STRATEGIC REPORT

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES AND REVIEW OF THE BUSINESS

ADS GROUP LIMITED

ADS is the premier trade organisation representing the UK Aerospace, Defence, Security and Space industries. ADS has some 900 members and represents over 1,100 companies and their subsidiaries.

The primary sources of ADS income continue to be from membership subscriptions and revenue generated from organising member company participation at national and international exhibitions and events.

During 2014, ADS continued to focus its activities around six strategic priorities established in 2013:

- To improve the image and profile of our industries
- To influence the policy debates of most importance to our industries
- To support UK manufacturing and our industries supply chains
- To encourage investment in technology and innovation
- To support business development opportunities nationally and in priority international markets
- To increase member value

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The Company continued to pursue the financial framework established to guide its longer-term development, which included the following commitments:

- To break-even without the contribution from Farnborough International Limited
- To minimise increases in ADS membership subscription rates
- To generate revenue from attracting more members and them doing better business in the UK
- To increase revenue from non-member sources, particularly sponsorship

In 2014 ADS continued to look carefully at the structure and capability of its staff. In the latter part of the year, following formal consultation, steps were taken to restructure the ADS events team. The changes were focused on bringing into the team specific sales and sponsorship expertise, providing a more flexible resource and a more structured management process. During the year ADS recruited new directors for security and aerospace, following the decisions of Bob Rose and Graham Chisnall to retire.

ADS continued to increase its engagement with all member companies, particularly SMEs. During the year it undertook an increasing number of events to make it easier for companies to be involved and influence ADS activities. These included regular webinars on key issues and topics, free member events, an improved website and more systematic opportunities of members to influence policy development.

The member survey conducted during 2014 clearly demonstrated the increasing confidence members had in the organisation. There was strong support for the strategic priorities that had been established and confirmation that members, particularly SMEs, viewed ADS as delivering a high quality and value for money service.

During the year ADS received an offer from SAE International, an international association of engineers and technical experts from across the aerospace and automotive industries, for the purchase of its non-core technical standards and parts qualification activities. Following satisfactory completion of a due diligence process, these activities were sold to SAE effective 1 January 2015.

The Technology Strategy Board (subsequently renamed as Innovate UK) did not renew the contract with ADS for hosting the Aerospace, Aviation and Defence KTN and this terminated at the end of March 2014 with a clean independent accountant report.

ADS signed a grant offer letter from the Department of Business, Innovation and Skills in December to set up and host the UK Defence Solutions Centre. The UK Defence Solutions Centre is one of the core enduring capabilities established by the Defence Growth Partnership (DGP) and is charged with developing technology, capability and skills roadmaps to help improve the competitiveness of UK exports. Steve Brittan has been appointed as Chief Executive to lead a core team of permanent staff supplemented by industry secondees.

FARNBOROUGH INTERNATIONAL LIMITED

Farnborough International Airshow (FIA) continued its legacy as the UK iconic airshow brand by hosting aerospace and defence businesses from around the globe at the 2014 event generating multi-million pound orders for the Aerospace industry and in particular its UK SME supply chain. FIA 2014 was a commercial success for the Company with 1,501 exhibitors taking part from 39 countries and 180,000 trade and public visitors during the event.

FIA 2014 was also a great success for UK industry and the Prime Minister led a very strong political presence at the show despite the disruption of a cabinet reshuffle. The work of the Aerospace Growth Partnership and the launch of the implementation plan for the Defence Growth Partnership provided strong demonstrations of the benefits of industrial strategies. The cross party attendance provided opportunities to showcase many of the companies, particularly SMEs that are seeing the benefit of schemes such as NATEP, Sharing in Growth and MSC bursaries.

ADS was particularly proud of the success of the Innovation Zone and Futures Day at FIA 2014. The strong partnerships established with universities, research institutes, companies and the organisations delivering specialist support to young people saw a step change in the effectiveness of these activities.

Farnborough International Venue and Events (FIVE) continued to build its customer base and a number of successful events and exhibitions were held at the venue during 2014.

