LEGAL STATUS

The company is a charity registered with the Charity Commission for England and Wales.

EVENTS SINCE THE END OF THE YEAR

Information relating to events since the end of the year is given in the notes to the financial statements.

STRUCTURE. GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Southend YMCA is affiliated to YMCA England via an affiliation agreement. This relationship does not impact on the operating policies adopted by the charity.

In addition, Southend YMCA maintains close informal working relationships with YMCA's across the East of England Region, Essex County wide, and within the YMCA England Movement.

In order to provide an Alternative Provision Free School, the Charity set up South Essex Community School (Limited by Guarantee) in 2012. This is a subsidiary company. The relationship between the main charity and the school (an exempt charity) is governed through the Memorandum and Articles of Association and by a Deed of Agreement.

Directors/Trustees

Full members of the Association have the right to attend and vote at the Annual General Meeting, where honorary officers are appointed to the board of management as directors under Charitable Law. The directors/trustees during the year under review are set out under an earlier heading.

The Association's rules provides for a board consisting of not less than 2, or more than 15 full members.

The board has a unified sense of purpose and wishes to acknowledge the centrality of their Christian faith in decision making and the care and leadership offered to the staff team. In the forthcoming financial year the board will:

- (A) Concentrate on the further development of trustees drawing on Charity Commission guidance and support the governance of South Essex Community School (Limited by Guarantee).
- (B) Conduct a general election.
- (C) Deliver its strategy as set out in the 5 year plan.

The board operates a governance cycle comprising not less than 4 full board meetings and with bimonthly subcommittee meetings on finance and risk, housing and facilities and service development. There are biannual reviews of service performance, safeguarding, policies and health and safety ensuring that the compliance basis of the charity is at its most effective.

The board of trustees has adopted the NCVO Good Governance Code and carries out an annual self appraisal of its performance targets against its key principals.

The board meets and exceeds the minimum number of meetings as set out in its governing documents.

New trustees have their legal obligations under charity law explained to them and are provided with a copy of the governing document and introduced to their fellow trustees. All trustees are encouraged to attend appropriate internal and external training events where these will facilitate the undertaking of their role.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES CHARITABLE OBJECTS

Association of England, Ireland and Wales, adopted by the British Young Mens Christian Association Assembly held in Birmingham in 1973, that is to say:

"To unite those who, regarding Jesus Christ as their God and Saviour according to the Holy Scriptures, desire to be his disciples in their faith and in their life, and to associate their efforts for the extension of his kingdom. Any difference of opinion on these subjects, however important in themselves, shall not interfere with the harmonious relations of the associations of the young men's Christian association on England and Ireland and Wales"

Accordingly the objects of the Association are:

- (A) To unite those who, regarding Jesus Christ as their God and Saviour according to the Holy Scriptures, desire to be his disciples in their faith and in their life, and to associate their efforts for the extension of his kingdom.
- (B) To lead young people to the Lord Jesus Christ and to fullness in him.
- (C) To provide or assist in the provision in the interests of social welfare of facilities for recreation and other leisure time occupation for men and women with the object of improving their conditions of life.
- (D) To provide or assist in the provision of education for persons of all ages with the object of developing their physical, mental or spiritual capacities.
- (E) To relieve or assist in the relief of persons of all ages who are in conditions of need, hardship or distress by reason of their social, physical or economic circumstances.
- (F) To provide residential accommodation for persons of all ages who are in need, hardship or distress by reasons of their social, physical or economic circumstances.

Charitable object (D) is further advanced through the establishment of an Alternative Provision Free School, South Essex Community School (Limited by Guarantee) also known as Southend YMCA Community School.

The charitable objects directly correlate with our strategic aims that are set out below:

Strategic aims

The Board of Trustees has set out their strategic aims within the 'Standing in the Gap' strategy (2011-14) which in summary are:

- 1. To provide a good quality education for disadvantaged young people aged 14-25.
- 2. To provide safe and supported housing for vulnerable young people aged 16-25 and progress their independent living skills.
- 3. To support young people to acquire the knowledge, skills and confidence to obtain and sustain employment enabling economic inclusion.
- 4. To provide positive activities which enable young people's personal, social, emotional development and active citizenship.
- To provide volunteering initiatives which promote health and wellbeing.
- 6. To attend to the spiritual development of young people.

In order to achieve the operational aims above, our final aim is:

7. To continue to build on our success and grow our capacity to ensure our long term sustainability.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Public benefit

Southend YMCA is an Incorporated Charity which exists for charitable purposes namely: the provision of accommodation, education, and recreation to improve conditions of life and the amelioration of need arising from socio-economic circumstance. Trustees are mindful of the need to pay due regard to Charity Commission guidance on public benefit when exercising their powers thus ensuring that all new and existing activity delivers public benefit.

