### TRUSTEES' REPORT

### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2012

The Trustees, who are also Directors of the Company for the purposes of the Companies Act, submit their Annual Report and the Financial Statements of International Social Service of the United Kingdom (operating as Children & Families Across Borders - the charity's working name) for the year ended 31 March 2012. The Trustees confirm that the Annual Report and Financial Statements of the Charity comply with current statutory requirements, the requirements of the Charity's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005.

### Constitution and Structure of the Organisation

The Board of Trustees, who in turn delegate day-to-day management to the Chief Executive Officer, govern the Charity The Board meets at least six times per year and on every Agenda there is a CEO's report on the current situation, a financial and fundraising report and a report from the Operations Manager

The Board of Trustees has three Sub-Committees, for Finance and Staffing, Fundraising and Social Work Each meet at least four times per year and report directly to the Board of Trustees These Sub-Committees do not have devolved decision-making powers, but make recommendations to the Full Board

The management of the Charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Articles of Association

At each Annual General meeting all the Trustees resign and can be put forward for re-election. At that meeting any person co-opted during the previous period can be confirmed as a Trustee. The Officers of the Company are elected from the Board and hold office from the conclusion of the meeting. Members of the Board of Trustees during the year are shown on preceding pages.

The Charity is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association on 3rd July 2000

CFAB is an independent branch of an international network of International Social Services agencies established in countries throughout the world

### Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

The Officers of the Company (The President, Chairman, Vice Chairman and Treasurer) actively seek recommendations for new board members from users, staff, the Board and donors Such prospective members, after a period of vetting/training, may be co-opted to the Board and ratified at the next Annual General Meeting

### **Induction and Training of Trustees**

Co-opted members are introduced to the Charity with an Induction Pack and supervision by the Chairman Ongoing training occurs regularly at Board meetings where the social workers present their work to discuss the range of issues that the Charity deals with The Board has adopted measures to monitor their own progress by the use of annual appraisals

Each Board member has a series of induction meetings with the CEO and staff covering the full range of the work of the charity. This focusses both on the social work service and the areas of fundraising and charity administration. Each Board member is invited to become a member of one of the Board sub-committees with regard to their relevant expertise. The process does not end with induction and on-going briefing sessions for Trustees are available as required and requested.

CFAB consider it vital that Trustees are kept fully informed about the Charity's work and that their relevant area of expertise is utilised in pursuit of the Charity's aims and objectives

### Risk Mutigation

The Board of Trustees annually reviews the Risk Assessment Policy and reviews and updates its policies and procedures on a regular basis

### ISS International Statutes

Children and Families Across Borders is the United Kingdom branch of the International Social Service, established in Geneva in 1925 with the aim of assisting those whose difficulties cross international borders. The network is a federation and CFAB is a wholly independent UK NGO. The UK Branch agrees to work within the international statutes that form the principal objects of the Charity.

- a) Assist those who, as a result of voluntary or forced migration or other social problems of an international character, have to overcome personal or family difficulties, the solution of which requires coordinated actions in several countries or, in some cases, action only in the country of residence of the persons concerned Either the child must be in the UK or a family member seeking reunification with that child must be in the UK in order for CFAB to become involved
- b) Study from an international standpoint the conditions and consequences of migration in relation to individual and family life, and as a result of these studies to make recommendations or take any other appropriate action
- c) Contribute to the prevention of social problems linked to migration or inter-country mobility
- d) Inform professionals and the public of the needs of migrant individuals and families
- e) Assist in developing and maintaining an international network of national bodies able to meet the needs

### Aims of CFAB

CFAB works exclusively with children and families in the UK when their welfare and protection involves an international element. All work undertaken by CFAB has a direct beneficiary in the UK. The priorities of the Charity for the year were to continue to

