STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing Document

All Nations Church, Bedford is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated as Brickhill Baptist Church on 24th February 2009 and registered as a charity on 11th March 2009. Brickhill Baptist Church, Bedford changed its name to All Nations Church, Bedford on 27th June 2013. The church previously operated as an 'excepted' and unincorporated charity under the trusteeship of The Baptist Union Corporation Limited which is a registered charity and continues to be custodian trustee for the church property at 79 Brickhill Drive. The company was established by a Memorandum of Association, which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

Appointment of Responsible Individuals and Elders

The Church is governed by its responsible individuals who are appointed according to the Articles of Association. The individuals are closely involved in the church's operations and held regular meetings during the reporting period ended 30th September 2017.

Elders are recognised by the congregation for the spiritual direction of the church, and these elders together with other people in leadership are appointed as Trustees as required. Day to day management is delegated to a team of senior staff and volunteer ministry leaders. At specific times during the year midweek church prayer meetings are open to all members and attenders. Visitors and guests are welcome.

Trustees

The responsible individuals and elders, who are directors for the purpose of company law and trustees for the purpose of charity law, who served during the period and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1.

Trustees Induction and Training

Responsible Individuals and Elders are closely involved in the church's operations prior to appointment and are appointed according to their ability to lead the church and the skills they bring to the post. Existing Responsible Individuals, Elders and new appointees have a good knowledge of the operation of the Church prior to appointment.

Existing Responsible Individuals and Elders have been involved in the establishment of the charitable company and are aware of the legal requirements from participation in this process. New appointees are supported in their posts by existing appointees. New appointees are also provided with copies of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, latest financial statements and guidance from the Charity Commission, including the Charity Commission guide 'The Essential Trustee'.

Pay policy for senior staff

The key management personnel comprise the directors/trustees (elders), the operations director/trustee and the church leaders. Key management personnel remuneration is disclosed in note 5 to the accounts and includes remuneration paid to 4 trustees under their contracts of employment, in accordance with the provisions of Clause 6 of the Company's Articles of Association.

The pay of key management personnel is reviewed annually and normally increased in accordance with average earnings. In view of the nature of the charity this is benchmarked against other similar organisations.

Risk Management

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the church is exposed, in particular those relating to the operations and finances of the church. A detailed analysis of income and expenditure is provided to all trustees every month with the opportunity to raise questions at regular leadership team meetings. The trustees are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate their exposure to major risk.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Aims and Objectives

The church's purposes as more fully set out in the objects which form part of the memorandum of association are:

- to advance the Christian faith;
- to relieve sickness and financial hardship and to promote and preserve good health by providing funds, goods or services including counselling and support;
- to further Christian education; and
- to provide, or assist in providing, facilities for those in need, to help improve their conditions of life

Statement on public benefit

The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Church's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

The Church is a member of the Baptist Union and Evangelical Alliance, and operates within the Catalyst Network in association with Newfrontiers.

A pre-school has been operating within the Church building for over 40 years, with a good report following the most recent Ofsted inspection. The pre-school facilities have been enhanced with the construction of a free flow area immediately adjacent to the Pre-school halls. The results of this activity are disclosed in note 10 to these financial statements.

The activities of The Hope Trust (Bedford) a subsidiary of the Church for community projects are included within the body of these financial statements and presented separately in note 14 to the financial statements. The Bedford Food Bank launched in 2011 under the auspices of the Hope Trust and in conjunction with the Trussell Trust is supported by local churches, other organisations, and members of the community. The Food Bank has continued to develop and expand, with two additional distribution centres, and employing two part time staff to assist in deployment of around 90 volunteers.

The Grove Pregnancy Advice Centre based in the town centre since 1999 moved to the Brickhill Drive site during the year. The Grove continues to serve a specific need with current expansion into helping those in the first year of birth and is open to the community staffed by volunteers from elsewhere as well as All Nations Church members.

We record our appreciation to members of the public and to other churches that have contributed to all Hope Trust activities. Donations have also been made in support of two other organisations serving the community, Bedford Street Angels who operate in the town centre at weekends, and Open the Book who make drama presentations to schools.

The South site established in September 2013 with Sunday meetings at Bedford Academy on Mile Road has continued to develop, with midweek meetings and other activities being held at other locations in South Bedford. Future developments include consideration of other sites and plans for new buildings at existing sites or in new areas.

Sunday services are held at the South site at 10.15am with an average attendance 109 of adults and at the North site at 11am with an average attendance of 240 adults. The Church membership was revised during the year so that there were 383 members at the close.

Premises and Facilities

The Baptist Union Corporation Limited which is a registered charity continues to be custodian trustee for the church centre at 79 Brickhill Drive. The two warehouses used for the Food Bank are leased from Bedford Borough Council. One other building solely owned by All Nations church, used by the Pregnancy Advice Centre, known as the Grove, is at 118 Brickhill Drive.

The Church Centre

The church centre at 79 Brickhill Drive is the registered office of All Nations church, a charitable company limited by guarantee. The majority of the staff team are based in the first floor offices, and the building houses the North site congregation every Sunday, as well as numerous activities throughout the week including the pre-school. The main rooms are available for specific wider community activities such as one of the Bedford Foodbank distribution centres, other charity meetings, and as a polling station on election days. All the main rooms are readily accessible to wheelchair users and parents with pushchairs, including a baby changing room and a toilet designed for wheel chair access. The building is also open to members of the community bringing donations for Bedford Foodbank.

The North Site

The North site building hosts many midweek activities in addition to the regular Sunday morning services attended by an average of 240 adults plus youth and children. We serve children and families through many activities open to those in the church and the community as well as the Pre-School, and we have begun exploring how we can better serve children with special needs.

We have a growing youth work which includes weekly groups for our church youth and a weekly Friday Evening youth club which attracts around 40 young people from the local community. We also took 80 young people and servers to Newday which is a national youth week which runs every summer. We have recently begun a Students and Young Adults group and anticipate this growing in the coming year.

Other midweek events include the Monday Fellowship for all those over 55 attended by many members of the community as well as church members, a weekly Food Bank distribution centre, a parenting course run in conjunction with Bedford Borough, and a monthly Coffee Morning for the community which collects donations every month for other charities.

We also run two major conferences a year, along with events specifically catering for men and women. Events designed to foster relationships among diverse groups include a termly pre-service breakfast and Come Dine (invitations to meals) as well as prayer meetings and other community and equipping groups. All Nations en Español, a monthly service for the Spanish speaking community is also held at the North site building.

The South Site

Meeting every Sunday morning at the Bedford Academy in South Bedford the congregation regularly exceeded 90 attending after the launch however this has dropped to an average just below this although the number of contacts in the area significantly exceeds this number through community outreach activities. These include a weekly Toddlers group called Kinder Cafe, one other weekly community group known as Coffee Pot, and 'Jigsaw' which is a monthly social group for older residents. The local Foodbank distribution centre at Scott Hall community centre serving the area is supported by All Nations members. Pre-service breakfasts, and bring and share lunches, both open to anyone attending, are a feature of the South site Sundays.

Small groups are actively promoted among the membership, including the Alpha course as well as house groups offering a variety of topics to be studied including outreach, marriage, and parenting, as well as Bible study and youth groups.

We are also involved in a weekly street mission around the local town centre area.

The West Site

In anticipation of launching a third site to the West of Bedford a team of three couples together with the Lead Elder have been exploring opportunities for a soft launch during 2017 and prayer meetings have been held at Kempston Rural Lower School.

The Hope Trust

All Nations Church is involved in and hosts two projects in Bedford through our associated Charity 'The Hope Trust (Bedford)' namely the Grove PCC and the Bedford Food Bank both of which involve other Bedford Churches as well as members of the community.

The Grove

The Grove Pregnancy Advice Centre with two part time paid employees supported by 18 volunteers provided services through both our dedicated Grove Centre based on Brickhill Drive since December 2016 and on site at Bedford Hospital. Clients access our services via telephone, email and by face to face visits. During this time our services were accessed on 329 occasions.

We continue to offer a Baby Loss Support Programme and our Family Support section continues to support clients with items of equipment out on loan to families in need.

Bedford Foodbank

Established in 2011 the Bedford Foodbank is part of the Trussell Trust national network of Foodbanks and operates under the charitable status of the Hope Trust (Bedford). Staffed mainly by volunteers with two part time paid staff and operating out of rented warehouse space in Manton Lane, Bedford, Foodbank's volunteers work with over 170 referral partners to provide a minimum of three days emergency food and support local people in crisis.

In 2016/17 Bedford Foodbank distributed food through six distribution centres in Bedford, and fed nearly 6,000 people with a total of over 74,000kg of food given out. Plans are at an advanced stage to open a seventh distribution centre.

We continue to receive amazing provision of finance through various donations, gifts and grant awards which have enabled us to cover our costs. We enjoy support from a wide range of churches, individuals, organisations, businesses and schools, with regular collections and donations of food. We have benefited greatly also from the support of local supermarkets with regular collections throughout the year that have helped us to keep pace with demand for food.

Church Membership

During the year 21 new members were added including 13 baptisms. There were 22 leavers including 2 deaths, with 383 members recorded at 30th September 2017.

Worship and Prayer

All are welcome to attend our regular Sunday Services. We meet for coffee before the service, and groups are provided for children and youth up to age 15, with a Creche for babies. The service consists of a time of worship, a time to communicate relevant information and a sermon, with opportunity to receive prayer at any time. We have teams of people to help welcome and integrate new people. Occasionally we will share breakfast or lunch to build relationships together. During the week the North site is used by many different groups, and is open for prayer for any members of the community.

Christmas Hampers

During December we provide food hampers for people in crisis in our community. With the support of many local schools and businesses and individuals we distributed over 700 hampers, reaching over 1,600 people in Bedford.

All Nations en Español

A ministry of All Nations Church Bedford created to outreach into the community and make disciples of Christ among all those who belong to the Spanish speaking community from Bedford and beyond. A Spanish speaking service is held once a month at our North Site and the congregation includes people from Colombia, Mexico, Ecuador, Peru and guests from England and Spain. All Nations en Español aims to serve firstly all members of our local church who are from the Spanish Speaking world and to other similar communities around this part of the country. We are working in partnership with the Spanish ministries from Kings Church Cambridge and COM Church Dunstable.

All Nations en Español runs weekly activities like home Bible studies, one midweek home prayer meeting in the morning and a weekly group named 'Casa de Paz' (House of Peace).

Group Events and Activities

Midweek groups meeting mainly in members' homes during the evenings or at the church centre during the day and known as 'growth groups' have been operating for a number of years. Separate events specifically for men and women have been further developed with the emphasis on activities designed to attract the wider community, particularly men's breakfasts and women's gatherings with speakers, held at local venues. These and other outreach events and conferences held during the year are all open to members of the community as well as church members.

Pastoral Care

The Pastoral Care team has continued to offer support and practical help to those who find themselves in crisis and in particular need. This included hospital visits, home visits including the housebound, and prayer support. They also seek to help and support those that are vulnerable in the community, particularly the elderly and those with disability, both physical and mental. A confidential 'hardship fund' is made available for use by the Site Leaders. A group intended for those over 55 but open to all meets at All Nations church North site with a speaker alternate weeks, with 'Tea, cake and chat' the other weeks, and specialises in seasonal meals and outings.

Children and Young People

Our weekly term time Toddler group offers activities where the children can play and a place where parents (and grandparents) can chat together. Toddlers for Dads runs once a month. We also run a group for New Mums and babies that meets all year round. Kids' Club is an outreach activity which meets on Wednesday evenings. Special events include Saturday Kids Clubs open to children in the community and other churches, as well as weekends away, and a Rainbow party as an alternative to Halloween.

A Pre-School has been running for more than forty years and provides a service to the local community. The Pre-School receives funding from the Local Authority and has to meet Ofsted regulations. In September we started to offer longer sessions so that parents can use the increased 30 hour funding which is being offered by the government. Pre-School is a great opportunity to get to know families as we serve them and care for the children, one of the new initiatives is the possibility of starting a support group for parents with children with additional needs.

Youth work for ages 11-19 years has continued with young people meeting in small groups on site on Thursday evenings with outreach activities open to all the community on Friday evenings. Special events included weekends away, joint Bedford-wide youth events and a week-long camping trip in Norfolk. We have also continued to work more closely with local schools which include: Beauchamp Middle School, St. Thomas More Upper School and the Bedford Academy. We record our appreciation of revenue grants from Bedford Borough Council towards the community youth projects. The Girls Brigade continues to meet at the North site building every Monday during term time.

Training Courses

Several short training courses were held to help equip people, including helping people who struggle with fear, understanding and getting to know the Bible, discipleship, and equipping people to share their faith, as well introduction to membership courses.

