THE BIRMINGHAM BATTALION OF THE BOYS' BRIGADE REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2013

The Trustees, who are also directors of the company for the purposes of the Companies Act, submit their annual report and the independently examined financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2013. The Trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in 2005 in preparing the annual report and financial statements of the charity.

Our aims and objectives

Purposes and aims

Our charity's purposes as set out in the objects contained in the company's memorandum of association are:

- (1) The advancement of Christ's Kingdom among boys and the promotion of habits of obedience, reverence, discipline, self respect and all that tends towards a true Christian manliness; and
- (2) The advancement of Christ's Kingdom among girls and the promotion of habits of obedience, reverence, discipline, self respect among girls; and
- (3) Any such other charitable and lawful activities as may be approved by the Directors,

particularly (but without limiting the general nature of the Objects) in Birmingham, West Midlands, and East Midlands areas and any other areas in which a Boys' Brigade company which is at any time a company member of the Charity as provided for in the Articles of Association of the Charity.

Ensuring our work delivers our alms

We will review our aims, objectives and activities each year. This review looks at what we have achieved and the outcomes of our work for the year ended 31 August 2013. The review looks at each key activity and the benefits brought to the people we are set up to help. The review also helps us to ensure our aim, objectives and activities remain focused on our stated purposes. We have referred to the guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aim and objectives in planning our future activities. In particular the Trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

The focus of our work

The focus of our work is in 45 locations where we work with young people in the age range 5 – 18 years and we engage them through positive activities through our four programmes, Anchors, Juniors, Discover and Challenge Plus. This is our 'core work' and is delivered by our 400 volunteer leaders each week which is also supplemented by a wide range of activities organised centrally for the benefit of the young people. As part of these activities we are able to provide the young people with opportunities for residential experiences.

How our activities deliver public benefit

Membership of our movement gives the young people the opportunity to develop their life skills and become responsible citizens in our society – this is backed up by a number of our young people who quote, "BB has influenced my life a lot because we learn what is right and wrong" and also "I have made many friends and have learnt valuable life skills that will help me through life". Further The Battalion has participated in the government-backed 'Youth United' scheme, which has led to the establishment of a number of new companies in areas of urban deprivation

Who used and benefited from our services?

We support over 1,200 young people as members of the Boys' Brigade movement who have experienced informal education helping them to grow and develop. In addition to this work we have also been able to provide work-related training opportunities for young unemployed people which has led to a number of them being placed into full time employment.

Fundraising activities

All of The Birmingham Battalion of the Boys' Brigade's fundraising activities are carried out in accordance with the laws regulating charity fundraising and are designed exclusively to provide raised voluntary income to support and enhance the main activities of the charity. The Battalion raises funds through receipt of donated goods into its charity shop and recycling project and through a range of other opportunities and supporters from grant making trusts, local government initiatives and the local community.

Volunteers

Volunteers are highly valued and play, in all aspects of the charity's activities, a very significant role within The Birmingham Battalion of the Boys' Brigade. The charity relies upon help not only from its own volunteer members but from a significant number of outside volunteers without whom the charity would not be able to operate as well. The fundralsing department is heavily reliant upon the support of volunteers and in particular in its charity shop where volunteers play a significant major role under the guidance of the charity's shop manager. The contribution from these volunteers cannot be readily quantified, but the trustees would like to thank everyone for their contribution. The Battalion continues to provide a significant range of relevant training courses for volunteers, which have been consistently well supported during the year.

Financial Review

It has been a tough year for the Charity with grant funding becoming harder to obtain. The Urban Buddies project finished at the end of December 2012 having utilised all surplus brought forward at 1 September 2012 from the grants received in the previous year. The charity continues to receive support from the Boys' Brigade in Birmingham Stechford Trust with their core funding grants. Grants from other charities have been received but at a much reduced level. Our subsidiary company, The Birmingham Boys' Brigade Shops Limited, made a surplus of £16,444 of which £16,000 has been passed up to the Battalion.

The Charity has received further restricted grant funding of £25,000 for the recycling project from the Community Action Against Crime Innovation Fund (CAACIF) to continue to help establish and develop sustainable training and working opportunities for ex-offenders. The grant is being paid over to the Birmingham Boys' Brigade Trading Limited, the subsidiary operating the recycling project, as the costs are incurred. This funding is not continuing beyond this financial year. Grants totalling £18,875 have been received from the Department of Work and Pensions (DWP) to help cover the cost of a warehouse supervisor for the recycling project. As with the CAACIF funding this has been paid over to the subsidiary as required.

During the year under review the Charity continued to plan and develop further services and to seek the necessary funding to support these plans. As mentioned, grants have been received for some of these plans and the resultant services are starting to commence. However, as funding uncertainties continue to exist there is a wait for response for requests for further funding to enable these new services and projects to be brought to full fruition.

The Charity has a surplus of incoming resources on its administration of the core activities of £6,966, which after a transfer from restricted funds of £3,500, leaves a surplus of £10,466. From this is deducted the £9,589 deficit of funds brought forward leaving a surplus on general account of £877. The Charity is hopeful that the income generated by the trading subsidiaries will in future years cover the administration costs and also add back to reserves.

