Structure, governance and management

Governing document

Exeter City Community Trust is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on January 15, 2007 and registered as a charity on November 14, 2007. The company is exempt under section 60 of the Companies Act 2006 from the requirement to use the word 'limited'.

The company was established under a Memorandum of Association and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

The charity changed its name from Exeter City Football in the Community on January 26, 2017.

Appointment of trustees

The management of the charity is the responsibility of the trustees who are elected under the terms of the Articles of Association. Under the terms of a Service Level Agreement with Exeter City A.F.C. Limited that company is entitled to nominate a minimum of two trustees to serve on the board.

It is the responsibility of the existing trustees to formally induct and train incoming trustees about the policies of Exeter City Community Trust. The current organisation structure of the board of Exeter City Community Trust is the chair with eight other trustees. Decisions are taken at regular board meetings attended by the trustees.

Risk management

The trustees regularly review and assess the procedures and formats for risk assessment to ensure that they continue to meet the needs of the charity to fulfil its responsibilities.

Objectives and activities

- 1.1.1 to promote for the benefit of children, young persons and adults within the Area of Benefit, the provision of, or the assistance in the provision of, facilities for education and recreation or other leisure time occupation of individuals who have need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, financial hardship or social and economic circumstances or for the public at large in the interests of social welfare and with the object of improving their condition of life;
- 1.1.2 to relieve poverty or financial hardship among people living or working within the Area of Benefit, by providing or assisting in the provision of education, training, housing management services and other necessary services and support with the object of improving their condition of life which they could otherwise not afford through lack of means;

Introduction

Exeter City Community Trust (ECCT) remains in good shape to deliver on its mission, values, and charitable objectives due to the sound and considered stewardship of the charity, and the diligence of our Chief Executive, management team, staff, volunteers and Trustees.

The charity continues to provide activities and opportunities for all. As a health and wellbeing charity, we seek to help people to lead positive, active, and healthy lives, whether that be through sports and physical activity, alternative educational opportunities, or social engagement. We also aim to use local knowledge and data to support the most vulnerable people in our community at the point of need, whether that be food, provisions and/or shelter.

During the period of this report, inflation and the cost-of-living crisis have had an impact on organisations across the third sector and the communities that we serve. As a result, the charity has worked this year to improve its deployment of a data-driven approach to development and engagement to ensure that we are achieving our objectives whilst helping those most in need in our community.

We have also worked within this period to restructure the charity. This restructure has been based upon the evolution and growth of the charity and has ensured that our structure reflects the core areas of activity in relation to our strategic approach and active role within the communities that we serve.

This document - which covers a timeframe between February 2022 and January 2023 - will provide greater detail on the aims, activities, and achievements of the charity during this period, whilst also outlining some of our key plans for the future.

Organisational Restructure

In April 2022 - following a period of internal and external consultation - the charity completed its planned restructure, which was built upon five core drivers.

- Improve the management and delivery of all programmes and resources.
- Increase clarity in terms of roles and responsibilities across the charity and provide capacity for community/programme/business development.
- Empower senior staff in order to release more time for the Chief Executive to focus on the direction of growth and strategic aims of the organisation.
- Improve work-flow, reporting structures and communication across all departments of the charity in order to maximise efficiency.
- Develop and implement employee development programme to a) create identifiable roles and pathways to progress/personal and professional development, and b) to enhance performance management.

To deliver on these aims, and the broader mission of the charity, five core departments have been created:

- Wellbeing and Inclusion
- Participation
- Education
- Charity Development
- · Finance and Resources

A sixth department - Supported Housing - remains within the charity whilst steps are made to establish the programme as its own independent charity.

The core departments also reflect the operations of the English Football League Trust, enabling the charity to align with the wider aims of the Club Community Organisation Network (CCO's), whilst also responding more effectively to localised need and demand.

Each department is now managed by a 'Head of', who oversee the operational management of their direct team, whilst working with the Chief Executive to deliver on the charity's mission and objectives.

The senior leadership team is made up of the following roles:

- Will Barrett Head of Charity Development
- Matt Julyan Head of Finance and Resources
- Scott Walker Head of Participation

In addition to the departmental restructure - and owing to the scope of our work, the charity has also hired Senior Safeguarding Manager Amy Richards, who oversees best practice for the charity in this area and leads the safeguarding group with support from our Designated Safeguarding Officer, Danny Harris

Capability Code of Practice

A Capability Code of Practice (CCoP) audit took place from March to July 2022. CCoP is the governing standards for club community organisations, set by the Premier League Charitable Fund and the English Football League (EFL) Trust.