It is the intention of the directors to develop the business and maintain its global position by improving the infrastructure of the Farnborough site. The Company is embarking on a programme of works to ensure the sustainability and growth of future airshows and provide first class facilities to host exhibitions and other events. The Company completed the construction in 2014 of 38 permanent chalet units for the primary use of the airshow and these were ready for FIA 2014.

The Company has been granted planning permission and raised funding in principle toward Phase 2 of the site development; a 20,000 sqm exhibition and conference facility which it plans to build after FIA2016 to be ready for FIA2018.

The Company has successfully delivered through its core team's expertise international consultancy projects in Bahrain and India and is progressing other significant opportunities in a number of other countries. These projects are a key part of further promoting the Farnborough International Limited brand on the international stage, which will ultimately provide further benefits to the Farnborough airshow.

ADS TOULOUSE SARL

The company continued its principal activity of assisting member companies in accessing the French aerospace defence, security and space industries primarily in the Toulouse area by providing networking services, intelligence gathering and event organisation support.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The consolidated Income and Expenditure Account for the ADS group of companies is set out on page 13. Consolidated Operating Income and Operating Surplus increased significantly from the previous year by £26.5m from £16.4m to £42.9m, and by £10.0m from a loss of £3.1m to a surplus of £6.9m respectively. This outcome and profile is entirely normal for the group as Farnborough International Limited operates a two year business cycle with the majority of its revenue earned in a FIA year.

Whilst continuing to represent a membership base of around 900 companies, the Company experienced a marginal net negative churn in its SME membership of 13 companies at year end reflecting 121 new members joining and 134 companies ceasing membership. Membership subscription income increased by 6% from £3.9m to £4.1m compared with 2013 from an annual fee increase and improvement in active fee generating members during the year.

The Company's Operating Income performance was down by 7% from £14.5m to £13.4m on the previous year reflecting the expected outcome from the major biennial event calendar which alternates with FIA. The Company exceeded its bottom line plan before taxation by £170k by achieving an Operating Surplus of £472k.

The income derived from non subscription activities including the delivery of an events portfolio, government programmes and other initiatives was slightly down on 2013 primarily due to the timing of major biennial events mentioned previously.

The financial contribution of ADS Toulouse to the group continues to be small but the business performs an important strategic role within the organisation.

The group operates a defined benefit scheme, The Society of British Aerospace Companies Limited Pension and Life Assurance Scheme. The Scheme has been closed to new entrants since 2004. Following the January 2014 triennial actuarial valuation, the company has reached agreement with the Trustees to make good the £6.5m deficit funding over a period of 15 years by making additional annual payments into the Scheme, such payments increasing 3.5% cumulatively year on year.

POSITION OF THE COMPANY'S BUSINESS AT THE END OF THE YEAR

The consolidated Balance Sheet summary for the group at 31 December 2014 compared with two preceding years is included below. In view of the biennial nature of FIA and Farnborough International Limited's two year business cycle, assessment against 2012 is considered more informative to provide a comparable understanding of business performance.

The overall financial performance of the group including incremental improvement from ADS and strong performance from FIA is reflected in a stronger balance sheet with £2.0m increase in reserves compared to 2012 and £4.5m increase in Fixed Assets primarily due to investment in permanent infrastructure on the Farnborough site.

OUTLOOK 2015

The ADS 2015 business plan and budget looks to build on the steady progress made during 2014. ADS has greater financial stability, strengthening relationships with key governmental stakeholders, a more focussed set of core services and a higher profile across a range of stakeholder organisations and opinion formers.

In taking forward its programme of activities, ADS will provide strong support to the work of the Growth Partnerships and industrial strategies, encourage greater Member participation in our activities, build new relationships with important stakeholders and play an active role in shaping future public policy for the benefit of all Members.

In 2015 ADS will seek to position the UK aerospace, defence, space and security industries at the forefront of efforts to deliver growth, jobs, exports and national security. The continuing pressure on public expenditure will create a challenging public policy environment. During the build up to 2015 General Election, ADS has focussed on the importance of industrial strategies and secure cross party support for their continuation.

Supporting the growth partnerships now established across the aerospace, defence and security sectors, alongside the commitment to the space innovation and growth strategy will remain a core activity for ADS. A high priority will be attached to communicating the benefits of these initiatives and encouraging widespread participation by companies of all sizes.

In 2015 the development of the strategic defence and security review will have a significant impact on the business environment for member companies. ADS will take a lead in developing and communicating industry priorities and the role they can play in delivering national security.

The General Election has resulted in a number of new Parliamentarians and ADS will make establishing strong relationships with this new cohort a high priority. This will extend the work already underway to build understanding of our industries and their priorities with recently elected MEPs and newly appointed European Commissioners.

ADS will continue to build a positive understanding of the role and importance of UK aerospace, defence, security and space industries. There has been a very positive response to the improved quality of data available on our sectors. In 2015 ADS will use the data collected to increase media and opinion former awareness and interest.

ADS will actively support and promote the interests of UK manufacturing and companies operating at all levels of the supply chain. In 2015 ADS, working closely with our regional partners in the Aerospace and Defence Federation, will administer the National Aerospace Technology Exploitation Programme (NATEP). The programme made significant progress in 2014. ADS and its delivery partners will look to maximise participation and build a strong case for the longer-term continuation of this valuable scheme.

ADS will continue to develop and promote the SC21 programme, both nationally and internationally, and encourage greater participation in its activities. This tried and tested approach improves quality, cost and delivery and makes a significant return on investment within a year. ADS will work closely with the Sharing in Growth initiative to maximise awareness of the opportunities it provides and support the wider sharing of best practice that emerges from its work.

UK manufacturing and its supply chain has consistently made skills one of its highest priorities. ADS will work with Members and key stakeholders to encourage greater investment in skills provision. It will support the work of the Growth Partnerships and seek to ensure that the longer-term skills needs of our industries are recognised and appropriate actions undertaken to prepare for them. ADS will build on the success of Futures Day at the 2014 Farnborough International Airshow. It will establish a regular dialogue with the partners and sponsors of Futures Day to explore other opportunities to work together. This will include promotion of the 2015 UK Rocketry competition and support for the Department for Business, Innovation and Skills'.

Investment in new technology and innovation are essential to maintain our industries' global competitiveness. The Government's industrial strategies have put in place new mechanisms to help secure UK competitive advantage. ADS will work closely with the Aerospace Technology Institute, the Defence Solutions Centre and the Security Innovation and Demonstration Centre to support their work and maximise industry participation. ADS will have an important role in ensuring wider appreciation of these important new institutions and providing coherent industry input to their operation and development. ADS will continue to promote public understanding of our industries' technology priorities and seek to influence public funding to support these. ADS will help UK business to access the funding available and provide opportunities for Member companies to create links to key funders and potential partners.

ADS will continue to deliver a range of activities and services to promote the profile of UK capability in our industries and help Members to develop new business opportunities. This will include providing market intelligence, access to potential customers and platforms to present capabilities and expertise. ADS will work closely with UKTI DSO to ensure export activities are closely co-ordinated with the work being undertaken through the Defence Growth Partnership and the Security and Resilience Growth Partnership.

In 2015 ADS will deliver Aerodays, which is the European Commission's flagship event in Aviation research and innovation. It takes place once during each EU Research Framework Programme and is designed to present strategic perspectives for aviation, through research and innovation. Aerodays 2015 will take place in London in October and presents an important opportunity to showcase UK expertise and leadership in priority areas of technology.

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES FACING THE BUSINESS

The management of the business and execution of the Company's strategy are subject to a number of risks. These risks and the action plans to mitigate these risks are developed and regularly monitored by management on an ongoing basis. The most significant risks identified are as follows:

Membership numbers - the Company recognises the importance of continuing to deliver a strong value for money proposition on its core activities, particularly during a period of challenging economic conditions, in order to maintain and increase membership numbers and revenue. The Company has continued to focus on alignment of activities and deliverables based on strategic priorities to protect member engagement.