Southend YMCA's mission statement is to 'Stand in the Gap' by offering high quality services which address the needs and aspirations of young people and helps to transform their lives - this is because we want to develop the talent and potential of young people with less opportunity and increase their life chances.

Southend YMCA continuously improves its service monitoring and evaluation processes to ensure the full impact of our work is captured and relayed to key stakeholders furthering transparency and accountability. In this way we are able to demonstrate positive change for beneficiaries. We know that without our support young people on society's margins would be homeless, they would not receive a suitable education and attain qualifications, or develop the foundational skills and behaviour to acquire and sustain employment.

Beneficiaries

Southend YMCA's services primarily benefit a subsection of the public - disadvantaged young people with a complex range of needs and circumstances including young people:

- Who have learning difficulties, are NEET (not in employment, education or training), or are on the cusp of exclusion.
- Who experience transitional difficulties including emerging mental health problems, self esteem issues and isolation.
- Who exhibit risk taking behaviour including substance misuse, offending and social, emotional and behavioural difficulties (SEBD).
- Who come from families with multiple vulnerabilities or live in poverty.
- Who are designated children in need or are in care.
- Who are homeless.
- Who are economically inactive or long term unemployed.

Southend YMCA also provides a health promotion and information, advice and guidance service for persons of all ages.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Whilst our beneficial area is not limited we operate as a local charity. In 2013-14 the Charity delivered services in Southend on Sea, Thurrock and Essex (Rochford, Castle Point, Basildon, Harlow and Tendering). In 2013-14 the charity delivered the following core services:

The results we see: Young people gain qualifications and awards. They develop the foundational skills for learning. They are supported to access specialist agencies which can assist them with addressing wider barriers. They progress into positive destinations that include further education, training or employment.

The results we see: In 2013-14 we housed 45 young people who were given the information, advice and support to maintain a tenancy, be responsible for their basic, educational, recreational and health needs and move on into independent accommodation.

The results we see: That 1200 people whose well-being was threatened by an inability to get home/illness or injury/emotional distress/other vulnerability had a first point of contact. Their personal safety was improved and harm reduced (safe sex, alcohol) averting the need for emergency services. The muliti-sport approach provided sporting projects that helped participants acquire healthy behaviours.

Securing the future

The Board of Trustees is pleased to report on the good progress made in respect of securing the future sustainability and growth of our services. In particular:

A good education - In September 2013 the Southend YMCA Community School opened for its first academic year in demountable classrooms at the Ticket House Site. This Alternative Provision Free School provides a full time GCSE programme for 31 key stage 4 pupils with social, emotional and behavioural difficulty as is expected to rise to a full capacity of 50 pupils in 2016. In November 2013 the school received planning permission for a permanent building with works commencing in 2014. A seven year rolling funding agreement with the Secretary of State puts this specialist strand of work on a sustainable footing.

Safe and supported housing - During 2013-14 the charity was able to raise further funds to create affordable move on housing for young people. This was achieved through individual sponsorship, donations from local trusts and an Empty Properties Grant (from Communities and Local Government). In March 2014 the charity purchased a property in Hamlet Court Road, Westcliff on Sea comprising of offices which will be remodelled as a 4 bedroom flat. The charity also conducted feasibility/viability studies on a number of prospective housing schemes and began the process of raising match funding to further a second property. By 2015 we will have increased our bed spaces by 10, a 25% improvement.

Skills for employment - The charity began delivering the 5 year Big Lottery Talent Match programme through our partnership with the Princess Trust. Southend YMCA will provide a bespoke mentoring service for young people who are the furthest away from the labour market across Essex.

Positive Activities - The Charity secured a grant from Youth Music enabling the continuity of the Switch music programme.

Health and Wellbeing - The SOS Bus was awarded the Queen Award for volunteering regarded as the MBE for voluntary groups.

Southend YMCA is regularly inspected by regulatory bodies, auditors and funders in all areas of service delivery furthermore external consultancy is utilised by the board of Trustees to ensure scrutiny in areas such as Health & Safety and Employment Law. We hold the flowing quality standards - Matrix, Investors in People and Supporting People QAF level A.

Conclusion

This year has seen Southend YMCA services develop further. Successful strategies have been put in place to ensure a sustainable future. The vision continues for Southend YMCA to be an exemplar charity delivering innovative and effective services which address the needs of disadvantaged young people and helps them to build their future. The trustees are appreciative of the enormous contribution made by our staff and volunteer team in ensuring high quality service delivery.

FINANCIAL REVIEW Reserves policy

The charity needs to hold a level of reserves that is freely available for its general purposes. These reserves are the resources the charity has or can make available to spend for all or any of the charity's purposes once it has met its commitments and covered its planned expenditure. The trustees have set a reserves policy which requires reserves to be maintained at a level which ensures that the charity can plan for future development and respond appropriately in cases of emergency. This enables the charity to meet its obligations should there be a temporary cessation or reduction in funding or to wind down the charity should this ever be required.

