### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the companies Act 2006. The board of trustees is a self-appointing body. Two new trustees have been appointed on 22 March 2010. New trustees are appointed if the number falls below the minimum required under the Articles of Association. Under these circumstances existing trustees will be invited to nominate new trustees prior to the Annual General Meeting. (AGM) advising them of the retiring trustees.

### Induction and training of new trustees

All existing trustees are familiar with the practical work of the charity hence there is no need to organise training sessions. All new trustees depending upon their qualifications and experience would undergo an orientation session to brief them on their legal obligations under the charities and company law. The trustees are encouraged to attend appropriate external training events where these will facilitate the undertaking of their roles.

### Organisational structure

The board of trustees whom meet regularly takes overall accountability for ensuring that the current legislation and rules governing the charity are complied with. The trustees are assisted by a registered manager and management staff in carrying out the day to day activities.

#### Wider network

The charity operates from offices in UK and in Bangladesh whose addresses are given on page 1 of this report

### Related parties

No member of the board of trustees/directors received any remuneration during the year

No trustees/directors or any other person related to the charity had any personal interest in any contract or transaction entered in to by the charity during the year

During the year the charity has received grants in the sum of £175,000 (2011 £240,430) from Majlish Homecare Services Ltd which is a UK registered charity (charity no 1105768) and whose trustees are also trustees of this charity

### Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charity and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate the risks the charity faces. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they continue to meet the needs of the charity.

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### Objectives and aims

Sir William Beveridge Foundation (SWBF) is an international charity that seeks to promote harmony within society, tackle inequality and enhance the well-being and potential of all people. It aims to do this in two ways

- by establishing and managing national and international practical projects that actively engage directly with people to improve their lives,
- through debate and discussion to help develop ideas and enhance understanding

The charity has its roots firmly embedded in the vision and inspiration of Sir William Beveridge. His seminal 1942 report identified five 'giants' that needed to be tackled - idleness, ignorance, disease, squalor and want - in order to effectively reconstruct post war Britain. SWBF believes that his ideas still have a resonance today and merit a wider global application to help all peoples of the world.

The charity's objectives, as set out in it's Trust Deed are for the benefit of the public, and in particular but not exclusively, the Asian community in the UK and overseas ("the community") by

- (A) the relief of poverty, sickness and distress,
- (B) the provision or assistance in the provision of facilities for recreation or other leisure time occupation for individuals in the community who have a need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity, financial hardship or social circumstances with the object of improving the conditions of life for such persons,
- (C) the relief of unemployment through the provision of education and training or re-training and
- (D) the promotion of research in to the social, political, economic and social care issues affecting, in particular, the elderly and disabled members of the community

### Significant activities

The main activities during the period which were all carried out in Bangladesh were

- (1) Homecare services (for elderly and disabled citizens)
- (2) English education course (ESOL) for nursing students of Moulana Bhasani Nursing Institute in Dhaka
- (3) Project ANKUR Education Programme for the underprivileged children
- (4) Health awareness campaign

### Volunteers

Apart from the trustees no other volunteers played any part in achieving the charity's objectives

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities Homecare service, Bangladesh

Sir William Beveridge Foundation's (SWBF) free homecare service that provides quality culturally appropriate care to destitute and vulnerable elderly people in their own homes has been operating successfully in Bangladesh for over five years. The first SWBF operations office was established in Dhaka in 2007 and, under the auspices of the SWBF Executive Director. Head of operations (Bangladesh) plus senior administration staff, the service spread to cover all the district of the city. A second operations office was established in Sylhet, and SWBF launched a homecare service in the city and surrounding districts in January 2012. As well as providing quality care to the elderly, it also employs people from the local communities that it serves. All those appointed as carers and nurses receive full training in order to carryout personal care services plus other services such as dementia care and end of life care to the elderly people in their own homes.

