the Annual General Meeting In addition up to four Trustees may be nominated, two by Wiltshire Council, and one each by Devizes Town Council, and the Salisbury and South Wiltshire Museum The Trustees have the power to co-opt three additional Trustees who serve until the end of the next Annual General Meeting at which they may be nominated and elected The maximum number of Trustees at any time is twenty

An induction session and other training are provided for all Trustees to familiarise them with the organisation of the Society, its Memorandum and Articles of Association, their legal obligations under company and charitable law, the current forward plan and the financial position and budget Board meetings are held regularly and additional meetings are held during the year to discuss matters of importance to the Society and to brief Trustees on current strategy

CHAIRMAN'S LETTER

The Wiftshire Archaeological and Natural History Society has had yet another highly successful year. The Society's journal has continued to maintain a high standard rivalled by few if any of the publications of other county societies. We have organised a remarkably successful series of lectures on archaeological and historical themes, well attended and much welcomed. Children have poured into the Museum to come to a variety of family events. The Museum itself has held a number of excellent exhibitions, including a remarkable one showing the finds of metal detectors, a once shunned group now agreeably brought within the fold of respectability and responsibility for our heritage.

The staff of the Museum in Devizes continue to be overworked, underpaid, and quite excellent The new Archivist and Librarian, Dr Ellie Pridgeon, performed brilliantly in beginning to put our wonderful collections into professional order. But we lost her when she was appointed to a full-time post at the Science Museum, partly in London and partly at their outpost on Wroughton. We wish her well. We were delighted to welcome Kerry Nicholls as a new Assistant Curator, who has been such a success.

The great loss of the year was the resignation from the Board of Trustees of Lt Col Colvin Chamberlain, a member of the Board for many years and a former Chairman His support of the Society and the Museum over many years is widely recognised, and much appreciated throughout the Society

The most notable event of the year was the settlement, after a long period of quietude and then negotiation, of the Society's residual remaining pension commitment to Wiltshire Council. The large sum claimed was eventually settled at £21,000 a year to be paid over the next 20 years to Wiltshire Council. At the same time, the Council decided to charge us £4,500 per annum in rates, previously waived. This repayment to the Council.

of over £25,000 per year is to be contrasted with their total grant to us of £35,000 per year

When Dr Pridgeon resigned we froze the post, and the Library is now run entirely by volunteers. But the Society really ought to have to a professional archivist to handle our fine collections. Sadly we have not been able to attract any substantial contribution to the costs of running the Museum and Library, both excellent facilities that we are all determined to maintain. It is these costs that produce the annual deficit, carried for many years, in the accounts.

But how can it be paid for? The great news of the year was the award of a major grant of £370,000 from the Heritage Lottery Fund for the reconstruction of our Bronze Age and other prehistoric galleries, plus £100,000 from English Heritage. And we have already raised the extra amount to bring it to over half a million pounds. This is a great achievement for the Museum, and our Director, David Dawson, is particularly to be congratulated for having orchestrated this complex grant.

The paradox for the Museum is that we can get capital grants for our excellent collections, but we struggle to raise the funding to run them. We hope that the new galleries will attract more paying visitors. We hope there will be a 'Stonehenge effect' from the new visitor centre there, just starting to be built, and which will contain exhibits provided by our Museum.

And we hope too that as many members as can afford it will decide to pay their subscriptions to the Society at one of the new 'donor' rates – paying either £60 a year to the Society or £120 a year to the Society That is £5 a month or £10 a month If many more members took up this opportunity it could transform our finances

BOARD OF TRUSTEES' REPORT

The Trustees present their Annual Report, together with the summary financial statements of the charity, for the year ended 31 March, 2012. A copy of the full accounts may be obtained from the Honorary Treasurer

The legal and administrative information set out on page 3 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities

The Director is the senior member of staff responsible for the ongoing operations in consultation with the Chairman

There are separate committees reporting to the Board, responsible for Archaeology, Archaeology Field Group, Buildings and Monuments, Finance, Fundraising, Marketing and Membership, Industrial Archaeology, Archive and Library, Programme, Publications, and Stonehenge A Deficit Working Group was set up during the year Reports from these committees, and professional staff are included in this report

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

DEVELOPMENT

The year began with the completion of work to install a lift and the refurbishment of the new North and South Galleries from the former Natural History Gallery. This marked a major step forward for the Museum, making it more accessible to those who find stairs difficult, including families with pushchairs, or those with walking difficulties. Over the year this has resulted in a significant number of people being able to attend talks and events at the Museum, access the library and see the collections.

During the year, the main central heating boiler had to be urgently replaced, at a cost of £28,000. We were fortunate in raising some grant aid towards this, but it has still been a major drain on our finances.

The Stonehenge Museums Partnership has continued to develop during the year and the Stonehenge Interpretation Strategy (developed by English Heritage working with the Wiltshire Heritage Museum, Salisbury and South Wiltshire Museum, The National Trust and other partners) was launched This has led to joint work on marketing as well as informing the development of our own bid to the Heritage Lottery Fund for support for new Prehistoric Wiltshire Galleries With the support of the North Wessex Downs AONB and a number of other funders, the Museum trialled the 'Henge Hopper' – a community bus service to link Stonehenge and Avebury While those who used the service were enthusiastic, the number of users was too small for it to be economic. It was clear that few visitors recognised that Stonehenge and Avebury could be visited on the same trip opening of the new Stonehenge Visitor Centre and joint marketing will offer the opportunity to restart the service

In March 2012 the Heritage Lottery Fund awarded us £370,000 to support our Prehistoric Wiltshire project to create a new gallery focusing on our outstanding Bronze Age archaeological collections. The new gallery will tell the story of the people who built and used the world renowned monuments of Stonehenge and Avebury. For the first time in generations the unique gold and amber finds from Wiltshire, which date back to the Bronze Age will be displayed. We plan to build on our existing learning and outreach programme to inspire local people and visitors to become engaged and informed about the prehistoric landscapes of Wiltshire.

The story to be told in the new gallery forms part of an integrated approach to the interpretation of Stonehenge The Stonehenge Museums Partnership links the Museum with new galleries being developed by English Heritage for the new Stonehenge Visitor Centre and plans for new galleries at the Salisbury and South Wiltshire Museum English Heritage is supporting the project with a major grant and Wiltshire Council have also helped behind the scenes We hope the new gallery will open in May 2013, ahead of the planned

opening in October 2013 of the Stonehenge Visitor Centre

We continue to work with Wiltshire Council, particularly in relation to the development of the Wiltshire Core Strategy. This is of particular significance as it recognises that new housing developments have a significant impact on archaeology and that there is a need to provide adequate storage for archaeological archives.

We have also been working with others in Devizes to address the closure by Wiltshire Council of the Tourist Information Centre (TIC) in October 2011 This has included Wadworth Visitor Centre, the Kennet & Avon Canal Trust and accommodation providers to host leaflets about local attractions. answer telephone and email enquiries and to begin to promote the town The Devizes Area Tourism Partnership has been supported by a grant from Devizes Town Council and is helping to encourage people to visit the town As a result of the closure of the TIC we hosted the "Cards for Good Causes" providing a venue for the sale of Charity Christmas cards This proved to be very successful, particularly in bringing many people into the Museum that had not visited for some time

ACQUISITIONS

During the year the Museum acquired a number of important objects. The most significant was an Anglo-Saxon gold sword pommel, found near Cricklade and acquired through the Portable Antiquities Scheme after being declared 'treasure' under the Treasure Act. It was the focus of the Vikings and Saxons Family Day held at the Museum in February 2012. We are very grateful to the Beecroft Bequest, The Headley Trust and the V&A Purchase Grant Fund for their grants towards the purchase of this item. We also used a small portion of Den Shelton's generous legacy.

We also acquired a number of significant works of art during the year. These included a 'dummy' book. by artist Eric Ravilious (1903-1942) for a planned Puffin book White Horses The book features pencil drawings, photographs and postcards of the artist's work, including views of Westbury and Uffington White Horses The book was to have been based on Downland Man by H J Massingham, which mentions the Museum and its collections Sadly the book was not completed before Ravilious died on active service as a War Artist in 1942 Four limited edition signed prints by David Inshaw were also acquired (see Art Acquisitions for details) Lord Brooke of Sutton Mandeville kindly gave us a wood engraving of Sutton Mandeville Church by Howard Phipps (signed by the artist and dated 2004)

We are very grateful to all those who have donated objects to the Museum as they help to form an important record of the archaeology and history of the County as well as a rich source for researchers and for exhibitions

LOANS

Over the year we made a number of loans for exhibitions not at the Museum. The most important was the loan of a sepia wash drawing by John Martin Avebury Reconstructed, 1823-4 and a copy of John Britton's Beauties of Wiltshire for the John Martin. Apocalypse exhibition at the Tate Gallery Two chalk axes from Durrington were loaned to Salisbury and South Wiltshire Museum for their 'Out of the Earth' exhibition. Preparations were also made to loan items to English Heritage for their Stonehenge Monumental Journey exhibition at the Quadriga Gallery, Wellington Arch in May 2012

DOCUMENTATION

A full audit of the Wiltshire Life Society collection was carried out, including a conservation check of all the items. All the objects and their locations were recorded and added to the MODES database.

With the assistance of Tim Burge (WC Museums Advisory Service Documentation) 1,000 digital images and 6,000 records were uploaded via MODES to our website in October This included items contained in 600 boxes deposited by Wessex Archaeology and Cotswold Archaeology, and records for over 300 items from the Owen Meyrick Collection, material from excavations at Oliver's Hill Field, Cherhill and Iron Age finds from several Wiltshire sites Digital images of paintings photographed by the Public Catalogue Foundation were also added to the MODES database, the images are also available through the BBC Your The total number of records Paintings website available online is now over 96,000, with 5,700 digital images

We are receiving more enquiries and research requests than any other Museum in the county. This is partly down to the fact that most of the Museum and Library collections are now available to view online. A great deal of the enquiries the curatorial staff received during the year referred to the online catalogue on the 'Search the Collections' part of the website, demonstrating the success of this major project.

