### Structure Governance and Management

SOLL (VALE) (The Company) was established as a trading subsidiary of SOLL LEISURE GROUP and commenced trading on 1 September 2004.

The governing document of The Company is the Memorandum and Articles of Association. SOLL (VALE) in this year was part of the SOLL LEISURE GROUP of companies providing leisure management services principally to local authority clients. SOLL LEISURE GROUP closed on the 31<sup>st</sup> March 2014 and SOLL (VALE) is now an entity with no controlling Parent. In the notice for an annual general meeting, the Board sets out its requirements for the skills, qualities and experience that it needs from its members. The Managing Director in exercising power to nominate, appoint, reappoint, elect, re-elect, approve and dismiss Trustees, both the members and Trustees shall seek to ensure that the Board of Trustees is representative of the local community and users of the services and facilities offered by the Trust and also comprises persons with a broad range of skills and who are likely to contribute to the Company's success. Potential Trustees are inducted by means of an induction programme that includes background to the Company, the purpose of the post, duties, liabilities, and roles and responsibilities. Training is also provided by the Managing Director. The key roles that the Board performs and provides are leadership, advocacy, influence, strategic direction and governance. The day to day operational management and decision making within the business is provided by the Managing Director and the Senior Management Team who propose strategic direction to the Board

The Company recognises that there are risks within the business including competition, limited catchment, and changes in fashion and lifestyle. The SOLL (VALE) Board and the Finance Sub-Group review these on an ongoing basis. A risk management matrix has been produced that identifies the potential risks impacting on the business and this is reviewed annually. Systems and procedures are in place to manage both the strategic and operational risks. The company keeps abreast of research in the leisure industry and is constantly reviewing and changing its programme to cater for new activities and examples of these can be found at all centres. In previous years it has been reported that the industry recognised area for significant growth in the next 5-10 years is low cost health and fitness and wellness and the Trustees and the Leadership team continue to believe that this is the case. The Trustees are however mindful of the need to develop strategies to create reserves that will cushion the charity against any economic downturn, change in legislation or threat to grant funding arrangements from public sector partners. In this year the Company created a reserves policy and funds are managed to ensure that the Company remains in an acceptable range in relation to operational costs.

### **Objectives and Activities**

In 2013 the Board, by Special Resolution, resolved to amend the objects of the Company to broaden both the geographical ambit of the Company and the activities which the charity might engage in, as follows:

- 5.1.1 to provide or assist in the provision of facilities and services for recreational, sporting or other leisure time occupation in the interests of social welfare, such facilities being provided to the public at large save that special facilities may be provided for persons who by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disability, poverty or social or economic circumstances may have need of special facilities and services; and/or
- 5.1.2 to promote community participation in healthy recreation; and/or
- 5.1.3 to provide or assist in the provision of facilities for art, culture and heritage; and/or
- 5.1.4 to provide or assist in the provision and management of parks and open spaces; and/or
- 5.1.5 such other charitable purposes beneficial to the community consistent with the objects above as the Trustees shall in their absolute discretion determine (the 'objects')".

In this financial year the Company having laid the foundations in the previous year expanded its operations to include wellness facilities in Kent and Hampshire.

# TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2014 (CONTINUED)

SOLL (VALE) is a management company that uses its experience, skills and expertise to manage sports/leisure facilities. It maintains strong partnerships with local authorities and schools. Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) owns two of the nine facilities managed by the company. OCC has Joint-Use Agreements for community use with the Vale of White Horse District Council (VOWHDC). The Joint-Use Agreements ensure school use of the facilities during specified times with remaining time available for the community. The Company manages the centres under an agreement with VOWHDC that reflects the respective Joint-Use Agreements and receives funding for this in the form of a contribution to revenue costs from OCC and a fee for services from VOWHDC.

In June of 2010 Soll (Vale) took on the management of the Park Club in Milton for a period of three months. After a successful three months operating the facility and after a due diligence process the company agreed terms for a 23 year lease on the premises. The facility comprises a 20 meter swimming pool, sports hall, two dance studios and a 100 station gym. Having successfully integrated this facility into the company, three further similar operations were mobilised within the reporting year:

- The Park Club Chatham, Kent
- The Park Club Fleet, Hampshire
- The Park Club Ashford, Kent

The Company aims to provide quality assured services and in the year utilised its brands and relationships with key industry partners as well as nationally recognised quality frameworks including Sport England Quest and Investors in People as well as adapting internal quality systems to achieve ISO 14001 accreditations.

