#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Governing document

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 24th May 2006 (company number 5826791) and registered as a charity on 7th March 2007 (registered number 1118258). The company was established under a Memorandum of Association, which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. The object of the charity is to promote community participation in rugby league and to use the power of sport to improve education and well-being in people of all ages.

The Governing Document was amended to demonstrate the broader nature of the charity's delivery range in May 2013.

#### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

New trustees are selected and appointed from the local and regional area. All appointments are made with the interest of supporting the Foundation to develop key activities.

No new trustees joined the Foundation board during the period.

#### Induction and training of new trustees

All new trustees received a formal induction programme to enable them to build knowledge and become familiar with the work of the charity. In addition, the charity has worked closely with the RFL governing body to support trustee training to further support their roles and the wider governance arrangement.

### Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 October 2014

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Organisational structure

Hull FC Rugby Community Sports and Education Foundation has five trustees who meet regularly and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. The trustees represent different sectors and bring to the charity a wealth of knowledge that support the charity to meet its objectives.

The charity is run on a daily basis by Richard Munson, Head of Community Foundation who leads on all key strategic and development issues and is responsible for reporting directly to the trustees quarterly on all charity related matters.

#### Risk management

Risk management issues are discussed at quarterly trustee meetings. From a financial perspective, key risks to the charity's ongoing sustainability have been identified and new strategies are in place to support their longer term renewal and identification of new funding streams.

#### Objectives and aims

#### Our Mission:

#### Aims

At the heart of the work of the charity is an understanding of the vital role that sport and in particular Rugby League can play in engaging, educating and inspiring people of all ages. The club remains committed to delivering exciting, safe, and innovative projects that leave a lasting legacy for all people who participate. The year has seen the refocus of the four key delivery pillars being Education, Health and Physical Activity, Supporting Local Community and Play Rugby League!. Each pillar takes into account how the brand of Hull FC and its players have the ability to engage participants across all age levels and make a real difference in our community.

### Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 October 2014

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### Charitable activities

#### Introduction

The Hull FC Community Foundation has had a very promising year from all perspectives. New partnerships developed with local private and public sector bodies which have resulted in new finance streams being made available to support our work. This was underpinned further through the implementation of the 'Power of Sport' strategy which was adopted in April 2014. The rationale behind a two year strategy was to take into account the changing landscape that charities operate in and provides a solid timeframe for refreshing the work areas. The key change was made in recognising the move to 'age areas' as opposed to specific Education, Health and Social Inclusion agendas.

#### **Primary Age Success**

The implementation of the Children's Sports Academy in September 2013 was a bold move in developing new relationships with local primary schools - much of which has been within this reporting year. Smith and Nephew have continued to support the Reading Hero initiative which has been delivered to 43 schools in the Hull and East Riding area. The programme has again focused on the use of creative writing in a sports context and has been recognised by Hull City Council as a project which is fundamentally contributing to the work on raising literacy standards in 10 and 11 year olds. AAK have continued to support the Foundation's work on tackling obesity in children through sponsoring the Be ACTIVE, Be HEALTHY programme which has delivered rugby league sessions to over 400 children. The Wooden Spoon 'Spoon Stars' initiative has used the power of a professional club in special schools to work with 320 children on rugby league programmes.

These three programmes have been a key driver in generating positive publicity for the Foundation in local press and on engaging other corporate sponsors to support other initiatives. The children engaged have also benefited from taking part in match day activities / festivals at the KC stadium on home match days. The Foundation has also benefited from the new national sky partnership which has allowed us to employ 3 people (1 Full time, 2 Part time) to work in schools. This programme is expected to be rolled out and announced nationally in early 2015 but has already seen 6 week blocks delivered with 15 schools in Hull. This programme once confirmed will be one of the most strategically significant initiatives ever to be introduced and will be a key driver in the Foundation's long term sustainability and the introduction of new players into the community game.

