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African Caribbean Community Initiative (A.C.C.I.) - Chair's Foreword for the year ended 31 March 2020

The African Caribbean Community Initiative, (A.C.C.I.) was initially set up in the 1980's as a response to concerns raised by the Wolverhampton Rastafarian Progressive Association about the disproportionate number of Black African-Caribbean people suffering or at risk of mental illness in the local community.

Therefore, for over 30 years A.C.C.I. has remained based in the heart of the Wolverhampton community but has continued to strive to raise the profile of the organisation nationally. It has worked in partnership with service users, local authorities, health providers and the local community to ensure our provision remains relevant and reflects the involvement of people with lived experience and their Carers, and is central to the work we do.

The environment within which we operate is constantly changing and remains challenging.

Looking back: 2019

Mental health continues to have prominence in the policy and legislative agenda, but question marks remain around the government's commitment to adopting prevention measures to appropriately safeguard the nation's mental health. However, on a more positive note, I feel we are on the edge of significant and lasting change in the reform of the Mental Health Act and on the funding of services. The NHS England Long Term Plan provides the drive and means to deliver community based services that we know make a difference to people's lives, recognising the good care and support that exists beyond the boundaries of the GP surgery and specialist mental health services. This is A.C.C.I.'s forte and strength in the work we continue to deliver to the diverse community that we serve.

The government has continued to introduce various welfare reforms and there are emerging changes to the provision of health and social care which is impacting on the frontline mental health services.

The consequences of the above changes and challenges and the impact on the A.C.C.I. Business Plan have been analysed.

Alongside the above developments, A.C.C.I. as an organisation too must change to ensure we continue to be best placed to support our members and their families, and other beneficiaries of our service delivery.

In 2019, we continued to transform A.C.C.I. through effective leadership and delivery. A.C.C.I.'s strategy outlines our ambitions to develop our services over the next five years. Building on the work we already do, we will be looking on identifying new and emerging opportunities to expand our service offer where we know we can have the greatest impact.

A.C.C.I. has a clear vision and goals. Our vision remains to be the leading BME mental health care and support provider in the UK delivering a range of services which are unsurpassed in the community.

However, the environment for achieving these goals is becoming challenging and competitive due to national and local government funding cutbacks. Yet we still believe we have a strong platform from which to move forward and grow.

We have a strong and committed board of trustees, and staff team who are determined to improve the quality of life for; our members, their families and carers, and the community we serve. We will respond effectively to the challenges and opportunities the future presents us with, and on behalf of our members, their families, carers and our customers. We will strive to achieve value for money and continuous improvement. We are in business for diversity.

After over 30 years, it is still a constant privilege for us to be the hub of the community and to see the difference we make together. Our community we serve includes our supporters and partners, and it is growing every day. We are a proud, community based organisation. We have a unique foundation from which to understand and contribute to the sustainability of A.C.C.I.; to build a bridge to partner with the diverse community we serve and other agencies. We are plugged in and feel the pulse of the community, we can support change and we can act as a glue to support others to achieve change and improve the lives of our members, their families and carers. In recent years we have made significant progress in improving attitude towards mental health and well-being.

A.C.C.I. continues to engage with the Local Authorities in the West Midlands region and other agencies to discuss what assistance A.C.C.I. can give to the BME community and general public by bringing back into operation dormant community assets designated for the benefit of the BME community.

The medium to long term objective is to remain relevant to the needs of local and regional communities and thereby maximise the input and scope of A.C.C.I.'s housing and community development activities.

Despite the ongoing difficulties in economic and social conditions; and the increasingly challenging political context, A.C.C.I. is determined to facilitate more effective delivery of its services to local communities and therefore A.C.C.I. remains committed to participating in community development activities.

Good governance, excellence in management, a commitment to continued improvement in service delivery and value for money are the foundations from which A.C.C.I.. Will continue to grow even in difficult economic and political conditions and continues to remain relevant to the needs of the diverse community which the organisation serves. Objects and activities of the charity

The purposes of the charity as set out in its governing document.

