Trustees' Report

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Introduction

The year 2010 - 11 has been one of significant progress across the whole range of projects with which the Trust is concerned Following the success of the principal funding applications for Llanelly House we were able to procure for the main contract and to start the restoration project. The Trust also continued with the delightful and transformational work of the Big Picture and began the development of a number of other important heritage projects

PROJECTS

Llanelly House: The Llanelly House project saw a number of major events during the year including

- procurement of the main contract with the successful contractors being an established conservation contractors based in Swansea, John Weavers Ltd
- the start of the archaeological investigations
- support from Llanelli Town Council and Carmarthenshire County Council towards the banking costs securing a second round of finance support from Finance Wales for working capital
- continued applications to various grant funding bodies including the Wolfson Foundation who are contributing £10k towards the project
- developing a positive working relationship with Cadw and the Planning Officers at Carmarthenshire County Council regarding the monitoring of work on site
- the beginning of the procurement of an After Restoration Business Plan, Interpretation Scheme and development of a website
- continuing to work closely with a range of public, community and other organisations ranging from Llanelli Town Council and Trinity University College In particular the Community Engagement team have continued to forge strong links with local community groups including the Community First Areas, forging relationships with potential volunteers to assist with the operation of the house and to
- continue research into the history of the house and its occupants of the last 300 years. This wide range of vibrant community groups in the Llanelli area have been key to the project's success to date

The Big Picture: The Project moved into Stage 3 and was supported by members of the CHRT team particularly Cheryl Kitt - to work with groups of special needs pupils at a number of primary and secondary schools across Carmarthenshire, Pembrokeshire and Swansea Big Picture 3 is working with these young people to take forward their interest in the landscape and develop it into a series of photographic exhibitions of their work The £60k project is generously supported by the Countryside Council for Wales and the Big Lottery

Gelli Aur - Golden Grove: as a result of difficulties in securing funding towards this project work with our partner ceased early in 2011 An options review has been undertaken which recommended forming new partnerships with tertiary colleges

Gwili Railway: during the last year the CHRT worked with the Gwilli Railway to develop a business plan as a basis to securing development of a £4m tourism railway station at Carmarthen North and further develop the operational side of the railway's work. The new CEO is shortly to meet with their Chair to discuss further future partnerships between us

Trustees' Report

Membership and corporate governance

The year saw Claire Deacon stand down as a Trustee to act as Assistant Secretary and to work as Project Manager for the Gelli Aur/Golden Grove Project and to support the Llanelly House team

The Audit Committee and Finance and Operations Committee formed at the start of this period met on several occasions with both committees agreeing that regular training and review would be a major feature of their own development as corporate leaders of the organisation

In addition to these committees a Llanelly House Board has been set up to inform Trustees in more detail about the development of the project

Staffing

The year in question saw the employment of four key full time staff for Llanelly House Craig Hatto – Project Manager, Joanna Walsh – Project Administrator, Lisa Bancroft – Development Manager and Estelle Evans – Community Officer Jonathan Williams moved from Carmarthenshire Life to provide additional support to the Llanelly House team, also strengthed by Lydia Giorgi We are deeply grateful for their commitment, hard work and professional rigour of all the team that has brought such respect to the work of their project

This year also saw the appointment and dismissal of a Finance Officer for the project. This was as a result of a reference from a previous employer being withdrawn. This course of action was supported by our HR consultants and Solicitors Morgan-Cole. An audit of the project was undertaken by our Accountants and Auditors LH Phillips who confirmed that no irregularities were found.

We also continued to work with Cheryl Kitt and Ken Day as regular freelance members of the team and deeply benefited from Cheryl's able leadership as Project Manager for the Big Picture Project

The Trust's Secretary – Robert Parker – continued his work as Chief Executive Officer on a project funded basis and was asked to continue in the role of 'more than full time' Project Manager for the Llanelly House project throughout the calendar year

During the year the Trust reaffirmed its commitment to achieving Investors in the People (IiP) with a revised target of September 2012

Registered office

The Registered Office of the Trust has moved from Stebonheath to newly refurbished offices in West End The new offices have an excellent space for both meetings and community engagement activities and are within easy walking distance of Llanelly House

Personal

1 would again like to express my most sincere appreciation to my Vice Chair – J C Williams MBE – for his support, for taking the Chair on my occasional absences and for chairing the hard working Audit and Finance and Operations Committee, Trustees to have found additional time to attend the Llanelly House Special Board

As always, I thank my fellow Trustees for their continuing dedication and commitment Our many and various partners also played a crucial role during the year – particularly Llanelli Town Council, the National Trust (for whom I have the honour of acting as Chair in Wales), Trinity University College and Carmarthenshire County Council All have provided essential resources, support and advice throughout the year

Finally, 2011 onwards will be a most exciting period of growth. The Llanelly House project is firmly under way and will soon move into a period of operation which will be new and challenging period for the Trust. There are other very exciting schemes in development. As always, we look forward with great excitement.

Structure Governance and Management

The Trust is a registered charity, a company limited by guarantee and a building preservation trust. It is governed by the Memorandum & Articles of Association dated 9th April 2003. Day to day decisions are taken by the Chief Executive and the Project Officers. Key decisions relating to the direction of a project and policy decisions are taken in committee meetings and recorded in minutes, special meetings are held as and when required if an urgent decision is required outside the normal meeting timetable.