- 1) Seek positive outcomes for children and adults facing socio/legal/personal problems with ar inter-country dimension through delivering specialist intercountry social work services
- 2) Share expertise through training and advice and guidance to increase the capacity of practitioners to deal effectively with social work issues with an international element
- 3) Minimise and/or prevent socio/legal/personal problems linked to migration or inter-country mobility through influencing policy and practice, contributing to relevant social reform and the upholding of human and children's rights
- 4) Strengthen the capacity and professionalism of ISS,
  - Internally (CFAB) Externally (the ISS network)
- 5) Establish a diverse and sustainable funding base
- Raise awareness of the capability and effectiveness of CFAB among stakeholders and funders
- 7) To establish an Appeal Board (redesignated as the Development and Fundraising Board in February 2012) to develop corporate donations and sponsorship and support the aim of establishing diverse and sustainable fundraising base Efforts were made to increase funding from users, Trusts and Foundations

# Significant Activities Contributing to Achievement of Stated Objectives

The following activities have contributed to achieving the stated objectives

- Providing specialist intercountry social work services on the advice line by two social workers per day to deal with increasing numbers of enquiries
- Running 37 training workshops for groups of social work practitioners in 37 different Local Authorities
- Attending ISS International meetings to review the improvement of the ISS network of co-operating agencies
- Commencing use of a new paperless database system for all advice calls and casework
- Holding the Third Social Work Lecture where Lord Ramsbotham and Mr Chris Spencer spoke on the subject of
  "The treatment of children in the asylum and immigration system and the impact of the legal aid bills family
  provisions on children"
- Raising awareness of our services to new audiences

### Review of Performance against objectives

The main objectives of the Charity for the year came under three main headings and the following progress was achieved

To seek positive outcomes for children, adults and children facing a socio/legal/personal problems with an intercountry dimension

The Advice Line gave information to 1624 individuals and social work practitioners about a huge variety of situations where family members were overseas—467 of these calls turned into cases where we were asked to provide reports and assessments—This work had a positive effect on at least 8,000 beneficiaries

2 To share expertise through training and advice and guidance

CFAB delivered training in the offices of 37 Local Authorities around the country where teams of social workers able to discuss intercountry issues that were relevant to their current caseload. Feedback has been very positive

Minimise and/or prevent socio/legal/personal problems linked to migration or inter-country mobility through influencing policy and practice

CFAB is taking part in the discussions about child protection for the London Olympics and will be offering Child Trafficking training to all London Boroughs before the start of the Olympics

4 Strengthen the capacity and professionalism of ISS

A new database which records both advice line calls and case files has been in operation since January 2012. This facilitates monitoring of all files and was introduced following recommendations from an independent outside audit.

5 Establish a diverse and sustainable funding base

The Board were instrumental in CFAB becoming the beneficiary Charity of the First Night Party of the Art & Antiques Fair, which raised a record amount of funds for the Charity

- Raise awareness of the capability and effectiveness of CFAB by
  - A launch of our new website and changing to "org uk"
  - Producing new fundraising materials and a Film
  - Evolving new Vision/Mission/Values

### **Review of Fundraising Activity**

The Annual Spring Fair was held in May at the Town Hall in Kensington and the Chairman, Mr D Lewis, and his Committee raised £65,000 with the support of over 100 Embassies and High Commissions based in London

The Art Antiques evening (mentioned previously) raised the record amount of £422,843 Total expenses were £179,000 which was due to contractual arrangements peculiar to the event and were beyond CFAB's control

An intrepid group of staff members, Hannah Moran, Christina Turner and Shaziah Wasiuzzaman, climbed Kılımanjaro in the autumn and raised £19 575

The International Child Protection Dinner was held at the Swiss Embassy The Charity is very grateful for the support of the Ambassador and his wife and with the help of The Organising Committee, led by Mrs Kumari Blakey, the sum of £123,000 was raised

We are indebted to all these Committee Members and volunteers

The Rank Foundation awarded a grant of £67,000 over a three year period to sponsor a programme about Private Fostering

Comic Relief gave £29,500 as the second year of funding towards the Child Trafficking Project

#### Volunteers

CFAB uses volunteers in its fundraising activities and has a volunteer policy Each event has a committee of volunteers, with Trustee involvement, ably supported by office staff

