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CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2013

As a leading charity, acting on behalf of our beneficiaries, Southend YMCA seeks to identify and secure the resources necessary to create much needed services. We aim to address the needs and aspirations of disadvantaged young people and contribute to the transformation of society by helping to build cohesive communities. This is in accordance with principles of public benefit and our charitable objects the advancement of housing, education and recreation and the amelioration of distress arising from socio-economic circumstance.

In 2011, the YMCA Board ratified the 'Standing in the Gap' strategy (2011-14) This sets out our strategic aims for the next three years, which in summary are

- To provide outstanding education and training provision for disadvantaged young people and communities,
- To provide safe and supported housing for vulnerable young people aged 16-25 and progress their independent living skills,
- To support young people to acquire the knowledge, skills and confidence to obtain and sustain employment and self-employment enabling their economic inclusion,
- To provide positive activities which enable young people's personal and social development and active citizenship,
- To drive forward volunteering initiatives which promote health and well-being and have a community impact,
- To attend to the spiritual development of young people and communities

In order to achieve our operational aims above our final aim is

- To continue to build on our success and grow our capacity to ensure our long term sustainability

The Board of Trustees are pleased to report on the good progress made in respect of securing the future sustainability of our services. In particular

An application to open an Alternative Provision Free School was approved by the Secretary of State. This will be for up to 50 Key Stage 4 and post 16 pupils who need to be taught in an alternative education setting so they can thrive and achieve. We have been very busy supporting the nascence of South Essex Community School (Limited by guarantee, also known as Southend YMCA Community School, by seconding staff to fulfil lead-in tasks. The school, an Academy Trust and subsidiary of Southend YMCA, opened in September 2013 at the Ticket House, East Street, Southend on Sea.

We are seeking to develop more housing in the locality for young people. We are adopting a 'from little acorns' approach to fundraising. In March 2013, 60 young people took part in Sleep Easy and slept out in freezing temperatures to raise in excess of £10,000 in sponsorship. This led to the support of local grant making trusts and at the point of writing we are waiting on other match funders to fund our vision.

Southend YMCA will be delivering the Talent Match Project made under the auspices of the Prince's Trust This puts our economic inclusion strand of work on a sustainable footing for the medium term thereby ensuring that young people will continue to be supported to secure and maintain employment

Furthermore, we joined the ACT Partnership, a consortium of high calibre arts organisations in England and France. This will open up creative opportunities for young people to participate in arts projects both in England and France through cross border activity.

The charity works across the Essex Thames Gateway, the Unitary Borough of Southend on Sea and the Essex District Councils of Rochford, Castle Point and Basildon

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2013

A summary of the main activities and achievements of the charity in relation to charitable and strategic aims and objects is set out below

Education and Training

In 2013 the scope of our provision comprised Alternative Education, Post 16 Foundation Learning (through the curriculum pathways music, sport, food and music studies) and Personal Development Programmes e.g. The Princes Trust Team

The charity remodelled its music offer (funded through Foundation Learning) to respond to changing learner demand such that music will be offered (with a grant from Youth Music) as a recreational activity rather than an accredited course, mitigating against financial risk

During the year

- 40 young people at Key Stage 4 engaged in alternative education,
- 184 post 16 learners engaged in courses offering nationally recognised qualifications and awards including functional skills (numeracy, literacy and ICT) on full and part time courses,
- Southchurch Vocational College, our post 16 provision, continued to support young people who have additional learning needs. Southend YMCA remains the top performing provider for the Prince's Trust Team programme in the East of England,
- Learners reported enhanced soft skills i.e. improvements in confidence, motivation, tolerance, problem solving, teamwork and social engagement,
- 50 young people took place in music making activities

Housing

In 2013 the scope of our provision comprised Housing Management services - (on behalf of YMCA England) and Independent living skills development (on behalf of Supporting People) We continue to be a lead provider of housing management services to YMCA England as demonstrated through our key performance scores as well as being a level 'A' Supporting People provider (Quality Assurance Framework)

During the year 49 young people resided in self contained flats within the Newlands building leading to an improved ability to manage a tenancy & accommodation, money, relationships, self care and health with successful progression to independent living

Economic inclusion

In 2013 the scope of our provision comprised skills workshops (for jobs and self employment) and start up units for disadvantaged people in business offered within our Eco Hub building

During the year

- 36 young people attended business start up workshops in a partnership between SYMCA and the Princes Trust,
- Unemployed young people were offered the opportunity to attend 'The Work Factor' a DWP funded initiative which assisted with the acquisition of interview skills and CV building,
- 90 nascent businesses attended Business Enterprise Exchange and/or used start up space

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2013

Positive Activity

In 2013 the scope of our provision comprised youth volunteering projects, youth leadership programme through the medium of sports and youth work projects using arts and culture

