## 1 Trustees responsibilities

The Trustees (who are also directors of Hull & East Yorkshire MIND for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice)

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees' are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP,
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements,
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Charity will continue in operation

The Trustees' are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In so far as the trustees are aware

- there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditor is unaware, and

## 2 Structure, governance and management

Hull & East Yorkshire Mind is an incorporated Charity limited by guarantee (Company No 4936165) governed by the Articles and Working Rules It is a local Charity affiliated to National Mind and a registered charity (Registration number 1101976)

The Articles and Working Rules set out various categories of membership and full members shall be entitled to vote at all general meetings of the Charity

On the payment of an annual levy to National Mind the Charity shall remain affiliated and can participate in the affairs of National Mind to such a degree and through such representation that may be determined by us and National Mind

We serve, but not exclusively, the area covered by the Kingston upon Hull and the East Riding of Yorkshire Councils being Unitary Authorities We are also developing services to be delivered nationwide.

The trustees have responsibility to ensure that the Charity is properly funded by direct grant or other means. The Charity is not allowed to be insolvent and is subject to annual audit by independent auditors.

In the event of a winding up of the Charity any surplus funds must be applied to any such charitable purposes in connection with the preservation and safeguarding of mental health and the relief of persons suffering from mental disorders

The Charity's objects ("the Objects") are to

- (a) Promote the preservation of mental health and mental and emotional well-being within the whole community by
  - (i) the advancement of education, and
  - (ii) the provision of facilities and services for social welfare, personal development, recreation and social inclusion, being non-party in politics and non-sectarian in relation, without distinction of race, gender or sexuality
- (b) Assist in relieving and rehabilitating vulnerable persons of all description and ages and from all walks of life who are
  - (i) Suffering from mental health disorders, or
  - (ii) Suffering from anxiety or emotional or mental distress, or
  - (iii) developing or are at risk of developing mental health disorders or anxiety or emotional or behavioural problems for any reason whatsoever including, but not limited to alcoholism, substance addictions, their age, bereavement or loss, conditions of life, disability, homelessness, exclusion from school, college, university or society, financial hardship, physical condition or illness, personal circumstances, redundancy, unemployment

By the provision of advice, assistance, counselling, guidance, treatment or any facilities or services calculated to improve their mental health, emotional well-being and conditions of life

(c) educate and disseminate information in matters relating to mental health and emotional well-being and the preservation and maintenance of mental health and emotional well-being to the public at large and to the carers, colleagues, families and friends of vulnerable persons suffering from mental health disorders and/or emotional or mental distress or who are developing or are at risk of developing mental health disorders and/or emotional or behavioural problems for any reason

- be the lead voluntary sector provider of mental health services within Hull and East Yorkshire and beyond
- be the partner of choice for funders, referrers and other organisations

## Day to day management

The day to day management of the Charity is carried out by a Chief Executive Officer, responsible to the Executive Committee of up to 15 Trustees, who also comprise the directors of the company, meeting up to 11 times a year including strategic planning days. From the committee of trustees are elected 4 Appointed Officers of Chair, Vice Chair, Honorary Treasurer and Honorary Secretary. The list of Trustees can be found on page 1. Other Trustees are either elected at the Annual General Meeting or co-opted. The principal office is situated at 41-45 Beverley Road, Hull

To assist the committee of trustees there is a senior manager with overall responsibility for, Finance and IT, Human Resources and Training, Operations, Health and Safety, and Protection of Vulnerable Adults Supporting the senior management team are 4 project/department managers. The Trustees may also appoint other sub-committees from their number to look at specific matters and advise

## Recruitment and training of trustees

The Trustees aim to maintain within the Executive Committee a wide breadth of experience both from within the voluntary sector as well as from the local business community and be representative of the people we serve and the diverse minorities within it. Trustees are elected from the membership following a formal nomination or recruited by advertising vacancies and personal approaches. Training is delivered in the first instance through the use of an induction pack and a process of support by other trustees. Specific training needs of trustees are also identified and training provided by a full range of methods both in house and external

#### Risk Management

Risk is identified in a number of ways through our Health and Safety Committee, strategic and business planning, financial reporting, recommended practise and legislation this is managed through policy development and training. A risk register in the form of policy development and review has been created from which policy is made and a training programme implemented. The training programme is monitored for each individual member of staff, volunteer, and trustee and reported to the Executive Committee of trustees.