Senior leaders have attended several training conferences, while the Assistant Site Leader has continued attending Ellel Ministries Modular 'A' training course, and the Operations Director is in the second year of a monthly two year leadership training course.

Disclosure and Barring Service

As part of our support to the community and commitment to safeguarding children and vulnerable adults, All Nations Church is an umbrella organisation handling DBS applications and disclosures on behalf of 8 local churches and 6 other organisations such as Bedford Street Angels, and YMCA Bedfordshire. During the twelve months 275 application forms were checked and forwarded to the Disclosure and Barring Service for local churches and organisations, as well as 48 applications for All Nations Church Staff and volunteers.

Overseas Mission and Support

Relationships with overseas churches and mission consist of a major charitable project 'Operation Tanzania', partnerships with Bethel Church, Mbeya, Tanzania; Holy Dwelling, Lilongwe, Malawi; churches relating to Sam Amara in Ghana and Nigeria and 'The Messengers' an independent charity working in South East Asia. In these relationships our vision is to resource Kingdom growth in a sustainable way with the objective of seeing the emergence of locally, Spirit filled, growing churches.

Visits have been made to Tanzania and Malawi and grants have been made for Church Planting in Dar Es Salaam, Tanzania.

Operation Tanzania

During the year container no.49 was sent to Tanzania with educational items for specific schools and colleges, tools and equipment for job creation, medical supplies for hospitals and clinics, as well as clothing for Pastors and Evangelists. There were also many boxes of clothing to support orphans. We continue to be humbled by the gratitude expressed by the recipients as they receive much needed aid.

Staff Salary Remuneration Team

The salary remuneration team consists of the non-executive directors and meets annually and as required to consider all aspects of salaries and benefits.

Future Developments

Our principal objectives for the coming year are to maintain and develop key activities, to further develop programmes for all age groups, and continue to plan for overall growth. Following the establishment of South site at Bedford Academy on Mile Road the aspiration remains to rent or preferably purchase a purpose designed building in the South of Bedford in order to further develop community involvement. In addition to regular Sunday services at the Bedford Academy, midweek meetings and activities for children and young people open to the community as well as members are held at Scott Hall Community Centre, and Faraday Square, as well as the Bedford Academy.

A further site to the West of the town is being actively explored with preliminary meetings being held in the area, and a staffing structure based on Site Leadership rather than departmental ministries has been established, being more appropriate for the development of multi-sites.

Activities of public benefit will continue to be developed, including Pregnancy Advice and family support, the Bedford Food Bank, and overseas aid direct support in addition to Operation Tanzania. The elders continue to prepare for growth with leadership development and training, and to emphasise collaboration amongst other Bedford Churches, and other churches within Newfrontiers, exploring other possible apostolic relationships, and supporting new churches.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The financial statements reflect activities during the twelve months ended 30th September 2017 and presented alongside the financial statements for this period are the comparable amounts as reported in the accounts for the 18 month period ended 30th September 2016. The accounts consolidate the activities of All Nations Church, Bedford, with the Hope Trust (Bedford). A summary statement of the financial performance of the church is presented in note 3 and a summary of the financial performance of the Hope Trust (Bedford) in note 14.

Summary of Financial Performance

Total income for the year was £705,841. Total expenditure for the year was £668,033. The surplus for the year was £37,808 made up of a surplus of £43,446 in the church and a deficit of £5,638 for the Hope Trust (Bedford).

Investment Policy and Returns

The trustees have wide investment powers. The trust's investment policy is to invest the monies not immediately required for the primary purpose of the trust, in, or upon, such investments as may be thought fit.

Reserves Policy

It is the policy of All Nations Church Bedford to hold in reserves the equivalent of two months' general running costs together with an additional one month's salary costs. It is also our policy to hold an amount sufficient to enable the church to meet its known commitments to beneficiaries both in the UK and abroad.

TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees/directors are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees/directors to prepare financial statements for each year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and the group and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable group for that period. In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume the church will continue its activities

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and the group and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Disclosure of Information to Auditors

In so far as the trustees are aware at the time of approving our trustees' annual report:

- there is no relevant information, being information needed by the auditor in connection with
- the trustees, having made enquiries of fellow directors and the group's auditor that they ought to have individually taken, have each taken all steps that he/she is obliged to take as a director in order to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditor is aware of that information.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of All Nations Church, Bedford (the 'charitable parent company') and its subsidiary (the 'charitable group') for the year ended 30th September 2017 which comprise the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities, the Consolidated Balance Sheet, the Church Balance Sheet, the Statement of Cash Flows and Consolidated Statement of Cash Flows and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In our opinion, the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of the charitable group's and of the charitable parent company's affairs as at 30th September 2017 and of the charitable group's surplus for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice;

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Opinions on other matters prescribed by the Companies Act 2006

In our opinion, based on the work undertaken in the course of the audit:

- the information given in the trustees' annual report which includes the directors' report for the financial year for which the financial statements are prepared is consistent with the financial statements; and
- the directors' report included within the trustees' annual report has been prepared in accordance with applicable legal requirements.

Matters on which we are required to report by exception

In the light of the knowledge and understanding of the charitable group and the charitable parent company and its environment obtained in the course of the audit, we have not identified material misstatements in the directors' report included within the trustees' annual report.

We have nothing to report in respect of the following matters in relation to which the Companies Act 2006 requires us to report to you if, in our opinion:

- adequate accounting records have not been kept by the charitable parent company, or returns adequate for our audit have not been received from branches not visited by us; or
- the charitable parent company financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records and returns; or

- certain disclosures of trustees' remuneration specified by law are not made; or
- we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit; or
- the trustees were not entitled to prepare the financial statements in accordance with the small companies regime and take advantage of the small companies' exemptions in preparing the trustees' annual report and from the requirement to prepare a strategic report.

Responsibilities of trustees

As explained more fully in the trustees' responsibilities statement set out on page 7, the trustees (who are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view, and for such internal control as the trustees determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are responsible for assessing the charitable group's and the charitable parent company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the directors either intend to liquidate the charitable group or the charitable parent company or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows.

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act 2011.

The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

1.2 Transition to FRS 102

These are the first financial statements that comply with FRS 102. The charity transitioned to FRS 102 on 1st April 2015.

No transitional adjustments were required in funds or income or expenditure for the year.

1.3 Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about All Nations Church, Bedford's ability to continue as a going concern.

The Hope Trust (Bedford)'s ability to continue as a going concern is dependent upon the continued financial and operational support of All Nations Church, Bedford. All Nations Church, Bedford is committed to ensuring that the activities undertaken by Hope Trust (Bedford), namely the operation of the Bedford Foodbank and Grove Pregnancy Advice Centre can continue for at least 12 months from the date of approval of these financial statements. There are plans in place to restructure The Hope Trust (Bedford) to better meet the objectives of Bedford Foodbank and Grove Pregnancy Advice Centre.

1.4 Group financial statements

The financial statements consolidate the results of All Nations Church, Bedford and The Hope Trust (Bedford) on a line-by-line basis. A separate Statement of Financial Activities and income and expenditure account for the church has not been presented because the church has taken advantage of the exemption afforded by section 408 of the Companies Act 2006.

1.5 Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the church. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are subject to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal. Transfers are made from unrestricted to restricted funds in order to prevent restricted funds from going into deficit.

1.6 Income

Incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the church is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

1.7 Donated services and facilities

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the church where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.

1.8 Interest receivable

Investment income is included when received.

1.9 Expenses and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

1.10 Operating leases

The lease of photocopiers and premises are operating leases; the title to the equipment remains with the lessor. Rental charges are charged on a straight line basis over the term of the lease.

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

1.11 Fixed assets

Fixed assets which are included at valuation were based upon historical valuations made for insurance purposes. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

Freehold buildings:

1%, 2% and 5% per annum on net book value

Motor vehicles:

25% per annum on net book value

Equipment and fittings:

5% and 25% per annum on net book value

Electronic equipment:

33.33% per annum on net book value

No depreciation is provided on freehold land.

1.12 Pension costs

Employees of the church are entitled to join a defined contribution 'money purchase' scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the church in an independently administered fund. The church contribution is limited to the contributions disclosed in note 5. There were no outstanding contributions at the period end.

2 LEGAL STATUS OF THE CHURCH

The church is constituted as a charitable company, limited by guarantee and has no share capital. In the event of the charitable company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charitable company.

3 FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE OF THE CHURCH

The consolidated statement of financial activities includes the results of The Hope Trust (Bedford) which operates the Bedford Foodbank and the Grove Pregnancy Advice Centre. The summary financial performance of the church alone is:
