Artichoke Trust Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 March 2009

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2009.

## **Objectives and Activities**

Artichoke is a creative producing company which aims to put on extraordinary live events in public spaces. Its mission is to conceive and produce events which set new benchmarks for the way in which the imagination of the artist can transform lives, introduce new thinking and give pleasure to the widest possible audience.

Artichoke is unique; it does not duplicate the activity of other organisations and inhabits a territory outside the mainstream, working beyond the theatre, concert hall and gallery. It aims to put on shows which, whilst every bit as ambitious and technically complex as those of the major institutions, are popular, if not populist, in nature.

#### **Public Benefit**

We have referred to the guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on Public Benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular, the Trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives set.

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission in determining the activities undertaken by the charity.

## Achievements and Performance in the year

Artichoke Trust has fulfilled its remit to put on extraordinary shows that can change the way people look at the world. In this financial year, we worked with some of the best creative minds to produce two events, in London and New York, and in Liverpool, attracting audiences of over 450,000 and world-wide critical acclaim.

### The Telectroscope, 22 May - 5 June 2008

The Telectroscope was a public art project by British artist Paul St George, designed to provide a window between two great world cities, from Brooklyn Bridge in New York to Tower Bridge in London. "Imagine the impossible... a secret transatlantic tunnel running between New York and London, that has lain undisturbed for a hundred years. And imagine an extraordinary optical device allowing people on one side of the world to see right through it to the other side! "

Working with the artist, we developed a fictional back story about how the tunnel came to be discovered and the telectroscopes invented. This story formed part of the experience for audiences and journalists who joined in the fun to tell the story. During the month long installation over.60,000 people looked down the *Teletroscope* to glimpse life on the other side of the Atlantic. The event attracted press coverage all round the world.

The Telectroscope was delivered in partnership with Tiscali with additional support from the Garfield Weston Foundation.

### La Machine, 5 - 7 September 2008

In September 2008, thousands of delighted onlookers lined the streets of Liverpool to greet "La Princesse". Vast in scale and spectacular in execution, this new commission from French theatrical engineers *La Machine* was undoubtedly a highlight of the City's European Capital of Culture celebrations, uniting hundreds of thousands of people as they watched a fifty-foot high spider on her journey through the city.

From the moment when astonished commuters discovered the giant arachnid clinging to a building next to the railway station, to the spectacular finale five days later, the creature stopped the city in its tracks. 'This is Liverpool's 'blimey' moment, for sure. I don't think I've ever seen so many smiling faces on so many wet people' wrote Phil Hogan in The Observer.

The project was commissioned by Liverpool 08 with additional support from Arts Council England and the Paul Hamlyn Foundation.

### Organisational Development

Fast moving growth has led to the rapid expansion of the productivity of the company with two major events per year, plus other smaller events, now being delivered. What was a very personal and fluid partnership has by necessity had to become a larger and more complex organisation with new processes and procedures in order to deliver the quantity, quality and integrity of events at a level that matches both internal and external expectations.

Having identified the need for increased administrative and company management support, in 2008/09 Artichoke developed a job description, person specification, core competencies and advertising and recruitment plan for a new post of General Manager. An appointment was made early in the next financial year and the post will be key to the organisational, management and board development that will continue throughout 2009 to support to the company's creative work.

### **Fundraising**

Artichoke has achieved a measure of financial stability with Arts Council England's investment in the company as a Regularly Funded Organisation. In addition, in 2008/09 the company secured a sponsorship deal with Sky Arts for the following two financial years. The sponsorship is for £400,000 per annum, plus substantial in-kind support.

In 2008/09 we appointed our first Development Director and in March we expanded the team with a full-time Development Co-ordinator in response to the need to raise a large amount of income from contributed sources. We recognise that, with little ticketed income potential available to the company (Artichoke's events are usually free) we have to develop other sources to close the gap between our public funding from Arts Council England and the cost of two large scale events per year. The development team, in collaboration with the Board of Directors, is increasing a variety of income streams from a diverse range of sources; we are building our individual giving programme as well as income from trusts and foundations, European government and local authorities and the size and range of sponsorship relationships.

#### Plans for the Future

In 2009/10 Artichoke will undertake development work on a further two events for 2010/11.

#### Antony Gormley's One & Other

One & Other is a nationwide project with a London showcase which encapsulates inclusion, participation, high quality production, innovation, use of digital technology and high public impact. Working for one of Britain's best known sculptors, Artichoke is producing all aspects of the event to realise his creative vision, from the initial recruitment of participants to the production and operation of the project.

Running consecutively for 100 days and nights, the project offers a platform to the British public to express themselves in whatever way they feel appropriate in a space normally reserved for the memorialising of Kings and Generals. The first of the 2400 participants, chosen by lottery to represent proportionately each UK region and country, will take up their place at 09:00 on 6<sup>th</sup> July 2009 and the last will come down at 08:59 on October 14<sup>th</sup> 2009.

One & Other will be broadcast live on the web 24 hours a day and Artichoke's sponsor Sky Arts has also commissioned a documentary film of the project from the legendary film maker Mike Figgis. The project will be documented, including a digital archive, by the Wellcome Trust.

### Lumiere

Lumiere is a four-day festival of lightworks taking place in Durham in November 2009. The festival will consist of a series of installations and performances displayed and executed throughout an intriguing array of public, semi-private and private spaces in the city. Durham will be transformed into a magical nocturnal landscape to be explored by residents and tourists alike. Visitors will follow a trail on foot or by bike, finding previously unnoticed buildings and architectural features beautifully lit from the outside or illuminated from within. Quiet corners and dark vennels will temporarily become artworks in their own right, and live performances created by artists in the medium of light will take place each evening.

It is likely that the programme will include at least one large-scale commission and several smaller scale works as well as community and education work. The featured work will focus on light in all its forms. This could mean an examination of the properties of light as well as its many manifestations. Works will include light installations, illuminations of existing buildings and windows, performances, projections and a programme of talks, discussions and demonstrations.

## Drowned London by artist Aleksandra Mir. (Development Work)

Artichoke is undertaking research and development on producing a major piece of work by international artist Aleksandra Mir. *Drowned London* is an installation designed to take place in the river Thames. Huge replicas of iconic London buildings will be created from recycled and scrap materials. Standing up to 60' high, they will be installed in the riverbed opposite the building that inspired them. At low tide, audiences can explore the beaches and the beautifully constructed edifices. At high tide, however, the buildings will be partially submerged – revealing a new London skyline flooded by rising waters.

### Dining with Alice by Hilary Westlake (Development Work)

First commissioned by Helen Marriage as part of the 1999 Salisbury Festival, *Dining with Alice* is an extraordinary feat of bravura outdoor performance. In 1999 *Alice* was seen for only three performances by a total of 600 people. We now aim to remake the show for a much broader audience and with substantial participatory opportunities in the summer of 2010.

The show imagines that the characters from Alice's adventures, no longer needed in her dreams, have gone into service as dinner party entertainers. Unfortunately, Alice's companions have not completely mastered the arts of deference and decorum... During the meal, the characters roam the grounds, chatting with the guests and bickering amongst themselves. Meanwhile, between courses, the guests themselves are escorted from table to table, just as Alice moves from chair to chair at the Mad Hatter's tea party. The show ends with a cabaret and a party piece from the each of the characters. As all descends into mayhem, the eternally sensible Alice appears to restore order to the chaos.

### **Review of Financial Position**

This is Artichoke's third year of operation and each year has produced dramatically different figures, being dependent as it is on the activities being undertaken and how they are to be financed. Performances usually cross over two if not three years, from conception to completion. Therefore in its approach to financial management Artichoke has to take a long term view.

This financial year Artichoke raised income in excess of £2.7m to fund activities taking place this year and next. Grants of £857,000 accounted for over 30% of this income, £500,000 of which was unrestricted income and the remaining, £357,000 restricted to specific projects. Over 65% of the income, £1.8m, was restricted earned commission income, with £24,600 from ticket sales and a further £14,000 earned from merchandising sales. Sponsorship continues to be an important source of revenue; £60,000 in cash terms but also much from in kind support in terms of technical assistance. Sponsorship is targeted to rise in the coming years.

The dramatic rise in expenditure this year is a reflection of the scale of the activities undertaken this year: 95% is spent on charitable activities. The net movement in funds for the year, was a deficit of £81,550 (2008: surplus £279,754). The Trustees have fully utilised the designated fund of £265,000, set up last year to meet the committed costs of projects in this year. Income received for specific projects is treated as restricted: most was spent during the year but £163,621 towards the One & Other project is carried forward to next year. At the end of the year the general fund stood at £44,458 (2008: £24,629). This is considerably lower than the reserves policy would favour but this shortfall is being addressed.

## Structure, Governance and Management

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 19 April 2005 and registered as a charity on 13 January 2006.

The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association.

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law. In addition to the Annual General Meeting, decisions are taken at regular meetings of the trustees.

#### **Trustees**

### **Recruitment of Trustees**

In 2008/09 Artichoke began a process of Board review and expansion. The skills, experience and representation required at Board level were assessed and compared with those currently possessed. A number of gaps were highlighted, including age and ethnic diversity as well as specific skills. The Board agreed a plan to address this and have made steps to fill the gaps with two new appointments. Jon Gisby, Head of New Media at Channel 4, joined the Board in March 2009 bringing with him excellent and relevant professional skills. In addition, following participation in the GAIN programme (a Board Development programme for potential board members from black and minority ethnic groups and people with disabilities) the company began discussions with Hannah Musisi who formally joined the Board early in the next financial year. As business development analyst at CNN, Hannah brings financial and strategic planning expertise.

### Trustee Induction and training

The induction process varies for each Trustee to ensure that every new member of the Board has the support they need to deepen their understanding of the organisation and their role as a Trustee. Elements of the induction include meeting the joint Chief Executives, meeting other Board members, information packs and DVDs about Artichoke's work and attendance at events. The ongoing training needs of the Board as a whole and individual Board members are reviewed and addressed regularly.

#### **Governance Methods**

The Board of Trustees meets five times each year. Day to day management is delegated to senior staff. The joint Chief Executives have been appointed Trustees, in recognition of their strategic contribution to the organisation and its governance. As employees of Artichoke, permission was sought and approval received from the Charity Commission to appoint them to the Trustee Board.

### Wider networking

Artichoke has established a strong reputation for the artistic quality of its productions with audiences, artists, press and media and the wide range of partners and stakeholders with which the company collaborates. This includes Arts Council England, local authorities and the office of the Mayor of London. Of the company's two events this year, the first, The Telectroscope, was delivered in partnership with ISP Tiscali with additional support from the Garfield Weston Foundation and the second, La Machine, was commissioned by Liverpool 08 with additional support from Arts Council England. The projects in research and development in 08/09 include collaborations with Sky Arts, several London Boroughs, Durham County Council and Durham City Vision, the National Theatre of Scotland and world-renowned sculptor Antony Gormley

Supporting the development of the wider artistic sector continues to play an important role for the company. The joint Chief Executives and Associate Producers are committed to ongoing mentoring relationships with a number of emerging creative producers and artists in addition to giving many one off advice sessions. Much of the latter part of 2008/09 was taken up developing a conference on producing large scale events, focusing on *La Machine*. The conference which took place in Liverpool in May this year was attended by 78 delegates.

### **Risk Review**

Trustees have conducted their own review of the major risks, financial, physical and operational to which the Charity is exposed and systems have, where necessary, been modified to mitigate those risks. Procedures have been put in place to minimise both external and internal risks and these procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they still meet the needs of the Charity.

### Reserves policy

During the period the trustees, in accordance with the Charity Commission's guidance (Reference: Charity Commissioners Booklet CC19 'Charity Reserves'), reviewed its reserves and after assessing the potential threats and risks agreed that its policy should be to maintain sufficient income reserves to:

- · ensure the continued avoidance of net current liabilities
- · provide sufficient liquid resources to meet both revenue and capital needs,
- to monitor the position on a regular basis,

It is the Trustees intention to build up the general reserves over the next few years, working towards a level which will cover three months operating costs. The shortfall in unrestricted reserves will be addressed by focusing on increasing unrestricted income from funding sources (new and existing).

### **Accounting convention**

### **Accounting Standards**

### Incoming resources and resources expended

### Grants, donations and sponsorship income

Income relating to future accounting periods is taken to the balance sheet as deferred income for recognition in those future accounting periods.

### Restricted funds

Resources are recorded on a receivable basis and allocated to a Restricted Fund if a limitation on their use is specified by the donors and providers. Funds received in the direct operation of the Charity are treated as unrestricted funds. Other resources received without external restriction are designated by the Trustees for particular purposes as deemed appropriate.

#### Direct charitable expenditure

Overheads are allocated to direct charitable expenditure on the basis of the time spent by staff on activities which directly serve objectives of the Board

# Fundraising and publicity expenditure

All expenses incurred with the intention of raising funds for the charity are allocated to fundraising and publicity expenditure.

### **Cashflow statement**
