This year has seen a further improvement in our financial position, however we still have a substantial loan from our Bankers and your Board is continuing to make every effort to find ways of seeking the appropriate funding to remove this liability which is potentially impeding our ability to obtain grants and access other funding sources

We have, nevertheless, obtained funding to carry out some further improvements to the building which we hope will provide an improved environment for our insurance services together with a better location for the cyber café. This work caused some minor disruption to the daily workings of the Healthy Living Centre but we hope that the improvements will be appreciated by all

During the financial year we were able to conclude our negotiations with HM Revenue & Customs regarding the interpretation of our VAT liability. The outcome was entirely in our favour and we have now been able to remove the potential liability from our Creditors in the Balance Sheet.

Once again I would like to thank all our staff and the volunteers who give their time and experience willingly for the benefit of us all. Also a big thank you to all those who provide financial assistance to us, enabling us to offer to those in need, a service which is praised by many who are the recipients thereof. Please continue to support Age Concern Hull in the years to come.

Having endured a number of financial restraints in recent years a decision was taken to increase our Social Work in Training (SWIT) intake to enable services to expand across the city and also give students the opportunity to fulfil the requirements of their portfolio

Following discussions with both Hull and Lincoln Universities, Service Level Agreements—were obtained ensuring that 12 placements would be provided for 2 periods of 100 days each year. This is an enormous undertaking and to enable the management of the new student unit we recruited a full time co-ordinator, who together with a part-time nominated staff member provides support to the unit. Both these members of staff work with the Community Manager to ensure that each SWIT has a diverse and meaningful experience.

Each SWIT learns to address the needs of older people by providing Information & Advice through telephone interaction, home visits and developing social activities with groups, thus helping Age Concern Hull to identify unmet needs and work towards social inclusion for our client group

Another new initiative has been work undertaken at Hull Prison to support the re-settlement programme for older prisoners. We are also delivering services in partnership with Help the Aged and British Gas in East Hull, offering advice on benefits and the development of active lifestyles and social activities has been made possible with the award of funding through the Neighbourhood Renewal Fund. This project will be in operation between January 2007 and December 2008.

A weekly Advo-cafe meeting takes place at the Healthy Living Centre This service caters for those in the early stages of dementia and as well as providing advocacy support encourages those attending to make meaningful decisions about their lives which leads to increased confidence and self esteem. A similar service is also provided at the William Sutton Trust Centre in East Hull

Under the auspices of Active in Age we trained 30 mentors during the year whose role is to facilitate activity programmes in the community

Following lengthy in depth discussions with both the Bank of Scotland and Hull City Council regarding our overdraft situation, we are hopefully approaching a satisfactory conclusion

In consequence of a successful funding application, the necessary plans for the building improvement work and timetable have been agreed

Age Concern Hull will continue to provide and develop services for older people by enabling and empowering them to improve their quality of life

Finally tribute must be paid to our staff and volunteers who have demonstrated commitment and loyalty to the Charity by working tirelessly to provide a wide range of services for the benefit of others

## 1. Directors' responsibilities

The most significant identified risk to the Charity is that of damage to its reputation, therefore we are particularly keen to ensure it is protected. Staff are fully aware of the importance of reputation in helping the Charity to achieve its objectives.

### 3. Organisation

### Governance and decision making

The body responsible for the general control and management of the Charity is the Board of Trustees

Membership of the Board consists of

- The Chair elected by members of the Organisation
- Such other number of persons elected by the members of the Organisation as may from time to time be determined in regulations adopted and issued in accordance with Clause 25A(2) of the Constitution
- III Those persons co-opted in accordance with Clause 28A of the Constitution
- A representative of Age Concern England who has the right to attend, to comment, advise and make recommendations but not to vote at meetings of the Board

The Board comprises 6 Trustee members (2 are volunteers of the Charity and service users) and meets 6 times a year. A nominated Trustee advises and liaises with senior managers on matters of finance, personnel/health & safety, volunteering and fundraising

The Trustees delegate the day to day management of the charity to an executive team who execute the policies and strategies defined by the board

#### Liaison Committee

The Board is responsible for establishing a Liaison Committee to bring together in discussion those appointed to represent the Organisation on other bodies, and representatives of other bodies in membership of the Organisation. The Liaison Committee meets at least six times per year, prior to ordinary meetings of the Organisation to receive written reports from its members and to conduct its business as determined by the Board in accordance with the provisions of Clause 3A(2) of the Constitution.

