REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

(i) Aims and organisation

Governing document: The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 23 February 2004 and registered as a charity on 9 August 2005. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

Objects of the charity (as stated in the constitution). To promote, improve, develop and maintain appreciation of and education of the public (and in particular the community of Crouch End) in the art and science of music, and in particular of choral music, by the presentation of concerts and recitals, the holding of workshops and by such other activity as the committee may from time to time determine

Main policies adopted: The company has no formal policies beyond those stated in its Memorandum of Association

The mission statement. To ensure that CEFC becomes one of the leading symphony choruses in the country

The statement is underpinned by the company's values and strategies for achieving the mission statement. These include seeking to promote and perform our own concerts in a prestigious venue each year, regularly commissioning new works, working with professional orchestras, being engaged by external promoters and voice tests for all singers every three years.

Organisation structure: The Trustees have adopted a two-tier structure for the management of the company. The Board of Trustees is responsible for the strategic management of the company, setting policies, developing business plans and approving the annual budget. The company is managed on a day-to-day basis by a Management Committee which reports to the company. Trustees

Trustees and members of the Management Committee are elected by members of the company at its Annual General Meeting Members of the Management Committee hold office until the following AGM

All Trustees and Management Committee members offer their services on voluntary basis. The company employs no staff but contracts for the services of the Musical Director and Accompanist. The Trustees also contract a qualified accountant to produce quarterly management accounts and prepare the year end accounts for independent examination.

The company is not connected to other charities but does, from time to time, promote concerts in association with local charities

Reliance on unpaid volunteers. Although the company does engage the services of the musical director, the accompanist and accountant under contract and a designer for marketing materials, all other activities of the company are managed by choir members on a voluntary basis. This represents a considerable amount of work, especially as the success of the choir increases. The rules of membership of the chorus underline the ethos that all choir members are expected to contribute to the effective running of the chorus. The workload is shared widely throughout the choir, in the form of working groups which report to the Management Committee.

(ii) Review of progress and achievements

CEFC mounted five of our own promotions in its 27th season, three of which were at the Barbican and two at St James Church, Muswell Hill in the heart of our local community

Our first concert was Berlioz' *Grande Messe des Morts* at the Barbican with the London Orchestra da Camera and tenor, Robert Murray. This was followed in January 2011 with a typically adventurous and critically acclaimed concert – John Adams's *Harmonium*, a CEFC favourite, and the rarely performed *The Plague* by Roberto Gerhard – Actor Paul McGann played the central character, Dr Rieux, in this interpretation of Camus's novel, *La Peste*, for what might be perceived as a challenging programme, we secured a pretty healthy audience, only just missing our budgeted ticket numbers – Many thanks must go to the committed CEFC team who worked very hard to make this concert a success

In April 2011, we sang Bach's *St John Passion* at the Barbican in German with soloists Katherine Watson, Diana Moore, Robert Murray as *Evangelist*, Mark Dobell and Stephan Loges, again with the London Orchestra da Camera

Our Christmas 2010 concerts were at St James Church, Muswell Hill, as were two summer concerts in July 2011, featuring local composer, Jenni Roditi's *Life* and featuring Allegri's beautiful *Miserere* and Kodály's *Missa Brevis*

As ever, our varied external engagements, both live concerts and recordings, have been enormously gratifying for the choir and bring in an essential income stream for CEFC

They have varied from two concerts with our Patron, Ray Davies, the second at the Meltdown Festival at the Royal Festival Hall, and performing a much-praised Britten's *Ballad of Heroes* with the BBC Symphony Orchestra under Ilan Volkov We were re-engaged by Classic FM for a concert at the Royal Albert Hall in March and finished the season with two wonderful concerts with Basement Jaxx at the Barbican

The choir has been very busy with recordings, many of which have been at the Abbey Road Studios

Some of our external engagements and most of the recordings call for a small to medium-sized choir and the trustees are enormously grateful to choir members who are willing, often at short notice, to take part in these external engagements

CEFC continues to hold well-attended Open Rehearsals alongside an ongoing and vigorous recruitment campaign to ensure we have a large and vibrant body of singers on whom to call. As our reputation grows, we have noticed a steady increase in the number of people attending Open Rehearsals.

The Trustees and Management Committee presented the choir's three year strategy at the AGM in January 2011 At each of our quarterly trustee meetings, the General Manager reports back on progress against the strategy

The singers of CEFC remain very grateful to our Musical Director, David Temple, and our accompanist, Peter Jaekel and associate accompanist, Paul Ayres

iii) Financial position of the charity

Financial review of the year: In this financial year the company made a small loss of £688 against a budgeted surplus of £15,700. This budgeted surplus of £15,700 included a fundraising target of £15,000 which was not met

Our income from ticket sales for our own promotions was £7,707 below budget. We exceeded ticket income budget for one concert, the *St John Passion* at the Barbican in April 2011. Ticket

sales for our two local promotions were well below budget which was disappointing

In a difficult financial environment, our external engagements just missed our budget – our net income was £32,304 but with our costs reduced to 30.8% of our gross income, down by 6%

Ticket budgets are revised and reviewed in the light of CEFC's sales to the choir and through venue box offices. Ticket budgets for the 2011-2012 season have been set with reference to the 2010-2011 sales. The Trustees believe that our ticket sales' budgeting is achievable, particularly for concerts in central London venues such as the Barbican, but that the choir as a whole must continue to make every effort to build sales and audiences. We must also market and sell tickets for local concerts with as much energy and determination as we do concerts in central London.