A full meeting of the Trust is held twice yearly with the two sub-committees meeting every other month on a staggered basis

Induction and Trustee recruitment

The Trust began the process of recruiting new members towards the end of the year in question and this is likely to reach a conclusion during the summer of 2011. Trustees are normally identified through an informal networking process which aims to identify people who are not only committed to a similar passion for the historic and cultural heritage but also who can bring skills and knowledge to our organisation. All new trustees are given an induction course. The new sub-committee structure will incorporate a framework for on-going training of all trustees through a themed approach of topics appropriate to the committees.

Management of Risk

As a significant project Llanelly House has a risk register, Gelli Aur also commissioned a risk register as part of the business plan procured. As general practice, each committee meeting is given a progress report on all projects and a risk assessment is given for a range of activities including reputation and financial control. This allows the regular review of all risks by the staff and Trustees.

Objectives and Activities

Quoted from the Articles of Association -

The Charity's objects ("the Objects") are for the benefit of the people of Carmarthenshireand the public at large -

- 3 1 to preserve, restore and regenerate, the historical, architectural, constructional and environmental heritage that may exist in and around Carmarthenshire in buildings (including any building as defined in Section 336 of the Town & Country Planning Act 1990), sites or areas of particular beauty or historical, architectural, constructional or environmental interest
- 3 2 to advance the education of the public in history, arts, culture and heritage or Carmarthenshire and the surrounding area
- 3 3 In pursuance of objects 3 1 and 3 2 to promote such charities or charitable purposes as the Charity may by unanimous resolution of its members from time to time decide

Trustees' Report

The broad objectives of the charity remain and are currently being met through the projects which include the preservation, restoration and regeneration of Llanelly House and towards similar work at Gelli Aur thus meeting objective 3.1, the Big Picture 3 meets objective 3.2 through the advancement of education and understanding of the historic, artistic and heritage of Carmarthenshirethrough its work with children with special needs

Public Benefit

The CHRT has demonstrated that our aims are for public benefit through the provision of activities and events which have enabled all to enjoy and experience it including activities such as Learning from the Landscape (Big Picture 3), the Community Engagement work undertake by the Llanelly House team and through the restoration and regeneration of Llanelly House as a community heritage centre

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aim and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set

CHRT is reliant on earned income, voluntary income and grants and the principal sources during 2010/2011 were

- Llanelli Town Council support for the Llanelly House project
- Countryside Council for Wales Big Picture 3
- CarmarthenshireCounty Council Future Jobs Fund and Llanelly House
- Big Lottery Big Picture 3
- Heritage Lottery Fund Llanelly House
- Welsh Assembly Government Llanelly House via WEFO
- Various private benefactors (who generally prefer anonymity) Llanelly House
- Private investor Gelli Aur

Our financial activity increased yet again over the previous year, with income being £813,530 (an increase from £551,987 in 2010) This was primarily funded from a number of public sector grants towards all our projects including the Welsh European Funding Office, Heritage Lottery Fund, Big Lottery Fund, Llanelli Town Council, Carmarthenshire County Council and the National Memorial Fund In addition to the public funds several private donations were also gratefully received

As always, we received excellent support from our auditors – L H Phillips & Co based in Carmarthen and our VAT advisor – Alun Mathias of VAT Capital During the year we were as always ably supported by our accounting officer – Andrea Jones of Winning Figures – who greatly helped in the ongoing development of a more rigorous management accounting process

It is intended that the portfolio of projects will continue to grow, Llanelly House will move into a new "post restoration" period which will deliver new challenges for the Trust and the Big Picture 4 will be developed Wales wide. Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2011

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005)', issued in March 2005, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) and the Companies Act 2006

Fund accounting policy

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees' discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity

Restricted funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose

Designated funds are unrestricted funds set aside at the discretion of the trustees for specific purposes

Incoming resources

Donations are recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the statement of financial activities at the same time as the gift to which they relate

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis

Income from charitable activities includes income recognised as earned (as the related goods or services are provided) under contract or where entitlement to grant funding is subject to specific performance conditions. Grant income included in this category provides funding to support programme activities and is recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Grant funding not recevied or quantified at the year end are not included in the accounts, however they have been disclosed in a note to the accounts

Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category.

Costs of generating funds are the costs associated with attracting voluntary income

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2011

continued

Governance costs include costs of the preparation and examination of the statutory accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and the cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters. It also includes insurance and depreciation on assets in line with the accounting policy

Support costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, for example, allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage

Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended for which it was incurred

Fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £500 or more are initially recorded at cost

Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows

Leasehold and other interests in land and Over the term of the lease, 150 years

No depreciation charged

Operating leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged in the statement of financial activities on a straight line basis over the lease term

Prior Year Adjustments

A prior year adjustment has been necessary to correctly state the cost of the leasehold for Llanelly House In the financial statements for the year ended 31st March 2010 the cost was stated in the balance sheet at £189,000, in fact the total cost of the lease should have been shown as £270,000, with a creditor of £81,000 in the balance sheet, this being the balancing payment due to Llanelli Town Council on completion on the Llanelly House restoration project

In addition a further adjustment has been necessary to correctly state the loan balance in respect of loan monies received from Finance Wales Investments Limited (FWIL) In regards to the FWIL Loan, monthly interest charges totalling £7,894 and legal fees and loan arrangement fees totalling £7,260 were not charged to the SOFA Whilst this adjustment was not material, it was felt necessary to show the actual loan balance for disclosure purposes

Renovation costs

Renovation costs incurred by the charity in the restoration of Llanelly House will be treated as revenue in nature and expensed via the SOFA
