DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2010

The directors present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2010

Principal activities

The group provides UK and US charities with user-friendly on-line fundraising services that help them maximise donations and cut costs

Business review and future developments

In 2010, total donations for the Giving group amounted to £249m compared to £215m in the previous year – growth of 16% in spite of difficult economic conditions in both the UK and USA

JustGiving

In 2010 Giving com Limited (trading as "JustGiving") confirmed its leadership of the UK's online fundraising industry with £214m (2009 - £189m) raised for 7,690 charities (2009 - 6,511 charities), at a time of great change and uncertainty for the charity sector

One of the company's most notable achievements was to secure a landmark victory in relation to the VAT element of our transaction fees. In September 2007, we challenged HMRC's view that our transaction fees on donations should be subject to VAT. Since most charities cannot reclaim any of this VAT, it increased the cost of their online fundraising. Three years on, our view was upheld by HMRC with the result that we were able to stop charging VAT on transaction fees on 1 January 2011.

The impact of this VAT change will be significant, our cost base will increase by approximately 8% due to irrecoverable VAT on our costs. Our decision to challenge HMRC on this issue illustrates the way we run the business, always putting our charity customers and users first, even if it means significantly diminishing the company's financial performance in the short term.

Our 2010 growth was made possible by the continued trust placed in JustGiving by its member charities, and our sustained investment in creating the technologies and tools that make giving online a rewarding and enjoyable experience for charity supporters. To make this investment in future product development for the benefit of our charities possible, we took out a bank loan for £2 5m in December 2010 which will be repaid over 3 years. This will enable us to remain highly innovative in the coming years.

2010 saw JustGiving expand beyond the confines of its website for the first time. We launched mobile applications that enable individual fundraiser's to tell their story and canvas their friends for donations while on the move. We integrated our service ever more closely with Facebook and other social media tools, and released a new version of our Facebook application for fundraiser's that tipped our number of application users over the one-million mark. These developments continued to prove the ever-growing British public's appetite for what we now call 'social fundraising'.

At the request of our users, we evolved our site to better highlight and celebrate the work of small and local charities, improving our search facilities and launching fundraising for "Projects", a selection of small-scale developing-country initiatives that our users can fund, and keep in close touch with. This offering, run in partnership with non-profit organisation GlobalGiving, is one of a new range of services designed to make giving more meaningful and rewarding for donors. The JustGiving community's appetite for supporting smaller, local causes is growing, and we will continue to develop our product in that direction in 2011.

We also delivered significant service improvements to our charity members. We created new online dashboards for charities to monitor their fundraising performance more easily. We also expanded our data support programme, a combination of technology and training, it enables our charities to automate the transfer of JustGiving data into their donor databases, cutting their data administration time by an average of 90% Innovation in this area continues apace.

DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2010

While all our new tools are built with absolute simplicity and ease of use in mind, we continue to believe that prompt, expert customer support is an essential part of the great user experience with which JustGiving has become synonymous with As a consequence, we started providing customer service support seven days a week, both on e-mail and on the phone, to great user acclaim

2010 was also a year of fundamental change for JustGiving that, though imperceptible at first to our users, will have a transformative effect on the business and the sector at large. We transformed JustGiving from a website to a platform, with the release in October of a first suite of APIs, (Application Programming Interfaces) - web services that will enable not only Giving group companies but, most importantly, other partners and third parties to leverage our technologies to create new giving applications and new businesses

The significance of this change cannot be over-estimated. Its first visible application was the use of the technology in late 2010 (and an official launch in January 2011) for Cancer Research UK's flagship event series, Race for Life, to enable the charity to deliver a ready-made JustGiving page to every woman registering for a race online — a huge innovation for the sector as a whole according to Cancer Research UK. Other charities are following into Cancer Research UK's footsteps, to create their own version of the JustGiving service easily and at low cost, in turn taking online giving to greater heights

These continuous innovations are testament to the creativity and imagination of the JustGiving team, and the long-term vision of our investors. They continue to prove the value of the unique combination of business acumen and single-minded commitment to the Third Sector that JustGiving embodies. These values — of continuous innovation, ground-breaking use of technology, and passion for great user experience — continue to guide us and set JustGiving apart.

