Trustees' Report For the year ended 31 December 2015

The Trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act) present their annual report together with the audited financial statements of Sky Blues in the Community (the charity) for the year ended 31 December 2015. The Trustees confirm that the Annual report and financial statements of the charity comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charity's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

Since the charity qualifies as small under section 383, the strategic report required of medium and large companies under The Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Director's Report) Regulations 2013 is not required.

Objectives and Activities

a. Policies and objectives

The principal object of the charity, in accordance with its memorandum of association, is to promote community participation in healthy recreation through football and other sports for the benefit of the public across Coventry and Warwickshire. In the furtherance of this object the directors, as the charity trustees, have compiled with the duty in Section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's published general and relevant sub-sector guidance concerning the operation of the Public Benefit requirement under the Act.

b. Strategies for achieving objectives

The charity's strategy for achieving this objective is to deliver projects and initiatives to people of all ages and all backgrounds across four themes; sport, education, health and inclusion.

Each of these themes has a strategic objective, which helps guide and influence the work the charity does;

- Sport increase opportunities to participate in sport and physical activity for people of all ages and abilities
- Health Promote an active, healthy and informed lifestyle, contributing to reduced health inequalities in our community
- Inclusion deliver innovative and attractive programmes to engage those from disadvantaged and excluded communities
- Education provide inspirational learning and personal development opportunities to raise aspirations, attainment and achievement.

c. Activities for achieving objectives

The significant activities for achieving the objectives are;

- to increase the opportunity for residents of Coventry and Warwickshire to participate in football and other sports, for a more physically active lifestyle
- to actively promote opportunities for disadvantaged and marginalised communities to participate in positive activities, regardless of age, gender, race, infirmity, disablement, poverty or social and economic circumstances
- to promote participation in healthy activities, through providing facilities for the playing of football and other sports, whilst improving health and awareness through a variety of mediums
- to advance the education and learning of children, young people, and adults by promoting accredited training and personal development opportunities
- working in partnership with key local, regional and national organisations to allow the company to achieve its charitable objectives and the listed activities

Achievements and performance

a. Review of activities

The last 12 months has seen a turnover of staff within the organisation, which has been used as an opportunity to regularly review the structure of the charity to ensure it remains relevant and fit for purpose. As part of this process, in 2015 Senior Management and Trustees took the decision to invest in a brand new position of Education Manager.

The organisation has four strategic themes (sport, health, education and inclusion), each with a Senior Manager in place — although previously the exception was education, where the work of the charity was limited without a dedicated resource.

A new Education Manager was recruited in August 2015 to help increase the amount of work the charity does in the area of training, attainment, personal development and qualifications.

This appointment now sees a senior management team comprised of two Directors and four theme managers.

All roles within the organisation are advertised on a national basis, to ensure that we get the best people for the roles that come up. This has led to some very successful recruitment in key positions over the last 12 months that leaves the charity currently with a strong staff pool, with expertise in a range of areas.

Our Senior Management Team, continue to represent the organisation locally, regionally and nationally in network and strategy groups for health, inclusion and sport – and with the successful appointment of an education manager, we now have a dedicated resource to drive our aim of becoming a key provider of alternative education programmes in Coventry and Warwickshire.

In what has been another successful year for the charity, the trustees believe the main achievements during the year can be broken down into the following themes:

Sport

We continue to deliver a wide variety of programmes in schools (curricular and extra-curricular), which brings us in to contact with thousands of children from all backgrounds every year.

Our work out of school has also increased, which allows us to provide year-round sporting activity for children and adults of all ages, fitness levels, sporting experience and abilities. The main areas of our work under our sport theme in 2015 have been:

- Schools working with over 40 primary and 20 secondary schools offering a range of sporting and fitness activities for children from reception to Year 13.
- Female Football Funded through the FA and Football League Trust this project has seen us work with over 200 teenage girls to promote physical activity and football.
- Girls Football League As a result of the female football project we have now set up a secondary schools' girls football league with 17 schools and over 140 players regularly taking part that don't otherwise do physical activity
- Development Centres Our development centre programme continues to be successful, with around 500 children taking part every week. The initiative is now linked with a school sport project funded by the Premier League Charitable Fund, which sees us provide PE lessons free to over 30 schools and over 2,000 children in Coventry and Warwickshire Health

We continue to deliver a range of successful health projects, all of which have a strong monitoring and evaluation framework behind them, which helps to evidence the impact of our work.

In 2014 we were awarded a small grant to deliver an extra-curricular secondary school project to increase levels of physical activity in young women. This project was used as a pilot for a larger grant application to run a women and girl's health and fitness programme, which was awarded a grant of £201,664 by Sport England.

- Healthy schools' projects our Kinder + Sport 'Move and Learn' and Fit 4 Life projects continue to offer healthy lifestyles activities and learning for children at primary schools across Coventry and Warwickshire
- InForm Our men's health 'InForm' project continues to run successfully, providing football and men's health workshops for different groups including open access sessions, those with mental health considerations, homeless men and older people
- In It Together Is our new Sport England-funded project that provides informal physical activity and health awareness sessions for young women and adult women across Coventry, targeting delivering activities in areas of deprivation.