RESEARCHERS

We saw many researchers again this year including John Robinson who spent three days in January carrying out research on Dobunnic coins, including coins from Upavon, Potterne and Nettleton. A team from English Heritage and the Oxford Radiocarbon dating laboratory took samples from material excavated in 1969 from Marden Henge by Geoffrey Wainwright. This initial sampling will identify material suitable for radio-carbon dating.

FILMING

The Director was interviewed for *Ancient Skies*, a feature film being produced for dome projection, and due for release in 2013.

CONSERVATION

During the year, the Wiltshire Council Museums Conservation Service supported the Museum by undertaking a number of projects. These included the preparation of the Anglo-Saxon sword pommel from near Cricklade for display and the conservation.

of bones excavated from Lanhill long barrow. We also received assistance with a pest infestation of our costume store and with woodworm discovered in several items in the Wiltshire Life Society collection.

EXHIBITIONS

A diverse range of exhibitions where held during the year and the new, albeit temporary, North and South Galleries were also utilised, meaning that often we had three temporary exhibitions on display at any one time

Landscapes of Thomas Hardy's Wessex - 28 May to 29 August 2011 An exhibition of works by Rob Pountney, Dave Gunning and David Inshaw, depicting the spectacular landscapes and ancient archaeological sites that feature in the novels and poems of Thomas Hardy Over 100 people attended the preview and subsequent sales resulted in nearly £2,500 commission

Devizes Camera Club, an exhibition of photographic works by members - 4 September to 2 October 2011

The Past is Another Country an Exhibition by the Elementals Art Group - 5 November 2011 to 2 January 2012 A display of artworks by the Elementals group, local artists - Jenny Ford, Jan Knight, Julia Leyden, Christine Shorney, Josephine Sumner, plus guest artist Charlotte Sainsbury The artwork had been inspired by the prehistory of Wiltshire and our own collections

Landscape with Stones paintings and woodcuts by Nick Schlee - 14 January to 2 September 2012 Oil paintings and woodcuts focusing on Avebury and the Ridgeway. Linked to this exhibition were three PAWS workshops with artist Belinda Chandler, organised between the Museum and the Army Welfare Service for Larkhill Mums and Tots group

Temporary Exhibition Gallery

Collecting Bug – 21 May to 30 August 2011 Personal collections from members and the general public included decorated miniature plates, elephants (representations of in a variety of materials from wood and ceramic to pava shell, soapstone and welsh coal), model steam engines, bar brooches and World War One postcards and medals

Crafts for Christmas - 15 October 2011 to January 2012 An exhibition of works by local businesses including watercolours by Wendy Trinder, glass sculpture by Sandra Young, handbags by Steve Weekes, pewter ware by Glover and Smith, crafts by Angela Bowerman plus doll's house furniture and crochet hats and scarves

Detecting Wiltshire's Past - 19 February to 2 September 2012 An exhibition of finds by the Trowbridge Metal Detecting Club, recorded with the Portable Antiquities Scheme Highlighting the collaboration between the Museum, metal detectorists and Wiltshire's Finds Liaison Officer,

and the contribution the scheme and responsible detecting make to local archaeology

North and South Galleries

Devizes District Great War - 18 June to 17 July 2011 This exhibition, developed by local author Richard Broadhead to complement his book of the same title, proved very popular and the end date was extended An evening lecture was also well attended

The Story of Devizes - May to September 2012 Although opening after the end of the year under review, work commenced on this new exhibition early in 2012. This included an invitation for those with long memories to come and share their stories, pictures and objects with us. Many of them will be included in the exhibition.

Archive and Library Showcase Displays

Two showcases in the Long Room are now being used to highlight material held in our collections and subjects included Wiltshire Churches and the village of Aldbourne

EVENTS AND VISITORS

In addition to the exhibitions, a full programme of events for members and visitors were organised Many will be mentioned elsewhere in this report, but include the Saturday lectures, Wednesday lunchtime talks, outings, activities for children The Industrial Archaeology and Family Days Symposium was held in October 2011 and continues to be as popular as ever There were also a number of new events this year, including the Director leading evening tours around Stonehenge, evening classes on a variety of topics and very popular 'Night at the Museum' evenings run by John Girvan All these events have brought new visitors to the Museum, raised our profile, and, brought in much needed income

The total number of visitors for the financial year was 21,576, slightly below that of previous years An increase in admission charges in January 2012 may have contributed to a lower than expected number of 'feet through the door' visitors early in the year, although this decline was shared by other local tourist attractions. On the plus side there was an increase in attendance at events, use of our Lecture Hall by outside organisations — partly the result of the closure of the Crown Centre for a number of weeks in 2011 — and casual visitors due to hosting the Cards for Good Causes scheme in December 2011

MUSEUM STAFF

Ali Rushent was on maternity leave from May 2011, her daughter Amelia arriving in June Rebecca Warren covered Ali's maternity leave between May and December, when she left to take up a post as Schools Liaison Officer with the Cheltenham Festivals Ali returned from maternity leave in March 2012 and will be working part-time

Curator Lisa Webb married Dr David Brown in May and her daughter Charlotte was born in November Charlotte made her first visit to the Museum for the Volunteer's Christmas Party in December Lisa will return from maternity leave in Autumn 2012 Our Future Jobs Fund employee (employed via Wiltshire Council for a period of six months), Steve Nolan, finished his contract on 20 June 2011 This employment helped him secure a permanent post with a local business

Kerry Nickels joined the staff in June 2011 as an Assistant Curator, to enable the Director and Curator to concentrate on the Stage 2 bid to the Heritage Lottery Fund

The Archivist and Librarian, Dr Ellie Pridgeon, left at the end of November to take up the post of Deputy Archivist at the Science Museum (London and Wroughton)

Archive and Library

The management and storage of the archive and library collections were substantially improved over the year. A programme of cleaning, tidying and deduplicating was completed, along with an audit of the book collections to check the completeness and accuracy of the records. In addition, items at risk were identified and a report commissioned to support a funding application to the National Manuscripts. Conservation. Trust. This was in addition to a busy year spent helping people answer a wide variety of research topics.

In January 2011 Mike Marshman, County Local Studies Librarian, recommended the transfer of the Wiltshire Gazettes (held at the Museum, but on loan from the Devizes Gazette and Herald), to the Wiltshire and Swindon History Centre in Chippenham. He indicated that the storage conditions at the Museum were poor and the volumes were deteriorating rapidly due to constant use by readers. Gary Lawrence (Editor, Gazette and Herald) viewed the collection and approved the transfer, which duly took place in August. The Gazettes would no longer be accessible to readers because of their fragile condition.

Education

The service offered by the Education Officers during the year continued delivering formal education activities, running half-term holiday activities, Young WANHS sessions and participating in the Family Open Day at Riverbourne Community Farm, Salisbury The Family Days continue to be popular and three were held during the year

Volunteers

The Society relies upon the support and enthusiasm of a team of volunteers. During the year we have welcomed many new volunteers and have completed work on a Volunteer Policy, which aims to recognise their contribution and also to guide volunteers and staff engaged in voluntary work and management.

CONSERVATION

In February, Helen Williams, senior conservator from the WC Museum Service carried out the biannual conservation visit to the Museum This involved the inspection of all galleries and store rooms, including our off-site store, to check environmental conditions, including light and humidity levels, and to look for any signs of pest infestation or pollution

The costume store was found to have a pest infestation All affected items were removed and sent to Wiltshire Council Conservation Service to undergo treatment and repacking. The source of the infestation was identified as a boarded up window in the cupboard. The cupboard has now been conservation cleaned and the window has been sealed and blacked out instead of being blocked off. The costume and textiles have now been returned to the store and regular monitoring of insect sticky traps is now being carried out.

The Wiltshire Life Society collection was found to have several objects with active woodworm. Most of these items were also treated by the Conservation Service and have been returned to the Hopton store. Several of the larger items have been isolated and are awaiting conservation treatment along with the remaining carts in the collection at Lackham.

The newly acquired gold Saxon pommel cap (DZSWS 2011 61) was cleaned and treated by Helen Williams at Wiltshire Conservation Service in January in order for the object to go on permanent display in the Saxon Gallery The pommel cap was officially unveiled as part of our Saxon and Viking Family Day in February

As mentioned elsewhere in this report, the Archivist & Librarian, Dr Ellie Pridgeon, left in November 2011 and the post frozen. The Archive and Library does remains open to visitors, although advance notice of intended visits is requested so material can be got out beforehand. Appointments can also be made to use the Archive and Library on the first Saturday of the month. The work of book and document preservation and cataloguing on MODES is being continued by volunteers, many of whom have valuable relevant experience. A list of the Society's extensive holdings of journals, dating back to 1770, is now available on the website. The acquisition of books has been reported elsewhere in the report.

Due to their increasingly fragile state it was unfortunately necessary to transfer the bound copies of the Wiltshire Gazette and Herald to the Wiltshire and Swindon History Centre, where they will no longer be available in the library and stored in controlled conditions. The work in the archive has yielded some interesting discoveries, notably a 19th century tracing of a mural in Highworth Church, since painted over

Programme

The events programme continues to be very busy and popular. Two 'Night at the Museum' events with John Girvan were very popular and it is hoped to organise something similar for children in the coming year. Sadly two lectures, including the Fundraising Lecture, had to be cancelled due to ill health, but many forwent a refund. The summer outings continued to be popular and help to generate much needed income for the Society Volunteers to assist with organising and running these events are very welcome.