### Financial Review of Restricted Funds Income

The Charity administered the Travel Assistance Scheme on behalf of the Home Office until the 31st March 2012 when the scheme was closed by the Home Office

The Department for Education is sponsoring the Advice Line for two years from April 2011

The Rank Foundation sponsored a project on Privately Fostered Children for three years

Comic Relief sponsored the second year of the three year project on Child Trafficking

### Reserves policy

The trustees have adopted a policy regarding reserves that should ensure that, excluding those funds represented by fixed assets, general reserves should be at a level commensurate to 3 to 6 months of planned expenditure. This is between £210,000 to £420,000. Unrestricted funds are currently at £168,590 and the trustees are working on building these up to the required level.

### Investment policy and performance

The Memorandum of Association requires that money not immediately required for the charity's objects, to be invested by the Trustees in such investments, securities or property, as may be thought fit. At the moment, the investment is in high interest bank accounts

### **Public Benefit Statement**

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in Section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit, 'Charities and Public Benefit'

CFAB's charitable purpose is enshrined in its International Statutes, listed on page 4. All of our services are open to anyone whose social welfare difficulties cross a national border, we only make a financial charge to Local Authorities requiring feedback from overseas. Members of the public can access services regardless of any financial implications. The Review of Performance against Objectives discussed in previous pages 5 and 6 clearly set out the benefits to the users of CFAB's services during the year and the Trustees regularly review the activities of the Charity to ensure that they continue to be related to its aims. No specific issues of detriment or harm arising from the work of CFAB have been identified, and measured against the Charity's objectives.

A number of private benefits do necessarily arise from the activities of the Charity, in particular, the employment and remuneration of staff These private benefits are incidental as they are an essential by-product of carrying out the Charity's aims

### Plans for the future

The main focus of the forthcoming year will be

- To launch a new membership scheme for Local Authorities
- To closely monitor outcomes for clients to ensure efficacy of service and to further improve our services
- To ensure our services are made available to more vulnerable children and adults
- To continue and expand our highly successful training for Local Authorities and other relevant professionals
- Ensure the Charity has a diverse and sustainable fundraising base through complementing our excellent events programme with equivalent success in trust and foundation, corporate and individual fundraising

We have audited the financial statements of International Social Services of the United Kingdom for the year ended 31 March 2012 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities (incorporating the Income and Expenditure account), the Balance Sheet and the related notes—The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice applicable to Smaller Entities)

This report is made solely to the charitable company's members, as a body, in accordance with Section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 and regulations made under section 154 of that Act Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the charitable company's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. ### Respective responsibilities of Trustees and auditor

The trustees have elected for the financial statements to be audited in accordance with the Charities Act 2011 rather than the Companies Act 2006 Accordingly we have been appointed as auditor under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 and report in accordance with regulations made under section 154 of that Act

Our responsibility is to audit and express an opinion on the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland) Those standards require us to comply with the Auditing Practices Board's Ethical Standards for Auditors

### Scope of the audit of the financial statements

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2012

### 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" published in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006

### Company status

The Charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the trustees named on page 1. In the event of the Charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the Charity.

### Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Charity and which have not been designated for other purposes

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors which have been raised by the Charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Investment income, gains and losses are allocated to the appropriate fund

### **Incoming resources**

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the Charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation

Income tax recoverable in relation to investment income is recognised at the time the investment income is receivable

### Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been included under expense categories that aggregate all costs for allocation to activities. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular activities they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

Overheads have been allocated on the basis of staff costs

Fund-raising costs are those incurred in seeking voluntary contributions and do not include the costs of disseminating information in support of the charitable activities. Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the Charity and include project management. Governance costs are those incurred in connection with the compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

### Cash flow

The financial statements do not include a cash flow statement because the charitable company, as a small reporting entity, is exempt from the requirement to prepare such a statement under the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008)

### Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

All assets costing more than £500 are capitalised

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases

Fixtures & fittings

33% straight line

Computer equipment

33% straight line