Education

As of July 2015, we have completed the recruitment for an Education Manager, which will allow us to develop a range of education initiatives and to really drive our work under the education theme over the next 12 months.

We have kindly been supported by Midshire Business Solutions who have become a sponsor through their corporate social responsibility supporting our work across our education theme.

During the second half of 2015 there were a small number of education projects that we had started or continued delivering:

- Raise Your Game a programme aimed at young people on the verge of exclusion from school, to help improve behaviour and provide an alternative learning environment helping to re-engage them back in to the mainstream school environment
- Premier League Reading Stars A project that works with primary age children who are struggling with their numeracy and literacy levels
- BTEC We continued to deliver our Level 2 and Level 3 BTEC qualifications in partnership with Henley College and we are now tutoring on a Level 1 entry course for NEET young people at the college Coach Education Scheme Following on from its success in 2014, we continue to run football coaching, first aid and welfare coaching qualifications in partnership with Henley College for local volunteers at grassroots football clubs.

During 2016 we will be looking to identify further funding opportunities to continue to grow and develop our education offer across Coventry and Warwickshire.

Inclusion

2015 has been another successful year in terms of our inclusion offer. During the financial year there were a small number of project grants that ceased, primarily 'On Target' funding from the Football League, BBC Children in Need and disability project funding. Funding was secured through other sources to continue these project activities. As with previous years our 'inclusion' offer for young people and those with a disability continues to run successfully impacting on a large number of marginalised individuals.

Our headline activities under the Young People element of our inclusion offer during 2015 have been:

- Kicks project One of our biggest projects engaging over 700 young people during the year providing diversionary and personal development opportunities for young people aged 13-19
- On the Ball funded by Children in Need this project provides free activities for children in 14 areas of deprivation across Coventry and Warwickshire. Funding for this project has been confirmed for a further three years from 2015 2018
- #UCan The 'UCan' project sees us work in partnership with Coventry City Council, Coventry Sports Foundation and the Positive Youth Foundation to deliver community sport and physical activities for residents of the Foleshill and Henley wards. This partnership project won the 'Community Project of the Year' award at the regional CSW Sports Awards in November which is the third consecutive year that Sky Blues in the Community has won this award.

Alongside Young People, our inclusion theme also includes disability provision. Our key delivery for people with disabilities in 2015 has been:

- Disability Teams we run a number of football teams for people with a range of disabilities from junior to adult men and women. These teams play regularly in friendly games and competitions representing Coventry City FC
- Disability Football Development This project allows us to work with specific disability groups or organisations free of charge for a period of 20 weeks, with the option to then signpost these participants in to our more long-term disability activities
- Special Education Needs Schools and Colleges We work with a number of SEN schools and colleges across Coventry and Warwickshire running extra-curricular activities for children and young adults in sport and other activities
- Specialist sessions We run some disability-specific activities on a weekly basis including Power chair football, working with those with Down's syndrome and learning disabilities

b. Factors relevant to achieve objectives

Financial review

a. Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies.

b. Financial review

The charity generated a surplus of £16,161 in the financial year. At the year end, the charity had restricted reserves of £133,135 (2014: £111,081) and unrestricted reserves of £69,270 (2014: £76,163). The cash at bank balance has increased from £143,033 in 2014 to £160,051 in 2015.

c. Principal risks and uncertainties

The principal risk faced by the charity is the potential loss of funding. However, the Premier League have confirmed funding for the next financial year. The charity also receives funding from other organisations and generates other funding

d. Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to six month's core expenditure. The Trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities whilst consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised.

e. Principal funding

As always the charity is extremely grateful for the funding we receive from a number of organisations that allow us to deliver our work. During 2015, those funders included:

Once again, grant funding and commissioning has significantly increased the range and diversity of our charitable activities taking place across Coventry and Warwickshire, and is having a significant impact on the lives of a large number of local residents of all ages.

Structure, governance and management

a. Constitution

The charity is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association on 7 July 2008.

The charity is a registered under the charity number 1127014.

The principal object of the charity is to benefit the inhabitants of Coventry and the surrounding area by promoting community participation in healthy recreation by providing facilities in for the playing of association football and other sports capable of improving health and education.

b. Method of appointment or election of Trustees

The management of the charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Articles of Association.

New Trustees are recruitment at the invitation of the current Trustees and are appointed as Trustees when such appointment has been approved by all the existing Trustees. The number of Trustees shall be not less than three but is not subject to any maximum.

c. Policies adopted for the induction and training of Trustees

Newly appointment Trustees are provided with a thorough introduction to the workings of the charity and are provided with all necessary information which will enable them to properly fulfil their role as Trustees.

d. Organisational structure and decision making

The Board of Trustees are the ultimate controlling party of the charity but they have delegated responsibility for the day-to-day management of the charity to the Director of Operations and the Director of Business Development.