Income from programme advertising has increased substantially this year, thanks to the work done on behalf of the choir by John Gregson. The Trustees would like to thank him and the programme team for their efforts. Total programme income has increased from a 2010 total of £1,979 to £5,987 at 31 July 2011.

Throughout the season, the choir maintained excellent cash flow and cost control; the Trustees would like to thank Julia Taylor and her team who have not only managed our cash flow superbly but also provided invaluable financial reporting back to both the Trustees and Management Committee

Purposes for which the charity's assets are held: The company has minimal capital (fixed) assets. A major asset of the company is its funds held in bank and building society accounts. These totaled £39,777 at 31 July 2011 (£43,182 in July 2010). Our net assets at 31 July 2011 were £56,737, against £57,425 in July 2010.

The Trustees have indicated that the choir should build its reserves to £24,000 by July 2014 (i e £8,000 a season) and retain working capital of £35,000

The main purpose for which the net assets are held is to provide a designated contingency and working capital fund, currently £30,000 but with a target of £35,000 by 2014

- as insurance against an unsuccessful concert in terms of ticket sales. The company is ambitious both in terms of its programming and its performance venues, which carries a level of risk.
- to enable the company, should it so choose, to plan a forward season which is musically
 exciting and pioneering, but which may show a financial loss
- to support the cash flow of the company, given, for example, that payments for commissions and venue bookings have to be made in advance.

The company maintains a small charities account for members' personal events, for example sending flowers in the case of a personal bereavement. This account is kept in a separate bank account and is entirely funded from donations from company members.

Dependence on key supporters: The company is not dependent on any one source of external funding

iv) Responsibilities of the Trustees

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the company as at the balance sheet date and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including income and expenditure, for the financial year

In preparing those financial statements, the Management Committee should follow best practice and

- · select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- · make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the company will continue on that basis

The Trustees are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The Trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Report of the Independent Examiner to the trustees of Crouch End Festival Chorus on the accounts of the Charity for the year ended 31 July 2011

I report on the financial statements of the Charity on pages 10 to 11 for the year ended 31st July 2011 which have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 1993 and with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (FRSSE), effective April 2008, as modified by the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales, effective April 2005 as modified in June 2008 (the SORP), under the historical cost convention and the accounting policies set out on page 12

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

As described on page 3, the Charity's trustees, who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law, are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements

The trustees are satisfied that the audit requirement of Section 43(2) of the Charities Act 1993 (the Act) does not apply and that the accounts do not require an audit in accordance with Part 16 of the Companies Act 2006 and that no member or members have requested an audit pursuant to section 476 of the Companies Act 2006, and that there is no requirement in the governing document or constitution of the Charity for the conducting of an audit. As a consequence, the trustees have elected that the financial statements be subject to independent examination.

Having satisfied myself that the charity is not subject to audit under company law, or otherwise, and is eligible for independent examination, it is my responsibility to.-

- a) examine the accounts under section 43 of the Act;
- b) to follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 43(7)(b) of the Act, and;
- c) to state whether particular matters have come to my attention

Basis of opinion and scope of work undertaken

I conducted my examination in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales setting out the duties of an independent examiner issued by the Charity Commissioners under section 43(7)(b) of the Act) in relation to the conducting of an independent examination, referred to above. 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NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

1 Accounting policies

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (FRSSE), effective April 2008, and all other applicable accounting standards, as modified by the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales, (revised June 2008) The accounts have been drawn up in accordance with the provisions of the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the Companies Act 2006, and include the results of the charity's operations which are described in the Trustees' Report, all of which are continuing.

Insofar as the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales, (revised June 2008) requires compliance with specific Financial Reporting Standards other than the FRSSE then the specific Financial Reporting Standards have been followed where their requirements differ from those of the FRSSE

Advantage has been taken of Section 396(5) of The Companies Act 2006 to allow the format of the financial statements to be adapted to reflect the special nature of the charity's operation and in order to comply with the requirements of the SORP

The charity has taken advantage of the exemption in the FRSSE from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement

The particular accounting policies adopted are set out below

- (i) The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued in March 2005
- (II) Grants, awards and sponsorship monies are credited to income resources on the earlier date of when they are received or receivable, unless they relate to a specific future period, in which case they are deferred.
- (iii) Fundraising income and voluntary donations are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when received
- (iv) Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows: -

Rostra and music stands

5 years

Furniture and office equipment

3 years

- (v) Management and administration costs: relate to the cost of running the chorus, including compliance with the constitution, and include costs which cannot be specifically identified to another expenditure classification
- (vi) Stocks consist of music library and merchandise for re-sale and are valued at the lesser of cost or net realisable value
- (VII) Liabilities are recognised on the accruals basis in accordance with normal accounting principles modified where necessary in accordance with the guidance given in the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting (revised June 2008) issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales
- (viii) Taxation: As a registered charity, the company is exempt from income and corporation tax to the extent that its income and gains are applicable to charitable purposes only Value Added Tax is not recoverable by the company, and is therefore included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities
- (ix) Fund structure policy The charity maintains a general unrestricted fund which represents funds which are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. Such funds may be held in order to finance both working capital and capital investment.

Restricted funds have been provided to the charity for particular purposes, and it is the policy of the board of trustees to carefully the monitor the application of those funds in accordance with the restrictions placed upon them

There is no formal policy of transfer between funds or on the allocation of funds to designated funds, other than that described above

Any other proposed transfer between funds would be considered on the particular circumstances
