OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES OVERVIEW

The principal objectives of the charitable company, as stated in the Articles of Association are as follows:

- The relief of unemployment in such ways as may be thought fit, including assistance to find employment;
- The prevention or relief of poverty by providing grants, items and services to individuals in need and/or charities, or other organisations working to prevent or relieve poverty;
- To promote social inclusion for the public's benefit by preventing people from becoming socially excluded, relieving the needs of those people who are socially excluded and assisting them to integrate into society:
- To relieve sickness and to preserve and protect health, including without limitation to provide assistance from every aspect of the rehabilitation of people who are sick or injured; and
- To advance such other purposes which are regarded as exclusively charitable under the law of every part of the United Kingdom as the Trustees from time to time think fit.

The Trustees of WISE Ability Services Limited review the company's operations regularly, to ensure the organisation's growth and service delivery is in line with its charitable ethos and purpose. There are regular reviews to maintain good employment practices in line with Equality and Diversity Policy and Acts.

FOCUS OF WORK

WISE Ability Services Limited is a charity focused on reducing inequalities and improving the lives of the most vulnerable participants of the community through its successful delivery of the Building Better Opportunities UCan project.

WISE Ability Services is an affiliated company with WISE Ability Limited (Charity Number 1132065 and Company Registration Number 06749024), a dynamic, innovative and growing charitable organisation with established offices and teams across England, delivering social and economic inclusion programmes for disadvantaged participants. WISE Ability Limited was founded by WISE Employment Ltd, an Australian charity that provides employment and support services in Australia to over 35,000 participants annually.

PROJECTS AND ACHIEVEMENTS IN 2019-2020

PROJECTS

Over the past 12 months WISE Ability Services Limited has delivered the following:

Building Better Opportunities (BBO) project, UCan

Building Better Opportunities (BBO) project, UCan, is a project funded by the National Lottery Community Fund that uses match funding from the European Social Fund for projects across England that tackle poverty and promote social inclusion. WISE Ability Services was successful in securing funding for BBO 1.4: Active inclusion, to deliver a project in the Dorset Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP) area in the South of England.

UCan, which has been live since September 2017, supports people aged 25 and over who are unemployed or economically inactive, into employment, education, and training. The overall aim of UCan is to support disadvantaged adults living in deprivation across the Dorset LEP area who face multiple and complex barriers. UCan is responsive to participants and their circumstances by offering significant holistic support that targets their barriers and needs, and builds individual strengths to gain and enhance skills, resilience. Participants complete training tailored to help them gain sustainable employment, independence and social inclusion. The goals of participants are varied and support typically focuses on multiple areas including:

- Access and connect to a range of valuable, well established, and well regarded community-based services and supports, particularly for the most pressing needs such as accommodation, emergency income assistance, transportation, gaining valid identification, mental health and substance abuse treatment, and many other services.
- Develop the skills, confidence and resilience needed to live and thrive in the community.
- Identify personal and career goals, and explore the job market where the jobs are and what type of work they want to do.
- Develop and update job skills or gain qualifications, through a range of courses with appropriate levels of support that best suit their needs and goals.
- Undertake personalised job coaching from staff with local knowledge and specialist employment skills
- Connect with potential employers and provide support throughout the recruitment process.
- Identify modifications to the workplace that may be required.
- Establish and reconnect with social support networks and help customers reunite with family members.
- Once employment is secured, we continue providing in-work support.

Profile of participants accessing our services

Our UCan participants are from different backgrounds and face considerable barriers, for example: work-limiting health problems and disabilities, mental illness, economic hardship, negative life events such as history of abuse, no or low education, unskilled and low-skilled, substance misuse, criminality, transportation problems, caring responsibilities for children, ill, ex-forces (and their families), elderly or disabled family members, lack of access to or poorly developed social networks, and language and literacy barriers.

Many customers are highly complementary of the support they have received through the UCan project, for example:

Quote: "Vicky has guided me through this experience in a really positive but caring way. She has encouraged me to challenge myself but never put me under pressure to do something that I really didn't want to, which has been the perfect balance for me."

Quote: "Staff are very kind and understanding. They don't judge you"

PROJECTS (continued)

WISE Choices

Through the UCan initiative, WISE Ability has developed a behaviour change programme, 'WISE Choices', with cognitive functioning and emotional capability themed activities. WISE Choices is a specialist mental health intervention service delivered to participants who are enrolled in the UCan project. This model of support responds to the needs of people aged 25 and older with persistent mental health challenges. The focus of the team delivering this service is to enhance the lives of participants who have mental health care needs. WISE Choices incorporates fun activities to improve mental processes such as concentration, memory, attention and planning and helps educate participants in skills and strategies for the development and maintenance of positive mental health and resilience.