This audit assessed the objectives, outputs, and outcomes for all CCOs across the following 15 areas:

- 1. Structure
- 2. Affiliated Club
- 3. Governance and the Board
- 4. People
- 5. Strategy and Implementation
- 6. Impact
- 7. Accountability and Communication
- 8. Finance
- Safeguarding
- 10. Equality Diversity and Inclusion
- 11. Data Protection
- 12. Risk Management
- 13. Health and Safety
- 14. Incident Reporting
- 15. Environmental Sustainability

There are a total of 203 evidence-based-actions to be completed for this audit, with outcomes scored from 0-720 (requires improvement - exemplary). The outcome of this process for the charity resulted in a score of 585, which is rated 'very good'.

Six of the categories were rated as exemplary by the auditor (Structure, Affiliated Club, Governance and the Board, Finance, Data Protection, Health and Safety).

Additionally, whilst no areas were noted as requiring improvement, our charity development team continues to assess and create actions to improve the standard of our work across all 15 areas of CCoP.

New Programmes

The University of South Wales (USW):

Sports Business and Management Degree (in development)

This is the latest collaboration between the EFL Trust, CCOs, and the USW. This degree provides learners the opportunity to study in the workplace of a professional organisation through formalised affiliation with a professional sports club. Lectures are produced by USW staff, with students studying these materials remotely, both at home and in the football club's (ECFC) learning environment with the support of an appointed mentor.

Within the football club/ECCT, successful applicants will undertake placements of 4-8 hours per week in year 1 and 7-14 hours per week in years 2 and 3. These experiences will mainly be working within the remit of the football club/CCO and will provide practical experience of working within the sports business and management industry. Participants may also get a wider experience through opportunities via the football club/ECCT's sponsors and partners. Students will also attend USW up to three times per year for residential study visits. This programme will begin in full in the Autumn of 2023.

FA Girls' Emerging Talent Centre

At the outset of the 2022/23 football season, the charity was awarded funding from the Football Association to launch an Emerging Talent Centre. The main purpose of the Girls' Emerging Talent Centres (ETCs) is **Talent ID**: To identify and develop future potential players by providing local, accessible high-quality training environments.

The new Centres offer increased playing time, varied football formats and allow players to play for both an Emerging Talent Centre and a grassroots club, school, or representative team, in order to enhance the variety of playing experiences.

The ETC format for Exeter sees us provide these opportunities in both Exeter and Barnstaple for the under-10 and under-12 age groups (Barnstaple only) and complements both our own female football pathway and that of the Devon FA.

Participation

This department works to encourage children of all ages between three and eighteen to participate in structured, professional sports coaching and physical activity sessions run in safe and secure environments in the Greater Exeter and North Devon areas.

These sessions are designed and delivered to improve motivation, co-ordination, health and confidence. Projects include children's holiday clubs - both football, multi-sport and individual sports, coaching in schools via extra-curricular clubs for primary schools and satellite clubs for secondary schools and community groups.

Also provided are curriculum-time PE sessions, weekly Grecian Tots clubs for three to six-year-olds, Grecian Kickers for 7-14s, Grecian Girls and Wild Cats (weekly girls only football clubs for 5-14s), inter- and intra- school/club tournaments and multi-sport courses.

One of our key priorities is to support the national curriculum, and so we continue to deliver our

Premier League Primary Stars programme (PLPS), which aims to support/up-skill teachers and to offer the children more competition opportunities, literacy, numeracy, PSHE and enterprise skills.

During the period of this report, all multi-sports, development and participation programmes returned to in-person activities. The full list of these activities includes:

Additional programmes delivered during the period of this report include:

The Twinning Project

We have continued to run this programme in collaboration with HMP Exeter throughout the period. This project provides structured sessions around sport, physical activity and employability skills with appropriate inmates who are due to be released from HMP Exeter. This remains a priority programme for HMP Exeter's resettlement process and could also link through to the supported housing programme.

Man v Fat

The Man v Fat programme is designed to support participants in reaching their weight loss goals through 7-a-side matches, weigh-in data, and ongoing nutritional and lifestyle support. Over the course of this period, we have supported 65 active players and are operating at around 86% for the capacity of this programme. During the most recent season, the players lost a combined weight of 91kg.

Wellbeing

Parasports

Our provision for children, young people and adults with disabilities continues to grow and develop and we are supporting more players than ever. We have an inclusive offer for all members of our community who have disabilities led by Para Sport Lead, Dan Hewitt. We are currently delivering the following weekly or bi-weekly sessions:

- · Disability Walking Football
- In Focus (visually impaired)
- · Adults Deaf Football Training
- Wildcats' girls' only sessions
- PL Kicks disability football
- Oakwood Collegé
- · Downs syndrome football
- Pan Youth football
- Adults' Pan football

In addition to the above sessions, we continue to deliver holiday clubs for children and young people with disabilities. These clubs provide a safe environment and the opportunity for children to thrive and feel part of something special. They are usually one to two days long and support physical and mental wellbeing as well as social interaction.

Achievements and performance (continued) Wellbeing Exeter

The Wellbeing Exeter initiative continues to fund a network of community support workers (including community connectors and builders) and the four Community Physical Activity Organisers (CPAOs) who are hosted at ECCT. They each cover a designated area of the city with a focus on increasing physical activity for residents.

CPAOs have continued to support groups in their areas through a range of co-designed activities created to suit the needs and demands of participants. During this period there has been an increased emphasis on work with families, including pop up games in parks, active listening stalls and other local events. This has helped us to talk to new people and find out what the needs of the community are. An example of this is seated exercise in sheltered accommodation for the elderly.

Extra Time Hub - Social Café and Sporting Memories

The Extra time hub supports people over the age of 50 who are at risk of loneliness and/or struggle with their mental health. They visit the social café to meet new people and try something new. We regularly have 10 people attending each week, although it has been a challenge to get more members to the group. The group have recently been on a history walk around Sidwell Street, linking in with the history of the football club. We have also planned Christmas carols and a shared lunch before we break for Christmas. We have registered the Social Café and the Sporting Memories session as warm spaces with both Exeter City Council and Devon County Council, where people can come and keep warm for free during the current cost of living/energy crisis.

Fit Fans

Fit Fans is a tier two weight management programme, licenced by the EFL Trust and funded by Public Health Devon. Following a successful year of delivery during the 2021/22 season, our contract was extended to deliver sessions across Exeter, East and North Devon. This programme is due to continue to the end of the 2022/23 season, in support of men reaching their weight and wellbeing goals. To date more than 90% of all participants have achieved a target of 5% reduction in their body weight and a positive improvement on the programme's adopted mental health and wellbeing scale.

Inclusion

Boxing Interventions

This project offers mentoring to help young people to re-engage into school life. It is designed to break down barriers which stop a young person from positively engaging with their education, and links into the Chances programme (see below). During this period, this initiative was featured on the regional news to highlight the positive impact that this activity, and the supporting environment provided, has on young people.

Chances

Exeter Chances is an intervention for young people who are disengaged from education. We are now in year three of the project and are once again at capacity. We work with secondary schools in Exeter to educate teachers on the purpose of the programme who then refer students to us. We also receive referrals from specialist police intervention officers who work with young offenders who aren't engaging with school. These children and young people will have various challenges from truancy to exclusions. Our 40 places have been filled and we have 12 referrals on reserve. We are also working with a group of children and young people who have been expelled from three different mainstream schools. This has started well, and we are using it is a pilot to expand and run alongside the Chances programme next year.

Achievements and performance (continued) Holiday Activities and Food (HAF)

During this period, we have continued to work in partnership with Devon County Council's Early Years and Childcare Services team to deliver the Holiday Activities and Food programme in the Easter, Summer, and Christmas Holidays. The programme is aimed at supporting children and young people on benefit-related free school meals and educational healthcare plans, provides four hours of physical activity a day, and a hot nutritious meal. The activities being held at Haven Banks Outdoor Education Centre, and Willowbrook and Newtown Primary Schools across a total of 16 days throughout the year.

Opportunity Club

The Opportunity Club provides a weekly session for homeless people and those with mental health issues and people recovering from alcohol/drug addiction. The project is sponsored by HSBC and is attended by service users from our supported housing project and players from the Amber Foundation and YMCA. During this period, we had two teams compete in a competition in Plymouth, with a further mental health tournament taking place at the Riverside Leisure Centre in Exeter.

Premier League Kicks

Premier League (PL) Kicks started in 2006 and has a long history of using the power of football and the value of sports participation to help youngsters in some of the most high-need areas. The vision for the programme is to inspire children and young people to achieve their potential and improve their wellbeing; working together to build stronger, safer and more inclusive communities. Throughout this period, we have delivered these free football sessions in Merrivale, Cranbrook, Summerway Park and Wonford. Our current aim is to engage with more than 300 young people this year through this programme. The PL Kicks team is looking at ways of winter-proofing venues due to weather and safety of venues, with the aim of having spring/summer venues as well as autumn/winter venues to maintain attendance.

Education

Football Coaching Development Foundation Degree (Exeter College / Marjon) The football coaching and development foundation degree is a two-year full-time course which focuses on the theoretical concepts of coaching and development in the world of football. Eight students joined the course in September 2022, which has taken the total number of students to 16.