Stonehenge

Committee members have continued to monitor and advise on all aspects of the management of the Stonehenge World Heritage Site In this year English Heritage has brought its Visitor Centre to the point of construction, and announced the timetable for the welcomed closure of the A303 junction and removal of the A344 roadway by Stonehenge itself Members have participated in the initial consultation associated with the Woodland Strategy and Governance Review underway for both halves of the World Heritage Site The Committee has recognised that many of the pressures on the Stonehenge WHS are being experienced in Avebury, in some aspects, such as tree planting, often with significant impact on monuments and their setting. The Committee has therefore proposed to the Board that its remit be extended to include also the Avebury part of the World Heritage Site

TRUSTEES' FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2012

TRUSTEES' FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITIES

The Trustees (who are directors for the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that Law the Directors have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). Under company law the Directors must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Society and the income and expenditure for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the

Trustees are required to

- Select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently,
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Company will continue to operate

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Internal risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for the authorisation of all transactions and projects are costed initially and monitored on a regular basis. The Board employ Williams de Broe to manage both the investment portfolio and the endowment fund portfolio with the primary investment objective to achieve a balanced return from income and capital with a medium level of risk.

The Society does not hold any indemnity insurance against any liability for negligence, default, breach of duty or breach of trust by a Trustee

RISK ASSESSMENT

The risk assessments for all galleries are reviewed regularly and a risk assessment is made of all activities undertaken. On the financial side a budget is prepared each year assessing the likely income receivable and costs of activities, which is monitored carefully and reported to the Trustees at

each Board meeting

RESERVES AND FUNDRAISING

The Trustees consider, in line with the Charity Commission advice, that the Society should have general reserves equivalent to at least one year's costs, that is some £300,000, to provide a measure of security, however, as the Society is dependent on its investments to provide ongoing income for its operations the reserves have to be substantially greater. In 2011-12 investment income was £23,500 Without this contribution the operational deficit was £113,000 With markets showing substantial declines since our year end it is difficult to calculate the additional capital input required to keep the Society solvent on its present level of activity Based on an optimistic 4% return a capital input of some £2,000,000 would be necessary to obtain financial security

FINANCIAL REVIEW

This has been another challenging year for the Society. The budget deficit on operations for the year was £76,000, against the actual deficit of £90,000. An unexpected net cost for a boiler replacement (after a grant of £5,000 from the Wiltshire Council) of £23,000, more than accounted for the main part of this difference.

We received support from Wiltshire Council who continued their grant of £35,500, which was supplemented for this year only by underwriting the newly introduced property rates charge of £4,500. We also received £3,000 from Devizes Town Council. Both these grants are very useful as they are available for core expenses.

Specific grants were contributed by the Heritage Lottery Fund for development work on the Prehistoric Wiltshire Galleries project, Devizes Area Board of Wiltshire Council towards the cost of replacing boilers

Specific project grants enable the Society to extend its work in ways it would be unable to undertake without such support and we are extremely grateful for all the grants we receive

Our capital reserves are now £496,000 and as stated the Trustees consider that these should not fall below £300,000. There is also an ongoing pension liability as described in Note 1 to the accounts. Without any material improvements in income the Society will have to seriously consider its viability by the middle of 2014.

Our staff are fully aware of the situation and working as a team continue to maintain our normal high standards. Expenditure is closely monitored and monthly accounts are produced to ensure we are operating to budget.

Investment income from the Society's portfolio and from the Sandell Trust was £49,000, the same amount as last year £125,000 was drawn from the Society's portfolio mainly to finance our operating deficit of £90,000. After taking into account profits on realised and unrealised gains of £15,500 the net deficit was reduced to £74,000.

A series of lectures on varied subjects were well received and well attended. An evening lecture series on experimental archaeology run by Katy Whitaker was very popular and it is hoped to run similar courses next year. The summer outings alo continued to be popular and helped to generate much needed income for the Society. £1,500 will be transferred to the Society's general accounts as a result of these activities.

ENDOWMENT FUND

The Fund is managed by Williams de Broe on a low to medium risk mandate, and, thanks to donations from members, dividends received and profit on unrealised investments, the value has increased in the year by £5,000 to £106,700

Under the terms of the Endowment Trust the capital is not available for distribution but must be invested to provide income for the Society at some future date to be decided by the Trustees

INCOMING RESOURCES

Incoming resources are allocated on the basis of the purposes for which they are raised, the income for designated and restricted funds being credited to those funds. The accounts include £135,000 for restricted funds, primarily the Endowment Fund. These funds are not available to the Society for general use and must therefore be disregarded when assessing the Society's financial position. On this basis there was a decrease in the funds attributable to the Society of £74,000, primarily due to the operating deficit.

FORWARD PLAN

Each year the Board approves a Forward Plan that contains objectives and targets for the year Most targets for 2011-2012 were fully achieved, including the installation of a lift, visitor figures target, increased membership, and improvements in storage and the use of the membership database. A few objectives fell short of target, or were held over for lack of funding, particularly in view of the general economic situation. The plan for 2012-2013 aims to complete a Stage 2 bid to the HLF, continue to increase membership and income, as well as to work in partnership with Wiltshire Council on museum storage and English Heritage on the development of the Stonehenge Visitor Centre