The objects for which the Charity was established are:

- To promote any charitable purpose for the benefit of the public, but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing, especially persons of African and Caribbean origin, living or working in or around the borough of Wolverhampton and its environs, and in particular but not exclusively those persons who are suffering from, or who have suffered from mental illness of any sort.
- To advance the education of such persons, their relatives and carers, persons working in the fields of mental health and the general public by the provision of advice, counselling and training.

The main activities undertaken in relation to those purposes during the year.

- Providing holistic services that advise and supports users of the service to maintain their tenancies, care for themselves and their lived in spaces and seek appropriate assistance when needed.
- Providing volunteering opportunities to the local community as well as manageable and rewarding tasks for users of the service.
- Continue to seek and take opportunities to raise funds to promote the organisation's profile and raise awareness of the service delivery and beneficial activities provided to the users of the service.
- Working in partnership to influence and improve mainstream service provision to African and African Caribbean people and Wolverhampton's diverse communities.

The main activities undertaken during the year to further the charity's purpose for the public benefit.

In addition during the past year A.C.C.I. has:

In October A.C.C.I.'s annual contribution to the nationally celebrated World Mental Health Day event was held at Jubilee Christian Centre. This year's theme was entitled: Mental Health & Wellbeing - It's a fine line, which was delivered by guest speaker: Pastor Paul Grey, Lead Pastor at The New Testament Church in Low Hill in Wolverhampton and Policy Implementation Specialist for Workforce Development Knowledge Transfer Initiative.

The organisation hosted three Open Days for stakeholders, partners, service providers and agents. Presentations were delivered by members within the service i.e. a Trustee, Carer, Staff from each service area and member (service-user).

The Carers Group together with family and friends enjoyed their annual holiday event this year in Eastbourne over seven days.

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Along with a number of the members, staff and young people the Carers travelled by Coach to participate in the Slavery Remembrance Day and historical tour of Liverpool.

The carers and some of the members attended several daytrips out to popular local sites organised and funded by the charity ConGens Group Near Neighbour's Project i.e. the Botanical Gardens and Trentham Gardens.

The Carers' hosted their annual Carers Day celebration in memory of the Windrush Era and presentations were given from the Rev Ronald Nathan, Mrs Elsie Gayle on the carer's perspective and Shirley Agbasi on behalf of the Member's - (Service Users). The event was held at the Heritage Centre, and guests included the Mayor Councillor Claire Darke and Consort Dr Paul Darke, two Councillors, Walsall and Dudley Groups and by voluntary and statutory agencies.

The Carers Group hosted a Dementia Awareness Day in May at which a presentation was given by a speaker from Culture Dementia London and displays were provided from Carer Support, Wolverhampton Homes and Alzheimer Society. The event was attended by statutory and voluntary agencies.

The Carers' Group continue to host Intergenerational events with young people in the community aged between 7yrs to 25yrs of age. The sessions consisted of a Windrush anniversary celebration and cinema and theatre shows depicting the Windrush era and related story telling.

The organisation again hosted a very successful Annual Gala Awards, Dinner & Dance event in September. Master of ceremony over the event was Bishop Windsor Queensborough and keynote speaker was Dr Josh Johnson MBE. This year's recipient of the Alicia Spence Award went to Tedrick Bailey a long serving member who supports the work of the Health and Wellbeing Hub

The annual Trustee Board and Staff away day was held in March 2020. The away day provides an opportunity for board members and staff to reflect on the previous year's activities, also for the staff to be able to develop a shared vision to collectively move the organisation forward and continue to deliver a holistic, culturally safe and valued service for our community.

MiFriendly Cities Programme was developed by Coventry University and Urban Innovation Actions as part of the ERDF regional funding initiative. Fund holder Wolverhampton City Council has commissioned a programme to A.C.C.I. to lead a "consortium" working in joint partnership on tendering opportunities in place with: BME Housing Consortium, Right Track enterprises, Crafty Gardener CIC, Wolverhampton Homes and Housing first Initiative, Coventry University, Urban Innovation Actions, Nehemiah Housing, Accord Housing, Inspire You Trust, Higher level World Ltd, and Katherine House Hospice.