Exeter City Football and Futsal Development Programme

During this period, the charity has partnered with Exeter College to deliver a hybrid version of Futsal and 11-a-side football, to ensure the students get to take part in a decent number of games over the academic year. The teams play in the AOC Sport Futsal league and the EFL CEFA 11-a-side league with Exeter College; this offers a varied fixture programme and helps to keep the students engaged in the academic courses. We recruited 49 learners for the programme and currently have 46 that are fully engaged. Discussions have already started with Exeter College around recruitment for September 2023.

Teignmouth Football Development Programme

This programme, which provides students with an education that can lead on to university whilst also providing them with the chance to train and compete in a professional football environment, is continuing at Teignmouth Community School and will see one team playing in the EFL CEFA 11 a side league, which is the same games programme as the Exeter College programme above.

Achievements and performance (continued) Women's and Girls' Football

The Charity continues to provide a successful pathway for female players into local college football academies, university teams and women's clubs.

We remain part of the EFL Trust/FA Female Talent inclusion programme, which is designed to support young girls from disadvantaged communities in reaching their potential. This funding can be utilised to support disadvantaged females and help them get on the regional and national FA talent pathway.

Our Emerging Talent and Girls' Development Centres form a core part of this work and sees staff operating across all age-groups from the delivery of tots sessions to management of the women's first team.

On the pitch the first team is performing well. At the time of writing, we are second in the FA Women's National League, Division One South West, whilst the development squad is performing well having been entered into a higher standard of football for this season in the Devon Women's League.

Off the pitch, the club has received increase support from Exeter City Football Club, with both increased financial investment and additional games scheduled to be played at St James Park.

The first of these games was held on October 2, 2022, and played in front of 2,621 supporters. That figure is both a record for women's football in the city and demonstrates the growing interest in the game following the Lionesses' success at the European Championships and the ongoing investment in the game here in Exeter.

Public Events

Running

The running programmes is designed to facilitate physical development and activity, whilst providing opportunities for participants to raise funds for ECCT and our partner charities (Exeter Leukemia Fund, Alright Mate?, Julian House, and Children's Hospice South West).

This period has seen the return of a full running calendar, to include all five of our core mass participation running events with more than 1,100 runners taking part:

- The Exeter Half Marathon
- The Granite Way 10 and 20-milers
- The 10k River Exe Run
- The Exeter Live Better Marathon
- The Exeter Santa Run

The charity also added a new 5-mile event - The Halloween 5 - to the programme, to enable an additional participation event, at an inclusive distance, during the vacant Autumn period.

Junior Grecians

The Junior Grecian (JG) membership continues to build; with 700 members at the latest count. The Junior Grecian Zone continues to attract young supporters on match days and builds positive relationships with fans and staff. The JG Christmas Party sold out within four hours from going on sale. A new membership system will be in place for the new year. All JG Parties have sold out for the

whole season. It has been something of a challenge to find enough volunteers to staff the room each match.

Match Days at St James Park

The 'on the pitch' experience has been limited to 10 matches this season to protect the pitch at St James Park. Despite these limitations, engagement is up on the previous season due to the lifting of Covid restrictions and the continued interest of local football clubs and families wishing to engage with this opportunity.

Off the pitch, the Junior Grecian Zone continues to be a hive of activity on Match Days, offering a range of activities and provisions in a family friendly environment. With restrictions lifted, players are also returning to the JG Zone ahead of games, which enables our youngest supporters the chance to meet their heroes.

Supported Housing

Following the launch in August 2021, our specialist housing service continues to help and support vulnerable people who are at risk of being homeless or have experienced homelessness by providing them with the opportunity to live in their own home and prepare for independent living.

The homes in the scheme are the responsibility of a registered housing association who provide the living accommodation for vulnerable people and families. They have been refurbished to a high standard and all either meet or exceed building regulation standards.

Much of the provision retains its focus on assisting the residents in developing the skills to maintain a tenancy through a personalised plan which helps them to sustain a tenancy and enables them to contribute to the community and to society in a positive way. Residents are also provided with help and guidance in areas such as budget management, job hunting and healthy living advice.

The programmes currently supports 95 service users. Referrals for this programme continue to be managed by the supporting housing team, with the referral pathway being supported by Exeter City Council and other organisations in the region set up to support those who are homeless or at risk of homelessness.

