DIRECTORS' AND TRUSTEES' REPORT

The directors/trustees present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 30th September 2017.

Directors' Responsibilities

Company Law which is also applicable to charitable companies in England and Wales requires the directors, who are also trustees of the company, to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the results of the company for that year.

In preparing those financial statements, the directors/trustees are required to:

select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently; observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The directors/trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Disclosure of information to examiner

So far as each director at the date of approval of this report is aware:

- there is no relevant audit information of which the company's examiner is unaware; and
- the directors have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant information and to establish that the earniner is aware of that information.

Principal activity and charitable objective

The objects of the charity are to advance education for the public benefit by establishing a non-profit making school to teach all the aspects of the design and making of historical clothing for theatre, cinema and the living history movement with particular focus on developing skills in historical tailoring.

Organisation and constitution

The company was incorporated on 13th September 2009 and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. The company became a Registered Charity on 1st June 2011, charity number 1142188.

The company is limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The guarantees of individual members are limited to £1.

Company Registration number 7017312.

Public benefit

In shaping the Charity, the trustees have considered the Charity Commissions Guidance on public benefit.

Courses and Events

In October 2016 we held two free courses for a total of 28 students on the subject of '16th Century Tournament Clothing for Horse & Rider'. Places on these courses were given to students who could not afford the courses fees we normally charge. In March we held several half-day events for groups from 'The Friends of the V&A', followed in May by an intensive one month-long course on '400 Years of European Fashion' divided into modules that were taken by a variety of students from Italy, Sweden, Denmark and the UK. These were all well attended and in many cases they were fully booked. Also in March, students studying Classics at King's College, London, came for a one—day course on the clothing of ancient Rome and Egypt, using our school collection of Coptic garment fragments. In addition to these TSHD classes we also ran workshops during the summer for other institutions such as The Rose Playhouse Trust, The 'Understanding British Portraits' group from the National Portrait Gallery, the International Costume Committee of Museums and the 'Take One Picture' series of classes for primary school teachers at the National Gallery. Our series of 9 courses throughout the autumn of 2017 included those on the subjects of 'The Cut of Peascod Doublets', 'Tailoring in Garments 1400-1800', 'Exploring Flat Pattern Cutting', 17th Century Bobbin Lace', '100 Years of Whitework', Historical Leather Techniques for Clothing 1400-1800', 'Pockets & Pocket Hoops' and 'The Nature of Fabrics 1400-1800'. All the courses were well attended; four of them were fully booked with waiting lists.

Collaborations

The 'Spanish Baroque Doll' project funded, by the AHRC through the Early Dress & Textile Network, of which the V&A Museum and King's College, London, were partners, was completed and presented on two occasions at the V&A and King's College in 2017. Since then, the dolls have been in high demand for bookings with the V&A Learning Department and have been used by them for classes with various diverse interest groups including fashion and costume university students, secondary school groups and even by groups of adults with dementia. The short film on undressing of Elegy XX, a c.1600 poem by John Donne, and also funded by the AHRC, was completed in Spring 2017 and made available for viewing through the King's College website. The THSD will now use the film as a teaching aid. The collaborative project between TSHD and the Art Institute of Chicago, to produce Renaissance war and tournament clothing for their new armour gallery within the 'Deering Family Galleries of Medieval and Renaissance Art, Arms, and Armor' was completed in 2017. Two of our teachers went to Chicago in in December 2016 to install the clothing in the new gallery, which was opened the following March to great acclaim by the press and visiting public. A new collaboration between our school and a group of institutions (The Rijksmuseum, Amsterdam University, Huis van Hilde Archeological Centre, and Kap Skil Museum in the Netherlands began in December 2016 when our teachers Melanie Braun and Jenny Tiramani were invited to the Huis van Hilde in Castricum to discuss our possible contribution to the study and publication of the textiles and clothing recovered from the mid-17th century shipwreck BZN17, discovered at Texel, in the north of the country. Subsequent visits in 2017 and award of the necessary funding, led to our school being engaged to carry out the detailed pattern-taking of 28 objects in the spring of 2018. A publication and reconstructions of some key items is planned for 2019-20. This is a highprofile contract and a valuable opportunity for us to add to our knowledge, which will in turn be passed on to our students.