#### Secondary / College Success

Our work with the Secondary / College age has predominantly been focused around 5 key areas. The FC Learning Centre initiative has grown in conjunction with the support of three focused hub partnerships with Boulevard Academy, Sirius Academy and St Mary's College through the utilisation of a Director of Rugby in each school. The 'Engage' programme received a further three years of funding support from St Stephens Shopping Centre in April and to date has engaged 45 children from targeted secondary schools in the region on aspiration workshops. This programme was a key driver in accessing funding from the Humberside Police and Crime Commissioner Matthew Grove who has supported the 'Raise your Game' initiative. This is a vital programme which the Foundation believes will open the door to more disengaged / young offender funding streams. The programme itself has engaged 15 young people aged 14 - 18 on a mentoring pathway which aims for them to lead healthier lifestyles and access employment or education.

From a performance perspective, the team have worked closely with the Hull FC Youth Department on becoming an approved Embed the Pathway partner which is intended to see more young teenagers progress into the rugby league talent system in the years to come. Finally, the 'Hub in your Community' programme has seen the Foundation team continue to deliver sport sessions every night of the week in the most deprived areas of Hull. Funded through a variety of partners including the Rank Foundation, StreetGames and Wooden Spoon, the programme has worked with over 500 participants aged 11 - 24 over the duration of the year on regular sporting activities.

#### **Adults Rugby**

The Hull FC Community Foundation was pleased to become one of the first Foundation's to sign up for the national Play Touch Rugby League franchise. The programme ran with the First Team season and saw over 70 people participate regularly. The concept has also been a key mechanism behind our application to Sport England for a new project based around Walking Rugby. The Foundation's wheelchair rugby league team has enjoyed real success through participating in its first competitive game since formation. Over the year, they have attended national tournaments and have an impressive win percentage. The team now have 15 regular players, with Mike Swainger now a fully employed member of the Foundation team.

### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities

#### **Community Focus**

A key focus of the Foundation will always be on delivering programmes that use the power and inspiration of the Hull FC badge to engage people in activities that bring positive change.

Our partnership with Sanctuary Housing has developed well in its second year of providing employability workshops for adults and family sport sessions for residents. Over 100 residents have been engaged within the HU6 and 7 postcodes. In a similar focus, a successful Health Win application has seen the commencement of a similar project working in the Thornton Estate area of Hull. The project has already engaged 45 participants in related activity. A great deal of Foundation work occurs with young people in the area, however the implementation of the St Georges Project for Veterans and Old Faithful dementia project are providing very positive older adult results for the Foundation. St George's project offers sports and healthy living programmes for veterans in Hull coupled with employment and retraining advice, all funded through a partnership with the Hull Military Covenant Board and has to date engaged 120 veterans. 'Old Faithful' has been funded by Relay Ports Agency and the Humber NHS Foundation Trust to offer Sports Reminiscence workshops to adults in 8 Hull care homes and to date worked with 27 adults with dementia.

We have been very successful with two lottery funders in Sport England and the heritage Lottery Fund. Our Sport England CSAF initiative 'Hull Sport Hubs' which received a grant of £162,544 from Sport England has seen the Foundation branch out into multi-sport delivery - specifically boxing, athletics, cricket, netball, rounders, basketball and futsal. From a wider perspective, the initiative in the long term will support the development of new volunteers and participants for clubs. Finally, the Heritage Lottery have funded the 'Faithful 13' initiative which will be instrumental in delivering a community engagement initiative through the clubs 150 year anniversary. The programme will engage 30 schools in exploring the key events throughout the last 150 years associated with the club and work with current fans to capture memories and preserve them for future generations.

#### **Bonus Youth Performance Centre**

The facility was operational for 49 weeks of the reporting period, allowing for 10 days close at Christmas, bank holidays and a one week closure during Easter for the development of a new classroom facility externally funded by Wooden Spoon.

#### Period Usage:

- Community Organisation Hours Accessed: 1,119 Hours - facility operational 49 weeks, average usage per week = 23 hours

Key organisations using the facility include the Diamond White Stars Dance Team, Hull Wasps, Hull Hornets, England Netball, Hessle Rangers, Hessle Sporting, Catch 22 and East Riding County FA.

