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# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2016

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2016. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

The report of the trustees also incorporates a directors' report as required by company law.

# **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

# **Objectives**

The Guild has been successfully managing to sustain and maintain its Charitable Objectives for over 30 years, namely:

"The Objects are to advance education for the public benefit in the visual Arts and Crafts in particular but not exclusively by exhibitions of high quality hand made crafts and the provision of workshop programmes".

# **Mission Statement**

"The Makers Guild in Wales is the National Craft Organisation for Wales; a membership body that engages and inspires through the promotion of excellence in craft."

# **Public benefit**

The trustees of the charity are committed to providing a public benefit, and have taken into account the Charity Commission's guidance in this area.

The Guild provides the public with free access to high quality exhibitions of craft by maker members of the Guild along with a programme of charitable activities including education exhibitions curated for public benefit, primarily in its Grade II listed building, Craft in the Bay, a former Victorian Maritime Warehouse in the heart of Cardiff Bay.

# **Charitable activities**

The Makers Guild in Wales was founded as a craft co-operative by a small group of craft-makers in February 1984, who were determined to create more opportunities for makers to exhibit and sell their work. Over time and as membership grew and the Guild progressed through a number of homes in Cardiff, 'The Old Library' to the 'Old Techniquest Building' to the 'The Cory's Building' on Bute Street, until successfully fund-raising £1.4 million in order to convert the 'D' shed, an old Victorian Transit Warehouse with a Grade II listed cast iron structure into our new purpose built gallery - Craft in the Bay. We opened the doors June 2002 and in 2005 The Guild concluded the purchase of the Freehold and Leasehold title from the former Welsh Development Association. In 2006 the Guild became an Incorporated Charity.

The Guild now exists to promote high quality craft work throughout Wales, by exhibiting and selling the work of its selected membership, and by creating and managing exhibitions and outreach educational programmes. The Guild is a registered charity, with a board of Trustees, some of whom are also makers, and employs a small number of permanent and part-time staff. Our activities are supported by a group of enthusiastic Friends. Both the Guild, and the gallery, now have a national and growing international reputation for excellence.

In addition to our educational programmes at our heart are our Welsh craftmaker membership which now numbers 83 (2015: 79), this gives the Guild a cumulative and united strength, allowing members to feel part of a group sharing a vision whilst members benefit from a multi-layered programme of opportunities.

Our Gallery is open 7 days a week from 10.30 to 17.30 free of charge and received 101,180 visitors in 2015. In the cultural heart of Cardiff, our building was short-listed for a RIBA award and received a "highly commended" at the British Archaeology Award in 2004. In June 2012 the Guild was used as an exemplar study into co-operative consortia by the Wales Co-operative Centre. Craft in the Bay is recognised as one of the Capitals most significant Cultural and Heritage destinations.

After moving from a purely volunteer-led organisation to employing staff, the 3 full-time and 5 part-time staff now supplement the 497 volunteer days given to the Guild in 2015. In June 2013 the Guild was awarded a Go Wales Excellence Award for our work volunteer placement scheme with Cardiff Metropolitan University over the last ten years. The Guild celebrated its 30th in 2014, so we have managed to sustain and grow our independent organisation for over 30 years. The Guild has developed a Friends scheme which now numbers over 80 and provides the Guild with a knowledgeable, supportive and committed group of 'Ambassadors'.

# Programme highlights

We have delivered a full programme of exhibitions and education events throughout the twelve months of this period. We have shown a total of seven major exhibitions in our gallery at Craft in the Bay as well as eighteen smaller showcases within the building in our Oriel 2 space on the first floor, the Guest Maker area and the Members Showcase area.

All of our exhibitions including the smaller showcases of Guest Maker, Members Showcase and Oriel 2 student showcases, have been supported with educational information. All our exhibitions are free of charge, we also regularly have many school and college groups visiting the gallery, both to see the exhibitions and visit the craft gallery and learn about Craft and the individual makers.

Our annual programme of educational exhibitions, feature 6 major exhibitions, plus 18 smaller exhibitions each year, usually all currently hosted and curated in house.

