TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT

The trustees present their 21st report and the unaudited financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2022.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on pages 10 and 11 and comply with current statutory requirements the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the U.K. and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective from 1 January 2019), the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities 2015.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The company was incorporated on 22 March 2002 and was registered as a charity on 28 November 2002. It is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. The company is limited by guarantee and has no share capital.

Friends First is connected with Clarendon Trust Ltd (of 21-23 Clarendon Villas, Hove, East Sussex, BN3 3RE) in that the charities have common trustees and Clarendon Trust Ltd is the sole corporate member of Friends First. The trustees of the company are appointed upon becoming a trustee of Clarendon Trust Ltd. The induction process for trustees involves supplying them with copies of the Memorandum & Articles of Association, recent Accounts and Minutes of trustees' Meetings. They are also shown the work of Friends First and meet with the senior staff. Trustees meet regularly through the year and all the major decisions of the charity are made by them in consultation with the charity's managers.

The trustees have recognised the importance of assessing and managing risk associated with the charity's objectives. The process of identifying risk is ongoing and has been an essential part of the management of the charity. The trustees have implemented systems to ensure ongoing identification, management and documentation of foreseeable risks.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES FOR THE PUBLIC BENEFIT

The trustees have had regard to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit, and paid due regard to it in deciding what activities the charity should undertake. The trustees are satisfied that the ongoing activities which they are involved in means that the charity is continuing to meet the public benefit requirement.

Friends First Trust aims to contribute toward:

- reducing long-term unemployment
- reducing homelessness
- reducing social isolation
- · increasing the provision of safe supportive housing

Friends First also works with socially minded property investors, enabling Friends First beneficiaries access to secure and affordable accommodation. The accommodation Friends First have available includes: short stay and emergency accommodation, shared housing and lodgings in the local community.

Friends First provides intensive personal support for beneficiaries to assist them in gaining momentum and achieving independent living. Alongside this Friends First recruit, screen, and train volunteer mentors and befrienders to come alongside beneficiaries living in their local communities. The charity also has access to counselling referral and regularly work alongside and signposts to other like-minded agencies in the city.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE FOR THE PUBLIC BENEFIT

Housing

Friends First provides support to residents in three houses across the city.

Coldean House: 4 -5 bed

The focus of this house is Christian discipleship and preparation and transition to full time work. Two of the men are in full time work and the third is starting voluntary work experience. One person who was in work recently moved on to a private rented flat.

Hove House: 3 bed

During the year, the tenant successfully moved to private rented accommodation. She's now serving as a volunteer for Friends First. Following her move, a single parent mum from Ethiopia with three young children moved into the house. She is part of City Coast Church and Friends First is partnering with them to support her.

Moulsecoomb House 2 bed

An Emmanuel church member has asked us Friends First to manage this property. A single parent mum and her daughter are currently living there. The young girl has started school and the mum is considering part time work options.

Housing First and SWEP

Friends First have actively been involved in the leading and running of the Brighton Churches Night Shelter for many years. Following Covid, government advice is that rough sleepers are given individual rooms. Over the winter months last year, Friends First switched to supporting a council led provision for rough sleepers at The Brighton Hotel. Friends First helped clean the rooms, provide toiletries, food and a Christmas bag of goodies. The team helped guests who had been given move on accommodation to move into their new flat.

Another council initiative is Housing First which offers some rough sleepers an unfurnished flat. Friends First have partnered with them and Holland Road Baptist Church to provide a basic start-up kit of a kettle, microwave etc. together with some furniture. The team would like to find premises where donated furniture can be stored.

Foodbanks

In 2021-22 Emmanuel Church Brighton set up two more foodbanks in addition to the Shoreham foodbank. Friends First Team members supported the opening of these two projects and continue to do so, weekly. Having Friends First team members attend these foodbank sessions, offers an instant ability to refer clients who may need further support with counselling, housing or work experience.

Keys Community Detox

Keys Detox is a National church based detox programme to help people escape from alcohol and drug addiction through integrated medical, spiritual and community support. Friends First has become the Keys hub coordinating support across Brighton & Hove. The team has supported clients engaging with the programme. The team recently attended a conference at Ashburnham Place which brought together agencies and churches working with recovery in the South East. Friends First are hoping to start an in person recovery course with a longer term aim of running it in Lewes Prison.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The Statement of Financial Activities on page 7 shows total incoming resources of £124,204. The charitable company has funded a variety of projects and activities, which are in line with its stated objectives. The level of activity for the year was satisfactory. There was a surplus for the year of £1,542. At the end of the year the funds of the charity were in surplus by £38,449. The trustees of Clarendon Trust Ltd have indicated that they will provide ongoing financial support for at least 12 months from the date of this report.

RESERVES POLICY

The trustees have formulated a reserves policy in line with Charity Commission guidance. It is the trustees' intention to create free reserves sufficient to enable the trust to meet its recurring expenditure for the foreseeable future. At year end unrestricted reserves of £38,449 cover more than three months of current expenditure.

PLANS FOR FUTURE YEARS

Friends First hopes to be able to relaunch its pathway to employment project that provides work experience and training to the long-term unemployed. The charity has been awarded £4,000 from Garfield Weston and 60 bus tickets from Brighton & Hove Buses to enable our trainees to get to training, education and work opportunities.

Friends First have also been approached by a Christian entrepreneur who wants to partner with the charity to offer carpentry and construction skills training. They have identified a location on a farm in West Sussex where they hope to have a workshop. On the farm there is also opportunity for learning market gardening and animal husbandry. Produce grown own site can supply the foodbank Friends Frist is partnering with.

Building on the good relationships established with other churches in the city through running the Nightshelter Friends First continued to meet with key leaders and have decided that one of the best ways that the team can serve the homeless is by supporting frontline workers. Partnering with other churches, Friends First plans to offer space for frontline workers to access the internet and have team meetings.

Chariot House Limited have been appointed as independent examiners via a resolution at the Annual General Meeting.

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland', and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern. The trustees do not consider that Covid 19 will have a significant impact on the charity for the following reasons:

In light of the above and following a review of our financial position, reserves and future plans, the trustees have confidence the charity will remain a going concern for the foreseeable future.

(a) Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met. The amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the Charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Gifts in kind are included at estimated market value.

Any income relating to future years is deferred.

(b) Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis and is allocated between cost of generating funds, charitable expenditure, support costs and governance of the charitable company. Overhead and support costs have been allocated to charitable expenditure.

Support costs are those that assist the work of the charity but do not directly represent charitable activities and include office and governance costs. They are incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity.

Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice. These costs include costs related to statutory audit and legal fees.

(c) Voluntary assistance

A certain amount of time is expended by volunteers on the charitable company's activities which is donated free of charge. It is not possible to quantify the value of the time given, and accordingly it is neither recorded as donated income nor as an expense in the financial statements.

(d) Taxation

The company is a charity within the meaning of Para 1 Schedule 6 Finance Act 2010. Accordingly the company is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains within categories covered by Chapter 3 of Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes. No tax arose in the year.

(e) Pensions

The charitable company contributes to defined contribution pension schemes. The charge to the Statement of Financial Activities for 2022 was £5,785 (2021 - £3,571).

(f) Fund accounting

An explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements. Funds held by the charity are either:

Unrestricted general funds - these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees.

Designated funds - these are funds set aside by the trustees out of unrestricted general funds for specific future purposes or projects.

All funds held are unrestricted funds.
