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# Trustees' report (including directors' report)

# For the year ended 31 March 2017

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2017.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016)

#### Objectives and activities

The Charity's objects are:

- To relieve persons who are in conditions of need or hardship or who are aged or sick by providing or assisting in the provision of primary healthcare and the promotion of good health.
- To advance education.
- To advance the provision of employment and personal morality for the public benefit.
- To promote the rehabilitation of people being affected by drug, alcohol or other substance abuse or addiction.
- To promote other charitable purposes beneficial to the community.

The Trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the Charity should undertake.

#### Overview of activities

### **Country reports**

## Sierra Leone: Betteh Tumara Freetown

The Betteh Tumara Freetown project is a vocational training programme aimed at providing young people with an income generating vocational skill. The programme includes mentoring, literacy, numeracy, enterprise, IT and customer service training and work experience placement. BTF is funded by Big Lottery and Comic Relief. In September 2016 we recruited our forth cohort of students bring the student number to 549 since 2012. In February 2017 we graduated 317 students of the class of 2016 (the first class completed since Ebola). In a country of 70% youth un/underemployment (2016 United Nations Development Programme) of these graduates, 75% claim they are now employed and 73% have had an increase in their income since completing the programme. Also in February, we held our first Employer Consortium event, which brought together 28 employers who have received our students for placement or employment or accessed our management and employee upskilling services. The feedback from employers was very positive.

#### Sierra Leone: Betteh Tumara Punduru

In July 2016, The Big Lottery Funded project, Betteh Tumara Punduru commenced. This 4-year project seeks to train young people and struggling landowners to improve the quality and quantity of crops and to provide access to markets in order to turn subsistence farming into sustainable farming. Education programmes such as business skills, literacy and numeracy classes, farmer field schools, with embedded mentoring and support for women and disabled villagers in human rights are bringing a new, fresh appreciation of the value of education to everyday life in Punduru.

The Project Manager and his wife re-located to the village from Freetown, and the local community are already reporting enhanced confidence and hope, and a greater appreciation of the value of managing their income wisely. The project is not only addressing poverty, but also social, economic, domestic and legal issues faced by the people.

#### Iraq: Team visit

In June 2016, a small team joined partners from Egypt to travel to Iraq, to support the work of LifeLine Iraq. They spent time with displaced people in the camps, ran children's and young people's events and worked alongside medics. They visited the bakeries set up by LifeLine Iraq to see how bread gets to families in the camps. Despite language challenges (English – Arabic – Kurdish!) this was a highly successful visit in terms of cementing the working partnership between LNI, partners in Egypt and LifeLine Iraq, and a further team is now planned for late 2017.

#### Dominica: Roll-out of creative arts course supporting hope and peace

Peaced Together, a creative arts course, was created and devised by LNI member, Heidi Singleton. Using a variety of themed craft projects, the course encourages participants to reflect on their lives and set out on a personal journey from brokenness to hope. Requested by LifeLine Ministries Dominica, staff from London ran a 'train-the-trainer' course for 20 people on the island in November 2016. Following this successful event, there are now three courses running (in the capital and beyond), with several in the pipeline for next year.

#### Mozambique: Literacy/Numeracy Project takes shape

In March 2015, the Network grieved the passing of Anacleto Luis Ferrao, our friend of over 20 years. Anacleto's passing left us unsure if we would continue to work in Mozambique. We were keen to build relationship with Godfrey Bhodyera, who had been Anacleto's administrator and close friend. With the support of a Fellowship from the Commonwealth Scholarship Commission, LNI was able to bring the Godfrey to the UK for a month-long period of training and of building strong relationship with other members of the Network. Capacity-building training was provided for him and LNI is pleased to report that the scheduled programme for literacy/numeracy training to empower communities in rural Mozambique has now commenced. Its aim is to provide the skills necessary to access better healthcare, agricultural techniques and markets.

#### Zimbabwe: Team visit

A team of eleven from the UK visited our partner organisations in Bulawayo and Harare for two weeks, returning in April 2016. They spent one week with George and Josephine Moyo and their church in Bulawayo and a second week with partners Lawrence and Portia Muzunzandare, who are located in Chitungwiza, a high-density dormitory town just outside Harare. The team brought with it medical and educational expertise and was able to encourage and equip the partners and their organisations, both of whom are considering the next steps for their communities in Zimbabwe.

#### Zimbabwe and Sierra Leone: Doulos International

Following on from the training provided last year on the Doulos International programme, a further four visits from experienced trainers were undertaken in 2016 to Zimbabwe and Sierra Leone (two to each nation). The programme trains and develops community leaders in the skills and attitudes necessary for sustaining community development. Although setting up the mentoring aspect of the programme proved challenging in both locations, the success of this aspect of the course has been welcomed by community leaders, particularly in Zimbabwe, where the team have asked to have the mentoring support extended. It is anticipated that, going forward, community leaders will be able to train the next cohort themselves.

