TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2019

The Trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements of the company for the 1 May 2018 to 30 April 2019. The Trustees confirm that the Annual Report and financial statements of the company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) as amended by Update Bulletin 1 (effective 1 January 2015).

Since the company qualifies as small under section 383, the strategic report required of medium and large companies under The Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Director's Report) Regulations 2013 is not required.

Objectives and Activities

a. POLICIES AND OBJECTIVES

The company's main aim is to share knowledge internationally about mental health in order to improve people's wellbeing. The objects of the charity are as follows:

To preserve and protect good mental health, in particular but not exclusively by:

- conducting study and research for the public benefit and publishing and disseminating the useful results;
- increasing awareness of mental health in its local, national and global context amongst health professionals, service providers and the public

b. ACTIVITIES FOR ACHIEVING OBJECTIVES

The charity encourages research, knowledge development and dissemination, policy development, and personal development, to promote culturally safe health and well being. In order to assist the charity in meeting the above objectives, they deliver this work through:

- high quality learning and teaching locally, nationally and internationally;
- research, evaluation and practice development into culture, health and wellbeing;
- providing international volunteering, exchange and twinning schemes, and promoting and developing positive practice on sports, young people and the wellbeing of individuals and communities.

c. MAIN ACTIVITIES UNDERTAKEN TO FURTHER THE CHARITY'S PURPOSES FOR PUBLIC BENEFIT

The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Trust's aims and objectives and in planning future activities and setting the grant making policy for the year.

The Trustees believe that the activities undertaken in the year for achieving the objectives of the Charity have met the public benefit requirement.

Achievements and performance

a. KEY FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE INDICATORS

The total incoming resources for the year were £661 (2018: £2,772), while total resources expended were £2,765 (2018: £5,957), leaving net outgoing resources of £2,104 (2018: £3,185). In financial terms, therefore, this has been a relatively quiet year for Careif. However, this does not reflect a lack of activity as a number of important projects and initiatives were in train.

b. REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES

The last twelve months have been marked by achievements but also challenges for Careif. The uncertainty created by the decision to leave the European Union has impacted adversely on the research community and the economy as a whole. In part, this explains difficulties in generating significant new income in the year to April 2019. However, there are successes to report. Three symposia were accepted from the charity for the World Association of Cultural Psychiatry meeting at New York in October 2018.

Our patron and administrator, Rick O'Shea, managing director of Renelec Groundworks, has been responsible for a number of fund-raising initiatives. The contribution of Queen Mary University of London in providing meeting facilities for Careif is also gratefully acknowledged.

There are some changes of personnel to report. After many years as Trustees, Dr Albert Chaitram Persaud, Prof Edgar Jones and Prof Kamaldeep Bhui resigned from Careif. Dr Shanaya Rathod and Mr Patrick O' Shea both became Trustees.

Following the hacking of the old Careif website in 2017 which rendered it beyond repair, the new version came on line in October 2018. An ongoing maintenance contract handled by Inbox Creative of Devizes to protect the website against future attacks has so far proven successful.

Financial review

a. GOING CONCERN

After making appropriate enquiries, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies.

b. RESERVES POLICY

The Trustees have examined the charity's requirements and are working together to develop a coherent forward plan for the charity. The present level of reserves stands at £99,645 (2018: £101,749) of which £72,562 (2018: £72,855) is restricted and therefore can only be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors. Taking this into consideration, it is the view of the Trustees that prudence is necessary to ensure that there are sufficient free reserves to provide financial flexibility over the next two to three years as the charity grows.

Structure, governance and management

a. CONSTITUTION

The company is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up under a Memorandum of Association, which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is goverened under its Articles of Association.

The company is constituted under a Trust deed and is a registered charity number 1121374.

The company was incorporated on 30 April 2007 and registered as a charity on 26 October 2007.

b. METHOD OF APPOINTMENT OR ELECTION OF TRUSTEES

New Trustees are appointed by the existing board at a meeting of the Committee. All new Trustees are provided with guidance obtained from the Charity Commission.

c. RISK MANAGEMENT

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the company is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the company, and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks.

Plans for future periods

a, FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

For the future, it is planned to publish a short version of Dr Jenny Willis' Wellbeing Survey and to embark on a broader, international study. There are also plans to publish the Careif Global Position Statements in a group format, marking the collective contribution of so many authors. The success of the Mental Health 4 Life website has prompted an initiative to explore the development of an App and we are seeking funding. The App would not only make the website more accessible, it would also raise the profile of Careif. We operate in increasingly uncertain times such that the need for the charity is heightened but so also the challenges facing its personnel.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

CAREIF meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

1.2 Company status

The company is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the Trustees named on page 1. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the company.

The address of the registered office is given in the company information page of these financial statements. The nature of the charity's operations and principal activities are preserve and protect good mental health.

1.3 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the company for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Income

All income is recognised once the company has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Income tax recoverable in relation to investment income is recognised at the time the investment income is receivable.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the company. Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the company and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Charitable activities and Governance costs are costs incurred on the company's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the company apportioned to charitable activities.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

All assets costing more than £500 are capitalised.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of financial activities incorporating income and expenditure account.

Tangible fixed assets are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

1.7 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the company; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

1.8 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

1.9 Cash at Bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.10 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the company anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

1.11 Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgment

Estimates and judgments are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

No judgements have been made in the process of applying the above accounting policies that have had any significant effect on amounts recognised in the financial statements, except for those detailed in the above accounting policies.

There are no key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.