This pilot initiative is highly popular with participants. Over 75% report feeling significantly better at managing their everyday lives and communicating with other people as well as an increased ability to organise, plan, problem-solve, and set goals.

The importance of our support

Our BBO UCan participants are from the most disadvantaged communities in the South of England and present with a blend of complex vocational and non-vocational barriers that impact on their employability and other areas of their life.

The following case study demonstrates features of UCan:

From hopelessness to hope: Joe's journey

When Joe (not his real name) engaged in the service he had minimal communication skills, anger management issues, very low self-esteem, and no social or community contact. He carried vulnerabilities derived from childhood, his time in the ex-forces, relationship breakdowns, problematic drinking, and substance abuse. As per the principles of The Armed Forces Covenant, we are committed to support exforces and forces personnel and their families, who are historically economically inactive. WISE Ability understand the importance of helping ex-service personnel overcome the difficult combination of barriers that impede their successful participation in the community and workforce. For example, if members are not connected to support services once they leave or are discharged, monitoring and visibility of that group diminishes (Barton, et al, 2008) and they are at greater risk. Ex-service personnel are at significant risk of pervasive psychological wounds such as PTSD, depression, and anxiety (Doyle & Peterson, 2005). Stigma around mental illness is a significant barrier to accessing services for veterans with mental health issues. Mental illness is also a significant barrier to veterans accessing and keeping a job.

Staff assisted Joe with the formalities of complying with MOJ requirements such as attending court dates, going to substance abuse counselling, dealing with addiction, signing-in for probation, and other medical issues. His lack of personal relationships, family disconnection (because they've been "burned" before), severe social isolation and loneliness, impacted heavily on his self-esteem and he relapsed in and out of substance use. He was a long way from focusing on employment. Listening and talking with Joe about his personal issues was vital. Staff persisted when Joe felt hopeless and lacked motivation, by making home visits to motivate him to get up and at least attempt to give life a go. Staff advised Joe about the Armed Forces Covenant. Over time he reached a "turning point", and WISE Ability referred him for veteran peer support. For now, success for Joe means simply staying with veteran peer support and experiencing a different approach to life. He is experiencing improved social and community connectedness.

Owing to our passionate and skilled staff and partners we have assisted many participants like Joe into employment, education and training, helped alleviate poverty, hardship, and distress, and helped UCan participants to reconnect with their community and achieve improvements in their quality of life.

PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

Successfully deliver the UCan contract

WISE Ability Services Limited's mission is "to help people in difficult situations overcome personal challenges, find employment and regain their independence".

WISE Ability Services had a successful year in 2019-2020, despite being faced by challenges, such as increasing project costs, pressure from ongoing Covid-19 measures, and escalating regulation. Our online delivery strategy worked well during the year enabling customers fast and flexible access to our services. Staff conducted appointments and other aspects of employment assistance and training via utilising video apps and conference tools. WISE Ability adopted COVID-19 protective measures and safe practices to help keep staff, employers, customers and the wider community safe.

Of critical importance and relevance to our mission, we aim to successfully support participants of the UCan project to gain life skills, employability skills, strategies and confidence to overcome their challenges and barriers, as a means for achieving positive outcomes in education, training, employment and personal and community wellbeing. Furthermore, we will strive to create more inclusive communities and workplaces, increased economic prosperity, and greater opportunity for people with disability and other disadvantages to engage fully in all aspects of life. Our UCan project is now well established and we are able to evaluate and analyse the project. We continued to work with our external evaluators on the evaluation and share learning and experience.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Going concern

The charity meets its day to day working capital requirements through careful management and support from its ultimate parent undertaking. The trustees have obtained a letter of support from the ultimate parent undertaking, and on the basis of that support, consider it appropriate to adopt the going concern basis in preparing these financial statements. In assessing the ability of the group to continue to operate as a going concern for the foreseeable future, the trustees have considered the cash resources available to ensure that the company can meet its liabilities as they fall due taking into account the expected impacts of the Covid-19 pandemic. The full impact of the COVID-19 outbreak cannot presently be estimated with any certainty, but with the support of the ultimate parent undertaking the group has adequate resources and mitigation strategies available to fund its activities and deal with the impact of the outbreak as it unfolds.

Financial review

Total income of £1,373,809 (2019: £1,382,276) relates to a Building Better Opportunities grant.

