### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Oxfordshire Independent State Schools Partnership (OISSP) is a registered charity and is also a company limited by guarantee. It is governed by the terms of its memorandum and articles of association.

The day to day running of the charity's activities is delegated to the project co-ordinator. The activity is overseen by the trustees and an advisory board, which in addition to the trustees, includes representatives from some of the schools who are involved in the charity's projects.

As at 31 August 2007, 39 schools in Oxfordshire, from both the state and independent sectors, were signed up members in the charity's project work

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

- Encouraging and supporting links and activities between maintained and independent schools for the benefit of students and teachers
- Expanding the ability of students and teachers to share access and carry out educational and learning activities of all kinds whether intellectual, cultural, linguistic, recreational or sporting
- Encouraging both maintained and independent schools to share their education, school and sporting facilities

### **ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

### Securing our Future

The Partnership was awarded a major grant amounting to £163,863 by the Department of Education and skills (now the Department of Children, Schools and Families, DCSF) in 2007 to set up and run the project 'Securing our future' 'Securing our future' is a project for 12-18 year old students in state and independent schools throughout Oxfordshire. It aims to raise students' standards, motivation and participation in science. The aim is to equip young people with the key skills and competencies they need to enable them to make a positive contribution to the economy by

- Demonstrating the value of Modern Foreign Languages (MFL) in Science and Maths through interaction with research and industry - Working with clusters of Oxfordshire's secondary schools in both the maintained and independent sectors - Working with other relevant bodies, such as the Oxford Trust and the Industrial Society

The Partnership was fortunate in being able to appoint Mr Tom Kempton, an experienced Head of Science in one of Oxfordshire's most successful maintained sector schools to direct the project

The Project made a good start during the year Initiatives are under way to stimulate interest in the partner schools through three 'Young Scientist of the Year' events concentrating on Chemistry, Biology and Physics

The focus will be on inspiring and motivating young people through a programme of activities including science workshops and master-classes led by experts from Oxfordshire's pre-eminent research establishments and industry

### **Schools Environmental Efficiency Study**

OISSP has sponsored a pilot project, with Oxford Brookes University, to demonstrate the potential environmental, economic, and educational benefits of implementing energy saving actions in schools

This pilot project engaged two schools, one from the maintained sector and one Independent school to help increase energy efficiency. A series of energy saving actions were determined, implemented, and measured to highlight the ease of savings possible in schools across Oxfordshire. The actions are believed to be applicable to a wide range of schools. The project elements are linked to the school's curriculum to provide a practical learning opportunity for students.

### **OTHER ACTIVITIES**

### **OISSP Website Development**

The OISSP Website was developed by students from the State maintained St Birinus School, Didcot and the Independent School of St Helen & St Katharine, Abingdon, with support from their teachers and can be visited at www oissp org. The scope of the website, which is professionally maintained, has grown in information and diversity as the OISSP has expanded its interests. The students involved with the web site are now moving on to university and the web site will be maintained in the future by RW-Designs based at Gosford Hill School.

### **OISSP Strategic Planning**

The OISSP is in negotiations with the local LSC regarding potential funding for 14-19 education provision and are looking at ways of enhancing the delivery of this through collaboration and the sharing of resources and good practice. Other collaborative initiatives are also being looked into by the strategy working party group e.g. the International Baccalaureate.

### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

DfES grants funded some of the charity's activities

The DfES project grants were managed by Oxfordshire County Council Spending of these grants was overseen by the project co-ordinator and the trustees, through one of their number designated as the Treasurer All other funds are held in a bank account in the name of the Charity, controlled by the project co-ordinator and the trustees

It will be noted that expenditure has fallen behind the original plan due to a late start. The Oxfordshire State/Independent School Partnership Board considered that it was of crucial importance to appoint the right leader for this project. We succeeded in securing the part-time services of Mr Tom Kempton, Head of Science at one of the County's most successful Maintained Sector girls' schools as Project Director. Formally starting from the beginning of the academic year 2007/08, the Project Director was immediately 'up to speed' and the project has gathered momentum rapidly.

### **PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS**

OISSP will seek funding from DCSF for a major collaborative project associated with the 'Children's University' initiative. The OISSP considers that the Children's University would present a timely and highly appropriate way of capturing, fusing and disseminating the best outcomes of all the OISSP projects.

### **RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TRUSTEES**

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations
