STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Rother Voluntary Action is a company limited by guarantee and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles which were an integral part of the incorporation on 17th January 2005. On 10th January 2007, the company became a Charity registered with the Charity Commission.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The management of Rother Voluntary Action is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected under the terms of the Memorandum and Articles. The Trustees may appoint a person who is willing to act as a Trustee, either to fill a vacancy or to act as an additional Trustee provided that the appointment does not cause the number of Trustees to exceed the maximum number. Only persons who are members of the company shall be eligible to become Trustees. None of the charity's Trustees receive any remuneration.

Recruitment and induction of trustees

Rother Voluntary Action follows the same process of recruitment and induction whether a potential Board member is nominated or co-opted. All potential Board members are asked to complete an application pack and are interviewed by a subgroup of the Board. Board members will then decide whether to co-opt or to recommend nomination to members at the AGM. The Chief Executive Officer is responsible for coordinating the Induction process and giving opportunities to get to know the organisation.

Risk management

The key risks to the organisation are

- The withdrawal of contracts from public service organisations and the impact this has in managing the long term strategy of the organisation
- Increasing concerns about the availability of funding from charitable and non-charitable sources that can be accessed for Rother
- Likely further cuts to public sector finances
- The loss of any key experienced staff member

Rother Voluntary Action, like many voluntary organisations is facing a serious challenge to maintain its financial operating reserve. As a result the Senior Management Team has recommended a series of cost cutting actions to be implemented to maintain the financial health of the organisation and is investigating other strategic options in order to preserve a service for communities in Rother

At this point the Rother Voluntary Action Board is satisfied that actions already taken or are planned are sufficient to enable the organisation to navigate through the immediate financial turbulence affecting particularly the public sector and its partners

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Rother Voluntary Action's vision is to strengthen the social and economic wellbeing of local communities and help people fulfil their potential in a socially and environmentally sustainable fashion. In order to deliver this mission it is critical that we focus our energy and resources towards the needs and requirements of our beneficiaries. Each year we appraise our current work to assess how much it contributes to the core objectives of Rother Voluntary Action and any new strand of work is similarly appraised Our objectives are to

- support the development of a vibrant community and voluntary sector in Rother enabling increased and improved services and facilities provided by the voluntary and community sector in Rother.
- 2 facilitate communication and representation between the voluntary and statutory sectors on policy planning and delivery to increase voluntary and community sector involvement in these processes
- 3 identify local needs and gaps in service provision and work with local communities, service users and other agencies to develop appropriate action to help build the social capital in Rother

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

This is the fifth year of operation of Rother Voluntary Action (RVA) and we were pleased to have completed our Quality Assurance Award with NAVCA, who said we were one of the best small CVS's in the country!

During the year RVA worked with 424 different voluntary and community groups offering them a variety of help and support this is an increase of nearly 30% on the previous year 231 enquiries were for funding and financial advice, a massive rise on previous years and perhaps reflecting the less benign financial climate 109 enquiries sought help with governance issues. Rother Voluntary Action welcomed 63 new groups into membership of whom 34 were new start ups whilst 2 members closed down

RVA prioritises its work to give additional support to groups who are at risk of closing due to funding/governance issues, organisations in transition or facing significant change or growth, small groups with few resources delivering services valued by the local community, organisations struggling to recruit volunteers (RVA has noted a marked increase here with 58 groups reporting issues/up from 27 the previous year and works closely with the Volunteer Centre East Sussex in addressing this need), groups and agencies working with individuals and communities whose full participation in society is limited by economic and social disadvantage, groups working with young people where there is a perceived lack of service, groups working with minorities to address barriers, negative attitudes and exclusion by society

RVA gave in depth support to over 40 groups. In depth support is offered to groups when they are facing major issues and changes. This includes supporting groups making large funding applications. (6), development of new community groups (5), start up social enterprises (5), supporting organisations as they review their governance and financial and business planning (11). We also support organisations at times of conflict and have offered help regarding employment issues (3) and mediation (4). We have supported local organisations in undertaking consultations (4), in developing new services (5) and in putting on events (3). RVA also helped draft joint partnership agreements when groups were working together to bid for funds (3). Additionally Rother Voluntary Action provides groups with relevant local data to support the development of funding applications or in making representation for new services.

Rother Voluntary Action was proactive in working with Rye Partnership, Amicus Horizon and Tilling Green Residents Association to enable the opening up of the old Tilling Green School as a Community Centre, serving a large social housing estate in Rye, which has been a long held ambition of the local community. It is hoped that the lessons learned in Tilling Green will prove valuable in seeking to develop community space in other deprived areas. Tilling Green provided a new venue where we have been able to provide training opportunities which have included a Funding Fair, with over 60 participants in September, Cookery Leader training and food hygiene (for 12). In total RVA ran 3 funding workshops for over 90 participants including one which looked at the specific needs of Community Transport operators. We also ran a workshop on Localism and one on the Green Deal for Parish Councils.

The RVA Community Hub in Bexhill provides office and/or meeting space for a number of local organisations Rother CAB, VCES, English in the Community, Bexhill Fybromyalgia support group, Bexhill Youth Council, Hastings & Rother Mediation Service, St Jude's Women's Rescue, Bexhill Town Forum, Bexhill Neighbourhood Gardeners, East Sussex Alzheimer's Society, Bexhill Community Bus and Hastings Trust

A number of new opportunities were pursued during the year RVA received a grant for 2 1/2 years funding from the Tudor Trust to develop a new rural project, Community Friends This project was developed from needs identified in Local Action Plans where local communities recognised the issues of isolation which faced some of their older and more vulnerable residents. Community Friends offers neighbourly help to such people helping then to stay active within their own community and remain in their home for as long as possible -such practical support as changing a lightbulb, getting a lift somewhere or having some shopping brought in or the dog being taken for a walk. RVA has employed Val Smith to undertake this role.

RVA has also responded to the need for improved access to physical activities which were highlighted by a number of villages in their Local Action Plans through the Active Rother project. The completed report for this project was published by RVA in July 2012 and can be found on our website

RVA have continually identified the problems of accessing services that are becoming more and more centralised for the isolated and elderly in the District. It was a common theme across Local Action. Plans, both in the rural area and Bexhill and has led to RVA being commissioned by East Sussex County. Council to work with Community Transport Operators (CTO's) both in Rother and across the county, to further develop the Community transport offer in East Sussex. Originally a year's project this has now been extended for another year as CTO's work towards gaining quality accreditation from the Community Transport Association.

RVA works in partnership with the two other CVS organisations in East Sussex. HVA and 3VA. Together we undertook the most in depth consultation with the voluntary sector in East Sussex ever attempted contacting over 1300 organisations. The report on this work was published in July 2011 and was entitled Valuing the Voluntary Sector - the Economic Impact of the Voluntary and Community Sector in East Sussex. This report showed that more than 10,000 people are employed in the VCS in East. Sussex, more than 60,000 volunteers in the county, through the time they give, make a contribution of more than £80,000,000 annually and the annual income of the sector in East Sussex is in excess of £476 million. This report was one of the first of its kind in the UK and has been used as a national exemplar.

The CVS Partnership also worked closely with East Sussex County Council in the development of the Third Sector Commissioning Prospectus Again this was work at the forefront of change nationally and NAVCA (the parent body for CVS's) undertook an in depth case study of our work through their Local Commissioning and Procurement Unit which has been published as an example of good practice under the title "East Sussex -a case study of putting social value and commissioning into practice"

The CVS Partnership also successfully applied for funding through the Big Lottery Transforming Local Infrastructure strand and started working on the TIES project (Transforming Infrastructure in East Sussex) in April 2012

An opportunity to apply for Social Action Fund monies saw RVA working together with Rye Partnership, Hastings Trust and Hastings Furniture Service and the deployment of Neighbourhood Enablers, supporting individuals to get community action started, across Hastings and Rother from January 2012

There have also been opportunities specifically working in Bexhill RVA has over a number of years highlighted the increased levels of deprivation in the town and this is now recognised nationally. The Community First Neighbourhood Match Fund (NMF) is targeted at some of the most deprived areas in England, including Sidley and Bexhill Central, the NMF encourages social action to improve the quality of local life. Local priorities are agreed by Community First panels which are made up of representatives of the local community. Community groups can then approach these panels with suggestions for projects to fund that meet these priorities. Local projects have to match funds with investment of time and local resources. The Community First Panels have to adopt a panel partner and RVA has taken this role for both Panels.

Sidley has also been selected as one of 50 areas in the UK for Wave 2 of Big Local which will bring a total of £1million to the area over a ten year period. RVA has just become the trusted local organisation to support this initiative and the area is now embarking on in depth consultation with residents as a Community Profile and Action Plan is developed.

RVA continues to facilitate regular community network meetings with membership across the networks of 606 groups. In addition RVA is leading the newly formed Carbon Reduction Action Group in Rother, which has 26 members. RVA has supported the work of the Hastings and Rother Health and Social Care. Forum through membership of the management group 299 organisations have actively participated in network events over the year.

