STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Foundation is a company limited by guarantee and is governed by its memorandum and articles of association

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Sylva Foundation is a registered company limited by guarantee (06589157), and a registered charity in England & Wales (No 1128516). We ensure the delivery of public benefit consistent with our charitable objects. These are to promote the conservation of the environment for the public benefit consistent with sustainable development principles by

1 promoting and conducting research for the public benefit about effective sustainable forest management and the dissemination of the useful results of such research, 2 advancing education for the public benefit in the theory and practice of sustainable forest management, 3 supporting the development and application of sustainable forest management for the public benefit

Our mission is to revive Britain's wood culture. The vision that steers our activities is that woodlands in Britain should thrive ecologically and economically for the benefit of everyone.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

STATEGIES

The strategies employed to achieve the charity's aims and objectives have been to divide our activities into three main programmes of work that relate directly to our three charitable objects (1) science, (2) education and (3) forestry

Science

The vast majority of woodlands in Britain are owned by private bodies or individuals, therefore any endeavour to improve the sustainable management of woodlands and the provision of public benefit is largely dependent on these woodland owners. This fact lies at the heart of much of Sylva's work, particularly the myForest Service (see below). However, little is known about the motivations, aspirations and knowledge of these woodland owners. Given that sound science is at the core of Sylva's work we we believe that our actions, and those of other stakeholders, should be evidence-based. For this reason we developed a survey to acquire up-to-date knowledge concerning private woodland ownership across the country in the British Woodlands Survey 2012. Funding was secured from the Royal Institute of Chartered Surveyors (RICS) Education Trust, Forestry Commission, Natural England, Woodland Trust and Institute of Chartered Foresters to develop the survey. Run during the summer of 2012, the online survey of of some 80 questions attracted 2600 respondents, representing about 7% of all privately-owned woodlands across Britain. The findings were presented in a conference hosted by the Department of Plant Sciences, University of Oxford, in December, attended by 120 people. A report presenting the full results, sponsored by RICS Education Trust, will be published in summer 2013 and made freely available online.

Our provision of the Sylva Scholarship at the Department of Plant Sciences, University of Oxford, continued with our first scholar, Kirsty Monk, successfully transferring to full DPhil status. The title of her research is The consequences of management and climate change for ecosystem function a case study of cord-forming fungi in English woodlands. The research is supported also by the Natural History Museum and Linacre College, Oxford. Field work has taken place in Wytham Woods and Blenheim Palace woodlands during the year, and a separate study completed on Lundy Island. Several papers have been written during the year and will be published in scientific journals later in 2013. This research project will conclude in Autumn 2013. Trustees have approved support for a second Sylva Scholar, to start work in Autumn 2013, studying the consequences of ash dieback Chalara fraxinea on ecosystem services in British woodlands. Efforts are being made to attract further funding to secure the scholarship in in perpetuity.

A new project was initiated during the year with support from Forestry Commission England, working in partnership with the Silvanus Trust, the Future Forests Network. It consists of an online database and map resource to enable Forest Research, together with private woodland owners, to indicate stands of trees that may thrive, in the light of environmental change, in our forests and woodlands in the future. The final product will be launched, as a freely accessible online tool, later in 2013.

Our online depository for forestry-related science, Forestry Horizons, continued to attract good numbers of visitors, with publications provided via a free access (where copyright permits) library linked to the Global Forest Information Service. A number of talks and presentations were given by Sylva staff during the year to promote the findings of our research activities. Collaboration with a BBSRC-funded project, studying enthusiasm in environmental volunteering, was initiated during the year, led by by Dr Hilary Geoghegan of University College London. Support for MSc student Dan Kinash, from Bangor University, was provided and resulted in a survey analysing fuelwood markets across Britain, the results will be published in 2013.

