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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES for the Year Ended 30 June 2016

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2016. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (the FRSSE) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims for the Public Benefit

The charity's objectives are to relieve sickness and preserve the physical and mental health of cancer patients and their carers in South Wales by providing or assisting in the provision of equipment, facilities and services not normally provided by the statutory authorities, in particular but not exclusively through the provision of support, information and complimentary therapies including Reiki and Indian Head Massage.

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty of section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission. This guidance has been referred to when reviewing the Charity's aims and objectives in planning future activities.

Volunteers

The shop and cafe are manned by volunteers. The value of any voluntary help is not included in the accounts.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The charity venue was established when the lease of a large building was acquired rent free in lieu of the charity incurring expenditure to make the building fit for its purpose. With a great deal of help from volunteers, 2010 saw the creation of a charity shop, a work room, sorting and recycling room, a book area and a small kitchen.

Work then turned to creating a quiet haven for a coffee shop at the rear of the building where drinks and food are sold at slightly above wholesale prices. Once this was completed, attention was focused on the first floor "tranquillity room" and a "pamper room" for hospital patients. These have now been renamed the "Blue Room" and the "Pink Room".

The 'tranquillity room' or 'Blue Room' continues to be used by various counselling groups including Cruse Bereavement, Pembrokeshire Counselling Services, the Pembrokeshire Breast Cancer Support Group and more recently Serin and church counsellors from CCFW.

The 'Pink Room' is used by our beauty therapists and our podiatrist and this year we have installed a much needed new storage area of cupboards and drawer units with two sinks, one for normal use and one for sterilisation use.

The Third room for therapists is called the "Yellow Room" and it continues to be used to offer lymphoedema massage etc. Patients receive different massages with the sole purpose of relieving pain and encouraging a good night's sleep.

The installation of central heating into the building last year with two radiators per treatment room has made a difference to the comfort of patients and staff alike - in the past we have closed therapies down because of the extreme cold weather.

The studio/workshop at the rear of the building continues to be used by all of our patients. This proves very effective during the summer months for those patients who wish to partake in heavier and messier art and craft sessions. These sessions are weekly. We have a problem in the winter months as again the roof is made of zinc and at times it is too cold to work in there.

The charity continues to offer the studio to various artists to give more art therapy to patients and carers. For example, the patients have utilised this facility to make such things as three-tier cake stands, drilling recycled old plates and either taking them home or offering them in the shop for sale.

When it is particularly hot, the very successful coffee mornings (Talking Shop) are held in the studio spreading out into the garden. We have continued allowing guests to give information to patients and carers on subjects close to their concerns as well as fun items and little "concerts" in the sunshine. These days have proved to be very popular and the numbers continue to increase.

The 'Bucketeers', a group of patients under the baton of a retired local teacher, have branched out into learning the popular instrument, the Ukulele, and meet regularly with another teacher on Fridays in our basement room, next to the sorting area. This group continues to go from strength to strength.

Overseas students from Pembrokeshire College continue to attend one day a week to improve their English; some call in more than once - their presence is always welcome and the cross pollination of cultures adds another dimension to volunteers and patients interest alike.

The local schools contact us to place their 15 and 16 year old students in our venue for work experience and, this year alone, we have hosted 16 Duke of Edinburgh students compared with seven last year.

Local gardening club members adopted the area from the car park into our "secret garden" having donated many plants and bushes for this area. This is an ongoing, very therapeutic activity and the garden is a delight in summer with all the birds that are encouraged to visit this little oasis of peace.

The Tearoom has spread into the garden very successfully. The volunteers expertly specialise in vegetarian food, gluten free, dairy free and other supportive diets for patients, carers and the general public alike.

This year we supported seven patients and their families sadly towards their final days. During hospital stays we send flowers and cards, visit them and when discharged our therapists carry out treatments in their homes. All of these patients were volunteers in the shop for a considerable time before their deaths. Many of our volunteers are patients that start by attending our coffee morning and having free treatments.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities

They move into recovery and either drop away restoring normal family life and putting the cancer years behind them if they are fairly young with a family to look after or they forge long and lasting friendships and become part of the Bucketful 'family'. We have noticed that our patient volunteers are falling more and more into the over 60's bracket.