Financial review

The net incoming resources for the period were £412,973 (2022: £247,682) resulting in accumulated funds carried forward of £1,283,249, of which £966,142 (2022: £775,320) are unrestricted funds. Free reserves at the year-end after allowing for unrestricted funds represented by fixed assets and a £419,600 transfer to a designated Facility Fund have been calculated at £532,179. At current activity levels this represents approximately 6 months of staffing and operating costs. The trustees will continue their efforts to build up unrestricted funds in accordance with the charity's reserves policy (see below) in order that the Trust's increasing range of activities, both in terms of scope and geographical coverage, are supported by a strong financial base.

Reserves policy

The Charity shall establish and maintain a reserve target that reflects its financial needs, risk tolerance, and long-term goals. The reserve target shall be reviewed regularly and adjusted as necessary to align with the Charity's changing circumstances. To this end, the trustees aim to have six months' worth of staffing and normal operating costs, in reserve when practicable.

Plans for future periods

The charity will continue to deliver inclusive health, sports and physical activity related projects which provide educational inclusion opportunities for children, young people and adults.

In addition, we continue to develop our broader approach to health and wellbeing by developing services to support our community at the point of need.

This approach will be further strengthened by our commitment to monitoring, evaluation and impact, which will enable us to further understand the needs of our community with greater precision.

This work will feed into the development of our 'Strategy 2025-2030', which will outline the strategic vision, operational plan, and theory of change model for the organisation over the stated period.

As ever, we seek to strengthen relationships and partnerships across the City. As an example of this, we are set to join the Urban Learning Academy alliance, which seeks to improve life-long learning opportunities for all across Exeter.

In addition to this, we continue to strengthen relations with HMP Exeter and are currently in the process of designing a fitness, wellbeing and lifestyle intervention programme for inmates to be delivered as a pilot later this year.

As part of our Wellbeing and Inclusion programme, Alternative Education Provision continues to play a key role in our strategic development. Following both qualitative and quantitative measures to assess the needs of the community, this area of work is of increasing importance and so we will seek to provide a range of opportunities for young people in partnership with the English Football League Trust, the Youth Endowment Fund and the Chances project.

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is St James Park, Stadium Way, Exeter, Devon, EX4 6PX, UK.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. We confirm that there are no significant estimates and judgements.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Incoming resources

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, unless it reverses a charge for impairment that has previously been recognised as expenditure within the statement of financial activities. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, except to which it offsets any previous revaluation gain, in which case the loss is shown within other recognised gains and losses on the statement of financial activities.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

20/33% straight line

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

For impairment testing of goodwill, the goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the charity are assigned to those units.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost are reviewed for objective evidence of impairment at the end of each reporting date. If there is objective evidence of impairment, an impairment loss is recognised under the appropriate heading in the statement of financial activities in which the initial gain was recognised.

Any reversals of impairment are recognised immediately, to the extent that the reversal does not result in a carrying amount of the financial asset that exceeds what the carrying amount would have been had the impairment not previously been recognised.

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as an expense in the period in which it arises.

4. Limited by guarantee

The trust is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. In the event of the charity being wound up the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1.

Premier League Kicks

A project funded by the Premier League Charitable Fund together with match funding from a number of partners with the aim of using football to bring communities together and engage with young people. It involves football and other sports sessions and the encouragement of volunteering.

Disability Football/Sport

The fund balance represents the net book value of 2 power wheelchairs purchased with funding from Sport England, together with unspent income from grants received specifically for disability projects.

Every Player Counts

Funding for the development of disability football.

C Fraser Memorial Fund

Funding received in memory of Catherine Fraser to support an annual girls' football tournament.

Traineeships

Funding to give young people aged 16 to 18 the opportunity to gain work experience and learn new skills, offering career progression paths within a sport and leisure environment.

Clare Milne Trust

Funding for the purchase of power-chairs.

Sporting Memories

An initiative which uses the power of sports to help tackle dementia, depression and loneliness.

Covenant fund

A project to support veterans of all ages and from all sections of the armed forces who may be socially isolated, lonely and in need of additional support with either transition into civilian life or with regards re-connecting with old friends and building up their support systems.

Infrastructure grant

EFL Trust funding to assist with refurbishment works on the charity's office accommodation.

Exeter City Women

Financial support by means of grants, sponsorship and other operating income in respect of the operations of Exeter City Women FC.

Wellbeing Exeter

Funding to support individuals and communities in making physical activity part of their daily lives, and therefore improve their health and general wellbeing.

A service that provides a safe and secure home with support for people to move to independent living. Tenants will likely be homeless, at risk of being homeless, living in other temporary accommodation, victims of domestic violence or prison leavers.

Terry O'Neill Fund

A fund set up with a generous donation from the Terry O'Neill Trust Fund to help to buy football kit and to subsidise other sport and physical activity expenses for young people in need in Exeter.
