Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 March 2020

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The principal objectives of the charity are to promote the welfare of families with at least one child under five years of age. Volunteers offer regular support, friendship and practical help to families under stress in their own homes, helping to prevent family crisis and breakdown. The personal growth and development of our volunteers is also very important to us.

Public benefit

The trustees have complied with the duty in section 4 of the 2006 Act to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Home-Start Cheshire provides a single integrated service with a unified structure across the Cheshire area (excluding Chester and Ellesmere Port), having being formed from three individual Home-Start schemes. The combined organisation has been able to deliver greater benefits more efficiently than the former schemes, which has become especially vital in the current environment of the Covid-19 pandemic.

We have developed our activities to meet the needs of the families we support and have been seeking new funding streams to supplement existing funding streams.

We have achieved a number of funding successes during the year, but the availability of funding remains a major difficulty, which continues and has been exacerbated significantly since the year end in the face of the international Covid-19 pandemic.

This has provided an added focus and opportunity across the charity to think about the longer term to seek to put in place an appropriate plan for the future that seeks to secure its longer term being.

We are pleased to report that we supported 195 families during the course of the year and our volunteers made over 4,000 visits to families spending over 12,000 hours with them

We measure the impact of the support we provide to families across a large number of indicators and almost all showed that our involvement has had a positive impact on the lives of the families, the wellbeing of children and on our families' abilities to cope with the issues they face.

In addition to the provision of direct home visiting support we also help families access other services that are likely to help improve their well-being. For example, over 50% of families assisted by their volunteers accessed another service such a housing, debt or benefit services. In many cases the volunteer looked after the child/children whilst the parent used the service.

During the year we recruited and trained 49 new Family Mentor Volunteers to add to our existing pool and at the end of the year we had 95 amazing volunteers supporting families. The skill, experience and enthusiasm of our Family Mentors are the key factors in ensuring that our support is of a high quality and that we achieve positive outcomes for families.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

The results for the year are shown in the Statement of Financial Activities. Although our income, as in the previous year, was less than we considered necessary for long-term viability, we ended the year with £104,545 in reserves. We consider these reserves to be an adequate basis on which we can continue our operations while we seek new sources of funding, though the need for additional funding has become more urgent following the decision of the local authority to discontinue it's funding to us.

Investment policy and objectives

The charity does not have the need for an investment policy. When possible, monies are held in interest bearing bank accounts.

Reserves policy

The trustees aim to keep a minimum of three months typical expenditure in unrestricted reserves and regularly reviews the funding situation to ensure that the trustees are able to meet their financial responsibilities.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Organisational structure

Home-Start Cheshire was established in 1998.

Home-Start Cheshire is governed by a Board of Trustees. The trustees are volunteers recruited from the local area, with individuals from health, social services, education and business with the skills required to provide sound leadership and governance.

The trustees delegate the day to day running of the charity to the paid staff, which is led by a Chief Executive Officer.

Related parties

Home-Start Cheshire is committed to partnership working and liaises with a variety of statutory and voluntary organisations within it's area of operation.

Risk management

In line with Home-Start UK's guidance, the trustees have identified the major risks to which the charity is exposed. The main risks are considered to be:-

- funding
- staff
- volunteers
- beneficiaries
- health and safety
- reputation

In each case, the board has considered the likelihood of occurrence, potential impact and measures in place to minimise the risk.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings

- 25% on reducing balance

Computer equipment

- 33% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