Work on the fabric of the building has come to an end and now the day to day running continues to tick over like a well oiled machine. The charity is still concentrating on more specialist training for its therapists who regularly operate in the venue. There are three fully qualified therapists dealing with massage and pain relief, a podiatrist, two beauticians and several counsellors who see patients in their homes or the hospital if they are unable to make their appointments at the charity's venue.

Every year our founder (Chris Evans-Thomas) has been asked to attend various organisations to talk about the work that is carried out in the venue and the ongoing state of play with regard to the 'Hospital Situation'. She has continued to attend many meetings with Hywel Dda University Health Board with regard to the proposed new Cancer Care Day Unit.

Our Coffee Morning and volunteer group became a "Focus Group" attending monthly meetings with the Local Health Board and they were encouraged to partake in the planning of the new unit.

The pressure applied by our patients on the Health Board to reach some conclusion with regard to the proposed new Unit was finally successful when a statement was made announcing the completion date for the new unit as January 2017.

Chris' work in this area was recognised by the awarding of an M.B.E.

Haematology and oncology day unit

As well as supporting cancer sufferers, the charity has fought hard for many years to try and save cancer services at our local hospital. Hywel Dda University Health Board finally announced that building work on the new chemotherapy day unit at Withybush Hospital would start on 4th July 2016.

On Saturday 28th January 2017, the new state of the art unit was opened by HM Lord-Lieutenant of Dyfed, Sara Edwards. It is now known as the haematology and oncology day unit. This was a very proud day for the charity especially as it had also contributed £150,000 towards the project so that equipment and facilities could be upgraded beyond what would otherwise have been the case.

Plans for future periods

Our future plans in 2017 following the completion of the new unit are to make more use of the studio by eventually putting a new solid roof with velux windows in on the body of the building and extending the heating into this area. This will free our three rooms upstairs for training purposes at least once or twice per month.

We hope to move the contents of one of the rooms upstairs to make an upstairs bathroom and toilet for our patients following the work intended for the studio.

We have run three very successful MTI Sessions for our therapists as well as other therapists dealing with cancer patients in our county.

We would like to liaise closer with other cancer support charities to deliver a more effective blanket of services.

We would also like to work much closer with the hospital lymphoedema department in preventative support to breast cancer patients.

MacMillan's have taken our brochures and are now sending them out to all Pembrokeshire patients.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The end of the period saw financial reserves standing at £202,142 (2015 - 198,872), with income exceeding expenditure by £3,270 (2015 - net expenditure of £883).

After the year-end, £150,000 was contributed to the new haematology and oncology day unit and reserves have therefore decreased by a corresponding amount.

It is currently the policy of the charity to maintain reserves at a level which equates to approximately 12 months expenditure in order that the charity can continue to function if sources of income decrease.

Principal funding sources

The charity has a high profile within the local area. Principle funding sources come from donations, from local fundraising events as well as realisation of donated goods within the charity shop.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Adam's Bucketful of Hope Appeal Limited charity was incorporated on 6th November 2009 under the Companies Act 2006 as a private company limited by guarantee (Company Number 07068880). It was also registered as a charity on 29 June 2010 with the Charity Commission for England and Wales (Charity Number 1136641). It is governed by its memorandum and articles amended by resolution on 25 May 2010.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The trustees welcome new trustees or members who can assist with the development of the company. New appointees receive support and guidance from their fellow trustees.

Induction and training of new trustees

New trustees are briefed on their legal obligations under charity and company law, and the content of the Memorandum and Articles of Association. They are also given the opportunity to meet employees and other trustees.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRSSE) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (the FRSSE) (effective 1 January 2015)', the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015) and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Improvements to property - 5% on cost

Plant and machinery - 15% on reducing balance

Computer equipment - 25% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
