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MEMBERS' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2014

The members present their report and accounts for the year ended 30 June 2014.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the constitution and the Companies Act 2006.

Structure, governance and management

The principal activity of the company continued to be that of promoting, studying and assessing public health provision and social care.

None of the members has any beneficial interest in the company. All of the members are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £1 in the event of a winding up.

The company is a not-for-profit company and any surpluses generated during a financial year can only be used to further the company's activities.

The members oversee the company's activities, but delegate day-to-day management to Julia Manning.

The members have assessed the major risks to which the company is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Objectives and activities

The company's objects are the promotion, study and assessment of past, current and proposed public health provision and social care in all their forms both in the UK and worldwide.

The policies adopted in furtherance of these objects are to empower those involved in frontline health provision, to improve access to public health services, to evaluate the effectiveness of technology in public health provision, to evaluate methods of funding public health provision, and to form and promote policy in public health provision.

Maintain income in a challenging economic environment through sponsorship and membership

Our accounting year begins in July but this annual report reflects two very different halves of this year. The first six months were marked by an unusual difficulty in obtaining sponsorship and grants that we had never experienced before.

This made cashflow in July-December very tight and we had to arrange an overdraft facility and gratefully accept two interest-free loans, which were both a first for the organization. We reviewed the staffing structure and streamlined activities using a new skill mix. We were given the opportunity to review our office base and we were delighted to be offered the chance of sharing office space in Great Portland Street at the invitation of Dr Mark Martin of Cavendish Medical & Medical Family Finance and a Board member of 2020health. We moved there at the end of January 2014.

Subsequently the following six months were very busy, with research on Obesity, Head of Wellbeing, Nutrition for people living with cancer, Access to physiotherapy and the Axa PPP Health Tech Awards partnership all commissioned and underway.

We remain registered with

Social Enterprise UK to reflect our not-for-profit status and the reinvestment of funds into our work, as well as the practical applications of our research.

Media review

The website continued to develop and improve, thanks to Richard Lucas and Angie Davis for their work on this. A summary of social media activity is as follows:

- Blog 96 posts over the year

15,721 views over the year

- Newsletter approx. 20 sent during the year to a minimum of 3k subscribers
- Facebook approx. 82 posts during the year

We once again took part in broadcasts with Sky News, BBC News, BBC The Big Question, LBC, BBC Radio London and BBC Radio Kent. Print coverage included all major newspapers. We took our media management in-house last year and have found we haven't needed to call on agencies for any large pieces of work – in addition a few companies have come to us asking for help with their publicity.

Finance

Strategic Goal 2: Maintain income in a challenging economic environment through sponsorship and membership

Our accounts for 2013-2014 reflect the two distinct halves of the accounting year, with an overall turnover of £266,923 and a small loss of £25,253. Although we had recourse to the overdraft this was soon cleared and no further use of it has been made. We have made good progress in repaying the loans which were interest-free. The first loan had been largely repaid by the end of June 2014, with payments on the second loan under way.

Given the situation during the first six months of this financial year the organisation has demonstrated an ability to secure new work in a challenging environment and been able to use the funds it has more efficiently. Overall the organisation is now in better shape than it has been for some time.

Structure and development

Strategic Goal 3: Ensure our structure puts us in the best possible position to use our reputation and to influence thinking and planning of NHS services and societal wellbeing

Dr Mark Martin was appointed to the Board on 22 July 2013.

Research Fellows – Jon Paxman and Matt James continued to make a huge contribution to our work, with each of them contributing to significant reports. Barbara Arzymanow continues to contribute, and Sarah Kershaw whose background is in public health and nutrition joined the team as a researcher. John Cruickshank continues as our health technology Consultant Director and Angie Davies continues to do a stalwart job on events and social media.

Our aim of harnessing technology to improve health was given a huge boost through the development of an initiative with Axa PPP and the Design Museum called "Health Tech and You" that will promote new digital technologies to the public.

Substantial progress was made in developing the concept of the Head of Wellbeing and this has turned into a major workstream.

We continue to work on a number of thematic issues.

We are grateful to the board, staff and patrons for their support and hard work through what has been a challenging year.

Financial review

The income and expenditure of the company during the year and the financial position at the end of the year are summarised in the attached accounts. As a result of the downturn and the subsequent actions taken the members consider the organisation is well placed to deliver a successful 2015/16.

It is the policy of the company that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. The members considers that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the company's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. The members aim to build the reserves up to this level in the future.

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

1.2 Incoming resources