EDUCATION

Three years of educational activity following the life of a single oak tree, in the OneOak project, concluded in December 2012. The aim of the project was to use the life of the single tree as a story that exemplified the benefits of sustainable forest management, enabling effective communication to a wide audience. Some 50 items were eventually made from the OneOak tree ranging from the waste sawdust used by chef Raymond Blanc to smoke salmon, to a throne chair worth £6000, and dozens of other items including charcoal, wood block prints, tables, benches, door, house, boat, and woodchip for bioenergy. A series of exhibitions held during the year, including at the Oxford University Museum of Natural History, Art in Action and Blenheim Palace, ensured almost continuous exposure to a wide audience of several hundred thousand visitors. The final exhibition hosted by Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh (RBGE) saw all the items made from the OneOak tree brought together during a six week show at the John Hope Gateway Funding for the exhibition at RBGE was provided by the Scottish Forestry Trust Two members of staff from Sylva and the volunteer curator spent three days interacting with visitors following its opening Comments from members of the public were positive, both relating to the overall presentation of the exhibition, and its content and story Visitor numbers at the RBGE exhibition totalled 49,608. The exhibition was highlighted specifically in a report by Visit Scotland who were impressed by the quality of the OneOak exhibition and found it 'fascinating and worth visiting in itself. Head of Exhibitions at RBGE, commented that the exhibition was a "triumph". During the year the dedicated OneOak website attracted over 27,000 unique visits, and witnessed unprecedented social media activity www OneOak info The citizen science initiative TreeWatch continued to attract interest from members of the public. The pear rust survey, run in partnership with the Royal Horticultural Society, attracted keen interest, and data from the 2011 survey was shared on the open access National Biodiversity Network database. Two new surveys on oak tree health problems were developed jointly with Forest Research. The total number of trees 'adopted' by citizen scientists exceeded 1000 during the year. Future planned developments include a survey to enable members of the public to contribute to understanding of the impact of ash dieback Chalara fraxinea www TreeWatch com

A new education initiative was developed during the year to promote the theory and practise of sustainable forest management widely to a general public audience. It will consist of the publication of a book and a series of public exhibitions during 2014. The New Sylva book is being written jointly by our Chief Executive Gabriel Hemery and artist Dr Sarah Simblet. As part of this initiative Sarah was also appointed as Sylva's first Artist in Residence and, during her two year residency, she will produce a a unique catalogue of drawings celebrating Britain's trees and forests. The New Sylva book will be published by Bloomsbury Publishing in April 2014 to coincide with the 350th anniversary of John Evelyn's Sylva, published by the Royal Society in 1664. A series of exhibitions hosted by arboreta and botanic gardens is planned for 2014. Sylva will benefit from sales of the book and associated marketing activities, and will own a significant number of the original drawings made for The New Sylva www NewSylva com

A large number and diverse range of talks were provided by Sylva staff to members of the public about our work promoting the principles of sustainable forest management. These included events held at all the OneOak exhibition venues, to schools and colleges, and to members of various clubs and societies. Sylva attracted a total in excess of 130,000 unique visits to our suite of websites during the year.

FORESTRY

The report of the Independent Panel on Forestry in 2012, and subsequent forestry policy statement by Government, highlighted that about half of all woodlands in private ownership in England are either unmanaged or undermanaged, threatening the provision of ecosystem services and public benefit Sylva's main activity in supporting the development and application of sustainable forest management for the public benefit across Britain is via its myForest Service. This is a freely available online service that provides mapping and management tools for woodland owners. Numbers using the service continue to grow steadily at the end of the year 804 woodland owners, owning 1086 woodlands covering 18,307ha across Britain, were using the service. Collaboration with Forestry Commission England continued to ensure that woodland owners were encouraged and supported in drawing up management plans that were compliant with the UK Forestry Standard, and work continues to ensure, via working with a wide range of of partners, that we will support more woodland owners in bringing woodlands into good stewardship www myForest org uk

Support continued for the Ward Forester initiative in Devon, by providing tools linked to the myForest Service. The initiative encourages sustainable forest management by bringing woodland owners together under the stewardship of Ward Foresters. Support has been given to plans to roll the programme out across Britain during 2013. A Leader-funded project in south Oxfordshire was completed in May 2012 with 100 woodland owners in the region supported in the sustainable management of their woodlands.

