## STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

## **Governing Document**

Charnwood Citizens Advice Bureau is a company (limited by guarantee) governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 24 November 2003. It is a charity registered with the Charity Commission

## Appointment of Trustees

Trustees are selected either from volunteers who approach the bureau to express interest in our work or via external recruitment, subject to the board approving their suitability. The recruitment process seeks to achieve a representative cross-section from our community.

New Trustees are provided with induction training and on-going training in specialist areas is available for all Trustees

## Organisation

The charity is governed by the Trustee Board and managed on a day to day basis by the Bureau Manager

#### Risk Management

The charity carries out an annual risk assessment and this forms the basis for the preparation of its development plan. The most recent assessment (performed in early 2010) identified the two largest risks as being (i) loss of income, and (ii) premises. These are described below. The first of these has increased in importance since the last formal risks review whereas the second has been addressed.

Loss of Income: Major Funder(s): Charnwood CAB receives the majority of its income in the form of grants from local government and from contracts with the Legal Services Commission (LSC)

There is severe and continuing pressure on central and local government to reduce costs and this in turn has resulted in a reduction in grants received from both Charnwood Borough Council (CBC) and Leicestershire County Council (LCC), it is expected that these grants will continue to decline

Loss of Income: LSC Contracts: Payments from the LSC are linked to the number of eligible clients that present themselves for advice (whereas the principal cost of servicing these contracts are salary costs) and therefore insufficient eligible clients will result in a loss on these contracts (as was the case for the LSC south contract for the period November 2010 – March 2011) Furthermore, the income is subject to case review by the LSC that can lead to a retrospective claw back of revenues

The financial pressures resulting from loss of income are expected to have an adverse effect on staff and volunteer morale

#### Premises

Until December 2010 Charnwood CAB's principal office was located within John Storer House and both the lack of room and the lack of facilities at times adversely affected the bureau's activities — In December 2010 Charnwood CAB moved to larger and better equipped offices at Woodgate Chambers

Since the last formal risk review, a further operational risk has been identified. Citizens Advice will require all bureaux to move to a new case reporting system called PETRA. The transition to the new system may give rise to problems with transfer of client information etc.

## **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

The charity's objects are to promote any charitable purpose for the benefit of the community in Chariwood and the surrounding areas by the advancement of education, the protection and preservation of health and the relief of poverty, sickness and distress

## Public benefit

The Trustees have referred to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular, the Trustees considered how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set

## How our activities deliver public benefit

Charnwood Citizens Advice Bureau helps people resolve their legal, money and other problems by providing information, advice and assistance and by influencing policy makers

#### Activities

Charnwood Citizens Advice Bureau provides information, advice and assistance free of charge to those with a wide range of legal, money and other difficulties. This 'Core Service' is provided to any person who asks for it. Depending on an individual's circumstances, we may be able to offer additional specialist advice in cases where we have additional tailored funding.

The 'Core Service' is funded primarily by Charnwood Borough Council (CBC) The service is provided mainly from our offices in Loughborough, however, Shepshed Town Council provides funding for an extension in Shepshed, in addition, an outreach service operates in Syston Volunteer advisers are at the forefront of this part of our activities and they provide advice on a wide range of subjects, they are supported by volunteers in other capacities

As the core service depends on having sufficient trained volunteers available, attracting, training and retaining volunteer advisors is an important feature of the bureau's activity. A grant was awarded in March 2008 by the **Big Lottery Fund** (BLF) to all CABs in Leicestershire to fund a **Training Officer** in each bureau. This has been very successful in recruiting and training new volunteers, in particular younger volunteers

In 2010/2011, financial support from Citizens Advice (CA) under its Additional Hours Project allowed the bureau to extend its opening hours and thus increase the number of clients it could see. (The grants from BLF and CA have now ended, resulting in pressure on both training and supervision resources, which are restricting the extent to which the Bureau's services can be made available to clients)

In addition to the core service, Charnwood CAB provides help and support to individuals with specific personal and family problems

