Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2017

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2017. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The vision that shapes our annual activities remains the building of resilient local communities in order to shape successful individuals. Young People Matter is committed to nurturing the potential of children, promoting healthy living and fostering a sense of social responsibility. Our mission is to help children, youth, their families and the community to fulfil their true potential.

The Charity's object and its principle activity continues to be a holistic approach to promoting and safeguarding the mental, physical, spiritual and moral development of children and young people whilst working in tangent with their families, schools and local community to develop opportunities that enhance their life skills and possibilities, reduce risk, and create responsible members of society. The Charity's aim is to positively impact communities.

When planning our activities for the year, the Charity has considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. The Charity is committed to nurturing the potential of children, promoting healthy living and fostering a sense of social responsibility through:

- Helping children and young people aged 3+.
- Providing childcare provisions for families.
- Developing the skills of young people in such a way that they are better able to identify and unlock their true potential so as to participate more fully in society. Advancing youth education particularly in sport, media and arts through the provision of curriculum enrichment programmes, schemes and training opportunities.
- Working with adults aged 18+ with the purpose of addressing unemployment through delivering proven, high quality programmes, volunteering opportunities, educational workshops and learning opportunities which help develop the skills and confidence needed to gain employment.
- To carry out other activities as considered appropriate, i.e. intergenerational programmes and family work in furtherance of said objectives.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2017

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Significant activities Our Programmes:

The Out of School Services and Provisions (OSSP) consist of after school clubs, breakfast clubs and holiday play schemes. These services operate a high quality, fun and safe, inspiring and engaging service for children and youth aged between 3 and 11. These services support families responding to childcare needs, enabling parents to confidently remain in employment posts. We currently have 5 afterschool clubs in lambeth

The Us LOT programme is a peer to peer mentoring programme designed to promote, support, nurture and facilitate the development of a new generation of dynamic leaders. Born from the proverbial philosophy of "Each One, Teach One", Us LOT focuses on personal development, academic achievement, community cohesion and teamwork. Young people aged between 14 and 24 are trained to harness their leadership skills to serve and inspire those around them. The programme helps to boost confidence and motivation whilst they develop new ideas and schemes participating in fun and adventurous activities.

Aspire to Elevate (AtE) is an innovative social enterprise training centre providing high quality training initiatives and work experience. AtE is designed to equip individuals, businesses, schools and groups with the expertise to improve individual performance by identifying skills gaps and training requirements to complement business' and individual's objectives. Professionally accredited courses are delivered in partnership with international awarding bodies and supports individuals into employment.

101 Community Challenge is the Charity's annual community give back programme. This programme gets young people involved in activities that give back to their communities such as feeding the homeless, fundraising for charities, caroling at residential care homes and an annual Santa grotto. Our long-term partnerships for this programme are Nando's Brixton, Ace of Clubs Shelter and SGWRA.

The Charity also conducted the following range of beneficial programmes and activities:

- Black History Residential to the International Slavery Museum, Liverpool. Theme: unsung heroes. Our spotlight shun on local Brixton activist, Olive Morris. This curriculum enriching programme combines the excitement of exploration and discovery with the sense of reward of successfully confronting and making sense of the complexity of race and history.
- Youth Club Nights for young people, to have a safe environment, weekly that they can attend, to learn, while having fun.
- Yearly 3 day residential trips to PGL for young people 12+

Growth:

Responding to the rising needs of the local community the Charity identified effective ways of supporting children and families by expanding our OSSP services. In September 2014 a new breakfast and after school club was introduced at Granton Primary School, Streatham. And now we have 5 After School clubs in Lambeth.

Community Cohesion:

Working with one of the Charity's principle partners, the Stockwell Gardens West Residents Association (SGWRA), we helped facilitate Santa's Grotto and senior luncheon at local tavern.

Partnerships Identified effective ways to support young people by increasing existing cooperative partnership work and developing new ones including: Hyde Housing, The Challenge, Granton Primary School, Young Lambeth Coop, London Youth, Horn of Africa, 4Children Lambeth, Oval Theatre, Pilot Light, Pandora's Box, Radio King Online, Nandos, Brixton, Ace of Clubs, and Vauxhall Food Bank.

Throughout the year, the Charity solidified support from local politicians and political affiliates including Pete Elliot (Green Party), Kate Howie MP (Labour)

and Larkhall ward councilors Andy Wilson, Tina Valcarcel and Marsha de Cardova who all made regular visits to the Old Laundry.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Charity constitution

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 5th November 2007 and registered as a charity on 16 March 2010. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event the company wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees (who are also the directors of Young People Matter Ltd for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Report of the Trustees and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice), including Financial Reporting Standard 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland".

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charity SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery - 25% on cost
Fixtures and fittings - 20% on cost
Motor vehicles - 20% on cost
Computer equipment - 25% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
