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Chairman's Report for the Year Ended 31st March 2015

Introduction

The year 2014-15 was another busy year for the Trust.

Firstly it saw the first full year of trading and operation of Llanelly House, the a continuation of the digital fit out at Llanelly House, then the start of work on our second project, the former YMCA Building in Merthyr Tydfil, and finally the passing of a special resolution confirming our name change from Ymddiriedolaeth Atgyfnerthu Treftadaeth Sir Gâr to the Cambrian Heritage Regeneration Trust and the formal extension of our remit to the whole of Wales.

Plas Llanelly House Cyf, the trading arm for the commercial operations of CHRT continued to run the commercial activities at Llanelly House and CHRT Ventures undertook a small amount of external consultancy work.

Llanelly House Operation

Llanelly House Project Work

Project work included:

- the snagging of the main Contract
- the fitting out of the William Chambers Junior Room by Stuart Interiors
- the digital fit out undertaken by Atlas AV with Centrescreen responsible for the film production including production of and installation of the talking portraits, the creating of a second film on the history of Llanelly House, touch screens in the Great All and Reception area and touch table.
- the purchase of the Armorial Chamber Pot and Armorial Strawberry Bowl

The Big Picture Llanelly House:

This project allowed for the purchase of the portrait painted by Sir Joshua Reynolds PRA (1723-1792) of Sir John Stepney 8th Baronet (1743-1811), its restoration and re-hanging at Llanelly House.

This year appointment of Art Facilitators, Space2Create to work with Cheryl Kitt, our Project Manager, and the beginning of the work shops with children who receive additional support at school and vulnerable adults. This project will continue until July 2016. It has been supported by the Heritage Lotter Fund, a private donation and other smaller grant giving organisations.

YMCA, Merthyr Tydfil

Chairman's Report for the Year Ended 31st March 2015

2014/14 saw the commencement of the stabilisation works at the YMCA in Merthyr Tydfil by WRW Construction. The professional team included Davies Sutton Architects, Mann William Consultant Engineers, Parry and Dawkin Quantity Surveyors and CDM Coordinators. The contract was managed efficiently and thoroughly by the professional team and completed only a month after the proposed completion date. Funded works included: the removal of asbestos and all hazardous material, the removal of loose brickwork and masonry, site clearance, ground anchoring to rear unstable ground slope, felling and lopping of trees and vegetation, boarding up and the construction of a temporary roof.

The Project Team secured £1m funding for the restoration from the Welsh Governments Viable and Vibrant Places Scheme and completed and submitted the Stage 1 HLF Application in October 2014. Confirmation that the HLF bid was successful was received in March 2015. This means that the YMCA project can now begin in confidence with a total of £3.6m earmarked towards the restoration.

Mynachlog Fawr (Great Abbey Farm), Strata Florida, Ceredigion

Following advice received from the main funding bodies CHRT has been aiming to raise the purchase costs through approaching private trust and foundations and public giving. In May 2014 we secured a significant single private donation of £200,000.00. Following this CHRT agreed a purchase price from the current owners with a view to forming an Option to Buy Contract with them. Lee Lapham from Alder King is handing this on our behalf together with Blake Morgan our legal advisors while the CEO concentrates of further fundraising with our project partner, Professor David Austin who represents the Strata Florida Research Project on behalf of the University of Wales Trinity St David.

CHRT Audits

During the financial period in question we had various audits, these included:

WEFO

Quarterly review meetings with us and WEFO, with lan Lewis, our Project Development Officer (PDO).

To secure additional European Funding we went through a second reprofile of the Llanelly House Project between August 2013 and February 2014. As no grant is paid out during this process, this led to significant cashflow problems due to the delays in grant payments caused by this process. Particular thanks is due to all our suppliers, especially the main contractor, who exercised extreme patience during this period.

Claim Reports - Following the monthly claim report we report to WEFO regarding a random mix of invoices, providing copy invoices and bank statement information.

Yearly we have to organise an independent auditor to check over our grant claims and produce a report for WEFO, this usually occurs in April to match the March grant claim. The auditor we have is: Gareth Jones from Donald Owen Accountants in Carmarthen.

We had a second European Funds Audit Team, who are a separate entity to WEFO and we performed well on this with only two minor recommendations for action.

HLF

The HLF grant for the Llanelly House project has been paid in full.

Accountants and Auditors

<u>Chairman's Report</u> <u>for the Year Ended 31st March 2015</u>

Following a request by Trustees in the 2014 AGM Accounting and Auditing services were tendered for during 2014/15, this has lead to a change in our reporting accountants from LH Phillips to Ashmoles for 2015/16. I would like to express our thanks to LH Phillips for their service over the last 10 years and in particular to Matthew Williams our Chief Reporting Accountant

H.M Revenue and Customs

CHRT and Plas Llanelly House Cyf operate as a VAT Group, CHRT Ventures is not VAT registered. A system of internal VAT recharging operates with each project.

Working Capital Loans

The extended nature of the Llanelly House project as meant that the proposed repayment of our working capital loans has been deferred as has the payment of the final instalment of the lease to Llanelli Town Council. The Trust would like to thank the Architectural Heritage Fund, Finance Wales and the Town Council for their continued support in this respect, the CEO continues to work closely with all parties to ensure that the loans can be redeemed at the earliest opportunity.

Financial Performance

Our financial activity declined during the year as a result of the Llanelly House project drawing to a close.