### Related Parties

The Charity is guided by both local and national policy and strategy where this is complementary to our objectives. Equally we will participate in joint working with other national and local organisations in the pursuit of our objectives such as National MIND.

#### 4 Public Benefit

The trustees confirm that they have paid due regard to the Charities Commission guidance on public benefit in deciding which activities that Hull & East Yorkshire MIND should undertake and have summarised the main activities below -

### Supported Housing Services

Supported housing is our biggest activity in terms of staff and resources, we provide 89 supported housing places across Hull and the East Riding of Yorkshire split between support in our own hostels and in the clients own home

We support people to maintain their own tenancies, assisting with budgeting, form filling and practical tasks such as cooking, cleaning and taking prescribed medicines. We also work on confidence building and social skills and achievement of their support plans which may result in moving on to independent living.

In 2013 there was 94% utilisation of our housing service (93% in 2012) with 77 people (86 in 2012) accessing our services. The reduction in the number of people accessing our houses was due to a higher degree of stability with fewer clients moving on

Floating Support provided to people living in their own homes was 100% utilised as last year with 54 people (68 in 2012) accessing the services. The reduction in numbers was due to previous over achievement of target numbers and a request by the funder to reduce our client numbers.

## Community Development

#### Reach Out Project

The second year of the project has seen the team performing to a very high standard across the East Riding in all 7 localities. Networks and excellent partnership working has been evident and successful service developments have taken place in relation to Bibliotherapy, Safe Talk training, the development of independent service user groups and Computerised Cognitive Behavioural Therapy Training (CCBT). In addition to these developments, as part of additional funding received, we were also able to recruit, train and deliver volunteer mentoring within the county. Regular groups and courses have also taken place in all localities and service user involvement has been integral to service delivery. The Information Service has been essential in enabling the team to reach more people and provide more support.

In summary, from April 2012 to March 2013, the team engaged with 952 people across the county. The contractual target for the year was 550 people (over 700 people received support in 2011-12)

### The Gateway, Information, Support, Wellbeing

The Gateway team have continued to provide an excellent portfolio of support and services through group activities and courses and client-centred formal or informal support. The team report 4,618 client contacts for the year and 214 new referrals which are both similar activity levels to the previous year. Service User Involvement is fundamental to the team's ethos and is evidenced in regular service user meetings, a user's social committee and user-led activities. Service developments during the year have included greater volunteer participation supporting the groups and courses and, as a result of additional funding, the introduction of 10-week Memory Loss Courses. Service User Satisfaction Surveys have recorded that 100% of people felt that they were treated with dignity and respect and also that service user's mental health has improved since accessing the project.

#### Information Service

In its second year, the Information Service has grown from 1028 enquiries last year to 1278 enquiries this year. Most of the enquiries are received through telephone contact, however a significant number of people have walked-in without an appointment to our offices to access support and information (180 recorded this year). All enquiries are handled within 2 working days, with the majority responded to on the day of the enquiry. This year the team have also responded to 31 crisis enquiries, 19 crisis enquiries were responded to last year.

The Information Service Team have undertaken extensive marketing and promotional activity by attending events across the region, posting flyers and leaflets to statutory and voluntary agencies, attending meetings and telephone networking

## POINT - Social Prescribing

The POINT Team received 674 referrals this year, with 583 people engaging with the project to gain support (the contractual target is 550 per year)

The team continues to have an excellent working relationship with the Single Point of Access (SPA) and has continued to provide regular support to patients at the Sydenham House Group Practice. The impact of the project is evidenced through client's case studies which provide ample examples that their support networks have been strengthened, there has been a resolution of practical issues impacting on health, that there are demonstrable improvements in physical and emotional wellbeing and that there is a reduction in attendance at GP surgeries.

The results of six-month follow up questionnaires found that most service users reported that their mental health had improved since accessing the project and that they found the service to be useful Exit evaluations found that clients reported that they would recommend the service to other people, that they would feel comfortable with accessing the service again and that the POINT intervention had made a difference to their lives

Volunteer Mentors have continued to provide one to one support for a number of POINT clients. The number of clients who have received volunteer mentor support this year is 169 against a contractual target of 150. 40 volunteers have actively supported the project which meets our contractual target Volunteer Mentors have supported clients with social isolation and social anxiety disorder, attended appointments with clients and provided information about mental health issues or local support agencies.

#### Employment Related Services

### Moving Forward

The Moving Forward Project commenced in August 2012 with the aim of supporting people to feel able to cope with employment. Through one to one support and extensive courses and a social group, the team seek to improve client's confidence and self-esteem through increased coping skills and individual action plans. In this reporting period, over 100 clients have been supported with 35 of those clients accessing the Computerised Cognitive Behavioural Therapy Training (CCBT) and 31 clients have undertaken training in personal development courses, such as confidence building, assertiveness or communication skills. The weekly social group is popular with clients and service user involvement is encouraged with user-led, independent activities and Steering Group meetings.

#### **Mindworks**

During 2012/13 Mindworks continued to deliver its core courses to a number of organisations nationwide, delivering to professionals working within the mental health industry and to many professionals and individuals whose working and personal lives benefit from the course content

Mindworks has also developed and delivered bespoke courses to the armed forces dependants, BBSRC, University of Hull and Hull & East Yorkshire Mind staff and volunteers

The service has been recognised with the senior trainer being nominated for being an exemplar of Mental Health First Aid training

#### Youth Activities

## **ACE Project**

The ACE programme was predominantly delivered to groups of fifteen or under people over a twelve-week period which included two weeks work placement. Delivery took place in a relaxed classroom environment with learners encouraged to set their own rules and standards for their learning environment. Learners also discussed and established their desired outcomes both for the whole group and on an individual basis. The project followed a broadly learner-centred, constructivist approach with each person being actively encouraged to bring past experience, ideas and opinions to the learning on which the core content could build and expand. Although classroom-based, many learners were quick to remark how far removed from mainstream education their experience of the project was. Many learners remarked on the level of control they had over their learning and how they were encouraged to take ownership of their personal development. This encouragement and facilitation took place in order to prepare the learners for progression, to instill more mindful approaches, to develop an increasingly positive approach to learning and to better prepare our learners for progression into Further Education or employment. For the reporting period -

The Actual Starts on learning was 56 learners

Starts on Skills for Life was 39 learners

Starts on Non-accredited Qualifications was 42 learners

Starts on an Accredited Qualifications was 27 learners

The project also achieved 13 progressions into learning and 8 progressions into employment. The Project Team were also particularly strong in their delivery of the ACE Certificate and the B S C Hazard Awareness with all of the feedback from this awarding body being either good or exemplary.

#### Other Activities

Our Volunteering Service has increased significantly in the last year from 5 volunteers in June 2012 to 60 volunteers in March 2013. The volunteering team have provided trained volunteers to a number of internal projects, including the Reach Out Project, the POINT Project and The Gateway Project and have also moved into a new service development with Prison Mentoring. In addition, to support our NHS partners, volunteers have also assisted the East Riding Improving Access to Psychological Therapies Team (IAPT) in their delivery of Stress Control courses.

During the year, the volunteering team have facilitated 5 Induction Courses for 54 participants 31 volunteers have received training in Mental Health First Aid and Safe Talk. Support and communication with volunteers has been integral to the volunteering team and regular contact is a Service Area Standard and Monthly Support Meetings are well attended.

The Social Work Student Programme is fully-established across the organisation with 11 students on placement with us in this period 
Eight staff members provided On Site Supervision to the students or were their Practice Educators 
The students are integral to the teams and service delivery

Students provided added-value to our projects and the organisation has benefitted from employing two of these students once their degree was completed. Exit interviews conducted with students who finish placement found that most students enjoyed their placements, they had been offered ample learning opportunities and they comfortably met the requirements of their degree. The majority of students also reported that they have been well supported while on placement and that they found all HEY Mind staff to be helpful

The trustees have not recruited any new members during this period and 2 trustees have resigned. This brings the number of trustees to 6 leaving 9 vacancies.

#### 5 Financial Review

The annual accounts have been prepared in accordance with the recommendations in Accounting and Reporting by Charities Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) revised in March 2005. The income of £1,765,137 is a reduction of £301,000 from last year. This was due to a reduction in grant income as we received £340,000 from the Transition Fund in the previous year which was a one off grant. A deficit of £21,000 was realised for the year.

We maintained a strong cash flow position throughout the year thanks to the prompt payments by our funding providers

## Reserves Policy

After assessment of the risk to the Charity the reserves policy is

- To maintain sufficient reserves to enable it to respond to short term fluctuations in levels of funding, and provide sufficient liquid resources to meet its revenue and capital needs
- To fix the sum required at three months gross annual expenditure plus forecast capital expenditure
- To monitor the position on a regular basis and identify the steps necessary to achieve the required level
- To invest all liquid assets in short-term low risk investments except where a longer period could be considered
- To ensure that any longer term investment is only undertaken after proper consideration of the risks and returns involved

The current reserves allocated to this are £1 115m compared to a target of £1 038m

## 1 Accounting policies

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments at market value and buildings at valuation, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April, 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and follow the recommendations in Accounting and Reporting by Charities Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) published in 2005

## a) Incoming resources

Grants, legacies, cash donations and gifts are included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities as soon as they are capable of being recognised. Significant non cash donations are included at the Directors' estimate of their market value when received. The value of voluntary help is not included in the accounts. Bank interest is included in the Statement of Financial Activity on an accruals basis. When incoming resources are received in advance or services have not been provided the incoming resources should be deferred. Deferred income is not recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities until the chanty is entitled to the incoming resource and instead is disclosed as a liability in the balance sheet.

## b) Expenditure

This is accounted for on an accruals basis but when expenditure is incurred relating to more than one cost category, the expenditure is apportioned over all relevant headings. The basis of apportionment used reflects the time and resources exerted under specific headings.

## c) Tangible fixed assets

Only expenditure over £1,000 is considered for capital expenditure

Depreciation is calculated on a straight line basis to write down the cost of all fixed assets over their expected useful lives

The rates generally applicable are

Equipment 20% Fixtures and fittings 5% - 20% Computer equipment 33<sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub>%

## d) Investments

Stocks and shares quoted on a recognised stock exchange are included in the balance sheet at their mid-market value at the year end. The variances between market value and the original cost or annual revaluation of the investments are shown as unrealised investment gains or losses.

## 1. Accounting policies (continued)

## e) Leases and hire purchase contracts

Assets acquired under finance leases and hire purchase contracts are treated as fixed assets. The amount capitalised is the present value of the minimum lease payments payable during the lease term. Depreciation is charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in accordance with the normal depreciation policy over the shorter of the lease term and the useful life of the assets.

The corresponding lease commitments are shown as liabilities. The interest element of rental obligation is charged to the Statement of Financial Activities over the period of the lease on a straight line basis.

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities over the period of the lease on a straight line basis

### f) Pension scheme arrangements

The Charity operates two schemes on a money purchase basis both of which are externally administered by Trustees Contributions made are therefore charged against income when the contributions fall due

## g) Administration

Administration includes the cost of management of the Charity's affairs

## h) Fundraising

Fundraising includes the costs of raising the Charity's gifted income

## i) Marketing

Marketing includes the cost of raising public awareness to the Charity's objects

#### i) Restricted funds

Restricted funds are to be used for specified purposes as laid down by the donor Expenditure which meets these criteria is identified to the fund, together with a fair allocation of management and support costs

## k) Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds are donations and other income received or generated for the objects of the Charity without further specified purpose and are available to generate funds

## I) Designated funds

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for a particular purpose

### 2 Taxation

Hull and East Yorkshire MIND is a U K registered charity, number 1101976. All the Charity's income is applied to its charitable objects and the Charity is, therefore, exempt under current legislation from most forms of taxation.

Value added tax is not recoverable by the Charity and is therefore charged to the Statement of Financial Activities or Balance Sheet as incurred