The programme commenced by offering up-cycling, recycling services and small property makeovers. Participants from migrant communities are to be recruited together with volunteers who will help run the programme.

The programme was formally launched on 28 January 2020 at the Heritage Centre.

The trustees have had regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit in managing the activities of the charity.

The short term and longer term aims and objectives.

A.C.C.I.'s objectives are to provide:

- A complimentary and culturally appropriate service to meet the needs of the African Caribbean community; and
- Influence local, regional and national mental health policy development and service delivery.

A.C.C.I.'s trustees have prepared and approved this report and the public benefit statement below with due regard to the Charity Commission's general guidance, 'Charities and Public Benefit'.

The charity's strategies for achieving its aims and objectives in the future.

Many of A.C.C.I.'s service users present with conditions often complicated by drug and alcohol addiction, making them among some of the most excluded, isolated and marginalised members of our local community.

In line with A.C.C.I.'s charitable objectives, the organisation provides public benefit via a range of support and services designed to improve the mental health and wellbeing of African Caribbean's suffering or recovering from mental ill health. This is achieved by developing and delivering specialist services to reduce the number of new and repeat hospital admissions among our service users, supporting them to find appropriate accommodation and secure or retain tenancies, improving their life skills and money management, advising on a range of issues including medication, addiction and diet management. These services form the golden thread of A.C.C.I.'s holistic approach to delivering our charitable objectives and helping our service users remain well for longer.

Although the organisation focuses on providing culturally appropriate services to African Caribbean's and their families; the organisation is continually looking at ways to develop methods to manage the efforts working with the many displaced people coming from outside of the UK seeking assistance for asylum seekers, against human rights violations and refugees. Additional beneficiaries of our services include other ethnic groups and communities, a range of private, public and voluntary sector bodies who work in partnership with A.C.C.I. to promote positive mental health and wellbeing within the local community, raise awareness of support available and de-stigmatize mental ill health. We also provide a range of training and advocacy services to influence mainstream practice and policy development among health and social care professionals.

The main achievements and performance of the charity during the year.

The difference the charity's performance during the year has made to the beneficiaries of the charity and the benefit of the charity's achievements to wider society.

Significant achievements and performance during the year included:

- A.C.C.I. successfully retained the tendered contract with Wolverhampton City Council to provide a Culturally Sensitive Community Support Service for people with ill mental health from African, Caribbean, Dual Heritage and Black British Communities.
- The organisation has successfully secured the tender contract for Omari Supported Housing Scheme.
- A Project Manager was appointed in June 2019 who will be responsible for delivering the contractual requirements and day-to-day management of the Omari Supported Housing Scheme.
- The organisation facilitated, assessed and supported training placements for MSc, BSc and BA social work students in partnerships with Birmingham and Staffordshire Universities. Two student placements on the BA Health and Social Care Degree programme were commissioned by Wolverhampton University.
- •The second "Alicia Spence" award was presented to Tedrick Bailey, a senior member of the organisation's Health and Wellbeing Hub.
- A.C.C.I. continues to support work experience opportunities for local secondary schools, sixth
 form Centres and Academies. This year 4 young people were introduced to the members,
 activities and they undertook tasks in a number of service areas within the Health and Wellbeing
 Hub.
- Sixteen young people from the Princes Trust volunteered to promote the work of A.C.C.I. by setting up a stand in the City Centre and handing out promotional materials to support the recruitment drive for volunteers.
- Thirty two volunteers registered with the organisation. Two volunteers have gained employment. One volunteer has become self-employed and one volunteer has started full time studies at University. Our volunteers continue to support the organisation to cover a range of activities. We continue to recruit volunteers throughout the year at different events for example at our annual 'World Mental Health day' event and providing additional support for service user activities.
- In September National Citizen Service (NCS) invited A.C.C.I. to provide volunteering experience to a group of young people in November 2019. This was the first time that we were invited to provide this service and consequently 12 young people attended the initial 3 day session.