The Homecare service operates under licence from the Ministry of Home Affairs, Bangladesh and is registered with the NGO Affairs Bureau of Bangladesh The success of the homecare project in Bangladesh has been built on the experience of the UK homecare operation that has been providing homecare services for the communities in East London for nearly 12 years

Through the expansion of its homecare service in Bangladesh, SWBF realised that there was a hidden condition that a number of its elderly service users seemed to be suffering from but was left undiagnosed. This condition was dementia that is unrecognised in Bangladesh both by health professionals and the population at large SWBF decided to start addressing this hidden problem through the care it provides to its own service users and thus started the process by forming a partnership with Alzheimer's Australia (WA) Limited (AAWA) who have considerable experience of working on dementia projects in other parts of Asia. Over the last three years, a number of staff from the SWBF office in Dhaka have visited Perth, Australia where AAWA is based to take part in a 10 days 'training for trainers' programme on dementia care to enable them to cascade what they have learnt to other care staff. Tutors from AAWA also visited Dhaka to provide training support to care staff engaged in dementia care and a further visit was made by a senior member of SWBF staff again to Perth to learn about the importance of early diagnosis for dementia

### **Health Awareness**

The beveridge foundation has been writing, printing and distributing short leaflets and pamphlets written in bengali and english in Bangladesh to help explain about diseases and particular conditions such as diabetes, dementia and heart problems (also including an explanation of the symptoms of a heart attack and what people should do) It has also produced guidelines on what constitutes a healthy diet in order to help people avoid such diseases as well as leaflets on public health issues

The leaflets have been distributed through a variety of methods including newspaper vendors, at public events, shopping centres etc.

### Education and empowerment for children and adults

The foundation recruits and employs people from the local communities in Bangladesh for its homecare service project. It provides training for all its carers and nursing staff and offers a career path as well as promoting the empowerment of women through its employment policies. Many of the current care staff in Bangladesh had fallen on very hard times and some of the women in particular were experiencing difficulties in gaining suitable employment even with qualifications. The foundation sees its role as helping to improve the quality of life and dignity not only for the vulnerable elderly people in its care but also for its staff. After training, staff are fully supervised and supported in their roles and receive a decent salary for the work they do compared to similar care work in Bangladesh. This helps to lift them out of poverty, raise their self-esteem and confidence and enable them to feel pride in the role they are playing in their local community and in society generally. They are also held in esteem by people in the local community and have the support of local commissioners and community leaders.

### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### Charitable activities

The Beveridge Foundation free school Ankur, is progressing well after the initial pilot. Students are attending the main school and graduating to state schools with continuing support from SWBF. A small nursery school has also been established in order to prepare the children for the main school. The students and the school are supported through a successful Sponsor a Child fundraising initiative organised through the SWBF website. The teachers are employed by the SWBF and all school materials plus a daily nutritious meal is provided to all students for free. The intention is to reach the poorest and most destitute children that otherwise would not receive an education of any kind.

### FINANCIAL REVIEW

### Reserves policy

The board of trustees have examined the charity's requirement for reserves in the light of the main risks to the organisation. It has established a policy to set aside surplus unrestricted funds in order to pay for staff redundancy, compensation claims and other contingencies. All monies remitted to Bangladesh are kept in deposit accounts and only the interest from these accounts can be utilised for charitable projects. At the balance sheet date balances on these accounts amounted to £386,437 (2011 £478,940)

### Principal funding sources

The principal funding source during the period was a grant received in the sum of £175,000 (2011 £220,430) from it's sister charity Majlish Homecare Services Limited

### **FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS**

Towards the end of 2012,SWBF learnt that it had been successful in its application for a substantial grant from an international body to enable it to run a three year dementia project in Bangladesh to start early in 2013. The project will have two main aims to establish strong working relationships with health and social care professionals in Bangladesh to help them develop the necessary skills and knowledge for carrying out effective diagnosis of dementia, deliver medical treatments and provoke co-ordination and communications links with care and support services that people with dementia and their families need, also to raise awareness of the condition among decision-makers and influence policy making on dementia. A dementia unit will be established in the SWBF Dhaka office to be headed by a Medical Director that will manage the project

SWBF is organising and will host an international conference on dementia to be held in Dhaka towards the end of 2013. The conference will also cover issues around the challenges that an ageing population brings for a developing country and the aim is to attract authoritative and renowned speakers and delegates from around the world as well as from Bangladesh.

A research project will be conducted by the Institute of Population Ageing at Oxford University over 2013 to assess the impact that the SWBF homecare service has had in Dhaka during the five years that it has been in operation. The data gleaned from this research will provide rich information to help inform future funding bids from national and international funding bodies.

#### **United Nations**

SWBF was extremely proud to be granted 'special consultative' status with the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations in 2012 after a 14 month deliberation. This will enable SWBF to take part in UN conferences and submit papers to various UN bodies on topics concerned with the work that it is pursuing including taking part on the consultation for developing the post 2015 Millennium Development Goals

### Other Developments

SWBF has formed a partnership with a UK hospice in order to provide a culturally appropriate and holistic end of life care service to people in their own homes living in East London. At present 10 SWBF UK care staff have completed a 16 week end of life care training course provided by the hospice to build on the knowledge and skills they already had. The intention was also to enable them to fully understand the roles of specialised end of life care professionals and have the opportunity to work with them as part of a team.

The Executive Director and senior staff from SWBF attended and gave a presentation to the All Party Parliamentary Group, Bangladesh in the UK House of Commons in 2012. A short film featuring the SWBF homecare service in Dhaka and Sylhet was shown to the MPs, peers and other guests attending. The intention is to build on this first meeting and raise awareness of SWBF's activities in the UK and Bangladesh among decision-makers in the UK.

The plan is to expand homecare services for the elderly in Bangladesh and establish care homes particularly for people displaced by climate catastrophes. This expansion will take in more districts in Dhaka and Sylhet and over time establish services in Comilla and Chittagong and so reach more vulnerable elderly people in need but doing so in a planned and sustainable way. The intention is to seek funding for the introduction of a paramedic-style service to complement, the homecare service using motorbikes. This will enable carers to visit the homes of elderly people living in hard to reach areas and also to quickly handle emergency call-outs.

There are plans to design, build and maintain a series of 12 care homes for vulnerable elderly people across the northern regions of Bangladesh. The main focus will be on providing free culturally-appropriate secular accommodation for elderly climate refugees who have been made homeless because of environmental disasters that are primarily hitting the south of the country. These disasters are set to become worse and more frequent in the coming years due to global climate changes.

The land for the first of these care homes, to be called 'Beveridge Gardens' has been acquired a few miles north of Dhaka City. As well as providing a good quality home for the elderly people with appropriate personal and medical care provided by fully trained and professional staff employed by the Foundation. The home will also provide leisure and recreational facilities including a garden for residents to enjoy and organised trips out. The emphasis will be on quality of life, respects and dignity

Palliative care and end of life care for elderly people being cared for in their own homes as well as in the care homes in the future, is an area that the Foundation has started to investigate with a view to establishing further partnerships with appropriate national and international organisations already operating in this area

SWBF is updating and refreshing its website and has established an account on twitter that is enabling it to spread messages about its work and raise its profile to a worldwide audience

### Fundraising

Fundraising and developing partnerships at national and international levels are constant areas of work for SWBF in order to ensure sustainability of the projects it has already started and to expand its services in the future to cover more people in need. They are especially important to enable SWBF to realise a long-term project to build a care village in Bangladesh to be sited to the north of Dhaka. The land for this village, to be called 'Beveridge Gardens', has already been secured and the buildings will include a care home for destitute elderly people, a dementia clinic and dementia care home plus a hospice for those people coming towards the end of their lives. SWBF will provide residents with all-round holistic care covering medical, personal, dementia and end of life care services as well as providing emotional support and social activities. It will also provide employment opportunities for people in the locality who would receive full training in all aspects of providing such care.

### Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 May 2012

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities

### Exemption from preparing a cash flow statement

Exemption has been taken from preparing a cash flow statement on the grounds that the charitable company qualifies as a small charitable company

### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

### Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life

Improvements to property

- 15% on cost

Fixtures and fittings

- 25% on cost, 20% on cost, 15% on cost and 10% on cost

Motor vehicles Computer equipment - 25% on cost - 33 33% on cost

### Tovotion

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities

### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements

### Foreign currencies

Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of transaction. Exchange differences are taken into account in arriving at the operating result.

### Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the statement of financial activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease

### Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the trustees named on page. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity.