RELATED PARTIES

For many years the Society has enjoyed a close relationship with the Salisbury and South Wiltshire Museum as demonstrated by the reciprocal arrangement for free entry to the museums for members of each organisation and co-operation on exhibitions, Adrian Green is a nominee on the Board and our Director is a nominee on The support of Wiltshire Council their Board in providing funding to the Society is gratefully acknowledged together with the contributions to the Board of their and the Devizes Town Council nominated Trustees The Wiltshire Council conservation staff have continued to give great support and help to the Society We are pleased to be working with English Heritage on the proposed Stonehenge Visitor Centre, and hope that more visitors to Stonehenge will be encouraged to visit the Museum The Board is aware that progress through partnership is the most effective pathway to success and will be pursuing every available opportunity to build strong partnerships

AUDITORS

David Owen & Co were re-appointed as auditors of the Company at the Annual General Meeting and have expressed their willingness to continue to act

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2012

1. Statement of Accounting Policies

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), Accounting and Reporting by Charities', and applicable accounting standards Where necessary the headings laid down in the Act have been adapted to meet the special activities of the Company The Company qualifies as a small company under the Act and the Trustees have elected to take advantage of the exemption under FRS 1 not to prepare a cash flow statement

Company Status

The Company is a company limited by guarantee The members of the company are subscribing members. In the event of the Company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10 a member.

Tangible Fixed Assets and Depreciation

Tangible fixed assets costing more than £4,000 are capitalised and included at cost. Grant funded purchases are written off in the year of acquisition. Depreciation is provided on all fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost on a straight line basis over the expected useful economic life as follows.

Freehold Land

Nil

Freehold Buildings

over 50 years

Fixtures, Fittings and Equipment

over 5 years

Investments

Realised gains and losses are taken to the Statement of Financial Activities and unrealised gains and losses are shown separately in that statement. Investment Income has been taken into account on the basis of the due date of payment.

Stock

Stock consists of purchased goods for resale and unsold publications. Stocks are valued at the lower of cost or net realisable value after making allowance for obsolete and slow moving stock.

Incoming Resources

Legacies are normally taken into account when received and if not given for specific purposes are utilised either for general expenditure or for the specific purposes which the Trustees believe the Testator would have approved

Donations of items for resale are included in receipts when received

Subscriptions are spread over the year in which they are received. No life membership subscriptions were received in the year.

All receipts and expenditure are shown in full in the accounts

Grants - where a grant is, wholly or partly, in respect of expenditure to be incurred in the following financial year the appropriate sum is deducted from income and included in liabilities as grants received in advance. Conversely in the following year this procedure is reversed with grants being withdrawn from grants received in advance and treated as income of the current year.

Allocation of Expenditure

Throughout the financial statements, where it is necessary to allocate staff or other costs over objective heads (i.e. Museum, Archive and Library etc.), this has been done on the assessment of the Director and the Treasurer

Pensions

At 31 March 2012 pension provision was made for four employees by membership of The Pension Trust Scheme, a defined contribution pension scheme. All other employees have been offered membership of this scheme but did not wish to join or were past the age for admittance. Employer's contributions of £5,078 (2011 £5,102) are charged to employee costs as incurred. The Society ceased to be a scheme employer in the Wiltshire Pension Fund (the local authority scheme) on 29 February 2008 when the former Curator retired At that date the scheme was under-funded and under the rules a withdrawing employer is required to make a cessation deficit payment to meet the difference between the liabilities and assets of its share of the fund, which the Fund's actuary advised was £423,000 The Society has entered into an agreement with Wiltshire Council whereby the Council has undertaken to guarantee this sum against future variations in the value of the assets and liabilities, which allowed the Fund to revalue the deficit to £261,000 on an 'ongoing' basis Payments towards this of £20,000 were made in earlier years, so reducing this sum to £241,000 Agreement has been reached to fund this liability over 20 years with payments of £21,000 per year up to and including December 2031 Payments amounting to £5,250 were made in the year to 31 March 2012, (2011 £800) and charged to employee costs

Capital Reserve

The Capital Reserve shown in these accounts arises from the transfer of assets, reserves, funds and liabilities from the original Society and represents the balance on the General Fund at the 22 November 2003

Going Concern

These financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis

The Wiltshire Archaeological and Natural History Society Endowment Fund

The Endowment Fund is a charity established to raise and hold capital, the income from which will be used to support the activities of the Wiltshire Archaeological and Natural History Society. The Company is the corporate trustee of the Fund which shares the Company's charity registration number. Under the terms of the Charity Registration the accounts of the Fund are included in the Company's accounts but as a separate charity these funds do not form part of the Company's assets.

The Wiltshire Archaeological and Natural History Society Collections Trust

The Company is the Corporate Trustee of the Collections Trust which owns the Collections On 3 March 2004, the Charity Commission issued a Uniting Direction under Section 96 (5) of the Charities Act 1993 stating that the Collections Trust shall be treated as forming part of the Company for the purposes of registration and accounting. The Direction points out that the Company will be the reporting charity and the Collections Trust will be the linked charity. However "the Company does not hold the endowment of the Collections Trust as corporate property The Company is the Trustee of the endowment and holds the property in trust. At no time can the endowment of the Collections Trust be considered an asset of the Company " Accounts for the Collections Trust have been set up within the Company's books and separate bank accounts have been established. Acquisitions for the collections are made by the Collections Trust The Collection Trust Accounts are included as a separate schedule with these accounts

To give a consistent view the assets transferred from the original Society have been included at the values in its books. The property was valued professionally in 1987 at £145,500, now divided between land and buildings. The Trustees are of the opinion that the costs of revaluation would not provide sufficient benefits to justify the expenditure involved.