A new project Good Woods was launched in January 2013 Sylva gained funding and support from home improvement and garden centre retailer B&Q to work jointly with sustainability charity Bioregional to improve the environmental, social, and economic values of woodlands in the east and south east of England. The aim of the 2013 project is to improve levels of woodland stewardship by providing 200 woodland owners with tools and training in woodland management, linked to the myForest service. Sylva will also be creating a new Woodland Star Rating scheme to encourage sustainable forest management in all woodlands, and promote greater understanding of good woodland stewardship among the general public. Other elements of the Good Woods project include building relationships between woodland owners and their local communities, supporting community woodland groups, and, understanding wood supply chain opportunities locally and nationally

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The Sylva Foundation has delivered a range of projects in line with its charitable objects. The structure and operations of the organisation has led to low project delivery costs by using in-house skills and the latest information technology, and working collaboratively with other organisations. Sylva has successfully diversified its income stream resulting in a significant rise in income through project delivery. This is in line with a small increase in expenditure compared to the previous year.

Sylva has improved its financial management systems, including implementing new financial software. The increase in income has led to Sylva becoming VAT registered.

The finances of the charity are overseen by a sub-group of trustees, and senior staff who meet on a quarterly basis. This group makes recommendations and reports to the Board of Trustees. The Board has compiled a Financial Strategy which is revised and updated at each meeting.

Reserves policy

The Trustees have set a Reserves Policy with a traget to raise £100,000 by the end of 2015, which represents up to six months expenditure. A significant amount has been raised to date. This is considered a realistic target that will be achieved through robust financial management.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

Plans for future periods

Under our science programme we will see the completion of our first Sylva scholarship project and the initiation of a new Scholarship project jointly with the University of Oxford. We will also be developing a new public participatory project looking at the potential role of minor forest tree species with a view to helping forests adapt to environmental change, working jointly with Forest Research and Silvanus Trust. A bid for European funding from Life+ has been submitted for a major new project concerning payment for ecosystem services, a decision is expected Summer 2013. We plan to develop further our science strategy during the year.

A new educational project is planned under the B&Q Good Woods project, aimed at 11-14 year old school children. Work on The New Sylva book, sponsored by the charity, will conclude in readiness for its publication in April 2014. A series of exhibitions around national venues to accompany the book, will be planned, also to take place in 2014. We hope to grow citizen science activities under our TreeWatch initiative, particularly via a new project that will work with members of the public and seek their help in identifying ash trees resistant to Chalara fraxinea.

Developments with our myForest Service will see continued enhancement of tools and resources to encourage sustainable forest management. Collaboration with the Forestry Commission, aiming to encourage more woodland owners to complete a UK Forestry Standard management plan, continues with the deadline of autumn 2013 for the launch of a new template by the commission. Work under the B&Q Good Woods project aims to meet a target of providing advice on sustainable forest management to 200 woodland owners across the south-east and east of England, representing 10,000 hectares, by January 2013. As part of this work we will also launch the Woodland Star Rating, aiming to encourage woodland owners to manage their resource sustainably according to recognised standards.

The trustees have initiated a new work programme in addition to those existing (namely science, education and forestry) This work will be delivered under a new charitable object

- advancing education and business enterprise in the design and production of home-grown wood products for the public benefit

We will be developing plans to promote the use of home-grown wood sourced from well-managed British forests, and to stimulate sustainable forest management and the rural economy. We will aim to provide skills & enterprise education in designing and making in wood to create successful home-grown wood businesses across Britain. Ultimately we will aim to stimulate an innovative culture in the design and use of home-grown wood.