The total reserves of the group and charity are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements. As at 31 March 2014, total reserves for the group were £2,236,782 of which £1,622,625 were fixed assets and £614,157 were net current assets. Within net current assets, funds held in respect of the free school totalled £138,093 leaving the charity with a balance of reserves of £476,064. This level of reserves equates to approximately 3 - 4 months operation costs and is within the trustees target for free reserves of 3 - 6 months expenditure.

The reserves policy is reviewed on an annual basis.

Principal funding sources

The principal funding sources for the charity are currently by way of grant, contract income (Service Level Agreement) from Southend Borough Council, South Essex College, Big Lottery Grant, European Social Fund, the European Union and other schools & colleges, as well as a net YMCA England Income Allowance.

Donations, grants, private sponsorship and commercial donations are received to fund the SOS Bus. Income was also generated from the sale of first aid training.

The principal funding sources for South Essex Community School (Limited by Guarantee) are the Department for Education, the Education Funding Agency and other schools in the Essex area.

Investment policy

The Board and Management Committee have chosen to distribute funds into various accounts to safeguard against uncertainties in the banking sector.

No other long term investments commitments have been made.

Risk Policy

The board has overall responsibility for ensuring that the charity has appropriate systems of control financial and otherwise, procedures are in place to assess business risks and to implement risk management strategies. This involves identifying the types of risk the charity faces, prioritising them in terms of potential impact and likelihood of occurrence and identifying means of mitigating those risks.

As part of the charity's review exercise carried out during the year, the trustees have considered and implemented a broadened insurance policy to mitigate against loss and protect the charities assets. They have reviewed systems and identified risks from the short term nature of service contracts and income streams reliant on one main income source. As such a diversified funding strategy is pursued.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The strategy of Southend YMCA is to ensure the sustainability of our successful existing services and to play to our strengths when responding to new opportunities using them as leverage to secure growth. We are committed to a culture of continuous improvement to ensure the best quality offer and competitive advantage.

As a leading youth charity, acting on behalf of our beneficiaries we seek to identify and secure the resources necessary to create much needed services. Our Fundraising Strategy seeks to maximise the level of income secured by the charity in order to meet the core strategic objectives and assist in the overall sustainable development of the organisation. A range of funding types are pursued from grants, contracts and service level agreements through to donated and earned income, from local, regional and national to European funding streams to social investment. This diversification spreads the financial risk ensuring we are not over reliant on one income source and that we are able to continue to service those in need of our services.

Our aims for the future are:

- To provide outstanding education and training provision for young people through our Alternative Provision Free School and through developing Post 16 training opportunities.
- To provide safe and supported housing for vulnerable young people through creating more affordable housing units in the locality.
- To support young people to acquire the knowledge, skills and confidence to obtain and sustain employment and self employment enabling their economic inclusion.
- To provide positive activities which enable young people's personal and social development and active citizenship.
- To drive forward volunteering initiatives which promote health and well being and have a community impact through securing a new SOS bus which will continue to provide outreach triage services.
- To attend to the spiritual development of young people and communities though our partnership with Christchurch.

In order to achieve our operational aims above our final aim is:

- To continue to build on our success and grow our capacity to ensure our long term sustainability.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES RESPONSIBILITIES

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2014

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), Accounting and Reporting by Charities

The group Statement of Financial Activities and Balance Sheet consolidate the financial statements of the charity and its subsidiary undertaking South Essex Community School (Limited by Guarantee). The results of this subsidiary have been consolidated on a line-by-line basis from management accounts prepared to 31 March 2014. The charity has treated South Essex Community School (Limited by Guarantee) as a subsidiary owing to the control exerted over its financial and operating policies.

As permitted by section 408 of the Companies Act 2006 and paragraph 397 of the SORP, no separate Statement of Financial Activities has been presented for the charity alone. In accordance with paragraph 397 of the SORP, total incoming resources for the charity are £1,773,314 (2013 - £1,510,169) and the net result for the charity is a surplus of £177,755 (2013 - £1,513).

Incoming resources

Management income from housing

The Newlands property is owned by the National Council of YMCAs. Rent income is therefore collected on behalf of the National Council.

Southend on Sea Young Men's Christian Association manages the property and receives a management income, which it recovers from the rent income.

Grant and training income

Grant income is accounted for on a receivable basis. Training is accounted for on a payment by results basis.

Donations and investment income

Donations and investment income are accounted for on a received basis.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Resource expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT if it cannot be recovered.