Chairman's Opening Address

The Chairman introduced himself to the meeting and said it was a great honour to be allowed to lead this organisation in the interesting county of Wiltshire He welcomed members to the 158th meeting of the Wiltshire Archaeological and Natural History Society and the twelfth Annual General Meeting since its reconstitution in to a Company Limited by Guarantee

The meeting stood for a few minutes to remember those members of the Society who had died since the last AGM Mr D H Bradfield, Mrs Manlyn F Day, Mrs A M Dumbreck, Mr R David Margesson, Mrs S Menali Moore, Mr J C Morgan, Mr Shaun Ogbourne, Mr F V J Small and Mr A H Tomsett Note these names are those notified to the Membership Secretary, the Society apologises for any omissions

04/11 Minutes of meeting held 9 October 2010
The Chairman thanked Mrs Wendy Lansdown for all her years of service to the Museum and Society and introduced

Mrs Karen Jones as her successor as Company Secretary Proposed by Mr J Ody and seconded by Mr P Saunders, the minutes of the AGM held on 9 October 2010 were adopted as a true record of the meeting nem con

Board of Trustees' Report and Accounts for the year ended 31st March 2011

a - Report by the Chairman

In addition to an active programme of lectures and outings, a splendid new lift had been installed in the Museum and the Natural History Gallery cleared out to form two temporary exhibition spaces, during which a fine Victorian floor had been re-discovered

b - Report by the Treasurer

Mr Peter Glasson commenced his report by thanking staff and trustees for their help and assistance during his first full year in office, and in particular the invaluable support of his predecessor, Mrs Wendy Lansdown The abbreviated version of the Annual Report and Accounts had been circulated to all members, the more detailed accounts were available on request from the Company Secretary or via our website

Major income in the year were £271,000 from the Wiltshire Life Society (held as a designated fund), and £145,000 received from the DCMS/Wolfson for the lift. However, there was a deficit for the year was of £79,000 and due to a fall in the stock market investments had decreased by £38,000, including on the Endowment Fund Members should be aware, however, that funds are invested on a low to medium risk basis and have therefore suffered less than the all share index

The ability of the Society to remain a viable entity was continually questioned. The position had now arrived that in a little over two years it would not be possible to operate within our existing establishment. At the last year end the reserves were £570,000, with designated and restricted funds of £426,000 - which could not be used to support the Society The projected deficit for the year to 31 March 2012, before revaluation of investments, would be in the region of £120,000, including £28,000 for replacing the Museum boiler which was

believed to be about 30 years old - Devizes Area Board had awarded us a £5,000 grant towards this cost. If there was also a deficit of £120,000 in the following year the accounts would be very close to the £300,000 reserve deemed necessary by the Board of Trustees. It was recognised that in the past large legacies and donations the Society had been received, but that it would be unwise to base operating policies on such expectations. It was possible that investments would recover over this period, but this would not happen quickly

The Treasurer assured the members that the Trustees were fully aware of the seriousness of the situation and had set up a working group to make recommendations on how to reduce the scale of the annual deficits. Painful decisions could be necessary to ensure the Company did not breach its statutory obligations. The Treasurer concluded that it was a shame he had to deliver such a report in his first year and stressed again that all Trustees were aware of the situation.

Mr Arthur Lansdown, asked the Treasurer why the Wiltshire Life Society (WLS) funds (Note 16, page 25 of the Annual Report and Financial Statements) had been designated rather than restricted. He suggested this had not been the wish of the donor, and that the Board of Trustees should change this. He further added that the meeting should not receive the Report and Accounts until the status of the WLS funds had been changed and the notes amended. The Treasurer advised that the distinction between designated and restricted funds was somewhat tenuous, but that there was no intention to use the WLS funds to finance WANHS. The issue had been discussed by the Board of Trustees at length and they had agreed the funds should be designated. There was an agreement between WANHS and the WLS to this affect. The matter could be reviewed and legal advice sought if necessary Although Mr Lansdown remained unhappy, he agreed with Lt Col Chamberlain's suggestion that the Trustees review the matter at their next Board meeting

The meeting noted the Treasurer's very blunt report regarding the financial situation and asked what plans existed to rectify the situation, and whether an action plan would be made available to the members. The Chairman advised that the Board had formed a working group on this issue, who would report to the next meeting of the Trustees. It was noted that Wiltshire was very rare in having museum run by a society, which was very expensive. Museums run by societies in Dorset, Sussex and Cornwall all faced a similar problem as did the Salisbury and South Wiltshire Museum, despite the success of their recent Constable exhibition.

