## Notes to the Abbreviated Accounts for the period ended 30 June 2012

### 1 Accounting Policies

### Basis of measurement and preparation of accounts

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of certain fixed assets, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008).

We believe that the company's financial statements should be prepared on a going concern basis on the grounds that current and future sources of funding or support will be more than adequate for the company's needs. This support is required as the company has net liabilities of £1,846. We believe that no further disclosures relating to the company's ability to continue as a going concern need to be made in the financial statements. In assessing going concern, we have paid particular attention to a period of not less than one year from the date of approval of the financial statements.

## **Turnover policy**

The turnover shown in the profit and loss account represents amounts invoiced during the year.

### Tangible assets depreciation policy

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Fixtures & Fittings - 33% Straight line

### Other accounting policies

Deferred taxation

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date where transactions or events have occurred at that date that will result in an obligation to pay more, or a right to pay less or to receive more tax, with the following exceptions:

Provision is made for tax on gains arising from the revaluation (and similar fair value adjustments) of fixed assets, and gains on disposal of fixed assets that have been rolled over into replacement assets, only to the extent that, at the balance sheet date, there is a binding agreement to dispose of the assets concerned. However, no provision is made where, on the basis of all available evidence at the balance sheet date, it is more likely than not that the taxable gain will be rolled over into replacement assets and charged to tax only where the replacement assets are sold.

Deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that the directors consider that it is more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of the underlying timing differences can be deducted.

Deferred tax is measured on an undiscounted basis at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the periods in which timing differences reverse, based on tax rates and laws enacted or substantively enacted at the balance sheet date.

#### Investment properties

Investment properties are accounted for in accordance with statement of standard accounting practice ("SSAP") 19, "accounting for investment properties" at open market value. Changes in market value are reflected in the revaluation reserve except where an impairment is deemed to be permanent, when the loss is charged directly against the current years profit.

No depreciation is provided in respect of investment properties. This treatment is a departure from the requirements of the companies act 2006 which requires all properties to be depreciated. However, the director considers that these properties are not held for consumption but for

investment and that to depreciate them would not give a true and fair view. The amount of depreciation which might otherwise have been charged cannot be separately identified or quantified as it is not practical to assess the estimated useful lives for investment properties.