- A strong partnership between Surestart and Charnwood Citizens Advice Bureau has continued during the last year
  enabling the Bureau to provide advice and information to families with young children living in the most deprived areas
  of Charnwood The Charnwood Citizens Advice Bureau advisers work within the Surestart team alongside other
  professionals such as health visitors and family support workers The service is delivered from seven Centres throughout
  the Borough
- Charnwood and other Leicestershire CABs provide financial advice to cancer sufferers and their families This is funded by the MacMillan Cancer Support Trust
- The bureau undertakes Legal Aid work in the fields of debt and welfare benefits. This is funded under a contract with the Legal Services Commission (LSC). Until November 14 2010, this was provided jointly with Melton CAB as Leicestershire Money Advice Services (LMAS). Since that date, Charnwood has two contracts with the LSC to provide welfare benefit and debt related legal aid work one for the north of Leicestershire (and based in Loughborough), the other for the south of Leicestershire and based in South and West Leics CABs offices in Hinckley.
- Clients that are not eligible for Legal Aid for debt nevertheless receive advice as a result of funding from the Severn
  Trent Trust Fund (for money and advice generally), Debtline (funded by Leicestershire County Council), and the
  Mortgage Rescue service funded by CBC

## ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

## 60th Anniversary and Office Move

2010/2011 was an important anniversary for Charnwood CAB and the bureau celebrated it by moving into new offices at Woodgate Chambers provided by Charnwood Borough Council These offices were formally opened on 9 May 2011 by HRH The Princess Royal

The move itself took place in December 2010 and was made possible through financial donations and gifts from a wide range of local societies, organisations and individuals, many of whom are commemorated by having rooms in the new offices named after them We would like to formally thank the generosity of those who gave The major donors are listed below

The Trustees also wish to acknowledge the significant contribution made by volunteers to the organisation, as advisors, administrators, receptionists and trustees. It is estimated that nearly 18,000 volunteer hours were donated during the year Using Citizens Advice's recommended valuation table, the contribution by the volunteers amounted to £278,000. Without this contribution, we could not have provided our services to nearly as many clients as we in fact achieved.

CASE (Citizens Advice electronic case recording package) allows us to monitor the quality of casework quickly and effectively. We are also able to extract statistical data to compile comprehensive reports. During 2010/2011 the Bureau handled 14,489 client contacts (2009/2010 14,253). These generated 21,440 issues (2009/2010 23,273). In addition to client contacts, the Bureau also made 4,616 contacts with third parties on behalf of clients (2009/2010 4,626).

## FINANCIAL REVIEW

Annual income has decreased from £450,935 in 2009/2010 to £411,653 in 2010/2011 The number of paid staff in post at the end of the year has increased from 18 to 20 Total funds have decreased from £122,851 in March 2010 to £73,535 by March 2011 Of this, £65,300 (2010 £110,961) relates to unrestricted funds

#### **Reserves Policy**

The charity periodically reviews its reserves policy. It has identified two distinct needs

- Financial risks and uncertainty

  The first is to provide a buffer to protect the charity against financial risks and uncertainty
- 1 1 The work carried out by the charity which is funded by the Legal Services Commission (LSC) is subject to targets Failure to meet targets can result in both clawback and a reduction in future funding. Additionally, the funding is time limited and subject to competitive bidding. The Trustees consider that a reserve equivalent to three months funding is required £44,319 at 31 March 2011.
- The work carried out by the charity which is funded by Leicestershire County Council (Debtline) is subject to the same risks and limitation. The Trustees consider that a reserve equivalent to two months funding is required £4,145 at 31 March 2011.
- The core costs of the charity are almost equivalent to its core income. The Trustees consider that a reserve equivalent to two months funding is required to provide for contingent liabilities such as redundancy costs £15,035 at 31 March 2011.