## 4. Review of the year.

Joint funding from HCC and Hull Teaching Primary Care Trust (PCT) for Falls Prevention

We were very fortunate to obtain funding from the Neighbourhood Renewal Fund to provide -

- Services in East Hull following the cessation of funding from Preston Road NDC
- Active in Age Training to volunteers to cascade healthier lifestyles in their own community

Funding from Lloyds TSB enabled us to recruit a worker to facilitate the project in HMP Hull Prison

Continued funding and support was received from the William Sutton Trust for community work within East Hull

## **Healthy Living Centre**

We were delighted to receive funding from both The Trusthouse Charitable Trust and Garfield Weston Foundation which will enable us to expand facilities and services within the Healthy Living Centre

We are also proud to announce that we are to receive the HRH. Duke of York's Community Initiative Award.

## **Retail Sales**

On 1st August, 2004 the charity transferred its shops to Age Concern England This reduced the administrative burden of the charity Following consultation with ourselves, Age Concern England decided to close the charity shops on Hessle Road and Greenwood Avenue because of poor performance over the previous year Age Concern Hull continues to operate the shop in Porter Street

## Restaurant

Restaurant income remained constant during the year. The service provides a facility to support the wellbeing of the target group. During the year we received an 'A' rating for food hygiene from Hull City Council's 'Scores on the Door' initiative.

#### Financial results

The Charity showed a surplus of £41,029 on unrestricted activities prior to an adjustment made for the increase in the value of investments of £329 giving a final surplus of £41,358

### 5 Reserves policy

The general fund provides funds to meet the charity's short term and mid term financial commitments. An amount equivalent to approximately three month's expenditure on recurring work has been designated a base reserve to enable Age Concern Hull to absorb temporary downturns in fundraising, without having to cut back on the programme of expenditure. During the year to 31st March, 2007 all unrestricted funds have similarly been utilised.

## 1. Accounting policies

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost basis, with the exception of investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" published in 2005, the Companies Act and applicable accounting standards

### a) Basis of preparation

The charity has availed itself of Paragraph 3(3) of Schedule 4 of the Companies Act and adapted the Companies Act formats to reflect the special nature of the charity's activities

### b) Incoming resources

Grants, legacies, cash donations and gifts are included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities as soon as they are capable of being recognised. Significant non cash donations are included at the Directors' estimate of their market value when received. The value of voluntary help is not included in the accounts.

Bank interest is included in the Statement of Financial Activity on an accruals basis

### c) Restricted funds

Restricted funds are to be used for specified purposes as laid down by the donor Expenditure which meets these criteria is identified to the fund, together with a fair allocation of management and support costs

### d) Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds are donations and other income received or generated for the objects of the Charity without further specified purpose and are available to general funds

#### e) Staff costs

Staff costs and overhead expenses are allocated to activities on the basis of staff time spent on those activities

### f) Resources expended

Fund raising and publicity costs comprise the costs actually incurred in producing materials for promotional purposes

Governance costs of the Charity relate to the costs of running the Charity such as the costs of meetings, audit and statutory compliance, and includes any costs which cannot be specifically identified to another expenditure classification

## g) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are capitalised and included at cost including any incidental expenses of acquisition

Expenditure of a capital nature is capitalised when the expended amount per item is over £500

Depreciation is calculated to write down the cost of all fixed assets, other than long leasehold property, over their expected useful lives

#### h) Stocks

### i) Investments

Stocks and shares quoted on a recognised stock exchange are included in the balance sheet at their mid-market value at the year end. The variances between market value and the original cost or annual revaluation of the investments are shown as unrealised investment gains or losses.

The difference between the original cost or annual valuation and the proceeds of investments disposed of are shown as a gain/(loss) in the statement of financial activities

### j) Grants

Grants of a revenue nature which are made to give immediate financial support or to reimburse costs previously incurred are credited to the statement of financial activities in the period in which they become receivable

Grants of a revenue nature which are made to finance general activities over a specified period or to compensate for a loss of current or future income are credited to the statement of financial activities in the period in which they are paid

## k) Operating leases

Rentals applicable to operating leases are charged to the SOFA over the period in which the cost is incurred

## I) VAT