Publications

The second in our series of books on The Hopkins Collection, 'WAISTCOATS' written by Vanessa and Alan Hopkins was published and launched by our Patron, Sir Roy Strong, on the 28th February at St Margaret Pattens Church. Sales of both this, and the previous volume 'FOOTWEAR' continue to sell steadily, both directly from us and from our distributor, Central Books. Work on the third book published under our TSHD imprint, 'PATTERNS OF FASHION 5: The cut & construction of bodies, stays, hoops & rumps c.1595-1795'; has continued all year and is now nearing completion, prior to publication in the autumn of 2018.

Work to our new premises

As well as honouring our teaching commitments throughout this financial year we continued with the refurbishment of 52 Lambeth Road. The first floor library and archive rooms were fitted out (with help from 15 volunteers) and the Janet Arnold Archive and her book collection were installed. On the same floor two study rooms were also completed ready for use by visiting scholars and students. Emergency lighting and a smoke/fire alarm system were installed throughout the building, together with historically appropriate fire doors, fire extinguishers and signage. All these were approved by Southwark Building Control and Red Point, our fire consultants. A disabled

toilet was built on the ground floor and a wheelchair ramp instated so that we can teach disbled students who now have access the the whole of the ground floor, including our main classroom and bookshop. Building works also included the repair and restoration of the exterior stucco and woodwork to an 1840s-appropriate colour scheme. During the repair work the original signage for The Royal South London Dispensary was discovered under layers of post WWI cement. The signage was reinstated on both the eastern and southern faces of the building. In 2017 sufficient funds were donated to enable us to renovate our two lower-ground floor storage rooms up to international museum standards. Once this work is complete, we can qualify as a museum and this will be another important step forward for us. We continue to attract enough course fees and donations to keep our school in a healthy financial position. So far, we have found the running costs of 52 Lambeth Road are relatively low for a building in Central London and this allows us to keep our fees to a level that those without huge resources can afford to come and study here. Our director and founder, Santina Levey, passed away in the summer 2017 and we have been gathering small donations, given in her memory, since then. We plan to start offering student bursaries with these funds, so that we can offer more free places in our quest to make the study of the history of dress available more widely.

Examiner

A resolution proposing the appointment of Frank Lachman as examiner will be submitted at the Annual General Meeting.

Risk management

The company undertakes periodic reviews for different areas of risk including insurance cover, health and safety policies in the workplace and whilst teaching, working with young children, financial affairs; personnel practices; ICT technology.

Reserves policy

The Board of Trustees have established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds held by the charity should cover a minimum of six months running costs (salaries and overheads).

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 30th September 2017

1 Accounting Polices

(a) The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

As a small company, The School of Historic Dress Limited has not presented a cashflow in these accounts on the basis of the small company exemption under FSR102, section 7.

The School of Historic Dress Limited meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

Reconciliation with previous Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

In preparing the accounts, the trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 the restatement of comparative items was required.

After reviewing these, no adjustment was concidered necessary.

(b) Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the items of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. Income from grants, whether capital or revenue grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants has been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

(c) Expenditure

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party. It is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Costs are allocated to a category either because such costs are directly incurred in relation to such category, or because they are support costs in respect of which an apportionment has been made between the categories.

Support costs consist of infrastructure costs for salaries, premises, office administration. Such costs are apportioned on a reasonable and consistent basis to the various categories with a view to determining, as accurately as possible, the total resources expended for each category. The basis of apportionment used is either a function of staff time applied to a given activity, or an estimate of the proportion of costs associated with the same, or a combination of both.

Direct and Support costs are separately shown by natural classification in Note 5 to these accounts for each category of cost.

(d) Taxation

The company as a registered charity (number 1142188) is exempt from taxation on most investment income insofar as it is applied for charitable purposes. The company is also exempt from taxation on capital gains.

(e) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

(f) Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.