Government spending - the Company participates in sector relevant public sector funding programmes with the UK Government and contract renewal success is likely to be influenced by economic climate and availability of funds, prevailing policy and opinion of key individuals. The Company seeks to proactively engage with key stakeholders and decision makers to determine future plans, demonstrate impact and to influence future strategies for the benefit of the sectors that it promotes.

Liquidity risk - the Company retains sufficient cash to ensure that it has adequate funds for operational and working capital requirements and this is managed by a regular cash flow forecast. Facilities with the Company's bankers have been maintained in order to provide a safe level of headroom to cover liquidity fluctuations throughout the year.

ADS Group Limited (ADS) is an independent not-for profit organisation limited by guarantee and owned by its members. The principal activity of ADS is that of an association representing and promoting the United Kingdom aerospace, defence, security and space industries. ADS activities are primarily financed by membership subscriptions and events undertaken for the benefit of the members.

GROUP STRUCTURE

ADS owns the following subsidiary companies:

FARNBOROUGH INTERNATIONAL LIMITED

Farnborough International Limited is a wholly owned subsidiary undertaking registered in England and Wales. The company's share capital is £2 dividend into 2 shares of £1 each.

ADS TOULOUSE SARL

ADS Toulouse SARL is a wholly owned subsidiary undertaking, registered in France. The company's share capital is €38,500 divided into 38,500 shares of €1 each. The principal activity of the company is to assist member companies in accessing the French aerospace, defence, security and space industries primarily in the Toulouse area by providing networking services, intelligence gathering and event organisation support.

THE DEFENCE MANUFACTURERS ASSOCIATION LIMITED

The DMA is a wholly owned subsidiary undertaking registered in England and Wales. The company's share capital is £1 divided into 1 share of £1. The company did not trade during the year.

THE SOCIETY OF BRITISH AEROSPACE COMPANIES LIMITED

SBAC is a wholly owned subsidiary undertaking registered in England and Wales. The company's share capital is £1 divided into 1 share of £1. The company did not trade during the year.

ADS ADVANCED ENGINEERING (INDIA) PRIVATE LIMITED.

ADS Advanced Engineering (India) Private Limited is a 100% beneficially owned subsidiary undertaking registered in India on 12 December 2013. The company's share capital is INR 100,000 divided into 10,000 shares of INR 10 each. The company exists to further UK members interests in India.

GOVERNANCE

The Company, an independent not-for-profit organisation, is governed by its Articles Association and operates on a commercial basis for the benefit of its members.

The Company's affairs are controlled by the Council, which is elected by the members. Unless otherwise determined by a general meeting, the Council consists of up to 25 members appointed by Council and 25 members elected by the members, which meets three times during the year. The members of Council which are directors of the company are shown on page 1. The next Council elections will take place in the last quarter of 2015.

None of the directors have any financial interests in the company or its subsidiary undertakings. The Company has maintained a directors' and officers' liability insurance policy to indemnify the directors and officers of the Company against loss arising from any claim made against them by reason of any actual or alleged wrongful act in their capacity as director or officer.

The Finance and Operating Board meets four times a year. It is responsible for overseeing the company's financial, commercial, operational and strategic matters and regularly reviews the principal risks facing the organisation and develops and implements the procedures and policies needed to address those risks.

The Company also operates an audit sub-committee, which meets once a year to discuss the findings of the external auditor from the annual statutory audit engagement and potential actions to address recommendations.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable United Kingdom accounting standards.

BASIS OF CONSOLIDATION

The consolidated financial statements incorporate those of ADS Group Limited and all of its subsidiary undertakings for the year. Subsidiaries acquired during the year are consolidated using the acquisition method. Their results are incorporated from the date that control passes. All financial statements are made up to 31 December 2014 for all active subsidiaries.

All intra-group transactions, balances and unrealised gains on transactions between group companies are eliminated on consolidation. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of an impairment of the asset transferred.

No separate Income and Expenditure Account has been presented for the company alone as permitted in Section 408 of the Companies Act 2006.

GOING CONCERN

The Directors have reviewed the Group's cash flows and the available finance to enable it to continue to invest in and develop its exhibition and events site.

On the basis of their review they have determined that the group has sufficient working capital for its needs for at least 12 months from the date of signing of these accounts.

OPERATING INCOME

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Operating income is derived from subscription income, events, government grants, the Farnborough International biennial airshow and the supply of services to similar airshows around the world. Subscription income is received annually from all members of ADS Group. Operating income is accounted for on an

Both event revenue and costs are recognised in the period in which the event has been completed. Deposits, relating to an event, received in advance are recorded as deferred income in the balance sheet.

Government grants are recognised in the Income and Expenditure account so as to match them with expenditure towards which they are intended to contribute.

TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

Tangible fixed assets costing more than £500 are capitalised and included at cost, including any incidental expenses of acquisition.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost net of depreciation and any provision for impairment. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset evenly over its expected useful life, as follows:

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

INVESTMENTS

Unquoted investments held as fixed assets comprise shares in subsidiary undertakings and are stated at cost, less provision for impairment in value.

IMPAIRMENTS

Fixed assets are reviewed for impairment if events or charges in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable or as otherwise required by relevant accounting standards.

STOCK

Stocks comprise goods held for resale and are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSLATION

- When preparing the group accounts the income and expenditure account and balance sheets of the subsidiaries denominated in foreign currencies have been translated to sterling using the closing rate/net investment method.
- Exchange differences arising from the retranslation at the closing rate have been recorded as a movement on reserves.
- Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded in sterling at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities are retranslated at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All exceeding differences are taken to the Income and Expenditure account.

DEFERRED TAXATION

- Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date where transactions or events that result in an obligation to pay more tax in the future or a carright to pay less tax in the future have occurred at the balance sheet date. Timing differences are differences between the group's taxable profits and its results as stated in the financial statements that arise from the minclusion of gains and losses in tax assessments in periods different from those in which they are recognised in the financial statements.
- Deferred tax is measured at the average tax rates that are expected to apply in the periods in which timing differences are expected to reverse, based on tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date. Deferred tax is measured on a non-discounted basis.

LEASES

- Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the income and expenditure account on a straight line basis over the lease term.
- Assets held under finance leases and other similar contracts, which confer rights and obligations similar to the attached to owned assets are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are depreciated over their useful lives. The capital element of future lease obligations are recorded as liabilities, while the interest elements are charged to the income and expenditure over the period of the leases to produce a constant rate of charge on the balance of the capital repayments outstanding.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

PENSION COSTS

Retirement benefits to employees are funded by contributions from ADS, its subsidiary undertaking FIL and employees to a defined benefits scheme. The assets and liabilities of the scheme are held separately from ADS in The Society of British Aerospace Limited Pension and Life Assurance Plan.

Contributions to the Group's defined benefit pension scheme are charged in the Income and Expenditure Account so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees working lives within the Group. The pension cost is assessed in accordance with the advice of qualified actuaries. A valuation for the purpose of FRS 17 is provided by the scheme's actuary. Actuarial gains and losses are recognised within the Statement of Recognised Gains and Losses under the heading "Pension scheme actuarial gain/(loss) on defined benefit pension schemes".

The Group also contributes to defined contribution schemes for eligible employees. The cost of the Group's contributions to these schemes is charged in the Income and Expenditure Account in the year for which they are made.

In order to maintain the security of accrued defined benefits and where existing funds appear to be insufficient, additional deficit funding contributions are required. Following the 2014 actuarial valuation, the deficit funding contribution for the year commencing 1st February 2015 has been agreed at £202,708 and increases at a rate of 3.5% each year on the previous contribution. Payments will be made annually until 2028 with a final 3 month contribution due in 2029.

Defined contribution scheme

The group also contributes to defined contribution schemes for eligible employees. Contributions to these schemes in the year amounted to £226,661 (2013: £172,899)