FirstGiving

2010 saw continued investment into our US business. We focused on strengthening the product, partnerships and technology teams to build a stronger core product and form strategic partnerships to grow donation volumes for our US charity members.

We also opened a second US office, in San Francisco, to enable FirstGiving to tap into West Coast technology talent

In late 2010, FirstGiving launched a customisable donation service to enable charities to take donations from their own websites and e-mail campaigns using our technology

Results and dividends

The profit for the year, after taxation, amounted to £509,991 (2009 - £1,502,398)

The directors do not recommend the payment of a dividend (2009 - £NIL)

Financial instruments

The group does not actively use financial instruments as part of its financial risk management. It is exposed to the usual credit risk and cash flow risk associated with selling on credit and manages this through credit control procedures. However, since the majority of our revenues are deducted from the Gift Aid that we claim on behalf of charities (thus ensuring charities receive the full donation within days of it being made on our website), our credit and cash flow risk is minimal compared to other companies.

Employee involvement

The group is committed to the principle of employee involvement in all aspects of the business. All employees participate in a profit sharing scheme and are eligible for share options. We are also committed to ensuring all staff are actively involved in regular personal and professional development initiatives.

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the company's and group's financial statements

1 1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards

1.2 Restatement of comparative figures

The turnover and cost of sales in the prior period has been restated to reflect the treatment of certain rebates as a reduction in turnover rather than a cost of sale. The effect of this restatement is a decrease in turnover by £352,247 and a decrease in cost of sales by the same amount. There is no affect on the reported profit.

1.3 Basis of consolidation

The financial statements consolidate the accounts of Giving Limited and all of its subsidiary undertakings ('subsidiaries')

In the company's balance sheet, the investment in Giving com Limited is stated at the nominal value of shares issued in consideration for that company. As permitted by sections 612 and 615 of the Companies Act 2006, no premium has been recorded on the shares issued in consideration. On consolidation, the difference between the nominal value of shares issued and received has been credited directly to the merger reserve.

1.4 Company profit and loss account

The company has taken advantage of the exemption conferred by the Companies Act 2006 section 408 from publishing its own profit and loss account During the period the company made a loss of £395,740 (2009 - £136,059)

1.5 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases.

Leasehold improvements - over 5 years
Fixtures and fittings - over 5 years
Computer hardware and software - over 3 years
Other fixed assets - over 5 years

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2010

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

16 Deferred taxation

Full provision is made for deferred tax assets and liabilities arising from all timing differences between the recognition of gains and losses in the financial statements and recognition in the tax computation

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of the retained earnings of an overseas subsidiary, associate or joint venture only to the extent that there is a commitment to remit the earnings

A net deferred tax asset is recognised only if it can be regarded as more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of the underlying timing differences can be deducted

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are calculated at the tax rates expected to be effective at the time the timing differences are expected to reverse

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are not discounted

1.7 Turnover

Turnover represents commissions and fees earned during the period, net of Value Added Tax

1.8 Foreign currencies

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate ruling on the date of the transaction

In the group financial statements, translation differences arising on consolidation of the net investments in overseas subsidiaries are taken to reserves. All other exchange differences are taken to the profit and loss account

1.9 Share based payments

Directors, senior managers and other qualifying staff of the group have been granted options to subscribe for ordinary shares All options are share settled

The fair value of services received in return for share options granted is measured by reference to the fair value of the share options granted, at date of grant, and this is expensed on a straight line basis over the estimated vesting period. This estimate is determined using the Black-Scholes valuation model considering the effects of the vesting conditions, expected exercise period and the payment of dividends by the group