RVA works with CVS Partnership and Speak Up to encourage local groups to participate in issues of interest at a county level e.g. Big Event

Monitoring shows the networks are well regarded and supported (100% positive feedback to date) Groups consistently identify the opportunity to make contact and share information with other groups as the most important role of the Networks

"I always like this meeting because it is a local network and I always find speakers, round robin really useful because I am not based there although we have groups in and around the area so I get a lot out of the meetings " Volunteer Services Coordinator ESDA

"Within our service, as I am sure is the case with many other small charities, we only have a small staff, and we all only work part time, we find ourselves very overstretched with work, with limited manpower, such that we are unable to attend many of the very valuable local meetings We do, however value reading the minutes when they are sent around" Manager Hastings & Rother Mediation Service

Groups new to the area find the Networks an efficient and effective way of getting their message into the local community

"I would like to say, however, that I really value the opportunities offered by this forum to publicise our work within the Rother area " Coordinator Homestart

Work is presently being undertaken, through the TIES project to further strengthen the role of the networks and to further develop the Health and Social Care Group

RVA works closely with its public sector partners and has developed a supportive relationship with local councillors. RVA supports all aspects of the LSP work especially around the Transport & the Environment, Active Communities and Economic Development/Jobs & Skills. Through Speak Up RVA is actively engaged as lead CVS for Environment, and Social Enterprise both of which include strong public and private sector involvement. RVA sits on a number of cross sectoral partnerships including WARR, Rye. Partnership, Amicus Horizon Area Panel. RVA remains active in the L-Earn project which is developing a new approach to providing work opportunities for young people. The development of the low carbon action group has seen strong cross sectoral support and includes local private providers. The work supporting. Community Transport Operators has further developed relationships with private sector providers of public transport.

RVA works to ensure local VCO's are able to participate in local planning and policy making by facilitating events, making resources and spaces available, lowering barriers to enable people to participate by holding events in accessible locations by ensuring invitations to the VCS, arranging transport, consulting on times, arranging childcare e.g. the non emergency patient transport review was discussed at local network meetings in the rural area, where groups felt their members were particularly likely to be impacted by the changes created e.g. working with LSP Active Rother group to ensure local VCS groups are able to participate in the Action Group Planning Workshop, ESCC Ageing Well workshops, Day Centre review in Bexhill. Thus ensuring there is improved understanding of issues that are being discussed within the wider voluntary and community sector in Rother, stronger engagement of VCS in local policy and planning making, the ability to include information gathered informally from groups in formulating a local VCS response

And the provision of a systematic process for consultation by agencies and for communities to express their views on a range of local issues with a particular emphasis by RVA on ensuring engagement in deprived and isolated rural areas which have been perceived by the agencies as hard to reach

Through our work RVA has identified a number of issues which impact our strategic planning. Present strategic issues include

The relationship between the sector and public sector

- The lack of job opportunities locally and low skills levels within the population
- Environmental issues around low carbon and the impact of Fuel Poverty

The Capacity of voluntary groups to respond to client needs:

- Reduction of available services funded through statutory agencies has seen a rise in clients seeking support from voluntary agencies across the sector
- Growing need for Day care services (Aging Well) and activities for older people now expanding to active over 50's
- Lack of young people's services
- Difficulty in attracting volunteers
- Rising costs for groups to deliver services
- Clients unable to afford even heavily subsidised services putting pressure on groups to cut costs

Changing needs

- VCO's report substantial increase in the numbers of people in need of suitable accommodation and concerns over the impact of changes to housing benefit and universal credit
- Nationally it is reported that young people have faced disproportionate levels of cuts with local authorities cutting 70-80% of budgets. The lack of services/activities for young people is being reported on locally
- Increasing stress in rural areas. Number of reports highlighting the impact of cost of living increases and reduction of services in rural areas particularly on those with low incomes.

Public Benefit

The Trustee's have considered their duty set out in Section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Commission, and in their opinion the foregoing report on the achievements and performance demonstrates that they have complied therewith

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Performance

The financial year 2011/12 saw RVA's financial position stabilise despite the background of public sector cuts and the national picture of funding cuts to the voluntary sector. A new 3 year funding agreement with Rother District Council and the prospect of a similar agreement with East Sussex County Council for 2012/13, coupled with RVA's cost reduction programme instigated in 2010 has resulted in RVA being able to broadly maintain both its current level of operation and protect its reserves.

The year saw an operating surplus of £19,174, (against a deficit of £8,880 for 2010/11) Income from charitable activities was £134,119 (£126,862 for 2010/11) This included income to implement community projects such as Community Transport Support across East Sussex (£45,000), Developing Volunteers (£29,000), Rural Community Development £35,000) and Active Amblings (£17,500)

The expenditure from charitable activities totalled £235,991 (£222,623 2010/11) for which £184,844 was spent on staff costs representing (78%) of RVA's charitable expenditure

Reserves Policy

It is the policy of the Trustee's to maintain sufficient reserves on ensure the day to day running of the Charity

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2012

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings, that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life

Computer equipment

- 33% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements