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- The Carers have successfully achieved charity status as a constituted, voluntary community group and since September 2019 will be known as Imara Carers' Group. This will enable them to apply for funding and inclusion opportunities in their own right.
- A.C.C.I. were invited to talk about mental health awareness and perceptions within the faith community to the Seventh Day Adventist congregation.
- A.C.C.I. was invited to support a public health initiative to assist in addressing some of the challenges affecting the Whitmore Reans area. The Whitmore Reans community celebration event "The Unsung Heroes" was scheduled to be held 28 March 2020, but has been deferred for a later date, due to the Covid-19 pandemic.
- This year we have had 155 new referrals to our Health and Wellbeing Hub facility which includes referrals for housing advice and support. Our partnership working with Wolverhampton Homes has seen 21 referrals to our housing support service. We continue to support tenants who have issues of rent arrears, debt/benefit/welfare issues and anti-social behaviours/potential evictions, rehousing, supported living and homelessness. The outreach support staff attended 3,948 appointments visits to client's homes, hospitals, prisons, probation, low and medium secure units, attendance at MH reviews and out-patients meetings, tribunals, court appearances and accompanied members to visit to GPs, Consultants, dentists, benefits assessments and other services in conjunction with the Mental Health Liaison Practitioner. The Carers Group expanded its membership by 3 new members. The Holistic and Therapeutic Counselling Service have also recorded an increase in cases now registering 86 new referrals that include referrals from local GP surgeries, self-nomination and the Psychological Wellbeing Practitioners at Healthy Minds.
- The Health Wellbeing facilitator has enabled the organisation to continue to see an increased growth and development of innovative and resourceful programmes of activity incorporating supported and user-led initiatives. This has become a very popular and well favoured motivational part of the health, wellbeing and uplifting targets/aims to maintaining the members'/carers' engagement, mobilisation, social integration and staying physically, emotionally and mentally well.

The programme consists of activities using practical, social interaction that supports group and one-to-one learning objectives. The additional activities delivered are:

- · Walking, cycling, swimming
- · Practical activity: crafts, sewing, baking, cooking, writing, reading and table games
- · Carers' wellbeing sessions
- Pamper days, massage sessions
- · Health assessments
- · Physical activity: catering for all fitness ability levels and age groups

There has been no reduction in the demand for our varied range of holistic services that continues to see a consistent increase in user numbers and open referrals; for which we continue to maintain a high quality and responsive service, utilising its committed and caring staff.

The information above highlights A.C.C.I's main achievements during 2019/20, and provides evidence that the organisation is successfully fulfilling its aims, effectively, delivering against key objectives and taking positive steps to improve performance, increase efficiency and effectively manage risk.

Structure, governance and management of the charity

The methods used to recruit and appoint new charity trustees.

Given the specialist nature of the organisation, trustees are recruited using a range of approaches specifically targeting individuals and organisations with the appropriate mix of expertise, knowledge and skills to undertake the business of the organisation. Adverts for trustee vacancies are circulated via relevant clinical, social care and third sector publications and networks in line with A.C.C.I.'s marketing strategy and equal opportunity policy.

In line with our Memorandum and Articles of Association, expressions of interest in management committee vacancies are invited, nominated and elected at our Annual General Meeting. Places are reserved on the management committee for service users and carers. The organisation also has a range of alternative mechanisms to promote and encourage service user engagement, input, consultation and feedback. We have made provisions for the co-option of members in order to meet identified needs or gaps on a short term basis throughout the year.

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The policies and procedures for the induction and training of trustees.

A.C.C.I.'s management committee induction pack includes information about meeting dates, roles, responsibilities and useful contacts and is issued to all new trustees with their letter of appointment. A joint staff and board member away day is also organised annually after our AGM and presents an ideal opportunity for new board members to meet the staff team, existing trustees and gain a helpful insight into A.C.C.I.'s day to day activity.

The charity's organisational structure.

A.C.C.I. is managed by a management committee. Management committee members are also members of our Board of Trustees. A.C.C.I. is managed by a 13 member Board of Trustees. Our organisation employs a Director of Services who oversees the work of the organisation, supported by a Deputy Services Manager. There are 36 members of staff (26 full time, 10 part time). The organisation registered 43 potential volunteers. In addition, we welcomed 48 Youth Challenge placements, who volunteered their services in varying areas of the organisation. The young people carried out supervised tasks and activities that challenged them to be innovative and inclusive to users of the service. A clear management structure is in place; however, our organisation also promotes a strong ethos of collective responsibility, team working and support.

Service users and carers are an integral part of A.C.C.I.'s decision making process, which ensures that our services are user focussed. A.C.C.I. also works in partnership with a range of public, private and voluntary sector organisations locally, regionally and nationally to influence specialist and mainstream service delivery to service users, carers and members.

Financial review of the position at the reporting date, 31 March 2020.

The income for the year amounted to £925,906 (2019: £741,969) of which £892,938 (2019: £709,902) was restricted funding and £32,968 (2019: £32,067) was attributed to unrestricted funds. The net balance for the year was £40,353 (2019: -£53,054). The total funds on the balance sheet are £218,923 which is an increase from previous years of 23%. While this increase is welcomed, we are keen to focus on a funding and income strategy that can deliver against our reserves policy as outlined below.

The charity has continued to exercise prudent management of expenditure during the year.

The charity will continue to focus on sustainable income generation and funding in the coming years to ensure its medium/long term viability.

Policies on reserves.

The Management Committee have established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets (the free reserves) held by the charity should be between three and six months of the resources expended, which equates to between £221,750 to £443,000 in general funds. At this level the Management Committee feel that they would be able to continue the current activities of the charity in the event of a significant drop in funding. It would obviously be necessary to consider how the funding would be replaced or activities changed. At present the free reserves which equate to £31,243 of unrestricted funds fall well below the target level, the Board are therefore targeting some renewed energy and resource to secure adequate levels of funding especially in the prevailing and sustained challenging economic climate. The Board have engaged in proactive fundraising in order to assist in bridging the gap and have also made progress in the areas of Business Development.

Availability and adequacy of assets of each of the funds

The board of trustees is satisfied that the charity's assets in each fund are available and adequate to fulfil its obligations in respect of each fund.

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The major risks to which the Charity is exposed and reviews and systems to mitigate them.

A.C.C.I.'s trustees take responsibility for reviewing major risks to which the charity may be exposed and the systems established to identify and monitor all identified risks. During the year, the board finalised implementation of a new risk management policy and procedure.

Financial and service delivery risks are managed by an enhanced suite of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects. This ensures consistent quality across delivery for all operational aspects of the organisation. The procedures are reviewed regularly to ensure that they continue to meet the needs of the charity, our funders, commissioners and relevant regulating bodies.

Key priorities for the trustees moving forward into 2020/21 will be to:

- Secure contracts to deliver essential elements of A.C.C.I.'s existing service provision subject to competitive tenders,
- We received continued support through the Lloyds Foundation Enhance Programme,
- To continue building the internal infrastructure to enable the organisation to develop skills and expertise, thereby achieving sustainability.

Plans For the Future

Summary of plans for the future and the trustees' perspective of the future direction of the charity.

The Trustees are mindful of the current and ongoing pressures on resources that is impacting on all sectors. The full impact of Brexit is also yet to be fully understood.

In the Trustees' endeavour to secure the sustainability of A.C.C.I., new initiatives have been introduced to strengthen as well as diversify income generation opportunities for this organisation.

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Specific activities planned for 2020/2021:

Ongoing initiatives:

- To secure ongoing funding for the Folami Counselling and Holistic Therapeutic Service.
- To secure funding in order to sustain the role of the Health and Wellbeing Activities Coordinator.
- Securing a Crisis and Recovery service offering a safe space for very vulnerable people in crisis and seeking respite.
- Explore how the organisation can diversify and increase income by tendering for ethical and appropriate opportunities to sustain the organisations work and provision of services to the diverse communities in Wolverhampton.
- Strengthening collaborations and partnership working with the City of Wolverhampton Council, Wolverhampton CCG and the Black Country Partnership Foundation Trust.
- Prepare to secure and retain the tender contract for Omari Supported Housing Scheme.
- A.C.C.I. & NHS Partnership Invitation to look at future mental health services, commissioning for appropriate services for BAME communities and acknowledging the ongoing development of the working relationship with the emergence of Birmingham as the hub of commissioning for the West Midlands.

