Executive Summary

Cardiff City FC Community Foundation (the Foundation) is the official charity of Cardiff City FC. Established in 2009, our mission is to use the unique appeal of Cardiff City FC to change lives. Put simply, 'our club changes lives'.

We launched a new five-year strategy in 2017 which sets out our ambitious plans for the future. Our goal is to support children, young people and families in South Wales to achieve their full potential. We focus on three key outcomes; health & wellbeing, education and employment and reducing offending and reoffending.

As the official charity of Cardiff City FC we occupy a position at the heart of communities across South Wales. We are the largest sport for social good charity in South Wales with an unrivalled reputation for providing sport and education activities.

Our activities, projects and services are grouped into three departments: education, inclusion, sport and health.

Objectives and Activities for the Public Benefit

The Foundation's objectives are for the benefit of the public generally and, in particular, the inhabitants of Cardiff and its surrounding areas:

- To promote community participation in healthy recreation by providing facilities for the playing of association football and other sports capable of improving health ('facilities' in this case means land, buildings, equipment and organising sporting activities).
- To provide and assist in providing facilities for sport, recreation or other leisure time occupation of such persons who have need for such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, poverty or social and economic circumstances or for the public at large in the interests of social welfare and with the object of improving their conditions of life;
- To advance the education of childhood and young people through such means as the trustees think fit in accordance with the law of charity; and
- For the general purposes of such charitable bodies or for such other exclusively charitable purposes in each case as the trustees may from time to time decide.

The trustees confirm that they have had regard to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Foundation's aims and objectives and in planning new activities.

Key Achievements and Performance 2017/18

The strategy and business plan identify three outcomes (strategic objectives) and five pillars (business objectives) for the period. This review sets out the key achievements and performance against the outcomes and business objectives:

Participation

During the year the Foundation engaged with 13,440 participants. This exceeded our engagement target of 12,000 participants.

Education & Employment

Improved attitude towards and enjoyment of learning - 70% of participants engaged in literacy interventions through Primary Stars reported an increase in confidence in reading. 71% reported an increase in confidence in writing. 90% of participants engaged in our Primary Stars transition project reported an increase in motivation towards learning.

Increased educational attainment - 100% of participants in our Futsal BTEC Level 3 achieved their qualification.

Progressions into education, employment & training - 97% of Futsal BTEC Level 3 participants progressed into further education, employment or training.

Health and Wellbeing

Improved Physical and Mental Health - 70% of participants attending our Premier League Girls sessions reported an increase in self-confidence.

Increased Physical Activity - 86% of participants in our Active Bluebirds programme reported increased physical activity levels. 56% of participants attending our Bluebirds Ability football sessions for children with a disability reported an increase in physical activity.

Improved understanding of health issues and risks - 58% of participants in +Sport Move and Learn reported they felt happy that they understand the importance of a healthy diet.

Reduced offending and reoffending

Increased opportunities for participation in safe activities - 50% of participants attending Premier League Kicks reported they were more confident to go out in their community.

Reducing anti-social behavior - 13% of participants attending Premier League Kicks reported that if they weren't at the sessions, they would be getting in trouble.

Insight and impact at the heart of our organisation

During the year we implemented a new theory of change and outcomes framework. The theory of change visualises the change we want to make and the steps involved in that change. The outcomes framework is designed to help us measure the outcomes we are supporting beneficiaries to achieve.

A diverse skilled and passionate workforce

We achieved Investors in People Silver Accreditation in March 2018 and launched our first employee engagement survey in June 2018. Our people told us that they are proud that our work changes lives and feel that they make an important contribution.

Celebrating success

We celebrated the achievements of our beneficiaries through stories, case studies and celebration events including our annual Foundation Day in March 2018. We began to work more closely with stakeholders to share our story.

Social impact within a financially sustainable model

We continued to achieve impact within a financially sustainable model and build reserves to a suitable level.

Governance & Safeguarding

We improved our framework of controls and risk management to create safer more positive environments for children, young people and adults at risk. We reviewed the skills, experience and knowledge required by the board of trustees and recruited new trustees to meet skills gaps.

Activities, Products and Services Provided in 2017/18

Sport & Health

Primary Stars - Premier League Primary Stars supports Primary School children to learn, be active and develop life skills; using the inspiration of the Premier league and Cardiff City FC to inspire children to engage in Physical Education and literacy through lively classroom, playground and sports field lessons.

+Sport Move and Learn - The + Sport Move and Learn Project is an initiative designed to encourage active lifestyles amongst children and families. The programme offers classroom activities about the body, nutrition and exercise and sports activities delivered in the playground, sports hall or on the sports field.

Premier League Girls - Premier League Girls provides opportunities for females aged 11 to 19, who are not currently taking part in regular sports activities, to take part in fun, flexible weekly sports activities in the heart of their communities.

Bluebirds Ability - Bluebirds Ability is an inclusive football programme providing essential access to sport and physical activity for children and young people with a disability. The programme aims to increase physical activity, enhance social skills and build confidence to try new activities.

Walking Football - Walking football provides opportunities for people to participate in football at a slower pace and aims to increase physical activity and improve social networks amongst the over 45's.

Sporting Memories - Sporting Memories is a programme which supports older people living with dementia, depression and loneliness and their families by engaging them in social activities and helping them to recall memories of watching or playing sport. By sharing memories of sporting moments and tapping into a passion for sport we help people to connect with others and with their past, reawakening positive thoughts and feelings that otherwise remain hidden away.

Bluebirds Experiences

Match-day Activities - Our match day experiences offer children aged 4 - 11 the opportunity to lead the Bluebirds out on to the pitch, wave the Bluebirds flag, play on the pitch or celebrate a birthday at the Cardiff City Stadium.

Soccer Schools - Soccer Schools are school-holiday activities offering structured football coaching, fun football activities and small sided games for 4 - 16 year olds in a safe fun environment.

Education

Strikers Traineeship - The Strikers Traineeship is an education and training programme which prepares young people for their future careers by helping them become work ready. Our 12-week engagement programme offers young people the opportunity to unlock their potential without the pressure to achieve qualifications, focusing on developing soft skills within a flexible environment. Our 24-week Level 1 programme offers a programme of study and practical experience tailored for a career in the Sport and Active leisure sector. Students complete a BTEC Level 1 in Sport qualification and take part in work experience opportunities.

Futsal BTEC - The Futsal BTEC is an education programme offering students aged 16 - 19 the opportunity to achieve vocational qualifications whilst representing Cardiff City FC in the National Futsal League against other Premier League and English Football League Clubs. The programme offers a BTEC Level 2 and BTEC Level 3 Extended Diploma in Sport (Performance & Excellence), the equivalent of three A-Levels.

Foundation Degree - The Foundation Degree in Community Football Coaching & Development is a 2-year programme, with the option of a one year top up to BSc, offering students the opportunity to gain industry recognised coaching awards whilst studying with the Cardiff City FC Community Foundation. This unique course is aimed at aspiring football coaches and development officers, who during their studies will have the opportunity to access invaluable work experience with the Cardiff City FC Foundation.

Inclusion

PL Kicks - Premier League Kicks is a youth outreach programme, which uses the power of football to connect with young people living in high need areas. The programme aims to create safer, stronger and more respectful communities through the development of young people's potential and tackle inequalities of participation in sport.

Premier League Enterprise Challenge - Premier League Enterprise Challenge is an annual football business challenge set by the Premier League. The programme aims to inspire young people to engage in education, develop enterprise skills and important life skills. School children participate in the challenge and pitch their business solutions to a panel of experts.

Premier League Employability - Premier League Employability uses the power of professional football clubs to engage with offenders aged 18 - 24. The programme offers a mix of personal and social skill development and employability skills giving them the confidence and the experience they need to make a positive transition back into education, employment or training and reduce reoffending post-release.

The Back Four - The Back Four is an employability programme which uses the power of football to support young people furthest from the job market into unsupported employment. The programme offers a mix of soft skill development and employability enhancement with a view to opening doors for further training, volunteering or employment opportunities for the young people.

Financial Review and Financial Position

Financial performance in 2017/18 was broadly in line with the business plan and saw a continued improvement in our overall financial position.

Total incoming resources amounted to £1,491,844 (2017 - £1,430,491) with £619,389 (2017 - £597,449) comprising grants for specific purposes. The balance of £872,455 (2017 - £833,042) representing unrestricted income comprised of £683,061 (2017 - £761,911) project funding and £189,394 (2017 - £71,131) general donations.

Income from charitable activities remained consistent with the previous year and totalled £1,302,450 (2017 - £1,359,360).

Direct fundraising from the general public is a relatively minor part of the charity's activities. There was, however, a significant increase in revenue from donations due to a major corporate gift/donation from Cardiff City FC. This contributed to a large annual surplus and improved balance sheet position.

Total resources expended amounted to £1,301,830 (2017 - £1,284,513) with £1,114,414 (2017 - £1,007,176) of this being directly on charitable activities, £143,919 (2017 - £277,337) to support the delivery of services and £43,497 (2017 - £0) on fundraising costs. Expenditure on education activities totaled £330,887 (2017 - £233,580), expenditure on inclusion activities totaled £208,081 (2017 - £235,780) and expenditure on sport and health activities totaled £281,627 (2017 - £263,108).

The net movement in funds was a surplus of £190,014 (2017 - £145,978). The balance sheet at 31 August 2018 shows positive funds carried forward of £376,676 (2017 - £186,662), comprising £346,084 unrestricted funds and £30,592 restricted funds.

Principle Funding Sources

The principle funding providers of the Foundation are the Premier League Charitable Fund, Cardiff City FC, the English Football League Trust and local colleges and training providers.

Reserves Policy

The board of trustees reviews the charity's reserves policy annually in regard to the changing financial, regulatory and competitive environment. In considering the level of free reserves the charity should hold, a number of factors are considered including but not limited to, current and anticipated levels of income and expenditure, liquidity and non-monetary assets, risks, opportunities and contingencies.

The overall aim is to use funds carefully to further our charitable objectives whilst maintaining a prudent level of free reserves.

The trustees' consider that given the nature of the charity's work, the charity should hold free reserves equivalent to between three to six months unrestricted expenditure. The trustees are of the opinion that this provides sufficient flexibility to cover temporary shortfalls in incoming resources due to timing differences in income flows, adequate working capital to cover core costs, and will allow the charity to cope and respond to unforeseen events whilst action plans are implemented.

Significant progress has been made over the previous three financial years to improve the level of free reserves. Our financial policies, procedures and future plans will ensure that reserves levels remain in line with the policy. The level of free reserves at year end was £318,355.

Future Plans

Future plans and activities include:

- Extending the reach of our successful early years and primary education offer including the transition to secondary school;
- Extending our post-16 education offer by providing new vocational training opportunities;
- Ensuring our activities and services are more inclusive, particularly for people with a disability;
- Embedding our outcomes framework so that we can more accurately measure and report impact;
- Continuing to develop the skills and experience of our workforce as coaches, teachers, youth workers and mentors:
- Raising awareness of our activities through a series of media events and activities including celebrating our 10th anniversary;
- Developing a new fundraising plans;
- Ensuring that we maintain the highest standards of safeguarding and providing safe positive environments for children, young people and adults at risk.

There are no significant factors at present that could impact the ability to achieve outcomes and business objectives in the future. However, the current economic and political climate coupled with the risk of variable and uncertain income streams need to be closely monitored through the Foundation's risk management processes.

Structure, Governance & Management

Governing Document

Cardiff City FC Community Foundation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on January 22, 2009 and registered as a charity on March 6, 2009. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objectives and powers of the company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

The charity trustees for the purpose of charity law are also the directors for the purpose of company law.

Under the Articles of Association, the board of trustees shall not be less than seven and shall consist of up to three trustees appointed by Cardiff City FC and four or more charity trustees appointed by the trustees. Trustees are appointed for a term of three years and may serve a maximum of three consecutive terms.

In selecting individuals for appointment as trustees, the trustees give regard to the skills, knowledge and experience needed for the effective governance of the Foundation.

The trustees' who served during the year and up to the date of this report, are set out on page 1.

Trustee Induction and Training

Trustees receive an induction and accompanying Trustee Good Governance Handbook on their appointment to the board of trustees. The induction includes a welcome to trustees and staff and an overview of the structure, finance, governance and administration of the Foundation. Trustees are also invited to visit projects and meet service users.

The trustees consider the skills, knowledge and experience needed for the effective governance of the Foundation. Workshops are convened to improve skills and knowledge as required.

Decision Making

The trustees are responsible for setting the strategic direction of the Foundation and approving the business plan and annual budget.

The board of trustees typically meets four times per year. Sub Committees with delegated responsibility oversee certain aspects of the board of trustees' work.

The Foundation has a delegated powers policy which sets out the powers delegated to the Foundation Director. The Foundation Director is responsible for the execution of the business plan and the day to day management of the Foundation.

The Foundation Director is supported by a Senior Management Team. The Senior Management Team are considered to be the key management personnel of the Foundation.

Remuneration of Key Management Personnel

The Foundation is committed to ensuring a proper balance between offering fair pay to attract and retain personnel and careful management of the charities funds. This approach ensures the greatest effectiveness in delivering our charitable objectives and meeting the needs of our beneficiaries.

The organisation adopts a maximum ration of 4:1 between the highest salary and median salary.

The remuneration of key management personnel is summarised in Note 6.

Risk Management

The trustees have examined the major strategic business and operational risks which the Foundation faces and confirm that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen their risks.

The trustees are aware of the strict safeguarding procedures necessary when working with children and adults at risk and are involved in these procedures as appropriate. The trustees are aware of the importance of compliance with Health & Safety regulations by all staff, volunteers and participants.

Key Partnerships

The Foundation's success is built upon a long standing relationship with Cardiff City FC. Our strategic partnerships include the Premier League Charitable Fund, the English Football League Trust, Cardiff & Vale College, University of South Wales and ACT Training. Our partnerships with other charities such as the Princes Trust, community organisations and local businesses enable us to magnify our impact. New partnerships established during 2017/18 include The Royal British Legion and the Welsh Council for Voluntary Action.

Statement of Trustees Responsibilities

The trustees (who are also the directors of Cardiff City FC Community Foundation for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Report of the Trustees and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Opinion

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The presentational currency is the Sterling (£) with rounding to the nearest pound. The company is incorporated in the United Kingdom and registered in Wales.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off the cost of each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery

- 25% reducing balance

Motor vehicles

- 25% reducing balance

Computer equipment

- 25% & 33% straight line

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
