Strategic report for the year ended 31 March 2019

The directors present their strategic report together with the unaudited financial statements for I S S Healthcare Limited (the 'Company') for the year ended 31 March 2019.

Results and dividends

The results for the year ended 31 March 2019 are disclosed on page 7 and show a profit after taxation of £32k (2018 profit of £43k). No dividends have been paid or proposed in the year (2018: £nil).

Financial review

Turnover for the year amounted to £1,298k (2018: £1,367k) which resulted in profit on ordinary activities before interest and taxation of £32k (2018: profit of £43k).

Key performance indicators

The Company's primary KPI is weekly delivered care volumes. Average weekly chargeable hours have remained stable in the year to March 2019.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The Company is exposed to non-financial risks such as the loss of major contracts, a significant change in the market dynamic, regulatory risk and the loss of key people

The risk associated with the loss of major contracts is mitigated by virtue of a strong pipeline of new business opportunities to replace any contract losses, the absence of undue reliance on any single contract which could potentially impact the overall performance of the Company as well as operating a number of long-term and rolling contracts. With the number of customer contracts in operation across the Company, the retendering process is on-going. The Company remains confident of retaining a very high proportion of existing business due for retender in the next 12 months and retender statistics over the last 48 months support that view.

The risks around market dynamics are constantly developing. The Company maintains a keen interest in political developments, is an active participant in meetings of industry representative, the United Kingdom Homecare Association ("UKHCA"), and keeps abreast of developments and interpretations of all relevant legislation pertaining to its workforce, the sector and its customer base.

Whilst funding pressures continue to impact the sector the Company maintains strong pricing discipline through tender and retender activity thereby maintaining a financially viable portfolio. The Company also annually renegotiates prices with its customers. Central and local government budgetary policy change over the last 24-36 months has also steadily improved that funding dynamic through ring-fenced council tax precept allocations, reallocations from more discretionary areas of public expenditure in favour of social care and separately allocated specific 'Improved Better Care Funding' (IBCF) to the homecare sector which started to filter down through the system in late 2018 to further support local authority charge rates. A clear political consensus exists to further increase social care funding and with clearly defined non-discretionary Care Act obligations and limited scope for Local Authorities to exert greater tightening around eligibility criteria the position should only continue to improve.

The principal activities of the Company are regulated which presents a potential risk of continued service in the event of regulatory enforcement action. The Company takes its relationship with its Regulators extremely seriously in all areas in which it operates and seeks to maintain a responsible and responsive relationship with each regulator, taking guidance and challenge promptly. The Company invests heavily in its Quality governance back-office infrastructure to ensure robust internal audit processes are followed as a matter of course

The success of that program is clearly evident by the fact the Company is operating without any Inadequate or equivalent rated branch operations across its portfolio.

Strategic report for the year ended 31 March 2019 (continued)

The Company has a comprehensive and extensive quality management system. This includes a dedicated quality team which reports separately to the operational line; quality is reviewed throughout the monthly management reporting cycle, up to board level; processes and systems are constantly reviewed for updates and improvements; there is a developed incident management system, escalating incidents and issues according to severity, the group operates a risk-based scoring system to understand where issues may arise and quality metric are reported through an organisation wide IT system which tracks key quality KPIs by branch.

The Company is dependent on being able to recruit, train and retain an appropriate number of carers and branch staff. If it is unable to do this both quality of service and volume may be impacted. At the same time this is also an area of competitive opportunity for the Company. The Company has a robust recruitment process and is investing in initiatives to improve staff attraction and retention. This is an area of continuous monitoring and improvement. The Company believes it has excellent training programmes and is investing for further improvement. The Company is also deploying technology which it believes will make both carer and branch staff roles more rewarding and satisfying, further aiding retention

The Company is always seeking people to join the business with the right skill set to replace the loss of key staff as and when that occurs. Following further significant Senior Management and Operational headcount investment in the financial year 2019 the Company's staff base has never been more robust.

Future strategy

The outlook for the financial year 2020 and beyond is positive.

Report of the Directors for the year ended 31 March 2019

The Directors present their annual report together with the unaudited financial statements of the Company for the year ended 31 March 2019.