- Hull FC Community Foundation: 761 Hours across 49 weeks - average usage per week = 15.5 hours

Key programmes delivered include TRY Line Girls! FC Tots, FC Touch Rugby, Central Sports Hub, and Fit 4 FC

- FC Learning Centre: 1,270 Hours across 49 weeks - average weekly hours 26

Deliver of Sport Study and Employability Programmes at Level 1, 2 and 3 for young people aged 16 - 18 previously out of education or employment and unemployed adults in partnership with Hull Training, Hull College, In Training and Learndirect.

- Hull City Council: 70 Hours

Delivery of a range of sports development initiatives and education programmes through StreetGames and the Humber Sports Partnership.

Total Engagement Hours on Site: 3,220 Hours of delivery across reported 49 week period, averaging 65 hours per week, 9 hours per day. This is an increase from 2,523 hours in 2012/13.

### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**Charitable activities

#### **Key Successes:**

The Hull FC Community Foundation has continued to manage the Bonus Youth Performance Centre's operation through three key areas, Community Club Hire, Hull FC Community Foundation Activity and as a base for the FC Learning Centre. The initial ambition of the charity was to utilize the facility into becoming a real hub of the local community for sport and education and this is very much being achieved. From a sustainability perspective, we have developed a close working partnership with key amateur clubs including Diamond White Stars (Dance and Cheerleading), Hessle Rangers (Football) and various basketball clubs who use the facility as their main base and have done since early 2013. This coupled with smaller but regular hire from organisation such as the East Riding FA for their skills programme has ensured that the target of 20 community use hours per week has been achieved. Our pricing structure remains the same since the facility opened and therefore one of the cheapest in the City.

As an organisation, the Hull FC Community Foundation remains in a strong position both financially and from a deliverability capacity, with its range of programmes offered broader than at any other time in its history. The Bonus Youth Performance Centre is a critical factor in this success from being able to partner on a sponsorship level with well know local business Bonus Electrical through to being able to offer Veterans Sport Sessions with the Hull Military Covenant Board and disability sport festivals with Wooden Spoon just some examples. A notable success was the Foundation's partnership working with facility users to develop a Community Sports Activation Fund project which was successful with Sport England and led to a three year investment of £176,000. This project brings users of the facility together and will support their development with participants of the project now joining their club.

#### **Year Conclusion**

2013/14 was a period which stabilised the Hull FC Community Foundation and has provided a great base to develop its offer for years to come. Long term partnerships are now in place on a range of grant and sponsored activities and the announcement from the RFL to provide £100,000 to foundations across the game will only develop our position and reach further. The Foundation looks forward to taking occupation of two new facilities in Hull on Chamberlain Road and County Road which will expand our coverage to local people. Our relationships with community clubs have reached new heights with the creation of the Fanbassadors scheme which will see over £2,000 donated back to the clubs on the back of their ticket purchases in year.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Reserves policy

The main area of expenditure for the charity is on staff costs and ensuring that they remain equipped with knowledge, skill and equipment is key to achieving delivery goals. Ongoing investment in larger assets will be directed to ongoing development of our Youth and Performance Centre to ensure it remains a high quality venue appropriate for Foundation activities and wider community use.

#### Principal funding sources

The majority of the investment into the charity was made through noted partnerships with NHS Hull, Sanctuary Housing, Hull Military Covenant Board, Help for Health, Rank Foundation, KC and Smith & Nephew.

#### Investment policy and objectives

The charity ensures a small amount is held in reserves whilst the majority of funds are spent in the short term.

#### **FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS**

Progressing into the end of this year and into 2015, the Foundation are in a solid position to go forward. There are 21 different projects that all have a direct focus on community engagement and personal development. There are also great opportunities ahead via fundraising initiatives such as the 'Spirit of Hull' campaign and the opportunities for unique events such as donated places in the Hull marathon & Just giving page.

# Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Hull FC Rugby Community Sports and Education Foundation

I report on the accounts for the year ended 31 October 2014 set out on pages seven to thirteen.

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees (who are also the directors for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. ### Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 October 2014

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

#### **Incoming resources**

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

#### Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Improvements to property - 10% on cost
Plant and machinery - 20% on cost
Computer equipment - 20% on cost

#### Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