In 2015 a new organisational risk register was written by the Directors, which outlines a number of areas of risk, how these will be mitigated and managed, as well as outlining the staff and trustee responsibilities. The subject of risk is now a standard agenda item at trustee meetings with the risk register continuously updated.

Organisational changes

It has been a year of consolidation for the charity, with a number of grants and commissioned work coming to an end during 2015. The financial implications for the charity with grants coming to an end has been minimised, primarily through the Directors maintaining a financial risk register and subsequently identifying and accessing new funds to continue the breadth of work undertaken by the charity.

2015 has seen a number of changes to the Board of Trustees, with the resignations of Chairman Alan Shaw, Sandra Garlick and Steve Waggott.

Nick Newbold has stepped in to the position of Chair on a short-term basis, whilst a suitable long-term Chair is recruited. It was agreed at the most recent trustee meeting in March 2016 that a recruitment process for a new chair and new trustees would now take place.

Sky Blues in the Community staff and trustees would like to place on record their thanks to those Trustees no longer with the charity, for their hard work and dedication in continuing to move the charity forward and develop in recent years.

As we move in to 2016, the Trustees are keen to ensure that the charity continues to grow in terms of delivery, but also to ensure that all staffing, processes and procedures are in place to allow the charity to run safely and effectively.

e. Risk management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charity, and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks.

f. Public benefit

The Trustees have each received the Charity Commission's guidelines on public benefit and this forms part of the induction pack for new Trustees.

The charity uses the brand of Coventry City Football Club to help achieve its mission of helping people to take part in a physically active, healthy and informed lifestyle, whilst providing an environment that encourages learning, personal development and personal achievement.

Plans for future periods

a. Future developments

2015 saw us enter the third and final year of our 2012-2015 strategy, which is continuously monitored by our Board of Trustees to measure our performance against our objectives.

During that period, the organisation has grown in size and turnover significantly. The start of 2016 will see the organisation develop a new three-year business plan and strategy document, which is in line with some funding opportunities that will become open to us in the second half of 2016.

With a number if funded projects due to come to an end in 2016, senior management have been looking at continuation funding and other means of sustaining activities and the work of the organisation.

It has been recognised that there is a need to diversify and increase the amount of unrestricted funds, so the organisation doesn't become over-reliant on grant income.

As part of the new business plan and strategy, there are a number of new initiatives that have been identified and that are currently in development that will support the generation of unrestricted income.

Trustees' responsibilities statement

The Trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charitable company's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

1. Accounting Policies

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006

Sky Blues in the Community meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

1.2 Reconciliation with previous Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

In preparing these accounts, the Trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 the restatement of comparative items was required.

No restatements were required.

1.3 Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the Trustees named on page 1. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10 per member of the charity.

1.4 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Investment income, gains and losses are allocated to the appropriate fund.

1. Accounting Policies (continued)

1.5 Income

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Gifts in kind donated for distribution are included at valuation and recognised as income when they are distributed to the projects. Gifts donated for resale are included as income when they are sold. Donated facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified and a third party is bearing the cost. No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers.

Donated services or facilities are recognised when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use of the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), the general volunteer time of the Friends is not recognised and refer to the Trustees' report for more information about their contribution.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

Other income is recognised in the period in which it is receivable and to the extent the goods have been provided or on completion of the service.

1.6 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. All expenses including support costs and governance costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure headings.

Charitable activities costs

These are costs incurred on the charity's activities within the community.

Support costs

Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity and include project management carried out at the charity's main office.

Governance costs

Governance costs are those incurred in connection with the administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

1. Accounting Policies (continued)

1.7 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

All assets costing more than £150 are capitalised.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

Equipment

25% straight line

Motor vehicles

25% reducing balance

Computer equipment

25% straight line

1.8 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

1.9 Operating leases

Rentals under operating leases are charged to the Statement of financial activities on a straight line basis over the lease term.

1.10 Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value after making due allowance for obsolete and slow-moving stocks. Cost includes all direct costs and an appropriate proportion of fixed and variable overheads.

1.11 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount repaid net of any trade discounts due.

1.12 Cash at Bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.13 Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

1.14 Pensions

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the charity to the fund in respect of the year.

Coventry City Football Club Limited (CCFC)

The charity is granted free access to webspace on the club website and editorial space in the match day programmes.

The charity receives 5000 vouchers, free of charge, from CCFC annually. These can be redeemed within the CCFC shop; where they can be used on match day tickets.

The above donated assets and services are not included in the statement of financial activities as the charity is unable to reasonably quantify or measure the value of these donations.

CCFC also donated staff kit amounting to £5,000. As the value of these items could be quantified, this has been reflected within the statement of financial activities.

The charity received in kind benefits from Coventry City Council for the Inform project valued at £2,407 (2014: 2,407).

The charity received in kind benefits from Radford Community Sports, John White Community Centre and other schools relating to the 'In It Together Project' valued at £2,341.

22. Related party transactions

The charity delivers its community initiatives on behalf of Coventry City Football Club Limited (CCFC). The football club is therefore considered to be a related party of the charity.