Proposed by the Lord Lieutenant, Mr J Bush, and seconded by Mr T O'Flynn, and subject to the Board of Trustees reviewing whether the Wiltshire Life Society funds should be restricted or designated, the meeting received the Trustees Report and Annual Accounts for the year ended 31 March 2011, together with the Auditors' Report There were two abstentions

Wiltshire Pension Fund

Mr Perry briefed the meeting on the background of why WANHS would be paying a cessation deficit payment to the Wiltshire Pension Scheme, a final salary scheme run by Wiltshire Council WANHS staff had been members of the scheme until some 15 years ago when, as it had become increasingly expensive, it was closed to new staff - who now had the opportunity to join a defined benefit scheme run by the Pensions Trust In 2008 WANHS formally withdrew from the Wiltshire Pension scheme on the retirement of the last remaining contributing employee

Unfortunately in 2008, as with many other pension funds the Wiltshire Pension Scheme, and our share of it, were underfunded. Under the scheme rules WANHS are required to make a 'cessation deficit payment' to cover the difference between our share of the assets of the fund and the liabilities for pensions to our former staff. The initial request was for £425,000, but negotiations over the last three years have reduced this to £241,000, mostly due to Wiltshire Council agreeing to act as a guarantor for our liability, regardless of whether in the meantime the investments perform less well then predicted and pensionsers live longer than predicted

Although a greatly reduced sum, the repayment would still be crippling and if it were paid now it would bring our funds perilously close to the £300,000 minimum. Wiltshire Council had, however, offered the opportunity to pay over 20 years at a rate, including interest (at a fixed rate), of £21,000 per annum. A condition of the offer would be a charge on our Long Street property - the amount claimed equivalent to the outstanding amount at the time of any default. Legal and financial advice had been sought and although some issues were still to be clarified, it was likely that the Board would accept the defered

payment option Mr Perry was thanked for his presentation and helping to bring this long outstanding matter to a close

Director's Report

There had been a number of staff changes during the year, including the retirement of Dr Lorna Haycock and Mrs Margaret Clarke and both Curator Mrs Lisa Brown and Education Officer, Mrs Ali Rushent, were both on maternity leave. There had been many events and exhibitions during the year. Evening classes had been held on a number of topics and a variety of exhibitions including the Landscapes of Thomas Hardy's Wessex exhibition - a collaboration between artists David Inshaw, Dave Gunning and Rob Pountney and the Collecting Bug curated by Mrs Heather Ault. The Archaeology Field Group had been very busy, including organising an exhibition about Calne Castle at Calne Heritage Centre which had been very popular.

There was much going on behind the scenes too. A store had been acquired to house the Wiltshire Life Society collection and roller racking had been installed for the Library's 12,000 journals. A lift had been installed and in preparation for the new Prehistoric Wiltshire galleries the Natural History Gallery had been closed and emptied to form two temporary galleries. They were already being put to good use hosting the 'Cards for Good Causes' in the run up to Christmas and a Devizes exhibition was planned for the spring – using new cases purchased due to the DCMS/Wolfson grant. The Heritage Lottery Fund had awarded a stage 1 grant for the Prehistoric Wiltshire galleries project and work on the stage II application, which included an activity plan, was progressing Mr Robert Clarke was thanked for his generous contribution to the project, he had donated proceeds from his recently published book 'Prehistoric Wiltshire' – visitors at Avebury had already been spotted with a copy!

One of the highlights of the items added to the collections during the year was the scout uniform owned by one of our Patrons, Phil Harding, and a Saxon sword pommel found near Cricklade. We hoped to acquire the pommel, which had been valued at £7,500, and grants of £4,000 had already been secured. Further funding would be sought and a small portion of the £10,000 legacy received from Mr D N Shelton would also be used

A Devizes Areas Tourism Partnership had been formed to work on attracting more visitors to Devizes and ensuring tourist information remained available despite the closure of the Devizes Visitor Centre in September 2011

The Director thanked his colleagues for all their hard work and the volunteers for all they do for the Society

06/11 Election of Trustees

Under the Society's constitution one-third of elected Trustees, excluding Officers, had to retire by rotation each year. The three retiring Trustees, Mr Gunter, Mr Perry and Mrs Triggs, had all served their maximum term (i.e. six years) and were not eligible for re-election. All were thanked for their contribution to the Society

The proposed new Trustees were Mrs Sarah Ingram Hill (a business woman), Dr David Field (an archaeologist of distinction) and Mr Doug Roseaman (who had been in charge of fundraising for many years and had been co-opted to the Board of Trustees during the year). All had been proposed and seconded and the meeting duly elected to the Board of Trustees nem con Mrs Sarah Ingram Hill, Dr David Field and Mr Doug Roseaman.

07/11 Appointment of Auditors

Proposed by Lt Col R C Chamberlain and seconded by Ms A N Hemmins, the meeting unanimously re-elected Messrs David Owen & Co as Auditors, and authorised the Trustees to determine their remuneration

08/11 Any Other Business

The Chairman highlighted the work of our devoted and helpful volunteers and in recognition of her contribution to the Society Mrs Joan Friend was presented with Honorary Life Membership

The Director was thanked for incorporating the Museum in the local tourism network

There being no further business the Chairman thanked everyone for attending the meeting

The meeting closed at 3 28 pm and was followed by a lecture West Kennet Long Barrow - Investigation and Reconstruction by Julian Richards