The net surplus for the year of £Nil (2019: £3,108 net surplus) includes the release of a £Nil (2019: £3,108) provision made against group debt recoverable. At the balance sheet date, the total funds carried forward was £91,790 (2019: £91,790) which are unrestricted funds.

The charity has a subsidiary undertaking, Company Number 02297415 Limited which is dormant and will be removed from the Company register in due course. At 30 June 2020 Company Number 02297415 Limited had deficit funds of £398,532 (2019: £398,532).

Principal risks and uncertainties

The trustees have considered the major risks faced by the charity and have put procedures in place to mitigate those perceived risks. This will continue to be monitored on an ongoing basis through the Senior Management Team and the Audit, Risk and Investment Subcommittee. The major risks and uncertainties are considered to be recruitment, retention and replacement to key staff, failure to remain compliant in the contract, and the uncertainty in market conditions due to changes in government policy.

FINANCIAL REVIEW (continued)

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity to have adequate reserves in place to support its planned charitable activities for the foreseeable future and to meet its obligations towards staff and creditors. At the balance sheet date, free reserves stood at £91,970 (2019: £91,790). The trustees consider that this level of reserves is sufficient and adequate to fulfil its obligations.

Principal funding

The funding for the charity comes from the National Lottery Community Fund and no other form of funding has been accessed in the financial year. All funds are currently restricted.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Organisational structure and decision making

Organisational structure

WISE Ability Services Limited's board has met 9 times this financial year. At each Board meeting, Trustees review essential reports including financial and budgetary management, operational performance, audit and risk, human resources planning and business development. Decisions are taken based on the recommendations put forward by Senior Management.

Day to day running of WISE Ability Services Limited is managed by the executive team which is led by the Chief Executive Officer. This team supports the Board of Trustees through delegated powers as outlined in the financial regulations and annual business plan.

Method of appointment or election of Trustees

The management of the charitable company is the responsibility of the trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Articles of Association. The Articles specify that there should be at least three trustees/directors at any time. Directors are subject to appointment by the sole member of the charitable company. The sole member is WISE Ability Limited, a charitable company registered in England and Wales.

Policies adopted for the induction and training of Trustees

WISE Ability Services Limited's mission is "to help people in difficult situations overcome personal challenges, find employment and regain their independence".

WISE Ability Services Limited's mission is realised through assisting participants in developing relevant skills, supporting them to gain and maintain work to improve their wellbeing, and encouraging and supporting employers to enable this.

WISE Ability Services Limited strives to ensure that our vision and mission is appropriately reflected through the diversity of the Trustees. The trustees (inclusive of six independent volunteers) bring the professional qualifications and expertise necessary for good governance including: legal, finance, audit, risk, disability and government relations.

To maintain this skills mix, Trustees are requested to provide a list of their skills and update this each year. The Trustees will ensure that new individuals with the appropriate skills are appointed to the Board, providing a breadth of skills and abilities the company requires.

New Trustees are invited to attend an induction meeting. This provides them with an introduction to WISE Ability Services Limited, the WISE Ability Limited Group, other Board members, its Articles of Association, the annual Business Plan, Risk Management Plan, and its aims and objectives. Information on compliance and accountability systems, recent financial performance, and the role and responsibilities of a Trustee is also supplied along with a copy of 'The essential trustee: what you need to know, what you need to do' (CC3a) publication by the Charity Commission.

All Trustees are apprised on changes in charity and company law as they arise, and also complete charity governance training and/or refresher training when required, as part of an ongoing programme of governance development.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT (continued)

Risk management

All Trustees are experienced in identifying, managing and minimising risks and this is a standing agenda item at each Board meeting. The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charitable company is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charitable company and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate our exposure to major risks.

Arrangements for setting pay and remuneration of Key Management Personnel

The pay and remuneration of Key Management Personnel is considered annually in line with benchmarking reviews conducted looking at a number of sources such as remuneration publications and similar. Key Management Personnel are employed via WISE Ability Limited.

AUDITOR

The auditor, RSM UK Audit LLP, is deemed to be reappointed under section 487(2) of the Companies Act 2006.

STATEMENT OF DISCLOSURE TO AUDITOR

So far as each Trustee is aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the charity's auditor is unaware. Additionally, each Trustee has taken all the necessary steps that they ought to have taken as Trustees in order to make themselves aware of all relevant audit information and to establish that the company's auditor is aware of that information.