# International visits

LNI continues to send consultants to various network members for training, evaluation and development. During this financial year, teams have visited the following nations: Sierra Leone, Zimbabwe, Peru, St. Maarten, Kenya, Ghana, Ukraine, Liberia and Dominica.

The cross-pollination of visits from overseas to the UK also continues, with visits this year by partners from Sierra Leone, Dominica and Mozambique.

#### Achievements and performance

#### Financial review

During the year LNI has received income both in the form of grants and also gifts and donations.

Grants were received from Big Lottery and Comic Relief to fund a vocational training programme in Freetown, Sierra Leone and from Big Lottery to fund an agricultural training programme in Punduru, Sierra Leone.

Gifts and donations received came mainly from LifeLine Church and there were also restricted gifts made towards the charity's work in Dominica and the Nehemiah Home in Freetown, Sierra Leone.

At the year end the charity's reserves include a balance of £70,299 of restricted funds which comprise unexpended balances of grants and donations held for specific purposes. These include the agricultural and vocational training programmes in Sierra Leone.

The charity's unrestricted reserves of £241,727 also include £98,681 of designated funds which have been set aside out of unrestricted funds by the trustees for specific purposes, including both the agricultural training programme and vocational training programmes in Sierra Leone, a conference for our overseas partners, the Doulos International training programme and international teams.

The charitable company seeks to maintain adequate reserves to cover anticipated management and administrative expenses. The reserves currently held by the charity are sufficient to cover future development and therefore the charity is currently in line with the reserves policy.

The funding that the charity currently receives from Comic Relief and Big Lottery for projects in Freetown, Sierra Leone is due to end in September 2018. The trustees are in discussion as to how the charity will continue the work it has pioneered in Sierra Leone without this funding.

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

## Plans for the future

The next International Conference, based in central Wales, is moving closer, with preparations now fully under way. Planned for May – June 2017, all overseas partners, as well as UK based partners, are invited.

The deferred second team visit to Iraq is now scheduled to go ahead in autumn 2017.

One of LNI's UK-based partners is currently fund raising for a small peer support programme for pregnant teens in Sierra Leone.

The strategy to assist our Network partners in their bid to raise up the next tier of leaders continues by a variety of routes. Following on from the year-long secondment of two partners and their family from Peru to the UK, LNI continues to investigate options to develop the immersion concept further. The aim would be for partners to spend extended periods in the UK to experience and learn all of the training courses and development programmes that LifeLine offer, in order to develop strategies for their own nations.

#### Structure, governance and management

The Charity is a company limited by guarantee, as well as a registered charity and as such is a non-profit making organisation. It was incorporated on 21 July 2009 and its governing document is the Memorandum and Articles of Association

The charity identifies the need for new trustees. #### 1 Accounting policies

#### Charity information

Lifeline Network International is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Lifeline House, 25 Neville Road, Dagenham, Essex, RM8 3QS.

#### 1.1 Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Charity's [governing document], the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The Charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The Charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The accounts are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the Charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of freehold properties and to include investment properties and certain financial instruments at fair value. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

These accounts for the year ended 31 March 2017 are the first accounts of Lifeline Network International prepared in accordance with FRS 102, The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland. The date of transition to FRS 102 was 1 April 2015. The reported financial position and financial performance for the previous period are not affected by the transition to FRS 102.

## 1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

#### 1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise which have been set aside at the discretion of the Trustees for specific purposes. The purposes and uses of the designated funds are set out in the notes to the accounts.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts.

#### 1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the Charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the Charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

#### 1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the Charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

Deferred income represents amounts received for future periods where:

- The donor specifies that the grant or donation must only be used in future accounting periods; or
- The donor has imposed conditions which must be met before the charity has unconditional entitlement.

Investment income and any other form of income is accounted for on an accruals basis.

Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for goods and services provided in the normal course of business, net of discounts, VAT and other sales related taxes.

#### 1.5 Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category.

Costs of generating funds are the costs associated with attracting voluntary income.

Direct charitable expenditure is allocated to the relevant project or mission outreach as shown on the statement of financial activities. Administrative expenditure is classified according to the nature of the cost.

Governance costs include costs of the preparation and examination of the statutory accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and the cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

# 1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Fixtures, fittings & equipment

25% straight line

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in net income/(expenditure) for the year.

#### 1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the Charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

Intangible assets with indefinite useful lives and intangible assets not yet available for use are tested for impairment annually, and whenever there is an indication that the asset may be impaired.

#### 1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

#### 1.9 Financial instruments

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at amortised cost. Financial assets comprise cash at bank and in hand, together with trade and other debtors. A specific provision is made for debts for which recoverability is in doubt. Cash at bank and in hand is defined as all cash held in instant access bank accounts and used as working capital. Investments, including those in subsidiary undertakings are held at fair value at the balance sheet date, with gains and losses being recognised within income and expenditure. Financial liabilities held at amortised cost comprise all creditors except social security and other taxes, deferred income and provisions. Assets and liabilities held in foreign currencies are translated to GBP at the balance sheet date at an appropriate year end exchange rate.

#### 1.10 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the Charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

## 2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the Charity's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
