# FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2017 TRUSTEES' REPORT

The trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 30 June 2017

#### STRUCTURE GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Islamic Education and Research Academy is a company limited by guarantee, and does not have share capital. The charity was incorporated on 23 June 2009, and is governed by Memorandum and Articles of Association. It is also a registered charity, no. 1134566.

#### **ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE**

The charity trustees are responsible for the strategic management of the charity. The CEO and staff are responsible for the implementation of plans and the day-to-day running of the charity.

Mr Nasser Ali Khan resigned from his position as trustee on 19 November 2016.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

The objectives of the charity are set out in the charity's Articles of Association, and are summarised below:

- To advance the Islamic faith.
- To educate and inform humanity about Islam.
- To train Islamic educators to deliver talks, seminars and other public engagements.
- To produce and distribute educational Islamic material.
- To carry out research into contemporary issues facing Islam and the Muslim community.

#### **STRATEGIES**

We seek to advance the Islamic faith by conveying the call, namely presenting a compassionate and intelligent case for Islam in the UK and throughout the world. We train educators to convey Islam in a compassionate, intelligent, and rational manner. We also convey the call through outreach campaigns, as well as producing and distributing choice Islamic educational material.

#### **HOW OUR ACTIVITIES DELIVER PUBLIC BENEFIT**

The charity carries out a range of activities in pursuance of its charitable aims. The trustees consider that these activities, summarised below, benefit those wishing to find out and learn about Islam, both in the UK and worldwide.

#### INTERNATIONAL CAMPAIGNS

World Dawah Mission:-

Throughout July and August 2016, we developed, trained, and organised 190 international Dawah teams across 110 countries to call and educate people to the Islamic faith in a warm and friendly manner, as part of iERA's 'World Dawah Mission' campaign. The strapline was simple yet profound: 'Is Life Just a Game?' This culminated in the official Dawah day on 20 August 2016.

The teams were given iERA t-shirts and Dawah materials, and were instructed to convey the call to Islam in an intelligent and compassionate manner. Through strategic planning, iERA helped and supported 3,117 people to help convey the call.

We launched a redesigned booklet for this campaign; 60,000 materials about Islam were distributed and 10,000 conversations about Islam took place. As a result of the compassionate and intellectual conversations, 186 people chose to embrace Islam.

#### TRUSTEES' REPORT

Jesus: Blessed by God:-

During the Easter period between Good Friday (14 April 17) and Easter Monday (17 April 17), we launched our 'Muslims Love Jesus' campaign. This was iERA's second global campaign of the year. We developed and trained teams across six continents (in Sao Paulo, Houston, UK, Abuja, Jerusalem, Melbourne, and more) to engage with their communities while sharing the true teachings of Jesus with our brothers and sisters in humanity. To support the campaign, we launched a live campaign on Facebook with the hashtag #MuslimsLoveJesus on 13 April 17; we achieved 15,000 views on this video.

iERA also launched a new book as part of this campaign, 'Jesus: Man, Messenger, Messiah'. To support the launch, we recorded an online lecture delivered by Hamza Tzortzis exploring the life, teachings, personality, and mission of Jesus, as well as compassionately deconstructing the Christian understanding.

We held webinars to support and empower the teams across the continents, which all six teams attended. We also held webinars for all international teams; 46 teams registered, with 43% of teams tuning into the webinar live.

#### **LOCAL CAMPAIGNS**

Jesus: Blessed by God:-

We ran two key UK campaigns last year. The first was 'Jesus: Blessed by God', which ran in December 2016 and focused on the Christmas period. The campaign involved a Dawah Day in key locations in London and Newcastle. We produced four online articles with subsequent podcasts to support the campaign. The podcasts achieved 1,172 listens and 99 downloads. These articles and podcast included:

- God, Man or Both Who Is Jesus?
- Corruption From Within Can We Trust The Bible?
- He Died For Our Sins Was Jesus Really Crucified?
- Not In Jesus' Name Paul's Christianity?

iERA provided bespoke training on how to give Dawah to Christians, which was given as a webinar. In total, there were 537 registrations, 102 live attendees, with over 1,000 have taking the webinar training since it was published.

