Management Committee Report

The Management Committee present its annual report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2016.

Structure, Governance and management

Central Eltham Youth Project is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 13 November 2002 and registered as a charity on 23 June 2003. It is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up, the members of the charitable company guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £10 to the assets of the charitable company. The total number of such guarantees at 31 March 2016 was 5.

Trustees are recruited through a combination of nomination, invitation and open application. They are selected based on their knowledge, transferrable skills and experience. Prospective candidates are invited to submit a curriculum vitae. This is considered by Trustees at the next scheduled meeting. Suitable candidates then visit the project, meet existing Trustees and observe a meeting.

Initial appointment is made by the Trustees, followed by arinual re-election at the Annual General Meeting. New trustees are given a thorough induction into all aspects of the Project.

Risk Management

The Trustees continue to work to identify the major risks to which the charity is exposed, particularly staff, financial control and funding implications. The level of risk will be evaluated and controls (existing and new) identified to manage those risks.

Objectives and Activities

The Charity is established particularly for young people who primarily but not exclusively live, study, congregate or have links with the central Eltham area in London, to relieve need and advance education particularly by the provision of advice, support and information with the aim of assisting in the promotion of good citizenship. There are no access limitations within the age group 11-30 and there is no charge to young people for any of the services provided by the Charity.

When undertaking all its activities, the Management Committee has regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit.

Funding to provide services during 2015-16 has been provided by the Big Lottery Fund - Reaching Communities, BBC Children in Need, the Skills Funding Agency & the Education Funding Agency (via Bexley College & LCBT), Comic Relief, the Isle of Wight Council's Youth Offer and the Jack Petchey Foundation.

To meet our objectives during the year under review, our primary services consisted of:

Information, Advice, Guidance & Support - We have continued to provide IAGS free of charge to all young people requesting our help. This is despite us not having funding for the vast majority of the work undertaken. We have done this because, with the closure of the Connexions service and the responsibility for careers advice now resting on schools, the Trustees are aware that many young people would not otherwise have access to good quality advice.

Objectives and Activities - continued

Life skills & accredited learning - Our programme of PSHE (Personal, Social and Health Education) has continued successfully throughout the reporting period. Our partnership with the Prince's Trust to deliver their 'Team' personal development programme for young people aged 16-25 has been particularly successful with 60 young people taking part. Of these, 57 achieved a Level 1 award.

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Supported volunteering & mentoring - This project enabled 106 new young people to take part in one or more volunteering opportunities including gardening, fundraising, marketing, events management, administration, ICT, music and media.

Our Comic Relief funded early intervention project enabled us to help 67 young people who would otherwise be at risk through ASB or exposure to gangs.

The Jack Petchey Achievement Award Scheme - enabled us to reward young people in recognition of their contribution to the project or other personal achievements. Award winners choose how their award is spent on activities of their choice in the project or to purchase equipment for the benefit of all members of the project.

Our volunteering and community cohesion project, funded by Big Lottery Reaching Communities, engaged with over 900 different adults and young people during the year across a wide range of activities and events.

Our open access youth club in Sandown IOW continues to provide somewhere safe and welcoming for young people aged 16-25 to meet and take part in positive activities.

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Achievements and Performance

During the year, 951 different young people attended our services making more than 12,308 individual repeat visits. Every young person completes a detailed needs assessment on their first visit which we use to provide appropriate interventions and to assess outcomes. Young people are also encouraged to provide comments and suggestions about the quality of service they receive.

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This has revealed that in 2015-16, 91.3% of beneficiaries felt they had received the information and support they required.

Each year it is necessary to devote considerable time and effort in finding new funding organisations and completing detailed applications, without which Central Eltham Youth Project's continuation would not have been possible

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Management Committee Report :

Financial Review

The results for the year are as shown on page 6

The Trustees recognise the importance of unrestricted reserves in the current climate of cuts at all levels of government and statutory authorities. They are, therefore, pleased that it has been possible to increase the Charity's unrestricted reserves from income generation to cover 6 months operating costs as recommended by the Charity Commission. They are also pleased to have sufficient unrestricted reserves to designate funds for further improvements within the premises, a fund to progress an increased programme of training and personal development for staff and young people, and a development fund to cover expenses should a move of premises be required at the end of the current lease. Other reserves are as described on page 12.

Responsibilities of the Management Committee

The Trustees who form the Management Committee are required by law to prepare financial statements for each year which give a true and fair view of the financial activities of the Charity and its financial position at the end of the year.

In preparing those financial statements the Trustees are required to:

- 1. select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistantly;
- 2. make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- 3. state whether the policies adopted are in accordance with the Charities Act 2011 and with applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- 4. prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume the charity will continue in operation

A resolution proposing Michael Adamson and Co be re-appointed as independent examiners of the charity will be put to the Annual General Meeting.

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1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP FRSSE) effective January 2015 and applicable accounting standards

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor.

INCOMING RESOURCES

Recognition of incoming resources

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when:

- * The charity becomes entitled to the resources;
- * The trustees are virtually certain that they will receive the resources; and
- * The monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Deferred income

Where grants are received in advance and specified by the donor as relating to specific accounting periods these are deferred on an accruals basis to the period to which they relate. Such deferrals are shown in the notes to the accounts and the sums involved are shown as creditors in the accounts.

Incoming resources with related expenditure

Where incoming resources have related expenditure, the incoming resources and related expenditure are reported gross in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Volunteer help

The value of any volunteer help is not included in the accounts.

Investment income

This is included in the accounts when receivable.

EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES

Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources.

Market Area of the State

Governance costs

These include the costs of preparation and examination of statutory accounts, the costs of the Annual General Meeting and the costs of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

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FIXED ASSETS

Tangible fixed assets used by the charity

Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £1000 and can be used for more than one year. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the charity on receipt.

Depreciation

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Depreciation has been provided at the following rates in order to write off the assets over their estimated useful lives.

Furniture and equipment	 20% on cost
Fixtures and fittings	20% on cost
IT equipment	33.3% on cost

Leasing and hire purchase commitments

Assets held under finance leases and hire purchase contracts, which are those where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset have passed to the company, are capitalised in the balance sheet and depreciated over their useful lives. The corresponding lease or hire purchase obligation is treated in the balance sheet as a liability.

The interest element of the rental obligations is charged to the profit and loss account over the period of the lease and represents a constant proportion of the balance of capital repayments outstanding.

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to income on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Designated fund