New initiatives:

- To meet with commissioners and seek to review the current core hours and related costs for Omari supported accommodation tenants.
- A.C.C.I. to agree a partnership arrangement with Nehemiah Housing to provide joint housing management services to Omari Housing CIC.
- Negotiating with ACCORD Housing a lease valuation for the community offices at Waterloo Terrace.
- A.C.C.I. to submit a revised business proposal to the Wolverhampton Clinical Commissioning Group for future long term funding of the Folami Counselling and Therapeutic support Service. This to align with the work of Healthy Minds and other mental health provision in Wolverhampton.

Funds held as custodian trustees on behalf of others

The charity receives funds from Omari in respect of the state benefits for individuals which it holds on their behalf and distributes to them. The net movement during the year was a reduction in balances held of £3,653. A balance of £22,649 was held at the year end.

Notes to the Accounts for the year ended 31 March 2020

1 Accounting policies

Policies relating to the production of the accounts.

Basis of preparation and accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared on the accruals basis, under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard 102, (effective 1st January 2016) and 'FRS 102 SORP (Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting by Charities) 2015, (as amended by the Bulletin issued in October 2018 and applicable to all accounting periods beginning on or after 1st January 2019), (The SORP), published by the Charity Commission in England & Wales (CCEW), effective January 2016, and in accordance with all applicable law in the charity's jurisdiction of registration, except that the charity has prepared the financial statements in accordance with the FRS 102 SORP (Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting by Charities) 2015, (as amended by the Bulletin issued in October 2018 and applicable to all accounting periods beginning on or after 1st January 2019), (The SORP), in preference to the previous SORP, the SORP 2005, which has been withdrawn, notwithstanding the fact that the extant statutory regulations, the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 refer explicitly to the SORP 2005. This has been done to accord with current best practice.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

Risks and future assumptions

African Caribbean Community Initiative (A.C.C.I.) meets the definiton of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Policies relating to categories of income and income recognition.

Nature of income

Gross income represents contractual payments received to fund charitable activities, the value of goods and services sold in accordance with the charity's objects, and gifts and donations.

Categories of Income

Income is categorised as income from exchange transactions (contract income) and income from non-exchange transactions (gifts), investment income and other income.

Income from exchange transactions is received by the charity for goods or services supplied under contract or where entitlement is subject to fulfilling performance related conditions. The income the charity receives is approximately equal in value to the goods or services supplied by the charity to the purchaser.

Income from a non-exchange transaction is where the charity receives value from the donor without providing equal value in exchange, and includes donations of money, goods and services freely given without giving equal value in exchange.

Notes to the Accounts for the year ended 31 March 2020

Income recognition

Income, whether from exchange or non exchange transactions, is recognised in the statement of financial activities (SOFA) on a receivable basis, when a transaction or other event results in an increase in the charity's assets or a reduction in its liabilities and only when the charity has legal entitlement, the income is probable and can be measured reliably.

Income subject to terms and conditions which must be met before the charity is entitled to the resources is not recognised until the conditions have been met.

All income is accounted for gross, before deducting any related fees or costs.

The accounts are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £.

Accounting for deferred income and income received in advance

Where terms and conditions relating to income have not been met or uncertainty exists as to whether the charity can meet any terms or conditions otherwise within its control, income is not recognised but is deferred as a liability until it is probable that the terms or conditions imposed can be met.

Any grant that is subject to performance-related conditions received in advance of delivering the goods and services required by that condition, or is subject to unmet conditions wholly outside the control of the recipient charity, is accounted for as a liability and shown on the balance sheet as deferred income. Deferred income is released to income in the reporting period in which the performance-related or other conditions that limit recognition are met.