During the year

- 60 young people aged 11 20 took part in 'Team YP' with 100% reporting an improvement in their self-confidence. Exit destinations include moving on to further physical activity and volunteering opportunities within recreational and health focused organisations,
- 350 people took part in community games and fundraising events where people came together to improve fitness and support good causes,
- Motivate, our flagship youth volunteering programme, enabled 200 young people to serve their local community by putting on events and activities that brought people together across the generations through events and campaigns benefitting the Southend, Rochford and Basildon communities,
- 69 young people took part in a European youth work project which took place in Normandy with YMCA CORE

Community Health and wellbeing

In 2013 the scope of our provision comprised the SOS Bus, an out of hours platform offering Social welfare Services, and Health promotional outreach supporting the dissemination of public health campaigns

During the year the bus provided information, first aid and harm reduction initiatives to 1,031 vulnerable persons of all ages using the to the night time economy - this averted the inappropriate use of emergency/ambulance services. We also conducted public health outreach work (with the PCT) into the Dale Farm travellers' site reducing health inequalities.

Business support

It is the view of the Board that the charity's success is attributable to effective risk management and a robust business infrastructure which, when taken together with additional supportive factors, put the charity in a strong position to grow. Our proven core services are based on the research of need, our performance is in the upper quartile when benchmarked against other providers, our quality is validated through nationally recognised quality marks, inspections and regulators, partnerships with key stakeholders has established our reputation as a 'can do' organisation and lastly, our values base and strong safeguarding ethos creates a safe, inclusive environment for young people

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Southend YMCA is affiliated to YMCA England via an affiliation agreement. This relationship does not impact on the operating policies adopted by the charity

In addition, Southend YMCA maintains close informal working relationships with YMCA's across Essex, the East of England and within the YMCA England Movement

In order to provide an Alternative Provision Free School, the charity set up South Essex Community School (Limited by Guarantee) in 2012, a subsidiary company. The relationship between the main charity and the school (an exempt charity) is governed through the Memorandum and Articles of Association and by a Deed of Agreement.

Directors/Trustees

Full members of the Association have the right to attend and vote at the Annual General Meeting, where honorary officers are appointed to the board of management as directors under Charitable Law. The directors/trustees during the year under review are set out under an earlier heading.

The Association's rules provides for a board consisting of not less than three, or more than 15 full members

The board has a unified sense of purpose and wishes to acknowledge the centrality of their Christian faith in decision making and the care and leadership offered to the staff team. In the forthcoming financial year (2013/14) the board will

- (A) Concentrate on the further development of trustees drawing on Charity Commission guidance and support the governance of South Essex Community School (Limited by Guarantee)
- (B) Conduct a general election

The board meets every six weeks (and as a minimum at least four times in a calendar year)

New trustees have their legal obligations under charity law explained to them and are provided with a copy of the governing document and introduced to their fellow trustees. All trustees are encouraged to attend appropriate external training events where these will facilitate the undertaking of their role.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES CHARITABLE OBJECTS

Southend on Sea Young Men's Christian Association is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association The objects of the Association arise from its acceptance of the Basis of Union of the Young Men's Christian Association of England, Ireland and Wales, adopted by the British Young Mens Christian Association Assembly held in Birmingham in 1973, that is to say

"To unite those who, regarding Jesus Christ as their God and Saviour according to the Holy Scriptures, desire to be his disciples in their faith and in their life, and to associate their efforts for the extension of his kingdom Any difference of opinion on these subjects, however important in themselves, shall not interfere with the harmonious relations of the associations of the young men's Christian association on England and Ireland and Wales"

Accordingly the objects of the Association are

- (A) To unite those who, regarding Jesus Christ as their God and Saviour according to the Holy Scriptures, desire to be his disciples in their faith and in their life, and to associate their efforts for the extension of his kingdom
- (B) To lead young people to the Lord Jesus Christ and to fullness in him
- (C) To provide or assist in the provision in the interests of social welfare of facilities for recreation and other leisure time occupation for men and women with the object of improving their conditions of life
- (D) To provide or assist in the provision of education for persons of all ages with the object of developing their physical, mental or spiritual capacities
- (E) To relieve or assist in the relief of persons of all ages who are in conditions of need, hardship or distress by reason of their social, physical or economic circumstances
- (F) To provide residential accommodation for persons of all ages who are in need, hardship or distress by reasons of their social, physical or economic circumstances

Charitable object (D) is further advanced through the establishment of an Alternative Provision Free School, South Essex Community School (Limited by Guarantee) The Academy trust, also known as Southend YMCA Community School, exists to advance for the public benefit education in the United Kingdom, in particular (but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing) by establishing, maintaining, carrying on, managing and developing an educational institution which is principally concerned with providing full-time or part-time education for children of compulsory school age who, by reason of illness, exclusion from school or otherwise, may not for any period receive suitable education unless alternative provision is made for them

Public benefit

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty of Section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit

The main activities of the charity are described below. These activities focus on the providing young people with residential accommodation and training and are undertaken to further our charitable purposes for the public benefit. Further information regarding the charity's achievements is provided in the Chairman's report.

In pursuance of charitable objects Southend YMCA operates the following services

Education and training

The provision of alternative education, post 16 training and work based training and personal development programmes to enhance life chances

Housing and homelessness

The provision of residential accommodation to vulnerable persons (on behalf of YMCA England) and independent living skills development (on behalf of Supporting People)

Economic Inclusion

The provision of skills workshops to assist unemployed young people obtain employment and self employment and start up units for disadvantaged people in business offered within our Eco Hub building

Positive Activities

The provision to deliver youth volunteering projects and youth leadership programmes

Community Health and Wellbeing

The provision of the SOS Bus for vulnerable persons in distress a platform offering Social welfare Services and Health promotional outreach supporting the dissemination of public health campaigns

Future Plans

The strategy of Southend YMCA is to ensure the sustainability of our successful existing services and to play to our strengths when responding to new opportunities using them as leverage to secure growth. We are committed to a culture of continuous improvement to ensure the best quality offer and competitive advantage.

Our aims for 2013-14 are

- To provide outstanding education for young people through the opening of an Alternative Provision Free School
- To provide safe and supported housing for vulnerable young people through creating more affordable housing units in the locality
- To support young people to acquire the knowledge, skills and confidence to obtain and sustain employment and self employment enabling their economic inclusion through obtaining continuation funding for the Eco Hub following the cessation of the ERDF grant
- To provide positive activities which enable young people's personal and social development and active through culture and arts broadening young peoples experiences
- To attend to the spiritual development of young people and communities

In order to achieve our operational aims above our final aim is

- To continue to build on our success and grow our capacity to ensure our long term sustainability

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The charity needs to hold a level of reserves that is freely available for its general purposes. These reserves are the resources the charity has or can make available to spend for all or any of the charity's purposes once it has met its commitments and covered its planned expenditure. The trustees have set a reserves policy which requires reserves to be maintained at a level which ensures that the charity can plan for future development and respond appropriately in cases of emergency. This enables the charity to meet its obligations should there be a temporary cessation or reduction in funding or to wind down the charity should this ever be required.

The total reserves of the group and charity are disclosed in detail in notes 19 and 20 to the financial statements. As at 31st March 2013, total reserves for the group were £1,249,552, of which £705,335 were fixed assets and £544,217 were net current assets. Within net current assets, funds held in respect of the free school totalled £103,655 leaving the charity with a balance of reserves of £440,562. This level of reserves equates to approximately 3 months operation costs and is within the trustees target for free reserves of 3-6 months expenditure

The reserves policy is reviewed on an annual basis

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Principal funding sources

The principal funding sources for the charity are currently by way of grant and contract income (Service Level Agreement) from Southend Borough Council, Essex County Council, South Essex College, Big Lottery Grant, European Social Fund, East of England Development Agency and European Regional Development Fund, Youth In Action other schools & colleges, as well as a net YMCA England Income Allowance Donations, grants, private sponsorship and commercial donations (from the night time economy) are received to fund the SOS Bus project. Income was also generated from the provision of first aid training. The funding received has enabled the charity to carry out its charitable objectives through the provision of supported residential accommodation, education, training courses and volunteering, as well as providing a safe haven through the SOS bus project. The skills, achievements and support these young people receive go toward helping them with future commitments and employment.

The principal funding sources for South Essex Community School (Limited by Guarantee) are the Department for Education and the Education Funding Agency

Investment policy

The Board and Management Committee have chosen to distribute funds into various accounts to safeguard against uncertainties in the banking sector

No other long term investments commitments have been made

Risk Policy

The board has overall responsibility for ensuring that the charity has appropriate systems of control financial and otherwise, procedures are in place to assess business risks and to implement risk management strategies. This involves identifying the types of risk the charity faces, prioritising them in terms of potential impact and likelihood of occurrence and identifying means of mitigating those risks.

As part of the charities review exercise carried out during the year, the trustees have considered and implemented a broadened insurance policy to mitigate against loss and protect the charities assets. They have reviewed systems and identified risks from the short term nature of service contracts and income streams reliant on one main income source.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees (who are also the directors of Southend on Sea Young Men's Christian Association (Limited by Guarantee) & Subsidiaries for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice)

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2013

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), Accounting and Reporting by Charities

The group Statement of Financial Activities and Balance Sheet consolidate the financial statements of the charity and its subsidiary undertaking South Essex Community School (Limited by Guarantee) The results of this subsidiary have been consolidated on a line-by-line basis from management accounts prepared to 31 March 2013 The charity has treated South Essex Community School (Limited by Guarantee) as a subsidiary owing to the control exerted over its financial and operating policies

As permitted by section 408 of the Companies Act 2006 and paragraph 397 of the SORP, no separate Statement of Financial Activities has been presented for the charity alone. In accordance with paragraph 397 of the SORP, total incoming resources for the charity are £1,510,168 (2012 - £1,377,248) and the net result for the charity is a surplus of £1,513 (2012 - deficit of £87,201)

Incoming resources

Management income from housing

The Newlands property is owned by the National Council of YMCAs Rent income is therefore collected on behalf of the National Council

Southend on Sea Young Men's Christian Association manages the property and receives a management income, which it recovers from the rent income

Grant and training income

Grant income is accounted for on a receivable basis

Donations and investment income

Donations and investment income are accounted for on a received basis

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Resource expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT if it cannot be recovered.

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. Where a cost is not directly attributable to a particular activity it has been apportioned over the relevant activities on an appropriate basis as detailed in note 8 and 9.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery to its activities and services. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity

Funds

Unrestricted funds are incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without specified purpose and are available as general funds

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Board for particular purposes

Restricted funds are incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity for a specific purpose

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

Southend YMCA participates in a multi-employer defined benefit pension plan for employees of YMCAs in England, Scotland and Wales, which was closed to new members and accruals on 30 April 2007. The plan's actuary has advised that it is not possible to separately identify the assets and liabilities relating to Southend YMCA for the purposes of FRS 17 disclosure.

The employer contributions in relation to the pension plan are determined by the Trustee based on advice from a qualified actuary and charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as made

Operating leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred

21. POST BALANCE SHEET EVENTS

At the year end, South East Community School (Limited by Guarantee) known as the Southend YMCA Community School was in its pre-opening phase. Subsequently, the Secretary of State issued a Funding Agreement and the School opened in September 2013 in temporary accommodation with a full intake of 30 Key Stage 4 pupils. In October 2013 planning was received enabling the establishment of a permanent school site - the Ticket House, East Street, Southend on Sea. In December 2013 the building was purchased.

23 PENSION CONTRIBUTIONS

Southend YMCA participates in a contributory pension plan providing defined benefits based on final pensionable pay for employees of YMCAs in England, Scotland and Wales. The assets of the YMCA Pension Plan are held separately from those of Southend YMCA and at the year end these were invested in pooled funds operated by Legal & General (equities and bonds and property units) and Schroder (property units only)

The most recent completed three year valuation was as at 1 May 2011 The assumptions used which have the most significant effect on the results of the valuation are those relating to the assumed rates of return on assets held before and after retirement of 6 2% and 4 95% respectively, the increase in pensions in payment of 3 4%, and the average life expectancy from normal retirement age (of 65) for a current male pensioner of 22 5 years, female 24 9 years, and 24 4 years for a male pensioner, female 26 8 years, retiring in 20 years time. The result of the valuation showed that the actuarial value of the assets was £71m. This represented 69% of the benefits that had accrued to members.

The plan's actuary has advised that it is not possible to separately identify the assets and liabilities relating to Southend YMCA for the purposes of FRS17 disclosure and accordingly the FRS17 deficit is not shown on the balance sheet

After taking professional advice and having consideration to the various options open to them, YMCA England in its capacity as Principal Employer in the YMCA Pension Plan and in conjunction with the Trustee of the YMCA Pension Plan, made the recommendation that the YMCA Pension Plan should close to new members and future benefit accruals. After consultation with members and participating YMCA employers, the Trustee of the YMCA Pension Plan informed participating YMCA Employers on 8 May 2006 that they would adopt the recommendation and that the YMCA Pension Plan would close with effect from 30 April 2007. Furthermore, it was agreed following a consultation process to remove the salary linkage for benefits from 1 May 2011 and Employed Deferred members became normal Deferred members from that date

The valuation prepared as at 1 May 2011 showed that the YMCA Pension Plan had a deficit of £32 3 million. Southend YMCA has been advised that it will need to make monthly contributions of £503 41 from 1 May 2012. This amount is based on the current actuarial assumptions (as outlined above) and may vary in the future as a result of actual performance of the Pension Plan. The current recovery period is 11 years.

In addition, Southend YMCA may have over time liabilities in the event of the non-payment by other participating YMCAs of their share of the YMCA Pension Plan's deficit—It is not possible currently to quantify the potential amount that Southend YMCA may be called upon to pay in the future
