OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES FOR THE PUBLIC BENEFIT

The Foundation's objectives are for the benefit of the public generally and, in particular, the inhabitants of Cardiff and its surrounding areas:

- To promote community participation in healthy recreation by providing facilities for the playing of association football and other sports capable of improving health ('facilities' in this case means land, buildings, equipment and organising sporting activities).
- To provide and assist in providing facilities for sport, recreation or other leisure time occupation of such persons who have need for such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, poverty or social and economic circumstances or for the public at large in the interests of social welfare and with the object of improving their conditions of life;
- To advance the education of childhood and young people through such means as the trustees think fit in accordance with the law of charity; and
- For the general purposes of such charitable bodies or for such other exclusively charitable purposes in each case as the trustees may from time to time decide.

The trustees confirm that they have had regard to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Foundation's aims and objectives and in planning new activities.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE (2015/16)

At Cardiff City FC Community Foundation, we understand that sport has the ability to influence individuals and communities to create a healthier, wealthier, more cohesive and active population. The partnership with Cardiff City FC, in conjunction with the delivery of effective programmes, enables us to change lives.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 August 2016

We are proud to deliver a diverse range of programmes including national initiatives, such as Premier League Kicks, and local interventions such as our Strikers Traineeship. In 2015/16 we provided 237,147 hours of activity and engaged more than 12,000 unique participants.

Our activities centred around four key themes

- Education
- Inclusion
- Sport
- Health

Education

Key projects within our education programme include; the Foundation Degree in Community Football Coaching and Development in partnership with University of South Wales and the English Football League Trust (EFLT); the EFLT Futsal programme offering a BTEC Level 3 in Sport (Performance and Excellence) in partnership with Cardiff & the Vale College; our Football Performance Centres offering participants the opportunity to train and compete in football alongside gaining a BTEC Level 3 in Sport (Performance and Excellence); and the BTEC Level 2 in partnership with Fitzalan High School.

Major successes include our excellent attendance, retention and progression outcomes. Learners who have attended our courses have successfully progressed onto employment and further education studying at Cardiff Metropolitan University, University of Bath, Edge Hill Liverpool and University of South Wales. Learners have also progressed onto sporting scholarships in the USA studying at St Leo University Florida and King University, Tennessee.

Inclusion

Key projects in our inclusion programme include; Premier League Works, an employability support programme; Premier League Kicks, a project offering free sports coaching to people aged 14 - 19; Strikers Traineeship; Fitzalan Pupil Referral Unit; and The Prince's Trust 'Get Into' courses, a 3-week project designed to prepare 16 - 25 year olds for employment.

Major successes include the volume of participants who have progressed onto employment following their attendance on Princes Trust Fairbridge and 'Get Started with' courses working with NEET young people. Our Premier League Kicks programme successfully engaged with young people to reduce anti-social behaviour and offer accreditation, awards, voluntary work and employment.

Sport

Key projects in our sports programme include; One City, One Club, One Community; Premier League Schools; Premier League & PFA All Skilled Up literacy project; soccer schools; match day activities; disability football and women & girls football.

Our equality and diversity work includes our disability and women & girls' programmes. Coaches working on our disability programme worked with participants across a number of impairment groups including: deaf, learning disability, physical disability, down's syndrome, pan & visual impairment. Over 300 participants engaged in our women and girls programme with a pathway from curriculum coaching into our senior women's team.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 August 2016

Our work in Primary Schools centred around three key projects. The One City, One Club, One Community project worked with 76 schools in Cardiff to provide multi-sport opportunities for Key Stage 1 & 2 pupils. The Premier League Schools programme provided football coaching for over 2500 children in 51 schools in RCT, Merthyr, the Vale of Glamorgan & Caerphilly. The Premier League & PFA funded literacy project provided an alternative intervention to improve literacy levels amongst 1400 Key Stage 2 pupils in RCT, Merthyr & Bridgend.

Over 5000 people engaged in our match day activities which support local clubs, members of the community and charities to experience the unique atmosphere of a professional football club.

Health

Our health offer launched in 2015/16 and uses sport as a tool to improve physical and mental health.

Our walking football sessions provide opportunities for older people or those who have mobility impairments to re-engage with football and operate at two sites, Cardiff City House of Sport and Abertillery.

Our 'Active Afternoon' sessions in conjunction with the Huggard Centre, Cardiff, provide fun physical activity sessions for those with specific mental health challenges.

A new partnership with FAW Trust and Time to Change Wales provides weekly multi sport activities for mental health at patients at Landough Hospital.

FINANCIAL REVIEW & FINANCIAL POSITION

A summary of the charity's incoming resources and amounts expended during the financial period can be found on page 9 of the accounts.

Over the financial period we have seen a sustained improvement in our overall financial position.

A new senior management team was appointed in September 2015 and, with the support of the board of trustees, implemented a series of changes to the operational activities and financial modelling of the charity. This included reducing core and operating costs, improving margins and increasing fundraising activities through events and challenges.

Total incoming resources amounted to £1,699,614 with £523,976 comprising grants for specific purposes. The balance of £1,175,638 representing unrestricted income comprised of £837,571 project funding and £338,067 general donations. Donations totalling £276,000 were gifted by Cardiff City FC.

Total resources expended amounted to £1,564,508 with £1,242,808 of this being directly on charitable activities and £321,700 to support the delivery services to users and beneficiaries.

The net movement in funds was a surplus of £135,106. The balance sheet at 31 August 2016 shows positive funds carried forward of £40,684.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 August 2016

Reserves Policy

The board of trustees have examined the requirement for free reserves i.e. those unrestricted funds not invested in tangible fixed assets, designated for specific purposes or otherwise committed. The trustees consider that, given the nature of the charity's work, and its dependency on grant funding, the level of free reserves should be between 3 and 6 months' expenditure on unrestricted funds. The trustees are of the opinion that this provides sufficient flexibility to cover temporary shortfalls in incoming resources due to timing differences in income flows, adequate working capital to cover core costs, and will allow the charity to cope and respond to unforeseen events whilst specific action plans are implemented. The Business Plan sets out the arrangements for improving the level of free reserves.

OUR ORGANISATION

Structure, Governance & Management

Cardiff City FC Community Foundation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on January 22, 2009 and registered as a charity on March 6, 2009. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

Appointment of Trustees

The trustees who are directors for the purpose of company law and trustees for the purpose of charity law, who served during the year and up to the date of this report, are set out on page 1. Following an open recruitment process, new trustees are appointed upon the recommendation of existing trustees. One third of the trustees must retire at each annual general meeting and offer themselves for re-election.

The board of trustees was strengthened during the year to include individuals with the right balance of skills, knowledge and experience to meet the needs of the organisation and reflect the diverse communities the charity engages with. Expertise added to the board of trustees includes Human Resources, Financial Management, Local Government and Social Housing.

In order to further strengthen the governance of the charity, the board of trustees established a Finance, Audit & Risk Sub Committee and a Programmes & Partnerships Advisory Group. Membership of these groups includes trustees, staff and independent industry expertise.

Risk Management

The trustees have examined the major strategic business and operational risks which the Foundation faces and confirm that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen their risks.

The trustees are aware of the strict safeguarding procedures necessary when working with children under the age of sixteen years, including DBS checks and are involved in these procedures as appropriate. The trustees are aware of the importance of compliance with Health & Safety regulations by all staff, volunteers and participants.

Key Partnerships

The Foundation's success is built upon a long standing relationship with Cardiff City FC. Our strategic partnerships include the Premier League Charitable Fund, the English Football League Trust, Cardiff & Vale College, University of South Wales, ACT, and an array or community groups and local businesses.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees (who are also the directors of Cardiff City FC Community Foundation for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Report of the Trustees and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charity SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In so far as the trustees are aware:

- there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditors are unaware; and
- the trustees have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditors are aware of that information.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 August 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charity has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemption in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery

- 25% reducing balance

Motor vehicles

- 25% reducing balance

Computer equipment

- 25% straight line

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Notes to the Financial Statements - continued for the Year Ended 31 August 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