### Achievements and performance

The Company's mission is to use its facilities and influence to get:

#### "More people, more active, more often"

In acquiring three new facilities within this year, all of which are positioned within the "budget" price point which we see as occupying the affordable premium space, the Company has taken further strides in this direction.

The organisation believes in the value of developing its people and so it recognises that to meet the challenges of its future growth it needs to develop a strategy that incorporates the commitment and development of people at all levels of the business. SOLL (VALE) continues to develop and this has resulted in a policy to put forward the leisure centres operated by the company for the Sport England Quest Standard. Quest is the UK quality scheme and is the recognised industry quality standard for the management of sport and leisure facilities throughout the UK. Quest is based on, and meets all the criteria, of the European Foundation for Quality Excellence Model that facilitates continuous improvement and quality standards for customers. Quest accreditation provides quality assurance for clients and customers. In the last year SOLL (VALE) has provided more activities for more people than ever before and surveys of customer's show that there is a very high level of satisfaction with service provision.

The Trustees have complied with the duty within the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission.

The Board of the company is delighted with the strong financial performance of the company which is far better than the market sector performance. Because of this improvement the charity has been able to deliver many new initiatives which enhance the benefits available to the public.

SOLL (VALE)'s mission is to get *More People, More Active, More Often* by working with local communities to ensure that everyone has access to sports and fitness services regardless of age, income or background. As a registered charity we work with partners to identify target groups low in participation and implement programmes to increase their activity levels.

In 2013/14 our objective was to grow participation by 5% through establishing partnerships with new and existing target groups and developing fitness/health projects that remove barriers and promote physical activity in the local community.

Performance demonstrates growth in participation for 2013/14 of 8.8%, 3.8% above target. Total usage for this financial year increased from 1,088,256 to 1,185,865. Highest percentage increases in participation were seen at Ashford (21.5%), Fleet (20%), and Milton (17.4%). Increases in participation are attributable to the continued growth in gym membership, and drive to optimise usage through assisting target groups.

SOLL (VALE) seeks to engage with those within the community who, because of their circumstances, would not otherwise be able to participate in sport and recreation. The targeted activities that were provided over the course of the year included the Active Health Exercise Referral scheme (usage, 2,249, members 117). We are now able to offer this service at Park Club Milton and Park Club Chatham. Further schemes are being delivered through the Active Concessionary scheme, targeting those on means tested benefits (usage, 1,656, members 69).

SOLL (VALE) is supporting the national agenda to reduce the incidence of childhood obesity. Having considered how to effectively support an increase in participation from this target group the company continued to provide a free swimming initiative for children under the age of eight (usage, 5,565) and also for children under the age of sixteen throughout the summer at the Abbey meadow Outdoor Swimming Pool (usage 5,699). As a consequence participation in this target group increased by 26%.

To further develop and provide focus for the charity's public benefit agenda the Board approved the appointment of a Community Development Manager who will seek to collaborate with other like minded organisations to target exclusively those groups outside the public at large who may have special needs for our services. In this first year of appointment the following initiatives were launched;

- Active Star Scheme, supporting talented sportspeople.
- Launch of Active Concessionary scheme at Willowbrook, Milton and Chatham.
- Sports & fitness sessions for adults with learning disabilities, partnership with Style Acre.
- Local Heroes membership.
- Hosting a Visual Impairment sports taster day.
- Go Active projects, 6 free swims and classes for sedentary adults.
- Over 50's swim, Pickleball sports taster sessions and 'Two Left Feet' dance course.

### ISO 14001

In this year SOLL (VALE) further developed its commitment to reduce the impact that our activities have on the environment.

- The table below shows the year on year results of electricity and gas usage across all SOLL sites (excluding Abbey Meadows)
- In summary the company used nearly half a million less kilowatt hours (kWh) of energy and emitted 126,000 less kilograms of carbon dioxide (kgCO2) into the environment this financial year against last financial year. Another great performance

We are very proud of these reductions which have come about through the endeavours and focus of our operational teams.

