FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2015

The members present their report and accounts for the year ended 30 June 2015.

None of the members has any beneficial interest in the company. All of the members are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £1 in the event of a winding up.

The company is a not-for-profit company and any surpluses generated during a financial year can only be used to further the company's activities.

The members oversee the company's activities, but delegate day-to-day management to Julia Manning.

The members have assessed the major risks to which the company is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Objectives and activities

The company's objects are the promotion, study and assessment of past, current and proposed public health provision and social care in all their forms both in the UK and worldwide.

The policies adopted in furtherance of these objects are to empower those involved in frontline health provision, to improve access to public health services, to evaluate the effectiveness of technology in public health provision, to evaluate methods of funding public health provision, and to form and promote policy in public health provision.

Our strategic goals for 2014-15 were to:

- 1. Profile: Continue to raise our profile through the reputational quality of our work, clear communication and press coverage
- 2. Finance: Maintain income through sponsorship and membership
- 3. Structure: Ensure our structure puts us in the best possible position to use our reputation and to influence thinking and planning of NHS services and societal wellbeing

2020 Health aims to influence government health policy through its activities of holding expert debates, writing informed articles, conducting research studies and making presentations, all with the involvement of front-line professionals in the healthcare sectors.

We have continued to share office space in Great Portland Street at the kind invitation of Dr Mark Martin (of Cavendish Medical & Medical Family Finance and a Board member of 2020 Health) and the location is ideal for the company.

Research through the year included on obesity, HIV, childhood vaccination, "Head of Wellbeing", depression, diagnostics and the impact of technology in the optical and opthalmology sector. Our first AXA PPP Health Tech and You Awards, also in partnership with the Design Museum, saw 138 entries, 24 shortlisted technologies displayed at the Design Museum with 20,000 visitors to the exhibition, and an Awards Ceremony in March attended by Simon Stevens. As an organisation our stated modus operandi are researching, networking, campaigning and building relationships.

Strategic Goal 2: FINANCE - Maintain income in a challenging economic environment through sponsorship and membership

Our accounts for 2014-2015 reflect a return to a more stable year, with an overall turnover of £ 321,993 representing a 20% increase in income in the previous year, and a small surplus of £17,958. We have not used the overdraft facility; one loan was repaid, the other is half-way repaid and will be repaid in full in the next financial year.

The income and expenditure of the company during the year and the financial position at the end of the year are summarised in the attached accounts. It is the policy of the company that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. The members considers that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the company's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. The members aim to build the reserves up to this level in the future.

Strategic Goal 3: STRUCTURE - Ensure our structure puts us in the best possible position to use our reputation and to influence thinking and planning of NHS services and societal wellbeing

There have been no major staff changes during this year and we continue to benefit from a dedicated, talented team. We are very grateful to the board, staff and patrons for their support and hard work through what has been a challenging year.

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.