The total reserves requirement to cover financial risks and uncertainty, therefore, amounts to a total of £63,499

## 2 Advice session supervision hours

During 2010/2011, approximately 18,000 hours of advice was delivered by volunteers. This work requires the support of trained staff. It is a requirement of membership of the national organisation that advisers have access to an Advice Session Supervisor at all times when the service is delivered. Funding for this support has reduced, partly as the core funding from Charnwood Borough Council is progressively reduced on an annual basis and partly because the funding from Citizens Advice for the Additional Hours Project ceased in December 2010.

The Trustees have been making provision to enable the level of advice delivered by volunteers to be maintained By March 2011, they had accumulated a fund of £26,170 for this purpose

As of 31 March 2011, total reserves were £65,300 (including the £26,170 allocated for the Advice Session Supervisor (ASS) hours) This is about £24,000 below the level the Trustees believe is required to manage financial uncertainty and to provide the ASS hours. A programme of fund raising is therefore underway

#### Plans for the Future

The Trustees' principal objective remains the preservation of the primary function of the bureau which is to provide an advice service, free to those who use it and provided mostly by volunteer advisors

The Trustees' immediate priority is therefore to ensure the long term sustainability of the bureau in the light of reduced funding. We will closely monitor the performance of the LSC contracts. We are actively looking for other sources of funding to cover the range of advice services we provide and are working closely with the other Leicestershire CABs to jointly bid for county-wide funding.

Two new activities which have started since April 2011 are

- A project with Trading Standards Leicestershire to record instances where clients have been mistreated by businesses,
- A project funded by Charnwood Borough Council to provide advice to those who are, or are in danger of becoming homeless

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2011

## 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below and have remained unchanged from the previous year and also have been consistently applied within the same accounts

## a) Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) and the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" published in 2005. There is a contingent liability of £156000 in respect of a multi-employer pension scheme (as set out in note 8). If this liability were to crystallise then the going concern basis would not be appropriate

## b) Company Status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee The members of the company are the trustees named on page 1. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity

## c) Fund Accounting

Undesignated general funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes. The funds which have been designated for specific purposes have been so designated either -

- 1 To meet the risk of the charity failing to meet performance targets and as a consequence being required to repay part of its funding or,
- 2 To ensure that the charity has sufficient funds to meet anticipated future financial needs which cannot be achieved out of normal recurring income

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

#### d) Incoming Resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Resources (SOFA) when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the income can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

## e) Resources Expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of those resources.

## f) Pensions

Scottish Council for Voluntary Organisations (SCVO) Final Salary Pension Scheme

In respect of one employee the charity participates in a multi-employer defined benefit pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charity. The charity is unable to identify its share of the underlying assets and liabilities of the scheme on a consistent and reasonable basis and therefore, as required by Financial Reporting Standard 17 "Retirement benefits", accounts for the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. As a result, the amount charged to the profit and loss account represents the contributions payable to the scheme in respect of the accounting period.

This scheme was closed to future contributions as at 31 March 2010 (see note 8)

## Defined contribution scheme

All other employees who are part of a company pension scheme are in a defined contribution scheme. The costs of contributions are charged to the SOFA in the year they are payable

## 8 PENSION COSTS

## (a) SCVO Final Salary Pension Scheme

The charity participates in the SCVO Final Salary Pension Scheme There was one employee who was a member of the scheme during the year but as at 31 March 2010 the scheme was closed to future accrual and all contributions in respect of future services ceased. There is currently no intention to wind up the SCVO scheme and it continues in paid up form

An actuarial valuation of the scheme is commissioned every three years to determine the financial position of the scheme

The last formal valuation of the scheme was performed as at 30 September 2008 by a professionally qualified actuary using the projected unit method

It is not possible in the normal course of events to identify the share of underlying assets and liabilities of the scheme belonging to individual participating employers. Therefore these accounts have been drawn up in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 17 on the basis that the pension cost is accounted for as a defined contribution scheme.

At 30 September 2008, the scheme's assets were valued at £45 1 million and the valuation revealed a shortfall of assets compared with the value of the liabilities of £20 438 million

If an actuarial valuation reveals a shortfall of assets compared to liabilities the trustees of the SCVO scheme must prepare a recovery plan setting out the steps to be taken to make up the shortfall

On 1 April 2010 a new recovery plan came into effect, following the finalisation of the 2008 valuation. Under the recovery plan, the charity is required to make lump sum payments of £2947 per annum, increasing annually in line with the salary assumptions used in the valuation.