#### Financial Review

The Board are delighted with the continued improvement of the Company financial performance and this year reflects a continued increase in assets which are at their highest in the Companies ten year history. The improvement in the financial performance is as a consequence of improvements in the existing estate and additional surpluses created within the new businesses. SOLL (VALE) receives the majority of its income in advance or at the time of providing the service and as a consequence the company benefits from a good cash flow. In this year turnover increased by 33.7% and the surplus as a percentage of turnover decreased from 9.47% to 3.03%. Over the course of the year the Board approved a capital improvement program and this included improvements at;

- Ashford, Relocation of dance studio and improvements to reception and public areas
- Willowbrook, modernisation of health and fitness facilities

Within the financial year costs were incurred at a lesser level than anticipated on facility maintenance and this is as a consequence of the investment in the previous years. Employee costs reduced year on year as a consequence of a human resource needs assessment.

In summary the charity was able to deliver excellent services, fulfil and expand on its charitable objects, reduce the grant requirement from public sector partners and create a surplus which will contribute towards the reserves of the charity.

### **Future Plans**

SOLL (VALE) has been operating as a company for 10 years. Prospects for 2014/15 look very good particularly because of the new acquisitions which are performing ahead of expectations and the continued growth in existing sites – Milton Park and Willowbrook. A review of the membership structure and revisions and improvements to the offer, the move towards low priced membership agreements and improving membership sales and retention will all contribute to an improved performance in income, surplus and participation in 2014/15. SOLL (VALE) continues to build on the five key brands of SOLLutions, Camp SOLL, Soll Swim School and the Kool 'n' Krazy children's birthday parties as well as the Park Club brand. The Company will continue to work with partners to identify priority areas for developing existing centres to increase income and improve the customer experience.

The Company has already secured a ten year partnership with Didcot Town Council for the operation of the Willowbrook Leisure Centre, commencing on the 1<sup>st</sup> April 2013, and will benefit from a full years turnover at the new sites within the next and future financial years. The Willowbrook facility was awarded to SOLL (VALE) through an open market procurement process and the Company believes that this success should provide confidence that the improvements in the Company's business model made over the last four years puts the charity in a very strong position to gain new business and further develop the charity.

### Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the accounts in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare accounts for each financial year. Under that law the Trustees have elected to prepare the accounts in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). Under company law the Trustees must not approve the accounts unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that period. In preparing these accounts, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- · make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charity's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

So far as the trustees are aware, there is no relevant information (information needed by the company's auditors in connection with preparing their report) of which the company's auditors are unaware and each trustee has taken all steps that he ought to have taken as a trustee in order to make himself aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the company's auditors are aware of that information.

# NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2014

#### 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), Accounting and Reporting by Charities published in April 2005 and the Companies Act.

### a) Tangible fixed assets

These are included at cost less accumulated depreciation. Fixed assets with a cost of less than £1,000 are not capitalised. Depreciation of fixed assets is calculated to write off their cost less any residual value over their estimated useful lives as follows:

Leasehold buildings

- 10 - 20 years (or length of lease if shorter)

Equipment

- 3 to 5 years

### b) Leases

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to income as incurred. Lease incentives (including rent free periods) are spread over the period up until the next rent review date.

Assets obtained under finance leases are capitalised as tangible assets and depreciated over the lease term. Obligations under such agreements are included in creditors net of the finance charge allocated to future years. The finance element of the rental payment is charged to the statement of financial activities on a straight line basis.

### c) Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

### d) Pensions

Contributions are charged to the statement of financial activities as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme.

### e) Incoming resources

Income from leisure centres is normally accounted for when received. However courses income is deferred until the course commences and annual membership is taken to income over the membership year. Funding from local authorities is accounted for in the period to which it relates.

### f) Resources expended

Resources expended are included on an accruals basis and apart from governance costs all relate to the charity's sole charitable activity of operating leisure centres. Any irrecoverable VAT is included within expenses.

### g) Intangible assets

Specific pre-start up costs (including payment for goodwill) are capitalised as an intangible asset and amortised over a period of 2 years.
