STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and constitute a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The initial Trustees founded the company due to their interest in the aims of the charity as set out below.

Induction and training of new trustees

All Trustees have read the guidance issued by the Charity Commission concerning their roles and obligations.

Trustees can retire when they wish as they do not serve under a fixed term of tenure.

Organisational structure

Trustees meet informally on a regular basis to manage the activities of the charity, which are organised by the executive management committee.

A Trustee is required to sign any property lease that the charity enters into.

Risk management

The Trustees have conducted a full risk assessment of the organisation. Various systems and checks have been put into operation and these are reviewed annually.

The Trustees are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate our exposure to those major risks.

The Trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The charity's objects ("Objects") are specifically restricted to the following:

- (1) To promote the efficiency and effectiveness of charities and the effective use of charitable resources for the benefit of the public by providing charities, non-profit or community organisations with access to property in otherwise vacant units on a non-commercial basis; and
- (2) To promote charitable use of property as a means of empowering communities, regenerating areas, developing a robust community sector, supporting social enterprise and delivering public benefit.

Significant activities

The charity's work involves signing short-term, meanwhile use, leases on empty commercial properties, which are then made available to charitable organisations, social enterprises, recognised community groups and qualifying local start-up businesses.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

How our activities deliver public benefit

Our main activities and who we try to help are described below. All our activities focus on providing charities, not for profit organisations and qualifying local start-up businesses with access to properties in which they can carry out their own activities for public benefit.

During the period, the charity provided space to over 150 organisations across 6 properties.

Organisations who used our spaces have included registered charities (with a primary focus on education, unemployment, health, sport, start up business and youth), universities, social enterprises, community groups, qualifying local start-up businesses and local authorities.

Projects running in the charity's properties have continued to expand the reach of voluntary and community sector organisations at a time when traditional models of service delivery have been under pressure if not out-of-reach.

A brief summary of activities undertaken by beneficiary organizations during the period is included below:

The charity's largest and most successful project was in Audit House on the Victoria Embankment in the City of London, which ran from December 2012 until September 2013. The 30,000 square foot former courthouse was used by over 50 organisations, while a further 50 organisations participated in the Re:Think Festival, a large scale conference on the topic of urban sustainability and how cities could use resources in a more effective and socially responsible way. Other activities in the building included office space, theatre and musical rehearsals and performances, exhibitions, talks, workshops, conferences, training leadership programmes, performance art and after-school classes. The charity also hosted monthly drinks events where users could collaborate, network and skill share.

The charity also worked with the Cabinet Office under the Space for Growth initiative in Merton from May to November 2013. Working with the DVLA and the Department of Business, Innovation and Skills we opened an office hub for early stage start-ups as well as charities and not for profits, with an additional space used for theatre rehearsals, talks and workshops. The charity also offered business support for local organisations in partnership with the Merton Chamber of Commerce. In total 28 different organisations used the space.

The charity's Oxford Street unit continued to be a popular and in demand space, with 31 organisations using the space during the period. Uses ranged from hot-desking to exhibitions, drama rehearsals and performances, workshops, art installations, music rehearsals, language classes, and a meeting and conference venue.

The charity's retail unit in Blackpool was used by NW Baseline CIC a local arts organisation. Activities in the unit included painting, screen printing, t-shirt printing and street art. By securing a visible location to display artwork, certain local artists went on to secure commissions and were able to discuss future partnerships with the Council. NW Baseline CIC also ran a program of free classes for local children many of whom had been excluded from school.

In Wigan we continued to work with the MS Society. The space was used as a café, to fundraise through a retail provision and also provided a space where sufferers of MS could receive physical therapy and counselling. Alongside the revenue that the MS Society were able to generate through the use of the space the other significant benefit was that the activities offered in the space helped to combat social isolation amongst the elderly.

A further retail unit was secured in East Kilbride during the period, but the space required various building works to ensure it was health and safety compliant. These were successfully undertaken during the period and the unit is now up and running.

Further details of additional past projects can be found on the Charity's website.

During the period, the charity has continued to work with and develop its Advisory Panel - a group of experts from the property, regeneration and marketing sectors - who meet once a quarter to provide advice and direction. 3Space hugely appreciates the time, effort and valuable support generously given by the members of the Panel.

The charity was also delighted to be selected as the winner for the European region in the Financial Times and Citi Urban Ingenuity awards in December 2013, a global competition created to recognise innovative solutions to urban challenges.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The Trustees aim for the Charity to build up reserves of £40,000, approximately equal to six months of total resources expended. The trustees believe this decrease (from the prior period's reserves target of £110,000) is reflective of the current and immediate position of the charity.

The financial position at the end of the period was a surplus of £32,262 (2013 - £62,129). Continued progress has been made towards achieving the reserves target, and the Trustees are confident that the Charity will continue to operate in the future and are in the opinion that it will meet its liabilities as and when due.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Investment policy and objectives

Under its Memorandum and Articles of Association, the charity has the power to invest in any way the trustees wish. The trustees, having regard to the liquidity requirements of operating the charity have maintained a policy of keeping available funds in interest bearing deposit accounts.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

Given the continued economic climate and the active efforts by the current government to stimulate economic and urban regeneration via activation of vacant property, the charity is confident that it is well placed to continue to delivering significant public benefit from otherwise un-utilised resources.

However, the volume of property under the charity's control continued to be significantly reduced following the placing into administration of the charity's largest commercial partner, JJB Sports in September 2012.

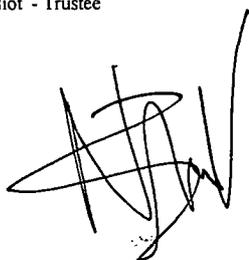
As a result, the charity continues to actively seek to engage additional new partners, both commercial and governmental in order to expand its activities.

Since the year-end, the charity continued to deliver its objectives in partnership with the Cabinet Office's Space for Growth initiative, with a second office hub opened in Croydon in April 2014.

In December 2014, the charity also partnered with Barclays Bank to open its first 'Hatch', a community innovation and event space in an ex-bank branch in Oxford, the first in a series of pilots scheduled for 2015.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF
3SPACE

I report on the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2014 set out on pages five to eight.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees (who are also the directors for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year (under Section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act)) and that an independent examination is required.

I. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The accounts have been prepared on the going concern basis as the Trustees are of the opinion that the company will meet its liabilities as and when due.

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Investments

Investment in subsidiaries are valued at cost less provision for impairment.
