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### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

### (I) Aims and organisation

Governing document: The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 23 February 2004 and registered as a charity on 9 August 2005. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

Objects of the charity (as stated in the constitution): To promote, improve, develop and maintain appreciation of and education of the public (and in particular the community of Crouch End) in the art and science of music, and in particular of choral music, by the presentation of concerts and recitals, the holding of workshops and by such other activity as the committee may from time to time determine.

Main policies adopted: The company has no formal policies beyond those stated in its Memorandum of Association.

The mission statement: To ensure that CEFC becomes one of the leading symphony choruses in the country

The statement is underpinned by a development plan which sets out the company's values and strategies for achieving the mission statement. These include voice training and musicianship classes for members, and voice tests every three years, regularly commissioning new works, working with professional orchestras, seeking to promote and perform our own concerts in a prestigious venue each year, being engaged by external promoters

Organisation structure: The Trustees have adopted a two-tier structure for the management of the company. The Board of Trustees is responsible for the strategic management of the company, setting policies, developing business plans and approving the annual budget. The company is managed on a day-to-day basis by a Management Committee which reports to the company trustees as detailed in section A (iv). Trustees and members of the Management Committee are elected by members of the company at its Annual General Meeting. Members of the Management Committee hold office until the following AGM. All Trustees and Management Committee members offer their services on voluntary basis. The company employs no staff but contracts for the services of the Musical Director and Accompanist. The company is not connected to other charities.

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### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

Reliance on unpaid volunteers. Although the company does engage the services of the musical director and the accompanist under contract, all activities of the company are managed by choir members on a voluntary basis. This represents a considerable amount of work, especially as the success of the choir increases. The rules of membership of the chorus underline the ethos that all choir members are expected to contribute to the effective running of the chorus. The workload is shared widely throughout the choir, in the form of working groups which report to the Management Committee.

### (ii) Review of progress and achievements

#### Overview:

CEFC has cemented its reputation as one of the most innovative and admired symphony choruses in the UK in 2005-2006 with four of its own promotions, one of which was in its local community in north London

The season was typically eclectic, comprising music from the 18<sup>th</sup> century up to the present day. We were particularly pleased to have the opportunity to stage our own promotion at Queen Elizabeth Hall on the South Bank.

External engagements, including recordings, were of great value to the choir Highlights included an appearance at the BBC Proms under Esa Pekka Salonen and the Helsinki Symphony Orchestra (Ravel. *Daphnis & Chloe Suites*), *Carmina Burana* with Daniele Gatti and Mahler's *Symphony No 2* with Gilbert Kaplan, both with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra and all at the Royal Albert Hall in London The choir made many recordings during this season, not least the celebratory song of the opening match at the 2006 World Cup which was broadcast around the world

CEFC holds well-attended Open Rehearsals alongside an ongoing and vigorous recruitment campaign to ensure we have a large and vibrant body of singers on whom to call.

The total commitment to high professional standards has ensured that the chorus continues to be recognised as one of the leading symphony choirs in the country and has earned considerable respect from the musical world.

### Important events during the year:

In January 2006 the company promoted its first concert, at the Barbican, with performances of James MacMillan's Cantos Sagrados, Britten's Ballad of Heroes

and Philip Glass's *Itaipu*, appropriately in association with The Medical Foundation for the Victims of Torture, which is based in north London

March saw a terrific performance, again at the Barbican, of Verdi's Requiem and in March a very well-attended a cappella concert at St Michael's Church in Highgate.

in July, CEFC joined forces with the composer Howard Haigh and young singers from Coldfall Primary School and Finchley Children's Music Group for an unforgettable evening of music linked by Morecambe Bay. The concert began with Elgar's Part Songs, which was written in 1899 for the Morecambe Festival, and two pieces by Howard, Around the Bay in a Boat, which took listeners on an imaginary journey around the bay, and the Flamenco-themed, Land of Light

CEFC was also very pleased to receive sponsorship from Prickett & Ellis

### III) Financial position of the charity

Financial review of the year: In this financial year the company made a surplus of £8,847 against a budgeted deficit of £1,090. This was helped by careful cost and cash flow control, realistic ticket budgets but mostly by a more than significant contribution from external engagements

On 1 January 2006 the company received the net assets of registered charity number 803604, amounting to £50,209 As a result, fund balances at the end of the year amounted to £59,056

Overall the finances of the company are in a satisfactory position, although heavily dependent on the income from external engagements, grants and sponsorship, and on the ability of the members to sell tickets for our own promoted concerts

Purposes for which the charity's assets are held: The company has minimal capital (fixed) assets. A major asset of the company is its funds held in bank and building society accounts. These totalled £53,453 at 31 July 2006. The main purpose for which the net assets are held is to provide a designated contingency and working capital fund:

- As insurance against an unsuccessful concert in terms of ticket sales. The company is ambitious both in terms of its programming and its performance venues, which carries a level of risk.
- To enable the company, should it so choose, to plan a forward season which is musically exciting and pioneering, but which may show a financial loss
- To support the cash flow of the company, given, for example, that payments for commissions and venue bookings have to be made in advance.

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The company maintains a small charities account for members' personal events, for example sending flowers in the case of a personal bereavement. This account is kept in a separate bank account and is entirely funded from donations from company members.

**Dependence on key supporters:** The company is not dependent on any one source of external funding

### (v) Responsibilities of the Trustees

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the company as at the balance sheet date and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including income and expenditure, for the financial year

In preparing those financial statements, the management committee should follow best practice and

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- · make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent, and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the company will continue on that basis.

The Trustees are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. The Trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

(i) The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with the Companies Act 1985 and the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued in March 2005

- (ii) Grants, awards and sponsorship monies are credited to income resources on the earlier date of when they are received or receivable, unless they relate to a specific future period, in which case they are deferred
- (iii) Fundraising income and voluntary donations are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when received
- (iv) Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows.

- (v) Management and administration costs relate to the cost of running the chorus, including compliance with the constitution, and include costs which cannot be specifically identified to another expenditure classification
- (vi) Stocks consist of music library and merchandise for re-sale and are valued at the lesser of cost or net realisable value

### 15 Restricted Fund not included in these accounts

The chorus is not empowered to make discretionary payments to, or on behalf of, members or ex-members. As a result, the chorus operates a separate "Charities" bank account, which is not included in these accounts, out of which discretionary payments are made to purchase gifts or flowers for retiring, ill or bereaved members and acquaintances of the chorus. Receipts to this account come entirely from voluntary donations from members, from both specific and general appeals.

The designated contingency and working capital fund is to contribute towards unexpected costs and reduced or delayed income from concerts and other primary activities which are not expected to anse but may arise, and to fund prepaid expenditure

### 17 Transfer from charity registration number 803604

On 31 December 2005 the trustees of Crouch End Festival Chorus, an unincorporated trust registered as a charity in England and Wales with registration number 803604, transferred assets to the value of £50,209 to the company. The trustees of this charity have indicated that they will be applying to the Charity Commissioner to seek the removal of charity registration number 803604 from the Register of Charities in England and Wales.
