STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Status

The London Oratory School Schola Foundation was incorporated on 26 October 2006 as a company limited by guarantee, company number 05979107 and with no share capital. It was registered as a charity with the Charity Commission of England and Wales charity number 1119254

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the company's Articles are known as members of the Trustees Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association the members of the Management Committee are elected to serve for a period of three years after which they must be reelected at the next Annual General Meeting

Trustees retire by rotation and, being eligible, offer themselves for re-election

All Trustees give their time voluntarily and received no benefits from the charity

The Trustees seek to ensure that the interests of the charity are appropriately reflected in the trustee body. The trustees agreed that the charity would benefit from a broader interest base, and therefore future trustees will be drawn from candidates with no links to the school.

Trustee Induction and Training

Most current trustees are familiar with the responsibilities of trustees. The Chairman of Trustees ensures that new trustees are aware of

- The obligations of Trustees members
- The main documents which set out the operational framework for the charity including the Memorandum and Articles
- Resourcing and the current financial position as set out in the latest published accounts
- Future plans and objectives

New trustees are encouraged to read Charity Commission publications signposted through the Commission's guide "the Essential Trustee"

Public Benefit

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Commission in determining the activities undertaken by the Charity

Risk Management

The Executive Committee has conducted a review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed. Where appropriate, procedures have been established to mitigate the risks the charity faces. Identification of significant external risks to funding has led to the drafting of a Development Plan and a review of governance, which will allow for any problems to be identified early and dealt with accordingly

Internal control risks are minimised by the aim to appoint a Development Officer and the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects. Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with Data Protection and health and safety of staff and volunteers. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they continue to meet the needs of the charity.

Organisational Structure

The London Oratory School Schola Foundation has a Trustee body of up to 12 members who meet once a term and who are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. At present the Board of Trustees has 6 members from a variety of professional backgrounds relevant to the work of the charity. The Secretary, Director of Music and Development Officer attend Board and Committee meetings by invitation, but do not have voting rights

There is an Executive Committee, comprising the Chairman and two other Trustees, which meets regularly between meetings of the full Board of Trustees

A scheme of delegation is in place and day-to-day responsibility for the provision of the services currently rests with the Development Officer, with the assistance of volunteers (a group of chorister parents). The Chairman has overall responsibility for ensuring that the charity delivers the services specified and that key performance indicators are met

Related Parties

The charity is guided by professional advice offered on a voluntary basis from associates of the school, the Church and other agencies where appropriate. The charity endeavours to maintain good relations with the The London Oratory School and the Oratory Fathers, who are the trustees of the school. The charity has established good relations with senior clergy in the Archdiocese of Westminster and other Catholic dioceses and organisations in the United Kingdom.

OBJECTIVES, ACTIVITIES AND PERFORMANCE

Purposes and Aims

With the agreement of the Charities Commission the Trustees resolved to amend the Objects of the Charity. The reason for the amendment was broaden the scope of the work of the Charity and better to reflect the present work of the Schola, particularly in respect of outreach work. The new objects became effective on 20th August 2011.

Previous Objects

The Charity's objects (the Objects) are to maintain the musical foundation of The London Oratory School Schola Cantorum including the support, maintenance and promotion of the choir, and for the advancement of Roman Catholic religion and education in the Roman Catholic tradition and in particular (but without limiting the foregoing) the education of children in church choral music

Revised Objects

The Charity's objects (the Objects) are

- to promote and support The London Oratory School Schola Cantorum (the Schola) in its activities as a Catholic liturgical boys' choir and as a concert choir,
- to support the Schola in promoting the education of children in choral music generally and in promoting the English choral tradition worldwide,
- to fund scholarships and bursaries (entirely at the discretion of the Trustees of the Foundation) to support individual members of the Schola in pursuit of activities associated with the Schola or their musical development generally,
- · to support the Schola in commissioning new choral music and making recordings, and
- to support outreach work in the local community and beyond by the Schola and members of the Schola

Ensuring our work delivers our aims

We review our aims, objectives and activities each year. This review looks at what we achieved and the outcomes of our work in the previous 12 months. The review looks at the success of each key activity and the benefits they have brought to those groups of people we are set up to help. The review also helps us ensure our aim, objectives and activities remained focused on our stated purposes. We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aim and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set

The focus of our work

Our main objectives for the year continued to be to maintain the musical foundation of The London Oratory School Schola and the advancement of Roman Catholic religion and education in the Roman Catholic tradition, in particular the education of children and the general public in choral music

The strategies we used to meet these objectives included

Providing financial support for a number of Schola projects

Developing opportunities for the Schola within the Church and the wider society

Developing relationships with donors and supporters and working towards applying good standards of stewardship and accountability

Working in partnership with other agencies to bring the Schola to wider attention, in order to protect its future Encouraging and supporting outreach work by the Schola

How our activities deliver public benefit

Our main activities and beneficiaries are described below. All our charitable activities focus on helping the Schola bring sacred music to a wider audience and are undertaken to further our charitable purposes for the public benefit

Who used and benefited from our services?