Principal funding sources

The principal funding sources are by way of grants received from The Boys' Brigade in Birmingham Stechford Trust, donations from other charities and general public, together with income generated by the Charity Shop trading subsidiary company. The Charity's income also includes some recharges of expenses to the subsidiary company running the recycling project. Further grants from the CAACIF and new grants from the DWP were received during the year.

Reserves policy

The Trustees have examined the Charity's requirements for reserves in light of the main risks to the organisation. A policy is to be established whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets should be around 3 months expenditure. Budgeted core activity expenditure for 2013/2014 is £79,428 and therefore the target is to be £26,500 in general funds. The reserves are needed to meet the working capital requirements of the Charity and the Trustees are confident that at this level the Charity's activities are sustainable. The present level of reserves falls short of this target level. The Trustees expect the strategy to build reserves through future surpluses will be achieved within the next 2-3 years. In the short term the Trustees will carefully monitor the existing activities and the planned future activities to assess any changes which may be required.

Plans for future periods

Our 'core work' will remain steadfastly at the heart of what we do through continuing the four programmes for children and young people between the ages of 5-18. To develop this 'core work' further there will be additional new companies started in the new year. The Urban Buddies project finished at the end of December 2012 but the aims of that project are to continue in a different format and will continue to form a key part of engaging children and young people, with them joining one of our member companies. To help fund the aims and activities the Charity, through its subsidiary companies is increasing the recycling business opportunity through greater volumes of textiles and the addition of furniture sales. The Charity Shop business will be merged with the Recycling business to streamline the operation. We will continue to explore further opportunities to expand the operations. Funds generated by the subsidiaries will not only be used to continue funding the 'core work' but also to provide work training opportunities and to help in creating jobs in an area of high unemployment.

Structure, governance and management

Governing document

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee and was incorporated on 23 September 2009. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

Members

The members of the Charity shall be all of the following who hold such positions with a company member namely:

- (a) Leaders (other than Helpers as defined in Boys' Brigade Regulations) and:
- (b) Staff Sergeants:

together with Honorary Officers of the Battalion.

A company member is, a company that is registered from time to time as a member of the Birmingham Battalion of the Boys' Brigade pursuant to Boys' Brigade Regulations. A company member is not a member of the Charity.

Structure, governance and management (continued)

Recruitment and appointment of directors

The directors of the company are also charity trustees ("Trustees") for the purposes of charity law and are responsible for the management of The Battalion. The number of directors shall not be less than two but (unless otherwise determined by ordinary resolution) shall not be subject to any maximum. Directors are appointed for a specific term, not exceeding three years. Directors are recruited from the membership of the charitable company.

Trustee induction and training

Most trustees are already familiar with the practical work of the Charity having been members of the previous unincorporated Birmingham Battalion of the Boys' Brigade Management Group. New trustees will receive a short training session and a written summary of their obligations as charity trustees to familiarise themselves with the Charity and the context in which it operates. The training sessions are jointly led by the Chairman of the Trustees, the Treasurer and the Chief Executive of the Charity and cover both their legal responsibilities and:

- the obligations of Trustees;
- the main documents which set out the operational framework for the Charity including the Memorandum and Articles;
- resourcing and the current financial position as set out in the latest accounts and future plans and objectives.

Responsibilities of the Trustees

The Trustees (who are also directors of The Birmingham Battalion of the Boys' Brigade for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for the year. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities' SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements:
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Trustees

Trustees, who are directors for the purposes of company law and trustees for the purpose of charity law, who served during the period and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1.

The Trustees have complied with the duty in Section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission.

1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the period.

(a) Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the inclusion of fixed assets at market value, and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued in March 2005 and applicable accounting standards.

(b) Preparation of consolidated financial statements

The financial statements contain information about The Birmingham Battalion of the Boy's Brigade and do not contain consolidated financial information as the parent company of a group. The company has taken the option under Section 398 of the Companies Act 2006 not to prepare consolidated financial statements.

(c) Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds represent funds that are expendable at the discretion of the Management Group in the furtherance of the objects of the Charity. Such funds may be held in order to finance both working capital and capital investment. Designated funds are those funds which are unrestricted in nature but which have been designated by the Management Group to be used in a particular manner.

Restricted funds represent funding received for specific projects and are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor, contract partners or through the terms of an appeal.

(d) Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the Charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Voluntary income by way of grants, donations and gifts is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable.

Where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the Charity, they are recognised when it becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the Charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.

Incoming resources from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for by the Charity as it earns the right to consideration by its performance. Where income is received in advance of performance it is treated as deferred income and included within creditors.

(e) Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the Charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the Charity and include examiner's fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the Charity.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the Statement of Financial Activities on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity comprise both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

(f) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

The initial cost incurred by the Charity in providing equipment, fixtures and fittings and motor vehicles is capitalised. The cost of the tangible fixed assets is written off to revenue in equal instalments over their estimated useful lives

Fixtures, fittings and equipment 10% - 20% straight line
Shop equipment 10% - 20% straight line
Computer equipment 20% - 33.33% straight line
Motor vehicles 15% straight line

(g) Investments

Fixed asset investments are stated at market value.

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

(i) Operating leases

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are reflected in the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred.