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1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

GENERAL INFORMATION

WISE Ability Services Limited is an incorporated charity limited by guarantee (company number 07200102) and is also a registered charity at the Charity Commission (charity registration number 1158761), registered in England.

The registered office of the charitable company is 14 Victoria Road, Tamworth, B79 7HL. The charitable company principal activities are set out in the Trustees' Report.

COMPANY STATUS

The company is limited by guarantee. The sole member of the company is the parent company WISE Ability Limited. In the event of the charitable company being wound up the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below.

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland" including the adoption of the amendments issued in December 2017 ("FRS 102") and the requirements of the Companies Act 2006 and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

WISE Ability Services Limited meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

In accordance with FRS 102, the charitable company has taken advantage of the exemptions from the following disclosure requirements:

 Section 7 'Statement of Cash Flows' – Presentation of a Statement of Cash Flow and related notes and disclosures for the charitable company.

The financial statements of the charitable company are consolidated in the financial statements of WISE Ability Limited. The consolidated financial statements of WISE Ability Limited are available from the registered office, 14 Victoria Road, Tamworth, B79 7HL.

Consolidated financial statements

The charitable company has taken advantage of the exemption under section 400 of Companies Act 2006 not to prepare consolidated accounts. The financial statements present information about the charitable company as an individual entity and not about its group.

GOING CONCERN

The charity meets its day to day working capital requirements through careful management and support from its ultimate parent undertaking. The trustees have obtained a letter of support from the ultimate parent undertaking, and on the basis of that support, consider it appropriate to adopt the going concern basis in preparing these financial statements. In assessing the ability of the group to continue to operate as a going concern for the foreseeable future, the trustees have considered the cash resources available to ensure that the company can meet its liabilities as they fall due taking into account the expected impacts of the Covid-19 pandemic. The full impact of the COVID-19 outbreak cannot presently be estimated with any certainty, but with the support of the ultimate parent undertaking the group has adequate resources and mitigation strategies available to fund its activities and deal with the impact of the outbreak as it unfolds.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

INCOME

All income including grants receivable is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charitable company has entitlement to any resources, any performance conditions attached to the income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received, and amount can be measured reliably.

FUND ACCOUNTING

Where income is received for the purposes specified by the donor or by the terms of appeal under which it was raised, that income is shown as restricted in the statement of financial activities. Expenditure for the specified purposes is shown as restricted expenditure. Any unexpended balance is carried forward as restricted income funds.

Unrestricted funds are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees.

EXPENDITURE

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified under charitable activity rather than the type of expense, in order to provide more useful information to users of the financial statements.

CHARITABLE ACTIVITIES

The cost of charitable activities comprises of all direct and support costs involved in providing services under the BBO contract.

INVESTMENTS

Fixed asset investments are recorded at the Trustees best estimate of fair value. If fair value is greater than cost, the unrealised surplus is reported as such in the charity's Statement of Financial Activities.

IMPAIRMENTS OF FIXED ASSETS

An assessment is made at each reporting date of whether there are indications that a fixed asset may be impaired or that an impairment loss previously recognised has fully or partially reversed. If such indications exist, the charitable company estimates the recoverable amount of the asset.

Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts, being the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value-in-use, are recognised as impairment losses. Impairment losses are recognised in statement of financial activities.

Recognised impairment losses are reversed if, and only if, the reasons for the impairment loss have ceased to apply. Reversals of impairment losses are recognised in statement of financial activities. On reversal of an impairment loss, the depreciation is adjusted to allocate the asset's revised carrying amount (less any residual value) over its remaining useful life.

FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The charitable company only has financial assets and liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments and are not considered to be of financial nature. Such financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

DEBTORS

Other debtors which are receivable within one year and which do not constitute a financing transaction are initially measured at the transaction price. Other debtors are subsequently measured at amortised cost, being the transaction price less any amounts settled and any impairment losses.

CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash and monies on short-term deposits at the bank and other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

CREDITORS

Creditors and provisions, are recognised where the charitable company has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

TAXATION

No provision for corporation tax has been made as the charitable company is exempt from the requirement to pay Corporation Tax on the income and gains to the extent that these are applied to its charitable activities.

LEASING

Rentals payable under operating leases, where substantially all the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charitable company is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

RETIREMENT BENEFITS

Defined contribution plans

For defined contribution schemes the amount charged to Statement of financial activities is the contributions payable in the year. Differences between contributions payable in the year and contributions actually paid are shown as either accruals or prepayments.

2. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES AND AREAS OF JUDGEMENT

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. There are no critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement to note.