### **Exhibitions**

Our Major exhibition programme features 6 exhibitions each year, highlights this year include:

# 'Summer Show: Focus on Glass' (July to September 2015)

Following an open call for artists, 21 artists from across the UK were selected to exhibit from over 50 applicants. Selection panel were Dr. Vanessa Cutler - glass artist and senior lecturer at Swansea School of Architectural Glass and Andrew Renton - Keeper of Art at the National Museum and Galleries Wales, Cardiff. A stunning selection of contemporary glass providing our audience with the opportunity to see both functional and sculptural glass created using a variety of glass making processes such as casting, blowing, fusing and water-jet cutting. Shellie Doolan who lives and works in Wales, was voted the public's favourite maker and will be exhibiting as Guest Maker at Craft in the Bay with her new body of work.

# 'Heat Exchange II' - a group exhibition of contemporary enamel work by national and international artists (September to November 2015)

Curated by exhibiting artists Elizabeth Turrell and Beate Gegenwart (also a member of the Guild) and on behalf of the Makers Guild in Wales. Twenty three artists from across Europe, USA and Australia showed a new body of work created during the Heat Exchange project. Artists shared their creative process over a period of twenty four months via an artist blog: crimsoncactus.org. and through shared workshop sessions in Erfurt, Germany. The exhibition showed immense diversity in the individual approaches to working with vitreous enamel. Artists had created items of jewellery, sculptural forms and wall pieces. The work was of an exceptional standard and attracted many visitors to the gallery. As a Makers Guild in Wales touring exhibition, Heat Exchange II travelled to: Fife Contemporary Art & Craft in December 2015 where they also held a day long symposium on contemporary enamel. The exhibition was showing at Gallery Waidspeicher in Erfurt, Germany until 8 May 2016. It then toured to the Gallery for Applied Arts in Munich, showing there from 20 May to 2 July 2016.

Beate Gegenwart and Elizabeth Turrell led a 'walk & talk' event in the gallery in which they talked about each artists work - 1 session. Gudrun Wiesmann from Germany was also there on the day to talk about her wall pieces in which she has incorporated her architectural photography into the enamelling process. It was fascinating to have this more in-depth information about the work and also provided an opportunity for the public to handle some of the pieces (with gloves!). Two day Masterclass in working with vitreous enamel led by Elizabeth Turrell -4 sessions. Symposium on Contemporary Enamel held at and organised by Fife Contemporary Art & Craft and included exhibiting artists giving presentations about their practice- 2 sessions.

# 'Christmas Show' (November 2015 to January 2016)

A group exhibition of contemporary craft and applied art by members of the Makers Guild in Wales and invited makers from across the UK. We showed work by 39 makers in total.

Outreach Christmas Exhibition - the Guild also showed in an external exhibition at Oriel Y Parc in St. David's, Pembrokeshire over the Christmas period. This was a good opportunity for our guild members to reach a wider audience and we plan to continue working with the gallery on future projects.

### 'Ooze' (January to March 2016)

A solo exhibition of ceramic art by Brendan Stuart Burns. Brendan had created a body of work in porcelain created over the past two years following receipt of a Creative Wales Award from the Arts Council of Wales. Working in clay was a natural progression from his painting and drawing and enabled him to express the physical qualities of the rocks and geological forms that inspired him. He manipulated flat sheets of clay, often using the irregular surface as a canvas on which to draw and paint.

# 'Animal Tales' (March to May 2016)

This curated exhibition themed around the wonderful characteristics of animals captured in clay, paper, fabrics and metal by eight very talented and individual artist. From the animated expressions of life sized guinea fowl in clay by Susan O'Byrne to the articulated wooden sea creatures by Jeff Soan - each artist has created work that shows incredible skill in manipulating their chosen materials. The artists came from across the UK and had a high level of recognition nationally and internationally for their artworks. Catrin Howell, dividing her time between studios in West Wales and London, has won major awards including Gold Medal at the National Eisteddfod. Her exquisite, finely modelled clay sculptures reflect her fascination with mythology and how animals are used to convey narratives. Each animal sculpture or print within the exhibition has a story to tell.

# 'Beate Gegenwart: Translating Between The Lines' (May to July 2016)

Identity, place, dislocation, belonging, people and the spaces between them have inspired this extraordinary body of artwork in metal and enamel by artist Beate Gegenwart, currently on exhibition at Craft in the Bay. Originally from Germany and having made Wales her home for the past thirty years, Beate has a strong fascination with the movement of people across borders and boundaries. Her work in this exhibition titled Translating Between The Lines captures the fluidity and energy within the gestures of cut and drawn line. Working and re-working the vitreous enamel to create layers and depth, her fluid yet controlled and purposeful approach to her artform has a powerful impact when you stand in front of them. Their detail pulls you in to scrutinise more closely, where you will be struck by the precision of line and mark. Electroplated 3D printed forms in silver are similarly exquisite in their design and detail. Their playful and elegant forms have developed from the wall series, sharing a feeling of movement and change whilst also simply being beautiful sculptures to hold and admire. Beate gave an artist talk 4th June, 11.30am.

# Members Showcase:

Our exhibition programme dedicated to putting the spotlight on a new body of work by our Guild members.

- Cadman Furniture Rachel and Arthur exhibited their new work that incorporated gilding, screen printing and scorching.
- Mari Thomas exhibited her new collection 'Crescent' in silver and diamonds.
- Claire Cawte exhibited her three dimensional nuno felted forms inspired by nature.
- Laura Thomas new collection of silver and parquetry jewellery.
- Christine Gittins porcelain inspired by the African plains.
- Shirley Jones 'The Quest' her latest artist book with five framed images illustrating a story from 'The Mabinogion'.
- Sasha Kingston Inspired by the concept of journeys, place and maps and reflecting her ongoing fascination with the delicate structure of plant life, Sasha has combined papermaking, print and stitch to evoke feelings of growth, movement and change.

Each guest maker/group of makers exhibited for a seven week period in the gallery at Craft in the Bay. The artists were invited to exhibit or were selected following application to the gallery.

### Friends of The Makers Guild in Wales events

Our 'Friends' invite Guild members to talk about their work, career or processes through their 'Meet the Maker' educational programme. There were five free of these events organised throughout the year, all held at Craft in the Bay, and free for members of the public to attend. Over this year talks were given by Guild members Rauni Higson, Lisa Marie Tann, Alys Wall, Eluned Glynn and Ruth Shelley, attendance for these events was over 130. The Friends made two studio visits to Lowri Davies and Anne Morgan, and were also invited on a guided tour of Wales Millennium Centre, at the invitation of their 'Promise' scheme co-ordinator.

# **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

### **Principal funding sources**

Commissions from the sale of Maker Members' work displayed in the main gallery, rental income from the café, income from educational activities and the letting of meeting rooms produce the bulk of the Charity's income.

Some 33% of the Gallery floor area is designated for visiting and in house Exhibitions which, together with Educational facilities offered to people of all ages in two workshop areas on the ground floor, is assisted by Arts Council of Wales Annual Project funding. The revenues and associated costs are those designated as 'Restricted funds' in the financial statements.

# Investment policy and objectives

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Charity has power to invest in any way the Trustees wish. The Trustees regularly review the investment funds to ensure that they are the most appropriate for the Charity.

# **Review of finances**

The Guild's financial situation has worsened during the year with a deficit of £10,415 reported (versus a £1,568 surplus in 2015). Despite a continued focus on controlling costs, a reduction in income from fundraising, combined with the necessary increase in costs associated with this activity has led to the decline in funds carried forward to £29,289 (from £39,704 in 2015). The trustees have, and will continue to regularly review the Guild's three year plan to ensure its future sustainability, this includes a new fundraising strategy and an Energy Efficiency project to help improve the Guilds finances over the next year.

The funded Energy Efficiency Project was instigated by a Welsh Government report by consultants appointed by Resource Efficient Wales. This project will see a substantial reduction in energy costs from a new LED lighting system and improvements to the heating and cooling systems and additionally generate an income from a Feed in Tariff from PV solar. With trading conditions continuing to prove difficult in the current economic climate the trustees will continue to explore all viable options to help improve the Guild's financial position.

The Guild would also like to thank The Gibbs Trust, The Red Dragon Centre and the Arts Council of Wales for their support during during this year.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### Reserves policy

The Trustees ensure that the disposition of restricted funds is in accordance with donor requirements. During the year unrestricted funds have diminished, it is the Trustees aim to create a strategic reserve over the next four years. A new Energy Efficiency project to be implemented in 2016-17 will create a new income stream (Feed in Tariff from PV solar) along with substantially reducing energy costs for the long term. It is envisaged that this will generate and allow reserves to be created, making a substantial difference to the Guilds finances and reserves over the coming years.

### **Factors affecting the Charity**

The Guild is aware that a number of factors may influence the Guild over the next few years, Trustees have therefore instigated a full review of all Guild activities. This review took place through 2015-2016, enabling Trustees to review possible threats, plan future developments and review all structures and policies.

#### **FUTURE PLANS**

The Trustees have updated the Guild internal structure, including committees and communication structures during this year. The Guild is also looking to implement the findings of a Welsh Government funded Energy Efficiency report through a planned and funded programme over the coming year. The Guild has also begun a new programme in co-operation with the National Museum of Wales which will trial a new selling exhibition of Guild members craft work on the NMW's website during 2016/17, with a view to a permanent collaboration if successful.

# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Constitution

The Charity is a company limited by guarantee and was registered with the Charity Commission on 6 April 2006, although The Makers Guild in Wales was first established by a group of makers in 1984. The Governing Documents are held at Craft in the Bay. In October 2006, the Guild agreed to the establishment of the current Charity. There are two categories of membership; Maker-Member and Supporter-Member. In order to become a Maker-Member, craftmakers who live and work in Wales are entitled to apply and submit their work to the Guilds rigorous artistic selection procedure.

# Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Trustees, who are either Maker or Supporter-Members of the Guild, are appointed at the Annual General Meeting. A maximum of 25% are Maker-Members and the remainder are recruited externally as Supporter Members according to the differing skills which are seen to be appropriate.

### **Organisational structure**

During this year the Trustees instigated a review and restructure of its committees. The governing body is the Board of Trustees who are non-executive, unpaid and meet at least six times a year. The Board have now formally established four standing committees who report directly to the Board; a Finance Committee, an Education and Exhibitions Committee; a Membership Committee and a Buildings committee. Each committee is made up of at least two Trustees and a staff member, with further personnel recruited as and when required. The Board have also reviewed and updated staffing and internal communication structures. The Board delegate the general day to day running of the Charity to Mr S Burgess, the General Manager.

# Induction and training of new trustees

There is no formal induction or training process for trustees as the skills and knowledge of trustees varies. However, vacant positions are advertised and a short list are interviewed for each post. Trustees are chosen for the specific skills that they bring to the Board.

# Risk management

The Trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error. Risk assessment and the management of risk is a continuous process with all areas being addressed as required and the Trustees are satisfied that appropriate action has been taken to mitigate any impact of these risks.

# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Guild employs 3 full-time staff (2015 - 3) and 5 part-time staff (2015 - 5). The staffing of the gallery area is supplemented each day by volunteers. The Guild operates a programme of volunteer opportunities in association with VCS Cardiff Volunteer Centre. The Guild operated with the help of 497 days given by volunteers in 2015, which include craftmakers themselves, school pupils, students, volunteers and Friends of the Guild. The Guild is grateful for the support it has received in this area from Careers Wales, Go Wales, Voluntary Community Service (Cardiff), Wales Council for Voluntary Action and especially to the Friends of the Makers Guild for the help that they provide.

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# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2016

#### 1. STATUTORY INFORMATION

The Makers Guild In Wales is a private company, limited by guarantee without share capital, registered in England and Wales. The registered office address can be found in the report of the trustees.

### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

# Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The Makers Guild In Wales meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

The Guild reviews the charity's forecasts, budget projections and working capital requirements at regular trustee and Finance Committee meetings throughout the year. The trustees therefore have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. The charity therefore continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing its financial statements.

# Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charity has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemption in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows.

### Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Donations and voluntary income are accounted for when receivable.

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2016

# 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

### **Expenditure**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

# Allocation and apportionment of costs

Costs are allocated between direct charitable and support expenditure according to the nature of the cost. Where items involve more than one category they are apportioned between the categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

### **Tangible fixed assets**

Tangible fixed assets other than freehold land are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Freehold land
Freehold property
Plant and machinery
Fixtures, fittings and equipment

### Stocks

Stocks consists of cards, magazines, books and videos and are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

# **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from Corporation Tax on its charitable activities.

# **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds may be used in accordance with the charitable objectives, at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds may only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2016

### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### **Debtors**

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

### Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and a short term deposit account that are subject to an insignificant risk to changes in value.

# **Creditors and provisions**

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

### **Financial instruments**

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.