The choristers of the London Oratory School Schola are the most obvious beneficiaries of the Foundation's resources. They and their families enjoy the rewards that a chorister education can bring. The wealth of their experience as a member of the Schola will stay with them for the rest of their lives and many of them will go on to share their skills and talents in a professional capacity, thereby further spreading the benefit to others.

These boys are benefiting not only from a rigorous choral education provided by the school Further, the Foundation adds value to their experience and enables the Schola to be more than just a school choir. Its support provides opportunities which would otherwise not be available to them

The impact of our work goes far beyond the choristers however. The Foundation's resources enable the Schola to bring music to a very wide audience. The impact of this powerful and effective investment can be measured in a diverse variety of communities, including the following.

- Pupils and staff of the London Oratory School they hear the Schola sing morning prayer every weekday and Benediction every Friday afternoon There are 1400 pupils and 140 staff at the school
- Church and parish involvement: some of the senior Scholars, and some Schola alumni, are now Musical Directors, organists or singers at their own parishes and in three metropolitan cathedrals. In October 2012, the organ scholarships at three of the Oxford colleges will be held by Schola alumni.
- Children involved in *Oratory Sing Up*, the Schola's outreach choral singing programme 6 schools are involved, 200 children and over 20 staff. Schola choristers and music specialists visit local primary schools on a weekly basis in guided singing sessions, and perform with the children in a mass concert once a term. Our monitoring suggests that the positive impact on the children, and their families, is significant. Children who would most benefit from this experience are invited by their schools to take part.
- The congregation of the Oratory Church in London every Saturday evening during term time, the choir sings the Vigil Mass Numbers attending vary but are usually in the region of 300 500 each week
- The musical tradition of Catholic Church the performances of a new Mass setting by Roxanna Panufnik, including the commissioning of a version for parish use, is a major contribution to the living tradition of liturgical music of the Church
- Diverse public audiences at concerts, tours, performances and for recordings See 'Activities' below for more detailed analysis
- The Friends of the Schola at private recitals, three times a year, in the Little Oratory

Analysis of performance and achievements

What are the main areas of charitable activity?

The main areas of charitable activity are

- the provision of funds to contribute to
 - o chorister tour bursaries, enabling boys to participate in tours
 - o the commissioning of new sacred works in the Catholic tradition
 - Schola performances, events and recordings and
 - o the purchase of scores to build up the Schola music library

REVIEW OF FINANCIAL POSITION

Against the backdrop of limited resources, it is challenging for the Schola to plan or develop very far ahead

With the limited funds available in 2011-12, the Foundation has been able to

- Support a major concert given by the Schola and other choirs of The London Oratory School at the Cadogan Hall in July 2012
- Provide chorister bursaries for choristers taking part in the Inner Voices project
- Provide funds for additional music scores in the Schola music library
- Provide receptions at several concerts as supporter cultivation
- Provide funds for outreach work with local primary schools

Principal Funding Sources

The principal funding sources for the charity continues to be by way of private donations from a small number of very generous donors and some business sponsorship clustering around concerts. The trustees are keen to identify possible opportunities for a wider range of funding for the future, in particular institutional funding. This year the Foundation was privileged to receive a grant of £35,000 from the Queen's Silver Jubilee Fund to fund outreach work for two academic years, 2012-13 and 2013-14. This will enable the Schola to continue and expand its outreach work with local primary schools.

Investment Policy

Given the low level of fundraising at the present time, most of the charity's funds are to be spent in the short term so there are currently no funds for long term investment

Reserves Policy

The Trustees have examined the charity's requirements for reserves in light of the main risks to the organisation. At this time the charity's overheads are negligible and therefore significant reserves are not an immediate priority. Although the strategy is to continue to build reserves through planned operating surpluses, the Trustees are well aware that it unlikely that the target range can be reached for at least five years. In the short term the Trustees have also considered the extent to which existing activities and expenditure could be curtailed, should such circumstances arise.

- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- State whether applicable UK Accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements,
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time of the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.
