Directors' Report

The trustees who are also the directors of the charity for the purposes of company law, are pleased to present their annual directors' report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2017 which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and accounts for Companies Act purposes.

The financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

Governing Document

The company was established as a trust in July 1993 under the name "New Wine Church (Greenwich) Trust. The charity was incorporated as a company limited by guarantee on 22nd November 2000 under the name New Wine International and all the assets of New Wine Church (Greenwich) Trust were transferred to New Wine International on 31 December 2013 and has been operating as such since that date. It was registered as a charity on 16th February 2001. The charity is also known as 'New Wine Church'.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Charitable Objectives

- To advance the Christian faith in accordance with the statement of beliefs in the London Borough of Greenwich and in such other parts of the United Kingdom or the world as the trustees may from time to time think fit and other such purposes which are exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales and are connected with the charitable work of New Wine International.
- To relieve persons who are in condition of need or hardship or who are aged or sick and to
 relieve the distress caused thereby in the said London Borough of Greenwich and in such
 other parts of the United Kingdom or the world as the trustees may from time to time think fit.
- To advance education in accordance with Christian principles in the said London Borough of Greenwich and in such other parts of the United Kingdom or the world as the trustees may from time to time think fit.
- To promote and fulfil such other charitable purposes beneficial to the community, particularly young people in the community in the said Borough of Greenwich and in such other parts of the United Kingdom or the world as the trustees may from time to time think fit.

Objectives and Aims

New Wine Church is a multi-cultural, multi-national assembly of believers in Christ with over 50 nationalities represented. Our unceasing passion is to honour God with our lives and be a blessing to humanity with our individual and collective gifts. Our worship services and other range of activities are geared towards helping all people experience God, have fun, and feel truly valued as the glorious expression of His image on earth.

Our Vision

Our dynamic vision is to help individuals discover, develop, and deploy the gifts that God has placed within them, so they can be maximally effective in what God has called them to do.

Our Mission

We have a mandate from God to build men and women up in the Christian faith, equipping them with the word of God and the power of the Holy Spirit, so they can be maximally effective in what God has called them to do. We are convinced that every person has a destiny to walk in - a destiny already concluded in the mind of God. We are therefore persuaded that the greatest fulfilment in life comes when we discover our destiny and walk in it. In line with this, we disciple people to discover, develop and deploy the gifts, treasures, and potentials that God has placed within them for His own glory.

How our activities deliver public benefit

Our main activities and who we try to help are as described in our objectives and activities listed above.

All our charitable activities focus on these objectives to further our charitable purposes for the public benefit.

The trustees have considered the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit and have complied with the duty in section 17 of the Charities Act 2011.

Volunteers

The Church is dependent on its membership working as volunteers in all aspects of its activities, many of which run with little or no impact on the charity's expenditure, but nevertheless contribute substantially to the achievement of the charity's objectives.

The Trustees acknowledge and appreciate their immense contribution and would like to offer their sincere thanks and gratitude to the volunteers.

Results

The financial position of the charity at the end of the financial year is as detailed in the attached financial statements.

The present level of funding is considered adequate to support the continuation of the charity's programmes and the trustees consider the financial position of the charity to be satisfactory.

Principle funding sources and financial position

REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The trustees consider the performance of the charity this year to be satisfactory. The trustees and the Board of Ministers (Portfolio holders) would like to express their gratitude to the employees, church members and over more than 400 volunteers for their generous financial contribution and selfless sacrifice of their time and talent towards the achievement of the objectives of the organisation.

New Wine Church has continued to expand the frontiers of its impact locally, nationally, and globally. The church currently has 16 branches (7 branches added in 2017), including the French Language Speaking Church, Bulgarian language speaking Church and New Wine Saturday Church, helping to transform the lives of thousands of people in London, Dartford, Gravesend, Maidstone, Stratford / East London and Manchester in the UK and in Johannesburg, South Africa, Bulgaria and Luxembourg in Europe, Lagos and Abuja in Nigeria, Quebec in Canada and in Kampala, Uganda.

The ministry of New Wine Church continues to make a positive and ever-increasing impact within the local community of the Royal Borough of Greenwich, the wider society of London and the United Kingdom and in over one hundred and fifty nations around the world.

The church's operations continue to expand, with the New Horizons Radio Broadcast reaching over 2 million homes in West Africa. The internet live streaming of the weekly church services reaches over 47countries around the world and continues to expand. The Maximise Life TV Broadcast ministers to approximately 140 million homes in over one hundred and fifty nations in Africa, Australasia, Europe, North America, and the Middle East whilst the New Horizons Radio broadcast in the UK reaches an estimated 11 million homes. The church continues to reach further in the fulfilment of its divine assignment, touching many more lives with the liberating message of the Kingdom of God and the practical demonstration of God's grace in a diversity of ways all around the globe.

In Furtherance of its Objectives, New Wine International continues to provide the following services to its local, National and International Communities

Saturday Breakfast Club: - Every Saturday morning, we welcome the homeless and hungry across Woolwich to a full English breakfast. Up to 40 attendees come each week, bringing new people on a regular basis and they are served by our church members.

John Wilson Pantry: - Over the years, hundreds of marginalised and deprived people in our community have found our food bank to be a source of much needed provisions to help feed their families.

Christmas Hamper Campaign: - Every December, we actively seek out single parents, the elderly, the bedridden and those who have fallen on hard times and donate thousands of Christmas hampers to them. Each hamper is packed with enough food and drink to ensure that the family receives a complete Christmas dinner.

Marriage Enrichment Programme: - Marriage is the God-inspired framework for building families and healthy society. Our marriage enrichment ministry contributes to strengthening the marriages within the church, our local community and beyond through a broad range of workshops, events, and marriage counselling services.

Prison Chaplaincy Work: - Through our work with the Prison Chaplaincy, the positive impact of New Wine Church extends to inmates at HMP Thameside who often feel forgotten or unloved but are encouraged by the regular visits and assistance that our members provide.

G-Men: - Thousands of men have been positively empowered over the years by our G-Men ministry to develop and maximise their uniqueness as highly gifted, great, and godly gentlemen.

Girlfriends: - Our distinctive ministry for women undertakes a wonderful array of programmes that help unlock the sparkle, colour and the inner beauty that exists within every woman. Through workshops, retreats, conferences, and other events, we serve women of all ages and backgrounds, enabling them to be valued, refreshed, strengthened, and equipped to fulfil their unique purpose in life.

Children's Summer Club: - Our Children's Summer Club helps to educate children in the community and provides wholesome activities that keep them occupied including free movies, arts and crafts playgroups and tours.

Cedars' Club: - This is a club for over 55s where they enjoy weekly fitness classes, social events, and warm friendships. It is open to all senior citizens interested in maintaining an active and refreshing social life.

Salsa Club: - Develop Aerobics and Salsa Dancing classes to support community health

Careers builders: - This aspect of our work focuses on the economic empowerment of the community. We help individuals to identify their ideal career, refine their unique capabilities and equip them with the knowledge, tools, and skills to excel in their chosen career. We also support small business owners in developing more successful businesses that provide the income and fulfilment they desire.

Some of our activities include:

- Job search guidance and help with writing CVs and application letters
- Support with interview skills
- Assist with improving presentational, interpersonal and leadership skills

We deliver workshops to small business owners that provide knowledge and tools related to core aspects of running your business successfully such as:

- Effective financing
- Legal matters
- Marketing
- Administration

We offer access to excellent quality business mentoring & coaching services Additional community services include:

- Chaplaincy Service at Queen Elizabeth Hospital
- The Carer's Award, celebrating outstanding local carers
- Collaboration with other Christian groups via the Ecumenical Borough Deans

Radio Broadcast: - Our 'New Horizons' Radio Broadcast offers practical, biblically centred, spiritual refreshing and intellectual enrichment to approximately 11.7 Million people within the United Kingdom, equipping them to win in the game of life.

Conferences: - We undertake seminars and conferences such as 'Maximise Life' that attract delegates from around the United Kingdom and beyond, equipping them with life-transforming tools and strategies to positively impact their own spheres of influence.

Television Broadcast: - Over 140 Million households in 150 countries around the world enjoy life-enriching 'Maximise Life' television broadcasts on the inspiration TV Network (Europe, Africa, North America, and Middle East) and DOVE TV Network (Nigeria). Our 'New Horizons' Radio Broadcast also reaches over 2 million people in the nation of Ghana. Our weekly Sunday services are streamed live from Gateway House and have reached audiences in 47 countries as far afield as Indonesia, Pakistan, Finland, Jamaica, Argentina, Morocco, USA, South Africa, India, Australia, Qatar, and Ghana amongst others.

Shalom Nagar Lepers Colony: - New Wine Church continue to provide a residential estate housing for 55 lepers and their families in Chennai, India, offering them a life of dignity, self-empowerment and the opportunity for a better future often denied to them by the general society that treats them as outcasts.

Miracle Garden Orphanage: - We established a Sponsor-a-Child programme for children resident in the Miracle Garden Orphanage in Chennai, India. The programme caters for some of the most deprived children within the community, providing them with clothing, accommodation, and good quality education.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE, AND MANAGEMENT

The trustees are members of the charitable company and guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £10 to the assets of the charitable company in the event of winding up. The total number of such guarantees at 31st December 2017 was 4 (2016 - 4).

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The trustees are appointed by invitation as and when required depending on their expertise and the requirements of the charity.

Induction and training of new trustees

The charity arranges appropriate training both internally and through other voluntary sector training providers. The trustees and all involved in running the charity including volunteers are always encouraged to attain the necessary skills required to achieve the objectives of the charity.

Organisational structure

The Trustees who served during the period and up to the date of the report are set out above. The day to day operations of the charitable company are controlled by the chief executive officer appointed by Trustees, but the responsibility for all decisions rest with the Board of Trustees.

The Trustees meet regularly to manage the affairs of the charity. There are now 16 full time employees engaged in the administration and the organisation of the activities overseen by the chief executive officer. In addition, the charity is assisted by the services of approximately 400 volunteers.

For effectiveness, New Wine International is administered through a number of structured portfolios with specific responsibilities.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error. The trustees where appropriate, enlist the help of professional advisors to manage those risks. Special attention is also focused on non-financial risks arising from fire, health and safety and food hygiene.

Trustees' Responsibilities

The charity trustees (who are also the directors for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing a trustees' annual report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial period. Under that law the directors have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). Under company law the directors must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the surplus or deficit of the company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the directors are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- Observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- State whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- Prepare the Financial Statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue to provide services.

The directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and to enable them to ensure that the Financial Statements comply with the Company Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charitable company's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

In so far as the directors are aware:

- there is no relevant audit information (information needed by the company's auditors in connection with preparing their report) of which the company's auditors are unaware, and
- the directors have taken all the steps that they ought to have taken as directors in order to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the company's auditors are aware of that information

Reserves Policy

The charity has no endowment funding and is at present entirely dependent on income from donors from year to year which inevitably is subject to fluctuation. It is therefore the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds at a level which equates to at least twelve months' unrestricted expenditure. This provides sufficient funding to cover the charitable expenditure, management, administration, and support costs and to respond to emergencies which may arise from time to time.

As at 31 December 2017 there were free unrestricted reserves of £ 3,575,248 which will be used to support the organisation's future activities.

Investment Policy and Objectives

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the charity has the power to make such investments as the trustees deem appropriate. In addition to the short-term bank deposits during the period, the charity has a 100% interest in subsidiary companies namely Gateway Incorporated Limited and Vista Hospitality Limited.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS AND GOALS

Our Future

New Wine Church will be celebrating its 25th year anniversary in 2018. The Church is committed to expanding the frontiers of our work in enriching many more lives within the Royal Borough of Greenwich, United Kingdom and around the world.

To this end, our current plans continue to embrace:

- Launch of new church branches in the United Kingdom and other parts of the World
- Institute a Mentoring Programme for the youth, enriching them with life skills that position them for all-round success
- Deliver professionally accredited Counselling Services encompassing Marital, Bereavement and Crisis counselling to help hurting people through difficult times
- Strengthen our outreach work in Haiti, Nigeria, South Africa, and India and help lift many more people out of spiritual and economic poverty.
- Establish New Wine International School of Ministries

1. Accounting Policies

1.1 Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost basis.

1.2 Consolidated financial statements

As the company is a parent of a small group it has taken advantage of the exemption under Section 399 sub paragraph 2A of the Companies Act not to consolidate.

1.3 Incoming Resources

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

1.4 Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost or valuation, less estimated residual value of each asset over the expected useful life as follows:

Freehold property 2% on cost
Plant and Machinery 25% on cost
Fixtures and Fittings 25% on cost

Items of expenditure are capitalised when purchase price exceeds £500

1.5 Resources Expended

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation commiting the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

1.6 Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

1.7 Fund accounting

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Unrestricted Funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

1.8 Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

1.9 Foreign Currencies

Monetary assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate ruling on the date of the transaction. Exchange differences are taken into account in arriving at the operating profit.

The functional currency is £ sterling.

1.10 Debtors

Basic financial assets, including trade and other debtors, and debts from related parties are initially recognised at transaction price, unless the arrangement constitutes a financial transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Such assets are subsequently carried at amortised cots using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

1.11 Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are represented by cash in hand and deposits held at call with financial institutions.

1.12 Creditors

Basic financial liabilities, including trade, related parties and other creditors, loans from third parties and loans from related parties are intitially recognised at transaction price, unless the arrangement constitutes a financial transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Such instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

1.13 Interest Income

Interest income is recognised in profit or loss using the effective interest method.