Know God, Know Good:-

The next campaign, named 'Know God, Know Good', ran during the month of Ramadan. This campaign was run across thirteen cities across the UK including London, Edinburgh, Brighton, and Oxford as well as Waterford in Ireland. We also launched the 'Know God, Know Good' Dawah training webinar; 48 teams registered with 55% attending the webinar live.

The teams across the UK were given bespoke t-shirts with the 'Know God, Know God' branding. The online Dawah webinar successfully empowered Muslims to engage in warm and articulate conversations with their local communities.

The 'Know God, Know Good' campaign saw the development, design, and distribution of the 'Know God, Know Good' booklets. This booklet is a collection of God's beautiful names and attributes with a commentary. The commentary was a well-thought out narrative focusing on how to reconnect humanity to their Creator.

#### **NEW MUSLIMS**

Our new Muslim development programme is amongst the most important work that we do at iERA. Our programme includes a welcome pack, local weekly classes, monthly live online classes, online resources and support, and a four-day educational retreat programme. We distributed 251 of iERA's new Muslim gift boxes, which provide initial education support to people that have embraced Islam.

40 new Muslims attended our 10th anniversary retreat - 'Journey of the Believer' - in August 2016. Below is some of the feedback we received:

As part of our New Muslim support and care programme, we launched our New Muslim Problems webinar. There were four webinars with the below topics:

- Being Tested
- Preparing for Ramadan
- Love and Marriage for New Muslims: A Practical Guide
- Loving The Prophet (Peace be Upon Him)

On average, 68 people registered with an average attendance of 19 people and conversion rate of 28%. This highest registration rate was for the 'Love and Marriage' webinar, with 98 registrants.

We carried out nine Now Ready to Grow and Step by Step training courses. The Now Ready to Grow course is a mentoring program dedicated to teaching communities how to empower new Muslims at the very beginning of their journey effectively and successfully. The course also helps them to build a solid foundation of Islam in their lives. The Step by Step course is designed to empower New Muslims, providing them with a strong spiritual foundation. The course were delivered in the UK, Ireland, and mainland Europe:

- Bedford Masjid
- Cardiff
- London
- Luton
- Newcastle
- Copenhagen
- Waterford, Ireland

#### **MATERIALS BOOKS AND DISTRIBUTION**

The materials we distribute were written and designed by iERA to promote a warm and intelligent case for Islam, in a style and language that is easy to comprehend. Last year, we focused on the following topics:

- Jesus léaflet
- Jesus: Man, Messenger, Messiah
- Is Life Just A Game?
- Quran: A Short Journey
- Convey With One Verse cards
- Know God, Know Good
- The Man In The Red Underpants

- The Eternal Challenge

We distributed over 114,000 materials to over 100 countries across the globe:

- Our most popular materials last year were the 'ls Life Just a Game?' initiation flyers, of which we distributed over 75,000 across the world to 190 Dawah teams, accounting for 65% of our annual distributed units.
- The 'Is Life Just a Game?' booklet saw positive reactions, with 10,000 units distributed.
- The most popular book publication was The Eternal Challenge, with distribution of 1,850 copies.
- 75% of our annual materials are distributed during campaigns, with 25% distributed through the ecommerce site.

All of our materials are provided free of charge, with customers only paying for postage and packaging. We are currently working collaboratively with specific teams and organisations across the UK to promote a better understanding of Islam. We organise for teams to pick up boxes of materials from the office, in order to facilitate them conveying the call of Islam in their local area.

#### **ONLINE TRAINING**

Between April 2017 and June 2017, along with the Dawah campaigns, we launched an iERA Show on Facebook, in the form of a weekly live training session in relation to Dawah. We live-streamed seven episodes and reached a total of 101,400 views. The most popular episode was 'Characteristics of the Caller' with 22,000 views (see https://www.facebook.com/pg/iERAorg/videos/):

### TRAINING

On 10 September 2016, we traveled to America and delivered 'The Eternal Challenge Course: The Limits of Science and the Linguistic Miracles of the Quran' in three cities: Connecticut, Delaware, and Houston. The course was delivered by Fahad Tasleem, and was designed to discuss the miracles of the Quran and the clear reasons as to why the Quran has captivated the hearts of many around the world. Across the three locations, we had 48 registered attendees.

Between 7-9 October, we held an iERA Dawah Training Course in the Grand Mosque in the city of Leeds. With 26 registered attendees, the interactive workshop trained participants in how to engage in conversations about Islam with non-Muslims in a structured and logical way. We started the weekend with a talk from Salahuddin Patel on 'Reincarnation to Reformation: From Hinduism to Islam' on the Friday evening. On Saturday, we delivered the Dawah Training Course, followed by street Dawah and a comprehensive feedback session from the attendees on the experience of giving street Dawah.

Finally, on 25 November, we ran a mission in Ilford City Center, delivering a motivational lecture on Friday evening at the masjid Ansaar and a full Dawah training course on Saturday, followed by street Dawah.

#### TRUSTEES' REPORT

We conducted many Dawah training courses regularly across the UK and six continents as part of our instructor program.

#### **UK AND IRELAND UNIVERSITY LECTURES AND DAWAH TRAINING**

Throughout February and March 2017, we we honoured to be invited to speak about Islam, Evolution and Darwinism at Portsmouth, Kings, Salford, Birmingham, Oxford, and City Universities. The purpose of this talk was to explain to students what evolutionary theory is, what the philosophy of science teaches us about the epistemic weight of science's conclusions, and also what the Islamic position on these issues are. At City University, we also delivered the Dawah training course following a talk by Subboor Ahmad. A further two Dawah training courses were delivered by Salahuddin Patel at Hull and Hertfordshire Universities.

Hamza Andreas Tzortzis participated in the 'Why Islam?' FOSIS Tour of UK and Irish universities. He articulated why God deserves to be worshipped, and the rationale behind the claim that the Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) was the final Prophet.

#### SOCIAL MEDIA RESEARCH

We have a social media following of 2.5 million people around the globe, and this platform continues to grow: Facebook constitutes the largest part of this at 2 million, which was 92% of our total following as of June 2017.

Through these platforms we publish educational content in the form of:

- Training videos, webinars, and articles on how to convey Islam.
- Educational content on the importance of conveying Islam.
- Practical Dawah activities which augment people's learning about how to convey Islam.
- Updates on where our outreach specialists are travelling to for the Dawah training courses.

#### **RESERVES POLICY**

The trustees have set a reserves policy of £30,000.

#### **FINANCIAL DELIVERABLES**

We opened the financial year on 1 July 2016 with £131,092 and closed the year with £218,974. This is +67% versus last year.

Total donations this financial year: £979,154. £297,996 (30% of the annual total) of donations came during the month of Ramadan. 84% were one-off donations and 16% were recurring donations, at £251,021 and £46,974 respectively.

#### PRINCIPAL FUNDING SOURCE

The majority of funds are raised through the community. This is done through a range of activities, including community events, direct mail, emails, and social media. The trustees are satisfied that the fundraising objectives have been met, as highlighted in the achievements and performance section above.

#### **ERRATUM**

- In the Trustees' report 2015 to 2016, it was stated that the 'World Dawah Day' campaign was reported as part of the financial year. This is incorrect, and was a human error in events reporting. This error did not have any negative implications financially or operationally.
- The Trustees' report 2015 to 2016 also stated that the 10th Anniversary of the New Muslim retreat took place in the financial year. This was also incorrectly reported, and was also caused by human error. This error did not have any negative implications financially or operationally.