Principal activities and future developments

The principal activity of the Company is the provision of domiciliary care services across the United Kingdom. These services include support to people over sixty-five years of age, as well as young adults and children with a broad range of needs including physical and sensory impairment, mental illness and learning disabilities. These services are delivered in the service users homes. The directors propose to continue the same activities next year.

Political and charitable donations

The Company made no donations during the year (2018: £nil).

Financial risk management

The Company focuses on best practise to effectively manage the financial risks associated with its business and the financing of those activities. Due to the nature of the Company's business and its asset and liability base, the only financial risks that the Directors consider relevant to the Company are price, credit, and liquidity risk.

Price risk

Given the nature of the business in which the Company is engaged, it bears minimal risk of price inflation in the absence of any significant purchase obligations other than statutory national living wage increases. The Company's leased property portfolio is small and its annual obligations are immaterial to the performance of the Company as a whole. Price pressures are exerted by customers and these are managed through contractual negotiation and charge rate restructuring.

Credit risk

The Company's exposure to credit risk is mitigated through its large customer base, minimal credit exposure on any one customer contract, its focus on long-term customer relationships and active monitoring of the credit status of overdue customer accounts.

Liquidity risk

The Company manages liquidity risk by budgeting and forecasting cash flows in the short to medium term and monitoring working capital positions on a monthly basis. Long-term liquidity is assured through committed funding arrangements from other group companies to meet foreseeable peak borrowing requirements.

Post balance sheet events

On 1 April 2019 the trade and assets of subsidiary Freedom Choice Care Limited were transferred into the Company.

Going Concern

The directors have continued to review the Company's cash flow forecasts and trading budgets and after making appropriate enquiries, have formed the view that the Company is operationally and financially robust and will generate sufficient cash to meet its ongoing requirements for at least the next 12 months from the date of approval of these financial statements.

The Company's cash flow forecasts continue to indicate strong cash generation more than sufficient to meet liabilities as they fall due.

The Company's forecasts include modelling covenant compliance which indicates that significant headroom exists in the foreseeable future. The directors have a reasonable expectation that the Company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. The Company therefore continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing its financial statements.

1 Corporate information

I S S Healthcare Limited (the 'Company') operates as providers of domiciliary care services across the United Kingdom.

The Company is a private company limited by shares and incorporated in England. The address of its registered office is 101-103 Baker Street, 3rd Floor Caparo House, London, W1U 6EF.

2 Statement of compliance

The financial statements of I S S Healthcare Limited have been prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Accounting Standards which comply with Financial Reporting Standard 102 and the Companies Act 2006.

3 Summary of significant accounting policies

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements are disclosed below.

Critical accounting judgements and estimation uncertainty

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

The Company makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities are addressed below.

Key sources of estimation uncertainty.

 Determining the recoverable value of trade and other debtors. When assessing impairment of trade and other debtors, management considers various factors, including the ageing profile of the debtor and historical experience.

Key areas of judgement:

• Determine whether there are indicators of impairment of the Company's investements. Factors taken into consideration in reaching such a decision include the economic viability and expected future financial performance of the asset.

New standards and IFRIC interpretations

No new accounting standards, or amendments to accounting standards, or IFRIC interpretations that are effective for the year ended 31 March 2019, have had a material impact on the Company.

3 Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

Exemptions of qualifying entities under FRS 102

FRS 102 allows qualifying entities certain disclosure exemptions, subject to certain conditions, which have been complied with. Going Concern

The directors have continued to review the Company's cash flow forecasts and trading budgets and after making appropriate enquiries, have formed the view that the Company is operationally and financially robust and will generate sufficient cash to meet its ongoing requirements for at least the next 12 months from the date of approval of these financial statements.

The Company's cash flow forecasts continue to indicate strong cash generation more than sufficient to meet liabilities as they fall due.

The Company's forecasts include modelling covenant compliance which indicates that significant headroom exists in the foreseeable future. The directors have a reasonable expectation that the Company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. The Company therefore continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing its financial statements

Turnover

Turnover represents the amounts receivable from the provision of domiciliary care services. Turnover is stated net of value added tax and is recognised in the profit and loss account when the service is provided to the customer.

Exceptional items

The Company classifies certain one-off items that have a material impact, by amount or nature, on the Company's financial results as 'exceptional items'. These are disclosed separately to provide further understanding of the financial performance of the Company.