Expenditure was primarily funded with public sector grants from Welsh European Funding Office, Heritage Lottery Fund, Merthyr Tydfil County Borough Council's Townscape heritage Initiative (in turn funded by MTCBC; Heritage Lottery Fund and Cadw), Carmarthenshire County Council continues to support Llanelly House with revenue contributions which are gratefully received.

Alun Mathias of VAT Capital our VAT Advisor through out the Llanelly House Project retired from practice this year. The Trust will take advice from Ashmoles regarding future VAT issues when appropriate.

Membership and Corporate Governance

This year saw John C. Williams continue as Chair of the Trust. Formal confirmation of resignation has been received from Trustees Robert Parker and David Onllwyn Jones. I would like to thank both David and Robert for their work over the years, but in particular Robert, who's foresight enabled a sound structure for the Trust from its foundation to its current form, and without whom we would not be here today.

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The Charity is managed by the Secretary and CEO - Claire Deacon (unpaid for Secretary's duties), who is paid on a daily basis for Project and CEO duties.

At the end of the year the Charity had 9 full time members of staff, and 6 part time members of staff

The Trust's projects are also more than ably supported by a number of freelance / consultant staff who work long hours and give a considerable credence to our activities. 2014-15 saw the appointment of Morgan Ward as House Manager.

Whilst the combined performance of the charitable and commercial elements of Llanelly House operation was below target for financial customer and visitor figures were 88% and 90% on target the average spend was lower than target which has lead to the shortfall. There was a clear "spike" in visitor figures during April, July, August (co-inciding with the National Eisteddfod) and December. It is clear that the business model needs to develop a strong offer of events and activities year round so that a seasonal pattern is levelled out as much as possible.

Public benefit

The trustees confirm that they have complied with their duty in section 17(5) of the 2011 Charities Act with regard to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Charity's and objectives and in planning of future activities.

The CHRT has demonstrated that our aims are for public benefit through the provision of activities and events which have enabled all to enjoy and experience it including activities such as the Community Engagement work undertake by the Llanelly House team and through the restoration and regeneration of Llanelly House as a community heritage centre, start of the restoration of the former YMCA building in Merthyr Tydfil, the proposed Big Picture Llanelly House and Big Picture Wales.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Governance costs

Governance costs include costs of preparation and examination of the statutory accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and the cost of any legal advice to the trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

YMCA: A restricted fund whereby funds are restricted for the use of restoration of the YMCA building in Merthyr Tydfil.

The Big Picture Llanelly House: A restricted fund that allowed for the purchase of the portrait painted by Sir Joshua Reynolds PRA (1723-1792) of Sir John Stepney 8th Baronet (1743-1811), its restoration and re-hanging at Llanelly House.

18. RELATED PARTY DISCLOSURES

R G Pugh and J L Williams directors of Cambrain Heritage Regeneration Trust are also directors of CHRT Ventures Limited.

R G Pugh, A Evans and S Roberts directors of Cambrain Heritage Regeneration Trust are also directors of Plas Llanelly House Cyf.

During the year the charity purchased services from CHRT Ventures Limited totalling £2,000. As at 31 March 2015 there was a trade creditor balance of £2,000 owing to CHRT Ventures Limited. As at 31 March 2015 there was an intercompany loan owing to CHRT from CHRT Ventures Limited totalling £14,720 (2014:£16,378). As at 31 March 2015 the capital and reserves balance of CHRT Ventures Limited was £21,112 in deficit.

During the year the charity purchased services from Plas Llanelly House Cyf. totalling £26,273. As at 31 March 2015 there was a trade creditor balance of £17,284 owing to Plas Llanelly House Cyf . As at 31 March 2015 there was an intercompany loan owing to CHRT from Plas llanelly House Cyf totalling £24,059 (2014:£11,469). As at 31 March 2015 the capital and reserves balance of Plas Llanelly House Cyf was £45,055 in deficit.

During the year CHRT engaged the services of Ms Claire Deacon, the chief executive officer, a historic business consultant. The total expenses paid by CHRT for consultancy was £56,787 (2014: £59,568). At the year end, CHRT owed Ms Claire Deacon £29,228 (2014: £4,797). This balance is included in trade creditors.

19. ULTIMATE CONTROLLING PARTY

The charity is controlled by the trustees who are all directors of the company.

20. MEMBERS LIABILITY

The charity is a private company limited by guarantee and consequently does not have share capital. Each of the members is liable to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 towards the assets of the charity in the event of liquidation.

21. GOING CONCERN

The net deficit balance of unrestricted funds as at 31 March 2015 amounts to £59,910, indicating the existence of a material uncertainty which may cast significant doubt about the Charity's ability to continue as a going concern. However, the directors are of the opinion that the going concern basis of preparation is appropriate for the following reasons.

Working Capital Loans

The extended nature of Llanelly House Project has meant that the proposed repayment of the working capital loans together with the payment of the final instalment of the lease to Llanelli Town Council have been deferred. The Trust would like to thank the Architectural heritage Fund, Finance Wales and the Town Council for the continued support and patience in this respect. The Chief Executive Officer is working hard to ensure that the loans can be redeemed at the earliest opportunity. Strategy includes refinancing negotiations with Finance Wales and the Charity Bank and through further fundraising activities supported by the County Council.

Companies Under Common Control (CHRT Ventures Ltd & Plas Llanelly House Cyf)

These debtors will be repaid as the operations of Llanelly House improves and the consultancy activity of CHRT Ventures Ltd, grows. The directors will be discussing, and implementing where appropriate, measures contained within an advisory document, and are therefore of the opinion that these debts will be recovered as future trading activities improve.

Other Trade Debtors

The directors are of the opinion that all other trade debtors are recoverable.
