The trustees present their report and the unaudited financial statements for the year ended 30 April 2020. Included within the trustees' report is the directors' report as required by company law.

Reference and administrative information set out on the previous page forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities: SORP applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with FRS 102.

#### **OBJECTS AND ACTIVITIES**

The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities. In particular, the Trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

The objects of the charity are to provide aid and support for the protection and welfare of animals.

#### **ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS**

Over the period of these accounts, IAPWA have focused on the following:

#### **BORNEO**

Our first and largest project, situated in Sabah, Borneo, continues to provide a holistic and humane alternative to the previous methods of population control that ceased upon our 2014 MOU with the government (DBKK) who we continue to work closely with on this programme. From the DBKK facility in Inanam, where our main working site is based, and through our outreach programme, thousands of stray dogs and cats are neutered and vaccinated every year.

Following our Programme Manager for Malaysia joining our team, who has extensive expertise within dog population management programmes, our work in Malaysia, including this project, will undergo a mid-project review in 2020 to ensure we are being as impactful as possible. Following on from the results of this, a strategic plan will be developed for 2021 which will tie in with our overarching 3 year strategic objectives being set within 2020 for the period 2021 to 2023.

In addition to working towards our long-term goals, we also ensure we provide a lifeline to animals who need us now and throughout this period have continued providing additional veterinary care and support to many dogs and cats who have required this help from those needing wound management to treatment for skin disease. Our adoption programme continues to find local homes wherever possible for those unable to cope on the street.


This work remains our largest programme and we are committed to investing in this further moving forward with additional renovation work having been undertaken at the facility, including new kennels, tiling and other site improvements which will continue, as part of a larger development plan, over the next couple of years.



#### **PENANG**

Our project in Penang began in 2018 in partnership with the government (MBPP) following our second MOU to implement a holistic and humane dog population management programme within Malaysia.

Our work has continued to develop and, as planned, saw the completion and launch of a new facility within this period which is our base for this programme through which we care for many stray dogs each year.



This project, alongside our work in Borneo, will also undergo a project review in 2020 to ensure we are driving this forward to be as impactful as possible, with a strategic plan also being developed for 2021 which will tie in with our overarching 3-year strategic objectives being set within 2020 for the period 2021 to 2023.

Similarly to our work in Borneo, as well as our core aim of reducing the population of dogs born on the streets, we also ensure we facilitate a veterinary lifeline to those who need us now, with many strays having received treatment and care.


Our adoption programme, through which we find local homes and develop foster initiatives, is also progressing well with our international teams proudly sharing success stories from both programmes of patients enjoying their new lives in a loving home, no longer living on the streets.

We remain committed to developing this project further as part of our aims to expand our work within Malaysia and look forward to providing further updates on the future plans as these are developed.

#### ROMANIA

Our work in Romania has largely been focused on planning the launch of our own programme in country following having provided funding to neutering campaigns facilitated by other charities previously as part of our support programme.

Throughout this period, we transported our veterinary clinic to Romania with the first neutering campaign taking place shortly afterwards. This will be used for the neutering and veterinary care aspects of this programme and is fully fitted with surgical facilities in the back of the truck with a large awning to provide protection from the elements for dogs recovering from surgery.




We also identified our main UK partner for this project through which a collaborative working group will be established in 2020 as part of working together on our shared aims within Romania, have taken steps to establish IAPWA Romania as a registered local entity which is due for completion in 2021 and ran our first Romania Fundraising Challenge in country to raise funds to support this work. Through this period, we started mapping out all elements of the strategy, with a basic concept of this shown below, with the full plan expected to be in place within 2020 and all aspects being operational within 2021.


#### **SUPPORT PROGRAMMES**

Since IAPWA have been established, we have provided both financial and advisory support to assist a range of projects and campaigns where we have had an opportunity to make a difference to the lives of animals in need and raise much needed awareness of issues affecting their welfare. This includes our support for the Claws Out Campaign, founded by Beth Jennings in 2015 to increase understanding of the link between cub petting, canned hunting and the lion bone trade.

We are committed to continuing working collaboratively wherever possible to make a greater impact for animals in need and will be sharing plans for our future support programmes over the next couple of years as the structure and strategy for this develops.

#### **ANIMAL STAR AWARDS**

We would also like to congratulate IAPWA Founder, Nicky Stevens, on being awarded Animal Hero 2019 at the Animal Star Awards and our Programme Manager for Romania, Joanne McKenzie, for being awarded Veterinary Nurse of the Year. IAPWA Ambassador, Kate Stephenson was also a runner up for the Animal Hero category.



#### **FUTURE PLANS**

An overarching strategic plan will be completed by the end of 2020 relating to our 3-year strategic objectives for 2021-2023.

One of our key priorities will remain the continuation of our work in Borneo, Penang and Romania. This will include:

- Developing our facilities, specifically our veterinary clinics in Borneo and Penang, as part of our longer term aims for these projects
- Reviewing and increasing the impact generated from the dog population management aspect of our programmes
- Piloting new initiatives such as our sanctuary support programme in Romania
- · Developing local financial sustainability and engagement in country
- Building capacity within the UK to support our project work both within our Romania working group and on our Project Advisory Committee
- Establishing and developing partnerships to support our work in country

In addition to the above, we are also looking forward to sharing future plans for a support programme and how we intend to work even more collaboratively with others which will start to be structured in 2021.

Outside of the project areas of our work, we will be working on continuing to develop our Fundraising and Communications Team, recognising that the more funds we are able to raise, the greater impact we can make for our beneficiaries. We will also be continuing to build voluntary capacity within our advisory committees and building skills and experience within our Trustee Board to support the operational team with the vital work they carry out every year.

Our work wouldn't be possible without the generous support we have received from organisations and individuals who have enabled us to deliver vital lifelines to animals that rely on the support we provide. On behalf of everyone in the IAPWA Team, thank you so much for your kindness and belief in what we do.



#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### **AMOUNT OF RESERVES**

The results for the year are set out in the statement of financial activities. There was no general reserve at the year-end.

The trustees are concerned about the lack of general funds and have been working on increasing capacity within the fundraising team to develop funding potential with the aim of seeing a consequent improvement in reserves. It is understood that the pandemic is likely to represent a number of challenges for IAPWA, especially given the reserves situation. However, we believe we are taking positive steps to react to these challenges from diversifying our funding streams and adapting to changes in the fundraising landscape to recruiting a full time Fundraising and Communications Manager. Our financial plan has and will continue to be adapted with a view to increasing our reserves, meeting the challenges ahead and improving our financial sustainability.

#### **RESERVES POLICY**

A policy is set which reflects the trustees' wish to safely commit as much as possible to the primary objectives of the charity whilst retaining financial stability and the potential to respond to new opportunities. The trustees are aiming to work towards a target of three months' expenditure.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 30 April 2009 and registered as a charity on 17 August 2010.

The company was established under a memorandum of association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company, and it is governed under its articles of association.

Members of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £10 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up. The total number of such guarantees at 30 April 2020 was 3 (2019: 3). The trustees are members of the charity but this entitles them only to voting rights. The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

All trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no benefits from the charity. Any expenses reclaimed from the charity are set out in note 10 to the accounts.

#### **RELATED PARTIES AND RELATIONSHIPS WITH OTHER ORGANISATIONS**

During the period of these accounts, there were no related party transactions. Further details are set out in note 10.

As detailed previously in this report the charity works closely together with a number of organisations on a collaborative basis. IAPWA entered into Memoranda of Understanding and established programmes in Borneo and Penang Island, with IAPWA Penang and IAPWA Sabah being established as registered charities in country to assist with our work. At the time of this report, although our work in Borneo continues, we no longer work with IAPWA Sabah. Animal Kingdom Foundation (AKF) in the Philippines received ongoing support for their "Dog Meat Trade" programme, as did Game Rangers International in Zambia for their vital work at their elephant orphanage, both of which directly address our charitable objects.

Although our core projects are our focus moving forward, we aim to develop a more comprehensive support programme for other organisations in future where in addition to the projects we have founded we can provide aid to support the work of other organisations helping animals in need.

#### **RECRUITMENT AND APPOINTMENT OF TRUSTEES**

The Trustee Board are recruited from people who have an interest in the objects of the charity. Trustees are appointed by vote by the Trustees. It is the aim of the Trustees to create a comprehensive Trustee Policy setting out a detailed framework to support the Board in all areas of their role and responsibilities and also to recruit further Trustees to increase skills, knowledge and experience.

#### **STATEMENT OF REPSONSIBILITIES OF THE TRUSTEES**

The trustees (who are also directors of International Aid for the Protection & Welfare of Animals (IAPWA) Limited for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the trustees' annual report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting. Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable group and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable group for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- Observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- State whether applicable UK Accounting Standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable group and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the provisions applicable to companies subject to the small companies' regime of the Companies Act 2006.

#### 1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgments and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

#### a Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued in October 2019 - (Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

International Aid for the Protection & Welfare of Animals (IAPWA) Limited meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £ sterling.

#### b Judgments and estimates

The trustees have made no key judgments which have a significant effect on the accounts.

The trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

#### c Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charitable company's ability to continue as a going concern.

The trustees have reviewed the charity's forecasts and projections and in particular have considered the potential implications of the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. Whilst the eventual financial impact of the pandemic on the charity, and on the overall economy, remains uncertain, the trustees are confident that the charity will be able to remain operational throughout the pandemic. It has reviewed its expenditure and projects and, based on its reserves and some donor commitments, the trustees are confident that the charity can also fulfil its commitments to its beneficiaries for the period ending 31 December 2020.

In addition, with the benefit of relevant government support packages to help organisations through the pandemic, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity will have adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.

The charity therefore continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing its financial statements.

Notes to the accounts for the year ended 30 April 2020 (continued)

#### d Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

For legacies, entitlement is taken as the earlier of the date on which either: the charity is aware that probate has been granted, the estate has been finalised and notification has been made by the executor(s) to the charity that a distribution will be made, or when a distribution is received from the estate. Receipt of a legacy, in whole or in part, is only considered probable when the amount can be measured reliably and the charity has been notified of the executor's intention to make a distribution. Where legacies have been notified to the charity, or the charity is aware of the granting of probate, and the criteria for income recognition have not been met, then the legacy is a treated as a contingent asset and disclosed if material.

Income received in advance of a provision of a specified service is deferred until the criteria for income recognition are met.

#### e Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

#### f Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of charity.

Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

#### g Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified under the following activity headings:

- Costs of raising funds comprise the costs of social media, donation processing fees and their associated support costs.
- Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of salaries, operating costs and charitable project cost undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs, and grants made to other charitable organisations whose activities further the purposes of the charity.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

#### h Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £500 or more are capitalised at cost and are depreciated over their estimated useful economic lives on a straight line basis as follows:

#### i Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash held in the charity's bank account.

#### j Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

#### k Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### **I** Pensions

Employees of the charity are entitled to join a defined contribution 'money purchase' scheme. The charity's contribution is restricted to the contributions disclosed in note 9. Outstanding contributions at the year end were £805 which had been paid in full by 10 June 2021. The costs of the defined contribution scheme are included within support and governance costs and allocated to the cost of charitable activities.

#### 2 Legal status of the charity

The charity is a company limited by guarantee registered in England and Wales and has no share capital. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10 per member of the charity. The registered office address is disclosed on the Reference and Administration page at the beginning of the trustees' report.
