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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ending 31ST December 2018

The trustees present their annual directors' report and financial statements of the charity for the year ending 31st December 2018 which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and accounts for Companies Act purposes.

The financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

Objectives and activities

The purpose of the charity is to offer a variety of educational benefits to Chinese children, including English and Chinese language skills and I.T.

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Charity's aims and objectives in planning future activities and setting the policies for the year.

The charity furthers its charitable purposes for the public benefit through

- Enhancing community cohesion by assisting Chinese nationals, refugees and immigrants throughout Greater Manchester to integrate and access opportunities, enabling them to participate fully in the society.
- We achieve this by bringing together a diverse range of learning opportunities, such as leisure activities in arts, culture and sport. We also offer information and advice available through our centre seven days per week.

We provide:

Welfare and legal advice service every Sunday and Monday 1pm-6pm;

- Free advice for school info for all Chinese parents;
- Signposting to public services;
- ESOL English, working closely with WEA, every Monday and Tuesday;
- Interpreting courses on Wednesdays,
- Child care courses every Thursday;
- Elderly Chinese Opera Club (aged 55-85) running every Tuesday from 2pm -10pm, comprising 50-60 members;

Structure, governance and management

Manchester Chinese Centre is a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 1st December 2005. It has been registered as a charity organisation with the Charity Commission since 9th May 2006.

Appointment of trustees

As set out in the Articles of Association the appointment of trustees shall be subject to a minimum of three. At each meeting one third of the directors shall retire by rotation and offer themselves for reelection.

Trustee induction and training

On appointment the Trustees are given an induction to their roles and responsibilities and access to relevant literature from the Charity Commission, Companies House etc.

Organisation

The board of trustees administers the charity. The board normally meets 4 times a year. A Manager is appointed by the trustees to manage the day-to-day operations of the charity.

Related parties and co-operation with other organisations

None of our trustees receive remuneration for acting in their trustee role. Other payments are shown in Note 11. Any connection between a trustee and a senior manager with any service providers must be disclosed to the full board of trustees in the same way as any other contractual relationship with a related party. In the current year such related party transactions are reported in Note 11.

Review of our achievements and performance

The main achievements during the year were:

2018 Community work:

- **Community Service** was provided: interpreting to support NHS, Social Care, Children Services.
- Chinese Elderly Cantonese Opera (age 55-85). Support was provided to the group. This club is run every Tuesday from 14:00-21:00 with about 50-60 members from Greater Manchester, Stoke on Trent, Warrington, Leeds and Liverpool. MCC provided one huge studio for them to play live music and practise their Opera skill, one room to store their instruments, one room for tea, coffee and light food; also an extra quiet room for them to talk and relax. Volunteers were recruited to visit the group to chat to them. Sometimes MCC organised workshops like beauty therapist, haircut, healthy eating or provided IT information. Caring for "Isolated Elderly" is vital.
- Manchester City Council run an essential Health and safeguarding free course and First Aid course for the local community. MCC provided the rooms, tea and coffee to support the training courses.
- **School workshop:** MCC provided Chinese Educational Workshops for Manchester local schools and community. A total of 17 schools were involved.
- Legal and Welfare Service: volunteer solicitor Nicole has been providing free welfare and legal advice to people in the community who have language barriers. Advice includes family welfare, illness, personal debt, housing, refugee and domestic abuse.
- 8 Feb 2018 Chinese New Year: MCC worked in partnership with Salford University. A Chinese Professional Artists workshop was held at Salford University to raise awareness of Chinese Culture and Language in the community and networking through family events, helping the Chinese community to integrate with local people. The cost was £1,455. 600 people in the community were invited to attend, 138 volunteers ran the workshop and two huge shows in the theatre. Absolutely amazing!
- Fundraising for the Homeless: MCC provided Chinese costumes for hire, taking photos for people in the community in return for a donation. £248.74 was raised for Coffee4Craig's Homeless program.
- Chinese New Year and Festival: MCC had a team of volunteers working on the Homeless project by providing 500 hot meals across Manchester and Salford. MCC collected and delivered from the food bank to different organisations across Manchester. MCC worked closely with Coffee4Craig, Chinese Temple and Highway Hope Church.
- Chinese Archive at Central library: MCC worked on the Manchester Chinatown Archive Collection at Manchester Central Library. Children were sent to work at Central Library as school working experience.

- The River at Manchester 1300 Ashton Old Road, Openshaw, Manchester, M11 1JG since 2013 till now. MCC provided help by collecting clothes, household things and furniture from our supplementary parents. This charity work is helping people made vulnerable through domestic abuse and those marginalised by poverty and unemployment.
- Jan 2018 CBeebies show: MCC helped with recruiting Chinese children and helped with performance activities. It is well known that there is a lack of opportunity in the media, filming and broadcasting field for Chinese children. It is important for Chinese children to explore acting and the performing arts. CBeebies run a casting session at the Chinese Centre on Wednesday 30th May 2018. They were looking for children who are confident talkers with great imagination, who enjoy drama and role-play games and be able to work well with other children.
- Dance House Theatre, Manchester. MCC helped the organiser MsL to promote the event. MCC's talented music teachers, Yuxuan Su played the Chinese Guzheng (harp) and Ying Ying Han played the cello. Both of them performed two spectacular and magical pieces of music prior to the actual performance. "The Embroidery Girl" was the story of the Suzhou embroidery masters introduced to the world for the first time. The production was performed by Jiang Su Wuxi Song and Dance Theatre which is well known for their professional productions in the Jiangsu area. The costumes were fantastically intricate and detailed, and the performance was infinitely watchable. The elements and performances complimented each other perfectly, creating a visually stunning and moving performance. It is good to improve the lifestyle of the Chinese community. Through this event the community has learnt about high quality production, beautiful and professional dancers and musicians. Much knowledge about China's traditional and cultural heritage was gained and many memories were made. MCC were very proud to be involved with Jiang Su Wuxi Song and Dance Theatre Group.
 - 17 June 2018 Manchester Day Parade: MCC was delighted to join one of the North West's biggest and best community celebration, the Manchester Day Parade. MCC have been working with Walk the Plank since 2009 to deliver elaborate floats which explore Chinese culture. It gets better every year and MCC are very proud to be working with them. The overarching theme for this year was "The Word on the Street for Manchester" and in response the design was based upon Chinese calligraphy. For subject matter, it was decided to focus upon Confucian philosophy and focus on its effects on the wider Chinese community. The Boat, was the centrepiece. It was decided that the float would take the form of a traditional Chinese ship, to symbolise the boats that took generations and generations of Chinese migrants from the mainland to various countries across the globe. The ship design was influenced by the Chinese ship which is embedded on the mural above the Chinatown car park. On the three sails of the ship, proverbs were written which we believe embodied the sentiment of many Chinese immigrants.
- 26 May 2018 Music Festival: MCC organised the Chinese Music Festival at St James and Emmanuel Church, Didsbury. This year, a record 61 groups or solo performers took part, doubling last year's figures. There was a wide range of talent showcased at the festival from pianists, violinists and Guzheng players as well as singers and dancers.

School Exchange between China and Manchester: MCC helped Manchester Grammar
 School undertake an exchange programme to visit China. It was a great achievement for all parties.

Education:

- Homework Club has been supporting 43 children with their mainstream school's homework.
 MCC's volunteers are helping children to read and listening to their problems.
- Volunteer Linda Chan, works as a School Welfare Adviser. She offers help to parents and teenage children. She has been supporting parents and children through difficult times, teenage problems and children in need.
- MCC provided work experience for young people from school or university and job seekers. High school children could work in school as a teacher's assistant.
- 30 June and 1 July 2018 Poetry Festival: the Poetry reading event is for all ages. It is a great event to encourage the children to learn Chinese language by reading aloud and confidently. The children performed at the Ardwick Park and Church.
- June 2018 Exam at MCC School: 14 candidates were entered for Chinese GCSE language. 12 candidates achieved A*, 1 achieved A and 1 achieved B.
- GCE (A level) Exam at MCC: 6 candidates for Chinese achieved B and C.
- Northwest Chinese School: MCC helped them to enter 15 GCSE candidates.
- Other School: MCC helped them enter 9 GCSE and GCE candidates.
- Mainstream School: MCC helped 5 schools to deal with the Chinese GCSE exam.
- Chinese Church School: MCC organised their exam administration work and JQC is not happy with the safe's size. The space is too small to store 3 schools' exam papers. MCC have informed the Chinese Church School to look in to this matter and to find a solution.
- MCC School Fee: Sept 2018 school fee for Pinyin, GCSE and A level is £245. Year 1-7 is £210. We have increased the number of young children age 5-7 to join Pinyin classes. Most of the children would not carry on with their A level due to a change of the exam system.
- **358 children**; ages **3-16** attending our Supplementary School in Sept 2018 and gradually increased to 410 children in June 2019.
- Dragon Heart Day Nursery: The OFSTED inspection was held in July 2018 and was awarded "GOOD" rating. Recruitment of staff did not improve. Staff wages increased again. There were concerns about overheads. The Sick Pay Policy was changed by the government. Agency staff were recruited to cover sickness leave which doubled the cost. In the past 2 years it was not possible to balance our accounts. Sadly, we decided to close the nursery by the end of December 2018.
- WEA Adult Education is struggling with funding. They are unable to find funding to support some of the courses. They are supporting refugees, Job Seekers or lower income families.
 Learners will be self supported if their family income if over 16k.