When income from a grant or donation has not been recognised due to the conditions applying to the gift not being wholly within the control of the recipient charity, it is disclosed as a contingent asset if receipt of the grant or donation is probable once those conditions are met.

Where time related conditions are imposed or implied by a funder, then the income is apportioned to the time periods concerned, and, where applicable, is accounted for as a liability and shown on the balance sheet as deferred income. When grants are received in advance of the expenditure on the activity funded by them, but there are no specific time related conditions, then the income is not deferred.

Any condition that allows for the recovery by the donor of any unexpended part of a grant does not prevent recognition of the income concerned, but a liability to any repayment is recognised when repayment becomes probable.

Income from legacies

Income from legacies is recognised when the charity has sufficient evidence that a gift has been left to them, that where required, probate has been granted, the executor is satisfied that the property in question will not be required to satisfy claims in the estate, that it is probable that the amount will be received by the charity, and the amount to be received can be estimated with sufficient accuracy, and that any conditions attached to the legacy are either within the control of the charity or have been met.

Notes to the Accounts for the year ended 31 March 2020

Policies relating to expenditure on goods and services provided to the charity.

Recognition of liabilities and expenditure

A liability, and the related expenditure, is recognised when a legal or constructive obligation exists as a result of a past event, and when it is more likely than not that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and when the amount of the obligation can be measured or reliably estimated.

Liabilities arising from future funding commitments and constructive obligations, including performance related grants, where the timing or the amount of the future expenditure required to settle the obligation are uncertain, give rise to a provision in the accounts, which is reviewed at the accounting year end. The provision is increased to reflect any increases in liabilities, and is decreased by the utilisation of any provision within the period, and reversed if any provision is no longer required. These movements are charged or credited to the respective funds and activities to which the provision relates.

Policies relating to assets, liabilities and provisions and other matters.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are measured at their original cost value, or subsequent revaluation, or if donated, as described above. Cost value includes all costs expended in bringing the asset into its intended working condition.

Depreciation has been provided at the following rates in order to write off the assets to their anticipated residual value over their estimated useful lives.

Plant and machinery

25 % reducing balance

Accounting for capital grants and fixed asset funds.

Gifts of tangible fixed assets or grants of a capital nature, given for the purposes of acquiring specific assets to be fully utilised in the furtherance of the objects of the charity, are credited to fixed asset funds after the donated asset has been received or sums have been properly expended on the restricted purpose.

Debtors

Debtors are measured at their recoverable amounts at the balance sheet date.

Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to setlle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Cash and bank balances

Cash held by the charity is included at the amount actually held and counted at the year end. Bank balances, whether in credit or overdrawn, are shown at the amounts properly reconciled to the bank statements.

Notes to the Accounts for the year ended 31 March 2020

Pensions - defined contribution schemes

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions are charged to the profit and loss account as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme.

Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

There are no designated funds included in the accounts.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal or as implied by law.

There are no endowment funds.

2 Liability to taxation

The Trustees consider that the charity satisfies the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the Charity is exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by chapter 3 part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively on the specific charitable objects of the charity and for no other purpose. Value Added Tax is not recoverable by the charity, and is therefore included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

3 Winding up or dissolution of the charity

21 Non-adjusting post balance sheet events

Since the year end, the COVID-19 pandemic has impacted the operational aspects of the charity, resulting in the charity having to adapt the way they operate and carry out services to achieve it's main aims and objectives. The management does not expect the pandemic to have substantially impacted the charity financially. The charity's day centre has at times been forced to close following government guidance and local authority restrictions, which has in turn resulted in an increase in outreach and off site support that has been performed. The charity did incur additional costs when having to adapt it's operations during the pandemic, however successful claims for emergency COVID-19 funding have minimised the financial impact for the charity.

The charity has determined that these events are non-adjusting post balance sheet events, therefore the financial position for the year ended 31 March 2020 has not been adjusted to reflect their impact. The duration and impact of the COVID-19 pandemic remains uncertain at this time. It is not possible to estimate it's ongoing impact on the financial position of the charity for future periods.
