OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Citizens Advice Trafford helps people resolve their legal, money and other problems by providing information and advice and by influencing policymakers. Citizens Advice Trafford uses evidence of our clients' problems to campaign for improvements in laws and services that affect everyone.

Every Citizens Advice Bureau is an independent registered charity.

Without funding and volunteers Citizens Advice Trafford could not continue to provide its services in Trafford.

Our aims are:

- to provide the advice people need for the problems they face; and
- to improve the policies and practices that affect people's lives.

Our principles are:

Citizens Advice Trafford provides free, independent, confidential and impartial advice to everyone on their rights and responsibilities.

We value diversity, promote equality and challenge discrimination

In addition to the continuing provision of high-quality advisory services to the local community the primary objectives for the year were to review our delivery model and respond to cuts in funding from a range of funders, placing Citizens Advice Trafford on as sound a financial footing as possible in the current economic climate.

To obtain the necessary funding to provide additional services applications were made to various local and national providers of funding. Advertisements were placed on national and local websites for advisory staff both as paid employees and volunteers, induction and training being provided to the extent that necessary knowledge and skills were not pre-existing.

The charity is only too well aware of the financial pressures experienced by its major funders, and in view of this has taken active measures to seek additional sources of funding for its services.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Significant activities

The principal activity of Citizens Advice Trafford remained the provision of free, confidential, independent and impartial advice, information and counsel for members of the public. This is primarily provided through a telephone service from Sale. In addition to generalist advice, the following specialist advisory services were provided:

- i) Specialist Welfare Benefit and Debt provision providing specialist legal help in debt and welfare benefit issues.
- ii) Irwell Valley Housing Association Outreach Sessions provision of advice to tenants.
- iii) The Money Advice Service Funded Debt Advice Project (MASDAP) continues to deliver valuable support to clients with debt issues, helping them restructure their finances and aid their wellbeing.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Significant activities

Advisory services were provided through face-to-face consultations, telephone advice lines and various outreach services at community centres throughout the borough.

Citizens Advice Trafford has continued to work alongside Citizens Advice Rochdale and Oldham as part of SORT Citizens Advice ltd, the over-arching governing body created in 2012. In financial year 2019/20 SORT Citizens Advice ltd has worked in collaboration with Citizens Advice Stockport with a catchment population of over a million people provide further synergies and value for money for our funders.

CAT continued to act as the lead of the Trafford Advice Partnership having secured continued funding from Trafford Council to deliver information and advice services in the borough. CAT incorporated in the Citizens Advice Pennine West group structure which provided managerial and back office support.

In the financial year 2020/21 we helped 9,110 clients. The total financial gain has been £1.2 million pounds to the local economy, with £530,000 debts written off.

Public benefit

Citizens Advice Trafford provides free, independent, confidential and impartial advice to residents on their rights and responsibilities. Our aim is to:

- Provide the advice people need for the problems they face
- Improve the policies and practices that affect people's lives

The trustees believe that this fact clearly demonstrates the concept of "public benefit", as specified in Section 4 Charities Act 2011.

Social investments

The Charity does not carry out social investment activity.

Grantmaking

Grantmaking is not material to the Charity's charitable activities.

Volunteers

The charity receives help and support in the form of voluntary assistance in advising the public and administering the charity.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Covid-19 statement

There has been minimum impact on the incomes stream and was able to efficiently provide services remotely to clients in many instances, providing web chat, online meeting and telephone advice to the most vulnerable people impacted by COVID 19. All the operations of the charity remain open.

The Trustees confirm that the major risks to which the Charity is exposed have been reviewed and systems established to mitigate those risks.

The financial climate is extremely challenging and continues to be challenging moving into financial year 21/22. We have implemented various cost saving efficiencies and continue to seek to reduce cost and achieve further efficiencies where necessary. Financial year 20/21 there was a surplus of £10,675 (19/20: surplus of £5,500) which was funded from unrestricted reserves.

The free reserves held by the charity at 31st March 2021 amounted to £134,148 (2020: £123,473).

Trustees' Report for the Year Ended 31 March 2021

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Citizens Advice Trafford is required to ensure that free reserves are available in each financial year to meet any reasonably foreseeable contingency. The bureau will maintain a projection of income for at least 3 years ahead and will ensure that this continues to be derived from as wide a variety of sources possible. They will take all necessary steps to ensure that at no time within this period would it be possible for the cessation of one or more funding streams to present so serious a challenge to the future of the organisation that it could not be managed so as to continue to provide a best value advice service.

In reviewing the potential costs that could arise should a significant reduction in income be incurred the Trustees have determined that 'free' reserves of three months normal operating expenditure, which has been achieved.

The Directors extend their gratitude to Trafford Council which continued to support the core operating capacity of the charity and funded the work of the CAT Assist helpline. Additionally, funding was received from the Money Advice Service in support of debt advice. The THT Stretford Community Panel supported the pilot 'CAB Drivers - Getting you where you need to go' project. In addition, Irwell Valley Housing Association funded specialist debt advice surgeries.

Trafford Council provided premises to Citizens Advice Trafford at no financial cost to the charity.

The charity did not have any borrowings from either provider of funding or other sources at the balance sheet date.

No funds were in deficit at the balance sheet date.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

In the new business plan the Charity sets out its aims and objectives as defined within the Memorandum of Association and the means by which these would be achieved. The Charity aims to increase the access of all its communities to high quality information and advice.

The Charity's service in Trafford has a special value to those marginalized by social and financial exclusion. The Trustee Board recognises the need therefore for a more extensive use of information technology and telephone advice that will open up advice to more people including:

- The further development of our money advice work through the Money Advice Service Debt Advice Project (MASDAP).
- Developing additional services and tools to increase our capability to meet increasing demand through the further implementation of self-help tools and gateway assessments.
- Investigating the feasibility and appropriateness of developing income generation programmes.

In addition, the Trustee Board will continue to monitor the business plan for 2020/2021. The plan will be reviewed annually and be adapted as needed in what is a very changeable operating environment.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Governing document

Citizens Advice Trafford is a registered charity and a company limited by guarantee. Citizens Advice Trafford is also known and referred to as Trafford CAB. The maximum liability of each member is limited to £1. Citizens Advice Trafford is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association as amended by special resolution dated July 12th 2004.

Citizens Advice Trafford was incorporated as a company limited by guarantee January 27th 2004. The charity commenced operations on April 1st 2004 at which date the assets and liabilities of the unincorporated Citizens Advice Trafford were acquired.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Governing document

On 12th June 2017, Trafford Citizens Advice Bureau adopted the Articles of Association of Pennine West Citizens Advice Bureau. This Company's sole member became SORT Citizens Advice ltd.

Charity constitution

The charity's objects are to promote any charitable purpose for the benefit of the community by the advancement of education, the protection and preservation of health and the relief of poverty, sickness and distress.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Trustees, who are also Directors of the Company act in a voluntary capacity. A HR sub-committee made up of Trustees, the Company Secretary and chaired by the Chair is established to oversee the elections process for Board appointments. A separate process agreed by the Trustee Board is followed for the election of the Chair. No other persons or bodies external to the charity are entitled to appoint persons to the Trustee Board.

Organisational structure

Citizens Advice Trafford is governed by its Trustee Board which is responsible for setting the strategic direction of the organisation and the policy of the charity. Trustees meet as a minimum quarterly and delegate the day-to-day operation of the organisation to the Chief Officer. The Trustee Board is independent from management. A register of members' interests is maintained at the registered office and is available to the public.

Decision making

The Trustees carry the ultimate responsibility for the conduct of Citizens Advice Trafford and for ensuring that the charity satisfies its legal and contractual obligations.

Induction and training of new trustees

Newly appointed Trustees are provided with a comprehensive induction to Citizens Advice Trafford through the provision of a detailed induction, training courses and mentoring by established trustees.

Key management remuneration

Pay grades are based on Pennine West pay grading scales which are reviewed annual set by the trustees.

Related parties

Citizens Advice Trafford is a member of Citizens Advice, the operating name of the National Association of Citizens Advice Bureaux, which provides a framework for standards of advice and casework management as well as monitoring progress against these standards. Operating policies are independently determined by the Trustee Board of Citizens Advice Trafford in order to fulfil its charitable objects and comply with the national membership requirements.

The charity also co-operates and liaises with a number of other advisory services, local charities and social services departments on behalf of clients. Where one of the trustees holds the position of trustee/director of another charity they may be involved in discussions regarding that other charity but not in the ultimate decision-making process.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT FUNDRAISING

The Charity does not carry out fundraising activities.

Statement of Trustee Board responsibilities

The Trustee Board is responsible for preparing the Report of the Trustee Board and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the Trustee Board to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the Trustee Board has elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice applicable to Smaller Entities). Under company law the Trustee Board must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and the income and expenditure of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements the Trustee Board is required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- · observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- · make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The Trustee Board is responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company's transactions and disclose at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Members of the Trustee Board, who are directors for the purposes of company law, and trustees for the purposes of charity law, who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1.

1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgments and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

a Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Citizens Advice Trafford meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

b Reconciliation with previous Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

In preparing the accounts, the trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 the restatement of comparative items was required. No such restatement was required.

c Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charitable company's ability to continue as a going concern.

There are no key judgments which the trustees have made which have a significant effect on the accounts.

The trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2021 (continued)

d Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Income received in advance of a provision of a specified service is deferred until the criteria for income recognition are met.

e Donated services and facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), general volunteer time is not recognised.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

f Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2021 (continued)

g Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose.

Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

h Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

i Operating leases

Operating leases are leases in which the title to the assets, and the risks and rewards of ownership, remain with the lessor. Rental charges are charged on a straight line basis over the term of the lease.

i Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised at cost and are depreciated over their estimated useful economic lives on a straight line basis as follows:

k Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

I Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

m Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2021 (continued)

N Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

O Pensions

Employees of the charity are entitled to join the charity's defined contribution workplace pension scheme. The charity's liability to the scheme is restricted to the contributions disclosed in note 9, subject to the minimum legal requirement.

2 Legal status of the charity

The charity is a company limited by guarantee registered in England and Wales and has no share capital. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity. The registered office address is disclosed on page $^{\prime}$ 1.