Financial review

The attached statements show the current state of the Charity's finances, which the Trustees consider to be satisfactory. Total income in the year was £169,913 and total expenses £153,693 returning a surplus of £16,220 (2017 £11,170). The major sources of income were education and interpreting services.

Investment powers and policy

The trustees, having regard to the liquidity requirements of operating the charity, have kept available funds in an interest bearing deposit account.

Reserves policy and going concern

The balance held in unrestricted reserves as at 31st December 2018 was £81,777 of which £68,270 are free reserves, after allowing for funds tied up in tangible fixed assets.

The trustees aim to maintain free reserves in unrestricted funds at a level which equates to approximately 3 months of running costs (currently £38,250). The trustees consider that this level will provide sufficient funds to give stability to the services offered by the charity.

Risk management

The trustees have conducted a review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed and systems have been established to mitigate those risks.

Plans for Future Periods / Ongoing projects

Education:

We nade to make changes to our GCSE and GCE from September 2018. June 2019, the exam board changed their exam specification (9-1) includes both familiar and new topics. Their contents have been structured across five themes. This flexible programme of study allows time for a focussed revision period at the end of the course. Content and assessments that provide an engaging real-world focus which meant day to day language use. The authentic situations and stimuli enable students to see language in context and learn about the culture of the target language country. Their exams allow for spontaneity and test Chinese grammar as well as providing plenty of opportunities for students.

To be able to meet the above UK exam specification, we decided to change our text book and curriculum in September 2019. We will use HSK text book; also will provide extra Chinese Government Hanban exam whuich allows our students to take HSK exam yearly. It has 6 different levels.

We need to prepare and invest in the following training before September 2019:
Parent questionnaires
Marketing
Plan new school curriculum
Order HSK text book
Re-train teachers and staff
Register with Chinese Hanban as exam centre

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of preparation and assessment of going concern

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

(b) Funds structure

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by the donor or trust deed. There are no restricted funds at the year end. Unrestricted income funds comprise those funds which the trustees are free to use for any purpose in furtherance of the charitable objects. Unrestricted funds include designated funds where the trustees, at their discretion have created a fund for a specific purpose. Further details of each fund are disclosed in note 17.

(c) Income recognition

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably. Fee and grant income are reflected in the accounts when receivable. Grants are recognised when the conditions for their receipt have been met - ths may be based on performance of a task or purchase of goods or services. Grants which relate to a specified future period are deferred. Donations are recognised when the charity has been notified in writing of both the amount and settlement date. In the event that a donation is subject to conditions that require a level of performance before the charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognised until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the charity and it is probable that those conditions will be fulfilled in the reporting period. Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

Operating income represents grants, contracts, tuition fees, rental and sundry income receivable.

(d) Expenditure Recognition

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. All expenses including support costs and governance costs are allocated or apportioned to the applicable expenditure headings. For more information on this attribution refer to note (f) below.

(e) Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the expenditure heading for which it was incurred.

(f) Allocation of support and governance costs

Support costs have been allocated between governance costs and other support costs. Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice. These costs include costs related to independent examination and legal fees together with an apportionment of overhead and support costs. Governance costs and support costs relating to charitable activities have been apportioned based on staff time and facilities used in each activity. The allocation of support and governance costs is analysed in note 8.

(g) Charitable Activities

Costs of charitable activities include governance costs and an apportionment of support costs as shown in Note 7.

(h) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Fixed assets are included in the accounts at net book value. Additions of a single item or a group of similar assets exceeding £500, are capitalised at cost (valuation for donated assets). Depreciation is provided to write off the cost less the estimated residual value of tangible fixed assets over their estimated useful lives as follows:-

Leasehold Improvements	5 years
Fixtures, Fittings & Equipment	5 years

(i) Taxation

The organisation is exempt from income tax by reason of its charitable status. Income tax suffered on investment income is reclaimed in full. The Charity is registered for VAT.

(i) Pensions

The charity makes contributions to an auto enrolment pension scheme. The charity has no liability beyond making its contributions and paying across the deductions for the employee's contributions.

(k) Contingent liabilities

A contingent liability is identified and disclosed for those transactions resulting from a possible obligation which will only be confirmed by the occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the trustees' control.