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. Where a cost is not directly attributable to a particular activity it has been apportioned over the relevant activities on an appropriate basis.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery to its activities and services. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2014

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Funds

Unrestricted funds are incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without specified purpose and are available as general funds.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Board for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity for a specific purpose.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

Southend YMCA participates in a multi-employer defined benefit pension plan for employees of YMCAs in England, Scotland and Wales, which was closed to new members and accruals on 30 April 2007. The plan's actuary has advised that it is not possible to separately identify the assets and liabilities relating to Southend YMCA for the purposes of FRS 17 disclosure.

The employer contributions in relation to the pension plan are determined by the Trustee based on advice from a qualified actuary and charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as made.

Operating leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred.

General funds - this fund represents the undesignated accumulated surplus from funds available for general objectives of the charity.

Designated funds - these funds represent funds designated by the Board for:

Furniture and Equipment - the replacement of furniture and equipment in the Association's Ambleside Drive premises.

Repairs to Property - the repair, both internal and external, of the Association's Ambleside Drive premises.

Hardship Fund - for the purpose of assisting desperate young people with essential food, clothing and other items required, to enable them to move forward and become self-sufficient.

Eco Hub Fund - The committed contribution of capital and revenue, towards the development and running of a dilapidated historic building, transforming it into a fit for purpose multi use Eco Hub, providing enterprise and multi-purpose rooms for group work, meeting rooms and conference facilities creating 202m² of new employment space for the benefit of disadvantaged persons.

Research, Development and Marketing - for the purpose of enabling the organisation to work on new funding opportunities in order to meet its core strategic objectives and to assist in the overall sustainable development and infrastructure.

Education and Training - for the purpose of enabling the organisation to continue to invest and grow in its commitment to provide education and training for disadvantaged young people.

Empty homes fund – for the purpose of bringing empty property back into use.

Restricted funds - these funds represent the accumulated surpluses from funds available for a specific purpose:

Housing Security Fund - funded by the Essex Probation Service for the provision and maintenance of CCTV equipment.

Prince's Trust - funded by South East Essex College offering a 12 week full time self development course for young people aged 16-25.

PTT community project - funding for Prince's Trust students to raise funds and manage a project over a four week period for a local community organisation of the team's choice.

Residents' Fund - contributed to by various sources for the provision of immediate temporary relief to young people in crisis situations.

Jones Memorial Trust - funding towards the building costs of the Association's premises in Ambleside Drive.

Sports and Health Equipment - funding to purchase and run first aid courses for young people.

Community Sector grant - funded by Connexions for the provision of outreach music.

Foundation Learning - funded by the Nova Partnership for work based learning through Music and Food projects, for young people aged 14-19.

European Social Fund - Cue Music - funded by the Nova Partnership and various other schools and colleges for the Cue Music project.

University of Hertfordshire - Knowledge Transfer Partnership Funding to enable the transfer of knowledge in respect of establishing an IT platform for the charity.

Young Health Champions - funded by the Department of Health with the aim of involving young people in health promotion activities.

24. PENSION CONTRIBUTIONS

Southend YMCA participates is a contributory pension plan providing defined benefits based on final pensionable salary for employees of YMCAs in England, Scotland and Wales. The assets of the YMCA Pension Plan are held separately from those of Southend YMCA and at the year end these were invested in the Mercer Dynamic De-risking Solution, 35% matching portfolio and 65% in the growth portfolio and Schroder (property units only).

The most recent completed three year valuation was as at 1 May 2011. The assumptions used which have the most significant effect on the results of the valuation are those relating to the assumed rates of return on assets held before and after retirement of 6.2% and 4.95% respectively, the increase in pensions in payment of 3.4%, and the average life expectancy from normal retirement age (of 65) for a current male pensioner of 22.5 years, female 24.9 years, and 24.4 years for a male pensioner, female 26.8 years, retiring in 20 years time. The result of the valuation showed that the actuarial value of the assets was £71m. This represented 69% of the benefits that had accrued to members.

The plan's actuary has advised that it is not possible to separately identify the assets and liabilities relating to Southend YMCA for the purposes of FRS17 disclosure and accordingly the FRS17 deficit is not shown on the balance sheet.

The Pension Plan was closed to new members and future service accrual with effect from 30 April 2007. With the removal of the salary linkage for benefits all employed deferred members became deferred members as from 1 May 2011.

The valuation prepared as at 1 May 2011 showed that the YMCA Pension Plan had a deficit of £32.3 million. Southend YMCA has been advised that it will need to make monthly contributions of £549.15 from 1 May 2013. This amount is based on the current actuarial assumptions (as outlined above) and may vary in the future as a result of actual performance of the Pension Plan. The current recovery period is 11 years commencing 1 May 2012.

In addition, Southend YMCA may have over time liabilities in the event of the non-payment by other participating YMCAs of their share of the YMCA Pension Plan's deficit. It is not possible currently to quantify the potential amount that Southend YMCA may be called upon to pay in the future.
