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Directors' report for the year ended 31 December 2004

The directors present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2004. **Principal activities**

The principal activity of the company was that of a non-trading holding company. There has been no significant change in activities during the year. The principal activity of its subsidiaries is that of operating retail health and beauty stores.

Review of business and future developments

The continuing operations of the company and the group businesses performed profitably and the directors anticipate this success to continue in the foreseeable future.

Since the year end the company has capitalised the €364,779,683 loan (see note 14) payable to its parent company A. S. Watson (Europe) Holdings B.V. (formerly known as WPCS (Netherlands) B.V.), by the issue of 99 ordinary shares of £1 each and an increase in share premium of £257,571,000.

Also since the year end the company, through its subsidiary A.S. Watson (P&C UK) Ltd, completed the acquisition of Merchant Retail Group plc. The acquisition was by way of a recommended cash offer at 197p per share, valuing the entire ordinary share capital of Merchant Retail Group plc at approximately £221.9 million. The offer was declared unconditional in all respects on 14th July and cancellation of the listing of Merchant Retail Group plc shares on the official list and of trading on the London Stock Exchange was completed on 12 August 2005.

Merchant Retail Group plc is a speciality retail perfumery retailer and department stores group, operating in the UK, Ireland, Australia and Jersey. Merchant Retail Group plc has two main businesses, The Perfume Shop and de Gruchy. The Perfume Shop has more than 110 branches located in both shopping centres and malls throughout the UK and Ireland, selling a range of branded fragrances. De Gruchy is the leading department store in Jersey, located in St Helier.

Results and dividends

The results for the year are shown in the consolidated profit and loss account on page 6. A dividend of £14,000,000 was declared and paid during the year. The group's balance sheet as detailed on page 7 shows a satisfactory position, with shareholders' funds amounting to £121,911,000 (2003: £115,591,000).

Political and charitable contributions

The Group made charitable donations and organised and contributed to fund-raising activities that in total raised £428,427 (2003: £73,717) during the year.

Employees

Applications for employment by disabled persons are always fully considered. Employment policies are designed to provide opportunities irrespective of colour, ethnic or national origin, nationality, sex or marital status. In the event of employees becoming disabled every effort is made, including appropriate training, to ensure that their employment with the company continues. It is the policy of the company that the training, career development and promotion of a disabled person should, as far as possible, be identical to that of a person who does not suffer from a disability.

Consultation with employees or their representatives has continued at all levels, with the aim of ensuring that views are taken into account when decisions are made that are likely to affect their interests and that all employees are aware of the financial and economic performance of their business units and of the company as a whole. Communication with all employees continues through newsletters and briefing groups.

Supplier payment policy

The group does not impose standard payment terms on its suppliers but agrees specific terms with each one. It is the group's policy to pay its suppliers in accordance with the terms that have been agreed.

The group's average creditor payment period at 31 December 2004 was 36 days (2003: 34 days).

Statement of Directors' Responsibilities

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and the group and of the profit or loss of the group for that year. In preparing those financial statements, the directors are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- State whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- Prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the group will continue in business.

The directors confirm that they have complied with the above requirements in preparing the financial statements.

The directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and the group and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and the group and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Auditors

A resolution to reappoint PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP as auditors of the company has been proposed at the annual general meeting.

Accounting policies

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis, under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Companies Act 1985 and applicable Accounting Standards. A summary of these accounting policies, which have been applied consistently, is set out below:

Basis of consolidation

The group financial statements consolidate the financial statements of the company and its subsidiaries. All companies' accounts are made up to the nearest Saturday to 31st December each year.

Turnover

Turnover consists of sales through retail outlets excluding value added tax. Turnover is stated net of returns.

Fixed asset investments

Investments, principally in group companies, are carried at cost less amounts written off, where necessary, to reflect any permanent diminution in value.

Fixed assets and depreciation

Depreciation is provided to write off the cost less the estimated residual value of tangible fixed assets by equal instalments over their estimated useful economic lives as follows:

Freehold buildings - 50 years

Leasehold land and buildings - life of lease

Fixtures, fittings, tools and equipment - 4 to 10 years

Motor vehicles - 4 to 10 years

No depreciation is provided on freehold land. The cost of leasehold land and buildings includes lease premiums and legal and professional costs associated with the acquisition and transfer of leases.

Impairment of tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are subject to review for impairment in accordance with FRS 11 "Impairment of Fixed Assets and Goodwill". Any impairment is recognised in the profit and loss account in the year in which it occurs.

Leases

Assets acquired under finance leases are capitalised and the outstanding future lease obligations are shown in creditors. Operating lease rentals are charged to the profit and loss account on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Provisions are made as appropriate for shrinkage and slow moving items.

Accounting policies (continued)

Pensions

Defined contribution pension costs charged to the profit and loss account represent the amounts payable by the group under the Trust rules for the period. Defined benefit pension costs are accounted for on the basis of charging the expected costs of providing pensions over the period during which the group benefits from the employees' service. The effects of variations from regular costs are spread over the expected average remaining service lives of members of the scheme.

The group continues to comply with SSAP 24 "Accounting for Pension Costs". In accordance with the transitional arrangements under FRS 17 "Retirement Benefits" (paragraph 94), additional balance sheet disclosures have been given in note 23 for the year ending 31 December 2004.

Deferred taxation

Deferred tax is provided on timing differences that have originated but have not reversed at the balance sheet date. Deferred tax is not provided on permanent differences. Deferred tax assets are only recognised to the extent that, based on all available evidence, it is more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of the underlying timing differences can be deducted. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are not discounted.

Taxation

The charge for taxation is based on the profit for the year and takes into account taxation deferred because of timing differences between the treatment of certain items for taxation and accounting purposes. Provision is made for deferred tax only to the extent that it is probable that an actual liability will crystallise.

Goodwill and intangible assets

Goodwill is amortised over 20 years on a straight line basis.

Negative goodwill is amortised over 4 years on a straight line basis.

Purchased goodwill arising on the purchase of pharmacy licences is calculated on the excess of the fair value of consideration given over the fair value of the identifiable assets acquired, is capitalised as an intangible asset and amortised on a straight line basis over an appropriate period not exceeding 20 years. Where a business or pharmacy licence is sold, or where goodwill is impaired, the net book value of the goodwill or the amount of impaired goodwill, as applicable, is charged through the profit and loss account in the year of disposal or impairment.

Related party disclosures

The company is exempt under the terms of FRS 8 from disclosing related party transactions with entities that are part of the AS Watson (Health & Beauty UK) Limited group.

Company's own profit and loss account

The company has taken advantage of the exemption available in s230(4) of the Companies Act 1985 not to present its own profit and loss account and related notes. The company's profit before taxation for the year was £15,116,000 (2003: loss of £807,000).