Employee benefits

The Company provides a range of benefits to employees including annual bonus arrangements, paid holiday arrangements and defined contribution pension plans.

(i) Short-term benefits

Short-term benefits, including holiday pay and other similar non-monetary benefits, are recognised as expenses in the period in which the service is received.

(ii) Pension plans

Amounts charged to the profit and loss account in respect of pension costs represents the contributions payable in the period. Differences between contributions payable in the period and contributions actually paid are shown as either accruals or prepayments.

3 Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

Employee benefits (continued)

(iii) Annual bonus plan

The Company operates an annual bonus plan for certain employees. An expense is recognised in the profit and loss account when the Company has a legal or constructive obligation to make payments under the plans as a result of past events and a reliable estimate of the obligation can be made.

Current and deferred taxation

The tax expense for the period comprises current and deferred tax. Tax is recognised in the profit and loss account, except that a change attributable to an item of income or expense recognised as other comprehensive income or to an item recognised directly in equity is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively. The current income tax charge is calculated on the basis of tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date in the country where the Company operates and generates taxable income.

Deferred tax balances are recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the balance sheet date, except

- The recognition of deferred tax assets is limited to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits, and
- Any deferred tax balances are reversed if and when all conditions for retaining associated tax allowances have been met.

Deferred tax balances are not recognised in respect of permanent differences except in respect of business combinations, when deferred tax is recognised on the differences between the fair values of assets acquired and the future tax deductions available for them and the differences between the fair values of liabilities acquired and the amount that will be assessed for tax.

Deferred tax is determined using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at deemed cost which is the same as historical cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses at the date of transition to FRS 102, plus subsequent costs of additions less subsequent depreciation. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

Repairs and maintenance are charged to profit or loss during the period in which they are incurred

Depreciation on other assets is charged so as to allocate the cost of assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method. The estimated useful lives range as follows:

Computer equipment 5 years Fixtures, fittings and equipment 5 years

The assets' residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted prospectively if appropriate, if there is an indication of a significant change since the last reporting date.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and are recognised within other operating expenses' in the profit and loss account

Impairment of fixed assets

Assets that are subject to depreciation are assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication that the assets are impaired. Where there is any indication that an asset may be impaired, the carrying value of the asset is tested for impairment. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use. Non-financial assets that have been previously impaired are reviewed at each reporting date to assess whether there is any indication that the impairment losses recognised in prior periods may no longer exist or may have decreased.

Leased assets

All leases are treated as operating leases and their annual rents are charged to the profit or loss account on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease.

Investments

Investments held as fixed assets are stated at cost less any provision for impairment.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and deposits held at call with banks

Holiday pay accrual

A liability is recognised to the extent of any unused holiday pay entitlement which has accrued at the balance sheet date and carried forward to future periods. This is measured at the undiscounted salary cost of the future holiday entitlement so accrued at the balance sheet date.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events; it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation; and the amount of the obligation can be estimated reliably.

Provisions are measured at the present value of the expenditures expected to be required to settle the obligation using a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the obligation. The increase in the provision due to passage of time is recognised as a finance cost.

Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised in the Company's balance sheet when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets

Basic financial assets, including trade and other receivables, cash and bank balances and amounts due from group undertakings, are initially recognised at transaction price, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest.

Such assets are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method. At the end of each reporting period financial assets measured at amortised cost are assessed for objective evidence of impairment. If an asset is impaired the impairment loss is the difference between the carrying amount and the present value of the estimated cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. The impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss. If there is decrease in the impairment loss arising from an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, the impairment is reversed. The reversal is such that the current carrying amount does not exceed what the carrying amount would have been had the impairment not previously been recognised.

The impairment reversal is recognised in profit or loss. Financial assets are derecognised when (a) the contractual rights to the cash flow from the asset expire or are settled, or (b) substantially all the risks and rewards of the ownership of the asset are transferred to another party or (c) despite having retained some significant risks and rewards of ownership, control of the asset has been transferred to another party who has the practical ability to unilaterally sell the asset to an unrelated third party without imposing additional restrictions.

Financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including trade and other payables and amounts due to group undertakings, are initially recognised at transaction price, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade payables are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Accounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade payables are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Financial liabilities are derecognised when the liability is extinguished, that is when the contractual obligation is discharged, cancelled or expires

Share capital