If the valuation assumptions are borne out in practice, this pattern of contributions should be sufficient to eliminate the entire shortfall by 31 March 2022

Under the Occupational Pension Schemes (Employer Debt) Regulation 2005 there is a potential "employer debt" that the charity is liable for. The debt is due in the event of the charity becoming insolvent or ceasing to participate in the scheme, or the scheme winding up

The charity has been notified by the Pensions Trust that the estimated "employer debt" as at 31 March 2010 is £156,000. This "employers debt" is the charity's proportion of the overall scheme and will include a share of any "orphan" liabilities in respect of previous participants in the scheme. The amount of the debt therefore depends on many factors and can be volatile over time. The trustees consider that, in view of the uncertainty surrounding the timing and amount of the "employer debt", the debt is a contingent liability within the meaning of Financial Reporting Standard 12 and so no provision for the debt has been made in the charity's balance sheet.

## (b) Defined Contribution Scheme

Charnwood Citizens Advice Bureau participates in the Pensions Trusts' Growth Plan and Unitised Ethical Plan Schemes, which are multi-employer defined contribution schemes

The costs of these schemes and the SCVO final salary pension scheme are disclosed in note 7 above

There are no amounts prepaid or unpaid at 31 March 2011 (2010 none)

There may be additional liabilities in respect of the LSC old contract and the timing and nature of some payments to Charnwood Borough Council in respect of the new premises are still being negotiated

#### 1. LSC Contract Reconciliation

Under the contract with LSC which ended in November 2010, Charnwood CAB may be liable to refund LSC for certain monies paid by LSC on account This liability arises (i) where the total number of client cases ('New Matter Starts') undertaken by CAB was less than the number assumed by the LSC in making payments on account or (ii) where subsequent audit by the LSC rules that a NMS opened by Charnwood CAB was invalid (typically this arises where multiple NMS are opened for one client or for two or more clients in an immediate family) Since a (small) number of the NMS open under the contract are still open (welfare benefit cases in which an appeal has been lodged by the client with the DWP) and since the LSC has yet to conduct its final review of cases, the amount owing is still highly uncertain At this time, the best estimate of the amount is about £5,000, which has been provided for in these accounts

## 2. Lease

The bureau is currently in negotiation with Charnwood Borough Council over payments relating to the lease for Woodgate Chambers The matters under negotiation are (i) the bureau's liability (if any) for utilities bills relating to the offices, and (ii) the bureau's obligation (if any) to pay CBC a contribution towards the refurbishment of the premises

Shepshed Town Council continues to fund an extension of the core service in Shepshed

Surestart began in 2005 A Citizens Advice Bureau worker is part of the Surestart team which aims to help families with young children in the most deprived areas of Charnwood Our current contract runs to March 2012

From March 2008 to February 2011, the Big Lottery Fund funded countywide project to support training officers in bureaux

Charnwood CAB has contracts from the Legal Service Commission (LSC) to provide money advice as part of the Legal Aid scheme Until November 14<sup>th</sup> 2010, this service was provided jointly with Melton CAB under the joint banner of 'Leicestershire Money Advice Service', since that time, Charnwood and Melton have had separate contracts with the LSC

Debtline is funded by Leicestershire County Council and is for the provision of a money advice service. Our agreement with LCC runs to March 2012

In July 2008 Severn Trent Trust Fund commenced funding a countrywide project to support money advice work for non-eligible clients, which runs to March 2012

The Additional Hours Project was funded by Citizens Advice and enabled the bureau to extend its opening hours (This grant ran from April 2009 to March 2011)

The Macmillan Cancer Support Trust provides funding for a countywide service to cancer sufferers and their carers (runs to July 2014)

The Mortgage Rescue service is funded by Charnwood Borough Council and enables the bureau to give "mortgage rescue" advice
